# A BILL

To transfer Federal lands between the Secretary of Agriculture and the Secretary of the Interior.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

**3** SECTION 1. PURPOSES AND DEFINITIONS.

4 (a) PURPOSES.—The purposes of this Act are—

5 (1) to transfer administrative jurisdiction of
6 certain Federal lands in Missouri from the Secretary
7 of the Interior to the Secretary of Agriculture for
8 continued Federal operation of the Mingo Job Corps
9 Civilian Conservation Center; and

1 (2) to not change the Secretary of Labor's role 2 or authority regarding this Job Corps Center. (b) DEFINITIONS.—For the purposes of this Act— 3 (1) "Center" means the Mingo Job Corps Civil-4 5 ian Conservation Center in Stoddard County, Mis-6 souri, referenced in section 2(a) of this Act; (2) "eligible employee" means a person who, as 7 8 of the date of enactment of this Act, is a full-time, 9 part-time, or intermittent annual or per hour perma-10 nent Federal Government employee of the Fish and 11 Wildlife Service at the Mingo Job Corps Civilian 12 Conservation Center, including the two fully funded 13 Washington Office Job Corps support staff; 14 (3) "Environmental Authorities" mean all ap-15 plicable Federal, State and local laws (including reg-16 ulations) and requirements related to protection of 17 human health, natural resources, or the environ-18 ment, including but not limited to: the Comprehen-19 sive Environmental Response, Compensation and Li-20 ability Act of 1980 (42 U.S.C. 9601, et seq.); the 21 Solid Waste Disposal Act (42 U.S.C. 6901, et seq.); 22 the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 23 1251, et seq.); the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401, 24 et seq.); the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and 25 Rodenticide Act (7 U.S.C. 136, et seq.); the Toxic

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1	Substances Control Act (15 U.S.C. 2601, et seq.);
2	the Safe Drinking Water Act (42 U.S.C. 300f, et
3	seq.); and the National Environmental Policy Act of
4	1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321, et seq.);
5	(4) "U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service" means the
6	United States Fish and Wildlife Service as ref-
7	erenced at title 16, United States Code, section
8	742b(b);
9	(5) "Forest Service" means the Department of
10	Agriculture Forest Service as established by the Sec-
11	retary of Agriculture pursuant to the authority of
12	title 16, United States Code, section 551;
13	(6) "Job Corps" means the national Job Corps
14	program established within the Department of
15	Labor, as set forth in the Workforce Investment Act
16	of 1998, Public Law No. 105–220, §§141–161, 112
17	Stat. 1006–1021 (1998) (codified at 29 U.S.C.
18	2881 - 2901);
19	(7) "National Forest System" means that term
20	as defined at title 16, United States Code, section
21	1609(a); and
22	(8) "National Wildlife Refuge System" means
23	that term as defined at title 16, United States Code,
24	section 668dd.

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#### 1 SEC. 2. TRANSFER OF ADMINISTRATION.

2 (a) TRANSFER OF CENTER.—Administrative jurisdic-3 tion over the Mingo Job Corps Civilian Conservation Center, comprising approximately 87 acres in Stoddard Coun-4 5 ty, Missouri, as generally depicted on a map entitled "Mingo National Wildlife Refuge", dated September 17, 6 7 2002, to be precisely identified in accordance with sub-8 section (c) of this section, is hereby transferred, without 9 consideration, from the Secretary of the Interior to the Secretary of Agriculture. 10

- 11 (b) MAPS AND LEGAL DESCRIPTIONS.—
- (1) The map referenced in this section shall be
  on file and available for public inspection in the Office of the Chief, Forest Service, Washington, DC,
  and in the office of the Chief of Realty, U.S. Fish
  and Wildlife Service, Arlington, Virginia.

17 (2) Not later than 180 days after the date of 18 enactment of this Act, the Secretary of the Interior, 19 in consultation with the Secretary of Agriculture, 20 shall file a legal description and map of all of the 21 lands comprising the Center and being transferred 22 by section 2(a) of this Act with the Committee on 23 Resources of the United States House of Represent-24 atives and the Committee on Environment and Public Works of the United States Senate, and such de-25 26 scription and map shall have the same force and ef-

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fect as if included in this Act, except that the Sec-
retary of the Interior may make typographical cor-
rections as necessary.
(c) Applicable Laws.—
(1) Subject to section 3, the Center transferred
pursuant to subsection (a) shall be administered by
the Secretary of Agriculture and shall be subject to
the laws and regulations applicable to the National
Forest System.
(2) This transfer shall not conflict or interfere
with any laws and regulations applicable to Job
Corps.
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the Chief, Forest Service, and the Director, United
 States Fish and Wildlife Service, and with notice
 thereof published in the Federal Register within 60
 days of the date of the Letter of Transfer.
 (b) AUTHORIZATIONS.—
 (1) IN GENERAL.—A permit or other authoriza-

(1) IN GENERAL.—A permit of other authorization granted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service
on the Center that is in effect on the date of enactment of this Act will continue with the concurrence
of the Forest Service.

