1 TITLE I—GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 2 *SEC. 101. FINDINGS.*
- 3 Congress finds the following:
- 4 (1) Veterans of the United States Armed Forces
- 5 have been and continue to be vital to the small busi-
- 6 ness enterprises of the United States.
- 7 (2) In serving the United States, veterans often
- 8 faced great risks to preserve the American dream of
- 9 freedom and prosperity.
- 10 (3) The United States has done too little to assist
- 11 veterans, particularly service-disabled veterans, in
- 12 playing a greater role in the economy of the United
- 13 States by forming and expanding small business en-
- 14 terprises.

1	(4) Medical advances and new medical tech-
2	nologies have made it possible for service-disabled vet-
3	erans to play a much more active role in the forma-
4	tion and expansion of small business enterprises in
5	the United States.
6	(5) The United States must provide additional
7	assistance and support to veterans to better equip
8	them to form and expand small business enterprises,
9	thereby enabling them to realize the American dream
10	that they fought to protect.
11	SEC. 102. PURPOSE.
12	The purpose of this Act is to expand existing and es-
13	tablish new assistance programs for veterans who own or
14	operate small businesses. This Act accomplishes this purpose
15	<i>by</i> —
16	(1) expanding the eligibility for certain small
17	business assistance programs to include veterans;
18	(2) directing certain departments and agencies of
19	the United States to take actions that enhance small
20	business assistance to veterans; and
21	(3) establishing new institutions to provide small
22	business assistance to veterans or to support the insti-
23	tutions that provide such assistance.

1 SEC. 103. DEFINITIONS.

2	(a) Small Business Act.—Section 3 of the Small
3	Business Act (15 U.S.C. 632) is amended by adding at the
4	end the following:
5	"(q) Definitions Relating to Veterans.—In this
6	Act, the following definitions apply:
7	"(1) Service-disabled veteran.—The term
8	'service-disabled veteran' means a veteran with a dis-
9	ability that is service-connected (as defined in section
10	101(16) of title 38, United States Code).
11	"(2) Small business concern owned and
12	CONTROLLED BY SERVICE-DISABLED VETERANS.—The
13	term 'small business concern owned and controlled by
14	service-disabled veterans' means a small business
15	concern—
16	"(A) not less than 51 percent of which is
17	owned by 1 or more service-disabled veterans or,
18	in the case of any publicly owned business, not
19	less than 51 percent of the stock of which is
20	owned by 1 or more service-disabled veterans;
21	and
22	"(B) the management and daily business
23	operations of which are controlled by 1 or more
24	service-disabled veterans or, in the case of a vet-
25	eran with permanent and severe disability, the
26	spouse or permanent caregiver of such veteran.

1	"(3) Small business concern owned and
2	Controlled by Veterans.—The term 'small busi-
3	ness concern owned and controlled by veterans' means
4	a small business concern—
5	"(A) not less than 51 percent of which is
6	owned by 1 or more veterans or, in the case of
7	any publicly owned business, not less than 51
8	percent of the stock of which is owned by 1 or
9	more veterans; and
10	"(B) the management and daily business
11	operations of which are controlled by 1 or more
12	veterans.
13	"(4) Veteran.—The term 'veteran' has the
14	meaning given the term in section 101(2) of title 38,
15	United States Code.".
16	(b) APPLICABILITY TO THIS ACT.—In this Act, the
17	definitions contained in section $3(q)$ of the Small Business
18	Act, as added by this section, apply.
19	TITLE II—VETERANS BUSINESS
20	DEVELOPMENT
21	SEC. 201. VETERANS BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT IN THE
22	SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION.
23	(a) In General.—Section 4(b)(1) of the Small Busi-
24	ness Act (15 U.S.C. 633(b)(1)) is amended—

