A BILL

To modify the date on which the Mayor of the District of Columbia submits a performance accountability plan to Congress, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA PERFORMANCE AC-**
2 **COUNTABILITY PLAN.**

3 Section 456 of the District of Columbia Home Rule
4 Act (section 47–231 et seq. of the District of Columbia
5 Code) is amended—

6 (1) in subsection (a)—

7 (A) in paragraph (1) by striking “Not
8 later than March 1 of each year (beginning with
9 1998)” and inserting “Concurrent with the sub-
10 mission of the District of Columbia budget to
11 Congress each year (beginning with 2001)”;
12 and

13 (B) in paragraph (2)(A) by striking “that
14 describe an acceptable level of performance by
15 the government and a superior level of perform-
16 ance by the government”; and

17 (2) in subsection (b)—

18 (A) in paragraph (1) by striking “1999”
19 and inserting “2001”; and

20 (B) in paragraph (2)(A) by striking “for
21 an acceptable level of performance by the gov-
22 ernment and a superior level of performance by
23 the government”.

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
