A BILL

To increase the safety of swimming pools and spas by requiring the use of proper anti-entrapment drain covers and pool and spa drainage systems, to educate the public about pool and spa safety, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- This Act may be cited as the "Virginia Graeme Baker
- 3 Pool and Spa Safety Act".
- 4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 5 Congress finds the following:
- 6 (1) Of injury-related deaths, drowning is the
- 7 second leading cause of death in children aged 1 to
- 8 14 in the United States.
- 9 (2) In 2004, 761 children aged 14 and under
- died as a result of unintentional drowning.
- 11 (3) Adult supervision at all aquatic venues is a
- 12 critical safety factor in preventing children from
- drowning.
- 14 (4) Research studies show that the installation
- and proper use of barriers or fencing, as well as ad-
- ditional layers of protection, could substantially re-
- duce the number of childhood residential swimming
- pool drownings and near drownings.
- 19 SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.
- 20 In this Act:
- 21 (1) ASME/ANSI.—The term "ASME/ANSI"
- as applied to a safety standard means such a stand-
- ard that is accredited by the American National
- 24 Standards Institute and published by the American
- 25 Society of Mechanical Engineers.

- 1 (2) BARRIER.—The term "barrier" includes a
 2 natural or constructed topographical feature that
 3 prevents unpermitted access by children to a swim4 ming pool, and, with respect to a hot tub, a lockable
 5 cover.
 - (3) Commission.—The term "Commission" means the Consumer Product Safety Commission.
 - (4) Main drain.—The term "main drain" means a submerged suction outlet typically located at the bottom of a pool or spa to conduct water to a re-circulating pump.
 - (5) Safety vacuum release system.—The term "safety vacuum release system" means a vacuum release system capable of providing vacuum release at a suction outlet caused by a high vacuum occurrence due to a suction outlet flow blockage.
 - (6) SWIMMING POOL; SPA.—The term "swimming pool" or "spa" means any outdoor or indoor structure intended for swimming or recreational bathing, including in-ground and above-ground structures, and includes hot tubs, spas, portable spas, and non-portable wading pools.
 - (7) UNBLOCKABLE DRAIN.—The term "unblockable drain" means a drain of any size and

1	shape that a human body cannot sufficiently block
2	to create a suction entrapment hazard.
3	SEC. 4. FEDERAL SWIMMING POOL AND SPA DRAIN COVER
4	STANDARD.
5	(a) Consumer Product Safety Rule.—The re-
6	quirements described in subsection (b) shall be treated as
7	a consumer product safety rule issued by the Consumer
8	Product Safety Commission under the Consumer Product
9	Safety Act (15 U.S.C. 2051 et seq.).
10	(b) Drain Cover Standard.—Effective 1 year
11	after the date of enactment of this Act, each swimming
12	pool or spa drain cover manufactured, distributed, or en-
13	tered into commerce in the United States shall conform
14	to the entrapment protection standards of the ASME/
15	ANSI A112.19.8 performance standard, or any successor
16	standard regulating such swimming pool or drain cover.
17	(c) Public Pools.—
18	(1) In general.—Beginning 1 year after the
19	date of enactment of this Act, each public pool and
20	spa in the United States shall be equipped with de-
21	vices or systems designed to prevent entrapment by
22	pool or spa drains that comply with the ASME/ANSI
23	A112.19.8 performance standard, or any successor

standard.

1	(2) Public pool and spa defined.—In this
2	subsection, the term "public pool and spa" means a
3	swimming pool or spa that is—
4	(A) open to the public generally, whether for
5	a fee or free of charge;
6	(B) open exclusively to—
7	(i) members of an organization and
8	$their\ guests;$
9	(ii) residents of a multi-unit apart-
10	ment building, apartment complex, residen-
11	tial real estate development, or other multi-
12	family residential area (other than a mu-
13	nicipality, township, or other local govern-
14	$ment\ jurisdiction);\ or$
15	(iii) patrons of a hotel or other public
16	$accommodations\ facility;\ or$
17	(C) operated by the Federal Government (or
18	by a concessionaire on behalf of the Federal Gov-
19	ernment) for the benefit of members of the Armed
20	Forces and their dependents or employees of any
21	department or agency and their dependents.
22	(3) Enforcement.—Violation of paragraph (1)
23	shall be considered to be a violation of section
24	19(a)(1) of the Consumer Product Safety Act (15