1	(1) in the 5th sentence, by striking "four Asso-
2	ciate Administrators" and inserting "five Associate
3	Administrators"; and
4	(2) by inserting after the 5th sentence the fol-
5	lowing: "One such Associate Administrator shall be
6	the Associate Administrator for Veterans Business De-
7	velopment, who shall administer the Office of Veterans
8	Business Development established under section 32.".
9	(b) Office of Veterans Business Development;
10	Associate Administrator.—The Small Business Act (15
11	U.S.C. 631 et seq.) is further amended—
12	(1) by redesignating section 32 as section 34;
13	and
14	(2) by inserting after section 31 the following:
15	"SEC. 32. VETERANS PROGRAMS.
16	"(a) Office of Veterans Business Develop-
17	MENT.—There is established in the Administration an Of-
18	fice of Veterans Business Development, which shall be ad-
19	ministered by the Associate Administrator for Veterans
20	Business Development (in this section referred to as the 'As-
21	$sociate\ Administrator')\ appointed\ under\ section\ 4(b)(1).$
22	"(b) Associate Administrator for Veterans
23	Business Development.—The Associate
24	Administrator—

1	"(1) shall be an appointee in the Senior Execu-
2	tive Service;
3	"(2) shall be responsible for the formulation, exe-
4	cution, and promotion of policies and programs of the
5	Administration that provide assistance to small busi-
6	ness concerns owned and controlled by veterans and
7	small business concerns owned and controlled by serv-
8	ice-disabled veterans. The Associate Administrator
9	shall act as an ombudsman for full consideration of
10	veterans in all programs of the Administration; and
11	"(3) shall report to and be responsible directly to
12	$the\ Administrator.$ ".
13	SEC. 202. NATIONAL VETERANS BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT
14	CORPORATION.
15	The Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 631 et seq.) is fur-
16	ther amended by adding after section 32 (as added by this
17	Act) the following:
18	"SEC. 33. NATIONAL VETERANS BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT
19	CORPORATION.
20	"(a) Establishment.—There is established a feder-
21	ally chartered corporation to be known as the National Vet-
22	erans Business Development Corporation (in this section re-
23	ferred to as the 'Corporation') which shall be incorporated
24	under the laws of the District of Columbia and which shall
25	have the powers granted in this section.

1	"(b) Purposes of the Corporation.—The purposes
2	of the Corporation shall be—
3	"(1) to expand the provision of and improve ac-
4	cess to technical assistance regarding entrepreneur-
5	ship for the Nation's veterans; and
6	"(2) to assist veterans, including service-disabled
7	veterans, with the formation and expansion of small
8	business concerns by working with and organizing
9	public and private resources, including those of the
10	Small Business Administration, the Department of
11	Veterans Affairs, the Department of Labor, the De-
12	partment of Commerce, the Department of Defense,
13	the Service Corps of Retired Executives (described in
14	section 8(b)(1)(B) of this Act), the Small Business
15	Development Centers (described in section 21 of this
16	Act), and the business development staffs of each de-
17	partment and agency of the United States.
18	"(c) Board of Directors.—
19	"(1) In general.—The management of the Cor-
20	poration shall be vested in a Board of Directors com-
21	posed of 9 voting members and 3 nonvoting ex officio
22	members.
23	"(2) Appointment of voting members.—The
24	President shall appoint United States citizens to be
25	voting members of the Board of Directors as follows:

1	"(A) 1 from a list of individuals nominated
2	by the chairman of the Committee on Small
3	Business of the House of Representatives.
4	"(B) 1 from a list of individuals nominated
5	by the chairman of the Committee on Small
6	Business of the Senate.
7	"(C) 1 from a list of individuals nominated
8	by the ranking minority member of the Com-
9	mittee on Small Business of the House of Rep-
10	resentatives.
11	"(D) 1 from a list of individuals nominated
12	by the ranking minority members of the Com-
13	mittee on Small Business of the Senate.
14	"(E) 1 from a list of individuals nominated
15	by the chairman of the Committee on Veterans'
16	Affairs of the House of Representatives.
17	"(F) 1 from a list of individuals nominated
18	by the chairman of the Committee on Veterans'
19	Affairs of the Senate.
20	"(G) 1 from a list of individuals nominated
21	by the ranking minority member of the Com-
22	mittee on Veterans' Affairs of the House of Rep-
23	resentatives.