(2) REISSUANCE.—A permit or authorization
described in paragraph (1) may be reissued or terminated under terms and conditions prescribed by the
Forest Service.

(3) EXERCISE OF RIGHTS.—The Forest Service
may exercise any of the rights of the U.S. Fish and
Wildlife Service contained in any permit or other authorization, including any right to amend, modify,
and revoke the permit or authorization.

20 (c) CONTRACTS.—

(1) EXISTING CONTRACTS.—The Forest Service
is authorized to undertake all rights and obligations
of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service under contracts entered into by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife

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Service on the Center that is in effect on the date
of enactment of this Act.
(2) NOTICE OF NOVATION.—The Forest Service
shall promptly notify all contractors that it is as-
suming the obligations of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife
Service under such contracts.
(3) DISPUTES.—Any contract disputes under
the Contracts Disputes Act (41 U.S.C. 601, et seq.)
regarding the administration of the Center and aris-
ing prior to the date of enactment of this Act shall
be the responsibility of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife
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1 (D) the maintenance and use of roads and 2 trails; and

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(E) other transfer issues.

4 (e) AGREEMENTS With THE SECRETARY OF LABOR.—In the operation of the Center, the Forest Serv-5 ice will undertake the rights and obligations of the U.S. 6 7 Fish and Wildlife Service with respect to existing agree-8 ments with the Secretary of Labor pursuant to Public Law 9 105–220 (29 U.S.C. 2887, et seq.), and the Forest Service 10 will be the responsible agency for any subsequent agreements or amendments to existing agreements. 11

12 (f) Records.—

(1) AREA MANAGEMENT RECORDS.—The Forest
Service shall have access to all records of the U.S.
Fish and Wildlife Service pertaining to the management of the Center.

17 (2) PERSONNEL RECORDS.—The personnel
18 records of eligible employees transferred pursuant to
19 this Act, including the Official Personnel Folder,
20 Employee Performance File, and other related files,
21 shall be transferred to the Forest Service.

(3) LAND TITLE RECORDS.—The U.S. Fish and
Wildlife Service shall provide to the Forest Service
records pertaining to land titles, surveys, and other

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records pertaining to transferred real property and
 facilities.

3 (g) TRANSFER OF PERSONAL PROPERTY.—

4 (1) IN GENERAL.—All federally owned personal 5 property present at the Center is hereby transferred 6 without consideration to the jurisdiction of the For-7 est Service, except that with regard to personal 8 property acquired by the Fish and Wildlife Service 9 using funds provided by the Department of Labor 10 under the Job Corps program, the Forest Service 11 shall dispose of any such property in accordance 12 with the procedures stated in section 7(e) of the 13 1989 Interagency Agreement for Administration of 14 Job Corps Civilian Conservation Center Program, as 15 amended, between the Department of Labor and the 16 Department of the Interior.

17 (2) INVENTORY.—Not later than 60 days after
18 the date of enactment of this Act, the U.S. Fish and
19 Wildlife Service shall provide the Forest Service with
20 an inventory of all property and facilities at the Cen21 ter.

(3) PROPERTY INCLUDED.—Property under
this subsection includes, but is not limited to, buildings, office furniture and supplies, computers, office

equipment, vehicles, tools, equipment, maintenance
 supplies, and publications.

3 (4) EXCLUSION OF PROPERTY.—At the request 4 of the authorized representative of the U.S. Fish 5 and Wildlife Service, the Forest Service may exclude 6 movable property from transfer based on a showing 7 by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service that the prop-8 erty is needed for the mission of the U.S. Fish and 9 Wildlife Service, cannot be replaced in a cost-effec-10 tive manner, and is not needed for management of 11 the Center.

## 12 SEC. 4. COMPLIANCE WITH ENVIRONMENTAL AUTHORI-13 TIES.

14 (a) DOCUMENTATION OF EXISTING CONDITIONS.—

15 (1) IN GENERAL.—Within 60 days after the 16 date of enactment of this Act, the U.S. Fish and 17 Wildlife Service shall provide the Forest Service and 18 the Office of Job Corps, Employment and Training 19 Administration, Department of Labor, all reasonably 20 ascertainable documentation and information that 21 exists on the environmental condition of the land 22 comprising the Center.

23 (2) ADDITIONAL DOCUMENTATION.—The U.S.
24 Fish and Wildlife Service shall provide the Forest
25 Service and the Office of Job Corps, Employment

and Training Administration, Department of Labor,
 with any additional documentation and information
 regarding the environmental condition of the Center
 as such documentation and information becomes
 available.

6 (b) ACTIONS REQUIRED.—

7 (1) ASSESSMENT.—Within 120 days after the 8 date of enactment of this Act, the U.S. Fish and 9 Wildlife Service shall provide the Forest Service and 10 the Office of Job Corps, Employment and Training 11 Administration, Department of Labor, an assess-12 ment, consistent with ASTM Standard E1527, indi-13 cating what action, if any, is required on the Center 14 under any Environmental Authorities.