1	U.S.C. 2068(a)(1)) and may also be enforced under			
2	section 17 of that Act (15 U.S.C. 2066).			
3	SEC. 5. STATE SWIMMING POOL SAFETY GRANT PROGRAM.			
4	(a) In General.—Subject to the availability of ap-			
5	propriations authorized by subsection (e), the Commission			
6	shall establish a grant program to provide assistance to			
7	eligible States.			
8	(b) ELIGIBILITY.—To be eligible for a grant under			
9	the program, a State shall—			
10	(1) demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Com-			
11	mission that it has a State statute, or that, after the			
12	date of enactment of this Act, it has enacted a stat-			
13	ute, or amended an existing statute, and provides for			
14	the enforcement of, a law that—			
15	(A) except as provided in section			
16	6(a)(1)(A)(i), applies to all swimming pools in			
17	the State; and			
18	(B) meets the minimum State law require-			
19	ments of section 6; and			
20	(2) submit an application to the Commission at			
21	such time, in such form, and containing such addi-			
22	tional information as the Commission may require.			
23	(c) Amount of Grant.—The Commission shall de-			
24	termine the amount of a grant awarded under this Act,			
25	and shall consider—			

1	(1) the population and relative enforcement					
2	needs of each qualifying State; and					
3	(2) allocation of grant funds in a manner de					
4	signed to provide the maximum benefit from the					
5	program in terms of protecting children from drown-					
6	ing or entrapment, and, in making that allocation					
7	shall give priority to States that have not received					
8	a grant under this Act in a preceding fiscal year.					
9	(d) Use of Grant Funds.—A State receiving a					
10	grant under this section shall use—					
11	(1) at least 50 percent of amounts made avail-					
12	able to hire and train enforcement personnel for im-					
13	plementation and enforcement of standards under					
14	the State swimming pool and spa safety law; and					
15	(2) the remainder—					
16	(A) to educate pool construction and in-					
17	stallation companies and pool service companies					
18	about the standards;					
19	(B) to educate pool owners, pool operators,					
20	and other members of the public about the					
21	standards under the swimming pool and spa					
22	safety law and about the prevention of drown-					
23	ing or entrapment of children using swimming					
24	pools and spas; and					

1	(C) to defray administrative costs associ-					
2	ated with such training and education pro-					
3	grams.					
4	(e) Authorization of Appropriations.—There					
5	are authorized to be appropriated to the Commission for					
6	each of fiscal years 2009 and 2010 \$2,000,000 to carry					
7	out this section, such sums to remain available until ex-					
8	pended. Any amounts appropriated pursuant to this sub-					
9	section that remain unexpended and unobligated at the end					
10	of fiscal year 2010 shall be retained by the Commission and					
11	credited to the appropriations account that funds enforce-					
12	ment of the Consumer Product Safety Act.

1	(2) No liability inference associated with
2	State notification requirement.—The minimum
3	State law notification requirement under paragraph
4	(1)(A)(v) shall not be construed to imply any liability
5	on the part of a State related to that requirement.
6	(2) (3) Use of minimum state law require-
7	MENTS.—The Commission—
8	(A) shall use the minimum State law re-
9	quirements under paragraph (1) solely for the
10	purpose of determining the eligibility of a State
11	for a grant under section 5 of this Act; and
12	(B) may not enforce any requirement
13	under paragraph (1) except for the purpose of
14	determining the eligibility of a State for a grant
15	under section 5 of this Act.
16	(3) (4) Requirements to reflect national
17	PERFORMANCE STANDARDS AND COMMISSION
18	GUIDELINES.—In establishing minimum State law
19	requirements under paragraph (1), the Commission
20	shall—
21	(A) consider current or revised national
22	performance standards on pool and spa barrier
23	protection and entrapment prevention; and
24	(B) ensure that any such requirements are
25	consistent with the guidelines contained in the