1	"(H) 1 from a list of individuals nominated
2	the ranking minority member of the Committee
3	on Veterans' Affairs of the Senate.
4	"(I) 1 of the President's own choosing.
5	"(3) Ex officio members.—The Administrator
6	of the Small Business Administration, the Secretary
7	of Defense, and the Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall
8	serve as the nonvoting ex officio members of the Board
9	$of\ Directors.$
10	"(4) Chairperson.—The members of the Board
11	of Directors appointed under paragraph (2) shall
12	elect one such member to serve as chairperson of the
13	Board of Directors for a term of 2 years.
14	"(5) Terms of appointed members.—
15	"(A) In general.—Each member of the
16	Board of Directors appointed under paragraph
17	(2) shall serve a term of 6 years, except as pro-
18	vided in subparagraph (B).
19	"(B) Terms of initial appointees.—As
20	designated by the President at the time of ap-
21	pointment, of the members first appointed—
22	"(i) 3 shall be for a term of 2 years;
23	and
24	"(ii) 3 shall be for a term of 4 years.

- "(C) Unexpired terms.—Any member of the Board of Directors appointed to fill a vacancy occurring before the expiration of the term for which the member's predecessor was appointed shall be appointed only for the remain-der of the term. A member may serve after the expiration of that member's term until a suc-cessor has taken office.
 - "(6) VACANCIES.—Any vacancy on the Board of Directors shall be filled in the manner in which the original appointment was made. In the case of a vacancy in the office of the Administrator of the Small Business Administration or the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, and pending the appointment of a successor, an acting appointee for such vacancy may serve as an ex officio member.
 - "(7) Ineligibility for other offices.—No voting member of the Board of Directors may be an officer or employee of the United States while serving as a member of the Board of Directors or during the 2-year period preceding such service.
 - "(8) Impartiality and nondiscrimination.—
 The Board of Directors shall administer the affairs of
 the Corporation fairly and impartially and without
 discrimination.

1	"(9) Obligations and expenses.—The Board
2	of Directors shall prescribe the manner in which the
3	obligations of the Corporation may be incurred and
4	in which its expenses shall be allowed and paid.
5	"(10) Quorum.—5 voting members of the Board
6	of Directors shall constitute a quorum, but a lesser
7	number may hold hearings.
8	"(d) Corporate Powers.—On October 1, 1999, the
9	Corporation shall become a body corporate and as such
10	shall have the authority to do the following:
11	"(1) To adopt and use a corporate seal.
12	"(2) To have succession until dissolved by an Act
13	of Congress.
14	"(3) To make contracts or grants.
15	"(4) To sue and be sued, and to file and defend
16	against lawsuits in State or Federal court.
17	"(5) To appoint, through the actions of its Board
18	of Directors, officers and employees of the Corpora-
19	tion, to define their duties and responsibilities, fix
20	their compensations, and to dismiss at will such offi-
21	cers or employees.
22	"(6) To prescribe, through the actions of its
23	Board of Directors, bylaws not inconsistent with Fed-
24	eral law and the law of the State of incorporation,
25	regulating the manner in which its general business

1	may be conducted and the manner in which the privi-
2	leges granted to it by law may be exercised.
3	"(7) To exercise, through the actions of its Board
4	of Directors or duly authorized officers, all powers
5	specifically granted by the provisions of this section,
6	and such incidental powers as shall be necessary.
7	"(8) To solicit, receive, and disburse funds from
8	private, Federal, State and local organizations.
9	"(9) To accept and employ or dispose of in fur-
10	therance of the purposes of this section any money or
11	property, real, personal, or mixed, tangible or intan-
12	gible, received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise.
13	"(10) To accept voluntary and uncompensated
14	services.
15	"(e) Corporate Funds.—
16	"(1) Deposit of funds.—The Board of Direc-
17	tors shall deposit all funds of the Corporation in fed-
18	erally chartered and insured depository institutions
19	until such funds are disbursed under paragraph (2).
20	"(2) Disbursement of funds.—Funds of the
21	Corporation may be disbursed only for purposes that
22	are—
23	"(A) approved by the Board of Directors by
24	a recorded vote with a quorum present; and