15 (2) MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT.—If the 16 findings of the environmental assessment indicate 17 that action is required under applicable Environ-18 mental Authorities with respect to any portion of the 19 Center, the Forest Service and the U.S. Fish and 20 Wildlife Service shall enter into a memorandum of 21 agreement that—

(A) provides for the performance by the
U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service of the required
actions identified in the environmental assessment; and

(B) includes a schedule for the timely com pletion of the required actions to be taken as
 agreed to by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and
 Forest Service.

5 (c) DOCUMENTATION OF ACTIONS.—After a mutually agreeable amount of time following completion of the envi-6 7 ronmental assessment, but not exceeding 180 days from 8 such completion, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service shall 9 provide the Forest Service and the Office of Job Corps, 10 Employment and Training Administration, Department of Labor, with documentation demonstrating that all actions 11 12 required under applicable Environmental Authorities have 13 been taken that are necessary to protect human health and the environment with respect to any hazardous substance, 14 15 pollutant, contaminant, hazardous waste, hazardous material, or petroleum product or derivative of a petroleum 16 product on the Center. 17

18 (d) CONTINUATION OF RESPONSIBILITIES AND LI-19 ABILITIES.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The transfer of the Center
and the requirements of this section shall not in any
way affect the responsibilities and liabilities of the
U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service at the Center under
any applicable Environmental Authorities.

1	(2) ACCESS.—At all times after the date of en-
2	actment of this Act, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife
3	Service and its agents shall be accorded any access
4	to the Center that may be reasonably required to
5	carry out the responsibility or satisfy the liability re-
6	ferred to in paragraph (1).
7	(3) NO LIABILITY.—The Forest Service shall
8	not be liable under any applicable Environmental
9	Authorities for matters that are related directly or
10	indirectly to activities of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife
11	Service or the Department of Labor on the Center
12	occurring on or before the date of enactment of this
13	Act, including liability for—
14	(A) costs or performance of response ac-
15	tions required under the Comprehensive Envi-
16	ronmental Response, Compensation, and Liabil-
17	ity Act of 1980 (42 U.S.C. 9601, et seq.) at or
18	related to the Center; or
19	(B) costs, penalties, fines, or performance
20	of actions related to noncompliance with appli-
21	cable Environmental Authorities at or related to
22	the Center or related to the presence, release,
23	or threat of release of any hazardous substance,
24	pollutant, or contaminant, hazardous waste,
25	hazardous material, or petroleum product or de-

rivative of a petroleum product of any kind at
 or related to the Center, including contamina tion resulting from migration.

4 (4) NO EFFECT ON RESPONSIBILITIES OR LI-5 ABILITIES.—Except as provided in paragraph (3), 6 nothing in this title affects, modifies, amends, re-7 peals, alters, limits or otherwise changes, directly or 8 indirectly, the responsibilities or liabilities under ap-9 plicable Environmental Authorities with respect to 10 the Forest Service after the date of enactment of 11 this Act.

12 (e) OTHER FEDERAL AGENCIES.—Subject to the 13 other provisions of this section, a Federal agency that car-14 ried or carries out operations at the Center resulting in 15 the violation of an environmental authority shall be re-16 sponsible for all costs associated with corrective actions 17 and subsequent remediation.

18 SEC. 5. PERSONNEL.

19 (a) IN GENERAL.—

20 (1) EMPLOYMENT.—Notwithstanding section
21 3503 of title 5, United States Code, the Forest Serv22 ice will accept the transfer of eligible employees at
23 their current pay and grade levels to administer the
24 Center as of the date of enactment of this Act.

(b) TRANSFER-APPOINTMENT IN THE FOREST SERV ICE.—Eligible employees will transfer, without a break in
 Federal service and without competition, from the Depart ment of the Interior, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, to
 the Department of Agriculture, Forest Service, upon an
 agreed date by both agencies.

7 (c) EMPLOYEE BENEFIT TRANSITION.—Employees
8 of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service who transfer to the
9 Forest Service—

(1) shall retain all benefits and/or eligibility for
benefits of Federal employment without interruption
in coverage or reduction in coverage, including those
pertaining to any retirement, Thrift Savings Plan
(TSP), Federal Employee Health Benefit (FEHB),
Federal Employee Group Life Insurance (FEGLI),
leave, or other employee benefits;

17 (2) shall retain their existing status with re18 spect to the Civil Service Retirement System
19 (CSRS) or the Federal Employees Retirement Sys20 tem (FERS);

21 (3) shall be entitled to carry over any leave time
22 accumulated during their Federal Government em23 ployment;

24 (4) shall retain their existing level of competi-25 tive employment status and tenure; and

(5) shall retain their existing GM, GS, or WG
 grade level and pay.

#### 3 SEC. 6. IMPLEMENTATION COSTS AND APPROPRIATIONS.

4 (a) The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the For5 est Service will cover their own costs in implementing this
6 Act.

7 (b) There is hereby authorized to be appropriated8 such sums as may be necessary to carry out this Act.

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