- Commission's publication 362, entitled "Safety
 Barrier Guidelines for Home Pools", the Commission's publication entitled "Guidelines for
 Entrapment Hazards: Making Pools and Spas
 Safer", and any other pool safety guidelines established by the Commission.
- 7 (b) STANDARDS.—Nothing in this section prevents 8 the Commission from promulgating standards regulating 9 pool and spa safety or from relying on an applicable national performance standard.
- 11 (c) Basic Access-Related Safety Devices and 12 Equipment Requirements To Be Considered.—In 13 establishing minimum State law requirements for swim-14 ming pools and spas under subsection (a)(1), the Commis-15 sion shall consider the following requirements:
- 16 (1) Covers.—A safety pool cover.
- 17 (2) GATES.—A gate with direct access to the 18 swimming pool or spa that is equipped with a self-19 closing, self-latching device.
- 20 (3) DOORS.—Any door with direct access to the 21 swimming pool or spa that is equipped with an audi-22 ble alert device or alarm which sounds when the 23 door is opened.

1	(4) Pool Alarm.—A device designed to provide
2	rapid detection of an entry into the water of a swim-
3	ming pool or spa.
4	(d) Entrapment, Entanglement, and Eviscera-
5	TION PREVENTION STANDARDS TO BE REQUIRED.—
6	(1) In general.—In establishing additional
7	minimum State law requirements for swimming
8	pools and spas under subsection (a)(1), the Commis-
9	sion shall require, at a minimum, 1 or more of the
10	following (except for pools constructed without a sin-
11	gle main drain):
12	(A) SAFETY VACUUM RELEASE SYSTEM.—
13	A safety vacuum release system which ceases
14	operation of the pump, reverses the circulation
15	flow, or otherwise provides a vacuum release at
16	a suction outlet when a blockage is detected,
17	that has been tested by an independent third
18	party and found to conform to ASME/ANSI
19	standard A112.19.17 or ASTM standard
20	F2387. F2387, or any successor standard.
21	(B) Suction-limiting vent system.—A
22	suction-limiting vent system with a tamper-re-
23	sistant atmospheric opening.

1	(C) Gravity drainage system.—A grav-					
2	ity drainage system that utilizes a collector					
3	tank.					
4	(D) Automatic pump shut-off sys-					
5	TEM.—An automatic pump shut-off system.					
6	(E) Drain disablement.—A device or					
7	system that disables the drain.					
8	(F) Other systems.—Any other system					
9	determined by the Commission to be equally ef-					
10	fective as, or better than, the systems described					
11	in subparagraphs (A) through (E) of this para-					
12	graph at preventing or eliminating the risk of					
13	injury or death associated with pool drainage					
14	systems.					
15	(2) APPLICABLE STANDARDS.—Any device or					
16	system described in subparagraphs (B) through (E)					
17	of paragraph (1) shall meet the requirements of any					
18	ASME/ANSI or ASTM performance standard if					
19	there is such a standard for such a device or system,					
20	or any applicable consumer product safety standard.					
21	SEC. 7. EDUCATION PROGRAM.					
22	(a) In General.—The Commission shall establish					
23	and carry out an education program to inform the public					
24	of methods to prevent drowning and entrapment in swim-					

- 1 ming pools and spas. In carrying out the program, the
- 2 Commission shall develop—
- 3 (1) educational materials designed for pool
- 4 manufacturers, pool service companies, and pool
- 5 supply retail outlets;
- 6 (2) educational materials designed for pool own-
- 7 ers and operators; and
- 8 (3) a national media campaign to promote
- 9 awareness of pool and spa safety.
- 10 (b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
- 11 are authorized to be appropriated to the Commission for
- 12 each of the fiscal years 2008 through 2012 \$5,000,000
- 13 to carry out the education program authorized by sub-
- 14 section (a).
- 15 SEC. 8. CPSC REPORT.
- Not later than 1 year after the last day of each fiscal
- 17 year for which grants are made under section 5, the Com-
- 18 mission shall submit to Congress a report evaluating the
- 19 effectiveness implementation of the grant program author-
- 20 ized by that section.