1 "(B) in accordance with the purposes of the 2 Corporation as specified in subsection (b). 3 "(f) Network of Information and Assistance Centers.—In carrying out the purpose described in sub-5 section (b), the Corporation shall establish and maintain a network of information and assistance centers for use by veterans and the public. 8 "(g) Annual Report.—On or before October 1 of each year, the Board of Directors shall transmit a report to the 10 President and Congress describing the activities and accomplishments of the Corporation for the preceding year and the Corporation's findings regarding the efforts of Federal, State and private organizations to assist veterans in the formation and expansion of small business concerns. 15 "(h) Assumption of Duties of Advisory Com-MITTEE.—On October 1, 2004, the Corporation established under this section shall assume the duties, responsibilities, and authority of the Advisory Committee on Veterans Af-18 fairs established under section 203 of this Act. 20 "(i) USE OF MAILS.—The Corporation may use the 21 United States mails in the same manner and under the same conditions as the departments and agencies of the United States. 23

- "(1) IN GENERAL.—Acting through the Board of
 Directors, the Corporation shall establish a Professional Certification Advisory Board to create uniform
 guidelines and standards for the professional certification of members of the Armed Services to aid in
 their efficient and orderly transition to civilian occupations and professions and to remove potential barriers in the areas of licensure and certification.
 - "(2) Membership.—The members of the Advisory Board shall serve without compensation, shall meet in the District of Columbia no less than quarterly, and shall be appointed by the Board of Directors as follows:
 - "(A) Private Sector Members.—The Corporation shall appoint not less than 7 members for terms of 2 years to represent private sector organizations and associations, including the American Association of Community Colleges, the Society for Human Resource Managers, the Coalition for Professional Certification, and the Council on Licensure and Enforcement.
 - "(B) Public sector members.—The Corporation shall invite public sector members to serve at the discretion of their departments or agencies and shall—

1	"(i) encourage the participation of the
2	Under Secretary of Defense for Personnel
3	and Readiness;
4	"(ii) encourage the participation of 2
5	officers from each branch of the Armed
6	Forces to represent the Training Commands
7	of their branch; and
8	"(iii) seek the participation and guid-
9	ance of the Assistant Secretary of Labor for
10	Veterans' Employment and Training.
11	"(k) Authorization of Appropriations.—
12	"(1) In general.—There are authorized to be
13	appropriated to the Corporation to carry out this sec-
14	tion the following amounts:
15	"(A) \$2,000,000 for fiscal year 2000;
16	"(B) \$4,000,000 for fiscal year 2001;
17	"(C) \$4,000,000 for fiscal year 2002; and
18	"(D) \$2,000,000 for fiscal year 2003.
19	"(2) Privatization.—The Corporation shall in-
20	stitute and implement a plan to raise private funds
21	and become a self-sustaining corporation.".
22	SEC. 203. ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON VETERANS BUSINESS
23	AFFAIRS.
24	(a) In General.—There is established an advisory
25	committee to be known as the "Advisory Committee on Vet-

1	erans Business Affairs" (in this section referred to as the
2	"Committee"), which shall serve as an independent source
3	of advice and policy recommendations to—
4	(1) the Administrator of the Small Business Ad-
5	ministration (in this section referred to as the "Ad-
6	ministrator");
7	(2) the Associate Administrator for Veterans
8	Business Development of the Small Business Admin-
9	istration;
10	(3) Congress;
11	(4) the President; and
12	(5) other United States policymakers.
13	(b) Membership.—
14	(1) In general.—The Committee shall be com-
15	posed of 15 members, of whom—
16	(A) 8 shall be veterans who are owners of
17	small business concerns (within the meaning of
18	the term under section 3 of the Small Business
19	Act (15 U.S.C. 632)); and
20	(B) 7 shall be representatives of veterans or-
21	ganizations.
22	(2) Appointment.—
23	(A) In General.—The members of the
24	Committee shall be appointed by the Adminis-
25	trator in accordance with this section.

1	(B) Initial appointments.—Not later
2	than 90 days after the date of enactment of this
3	Act, the Administrator shall appoint the initial
4	members of the Committee.
5	(3) Political affiliation.—Not more than 8
6	members of the Committee shall be of the same polit-
7	ical party as the President.
8	(4) Prohibition on Federal Employment.—
9	(A) In general.—Except as provided in
10	subsection (B), no member of the Committee may
11	serve as an officer or employee of the United
12	States.
13	(B) Exception.—A member of the Com-
14	mittee who accepts a position as an officer or
15	employee of the United States after the date of
16	the member's appointment to the Committee may
17	continue to serve on the Committee for not more
18	than 30 days after such acceptance.
19	(5) Term of Service.—
20	(A) In general.—Subject to subparagraph
21	(B), the term of service of each member of the
22	Committee shall be 3 years.
23	(B) Terms of initial appointees.—As
24	designated by the Administrator at the time of
25	appointment, of the members first appointed—

1	(i) 6 shall be appointed for a term of
2	4 years; and
3	(ii) 5 shall be appointed for a term of
4	5 years.
5	(6) Vacancies.—The Administrator shall fill
6	any vacancies on the membership of the Committee
7	not later than 30 days after the date on which such
8	vacancy occurs.
9	(7) Chairperson.—
10	(A) In General.—The members of the
11	Committee shall elect one of the members to be
12	Chairperson of the Committee.
13	(B) VACANCIES IN OFFICE OF CHAIR-
14	PERSON.—Any vacancy in the office of the
15	Chairperson of the Committee shall be filled by
16	the Committee at the first meeting of the Com-
17	mittee following the date on which the vacancy
18	occurs.
19	(c) Duties.—The duties of the Committee shall be the
20	following:
21	(1) Review, coordinate, and monitor plans and
22	programs developed in the public and private sectors,
23	that affect the ability of small business concerns
24	owned and controlled by veterans to obtain capital
25	and credit and to access markets.

- 1 (2) Promote the collection of business informa-2 tion and survey data as they relate to veterans and 3 small business concerns owned and controlled by vet-4 erans.
 - (3) Monitor and promote plans, programs, and operations of the departments and agencies of the United States that may contribute to the formation and growth of small business concerns owned and controlled by veterans.
 - (4) Develop and promote initiatives, policies, programs, and plans designed to foster small business concerns owned and controlled by veterans.
 - (5) In cooperation with the National Veterans Business Development Corporation, develop a comprehensive plan, to be updated annually, for joint public-private sector efforts to facilitate growth and development of small business concerns owned and controlled by veterans.

(d) Powers.—

(1) Hearings.—Subject to subsection (e), the Committee may hold such hearings, sit and act at such times and places, take such testimony, and receive such evidence as the Committee considers advisable to carry out its duties.

- 1 (2) Information from federal agencies.—
 2 Upon request of the Chairperson of the Committee, the
 3 head of any department or agency of the United
 4 States shall furnish such information to the Committee as the Committee considers to be necessary to
 5 carry out its duties.
 - (3) USE OF MAILS.—The Committee may use the United States mails in the same manner and under the same conditions as other departments and agencies of the United States.
 - (4) GIFTS.—The Committee may accept, use, and dispose of gifts or donations of services or property.

(e) Meetings.—

- (1) In General.—The Committee shall meet, not less than three times per year, at the call of the Chairperson or at the request of the Administrator.
- (2) Location.—Each meeting of the full Committee shall be held at the headquarters of the Small Business Administration located in Washington, District of Columbia. The Administrator shall provide suitable meeting facilities and such administrative support as may be necessary for each full meeting of the Committee.

1	(3) Task groups.—The Committee may, from
2	time to time, establish temporary task groups as may
3	be necessary in order to carry out its duties.
4	(f) Compensation and Expenses.—
5	(1) No compensation.—Members of the Com-

 - (6) Provision of Internet or other distance learning academic instruction for veterans in business subjects, including accounting, marketing, and business fundamentals.
 - (7) Compilation of a list of small business concerns owned and controlled by service-disabled veterans that provide products or services that could be procured by the United States and delivery of such

- 2 States. Such list shall be delivered in hard copy and
