A BILL

To amend title 38, United States Code, to authorize advance appropriations for certain medical care accounts of the Department of Veterans Affairs by providing two-fiscal year budget authority, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Veterans Health Care
5 Budget Reform and Transparency Act of 2009”.

1 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

2 Congress makes the following findings:

3 (1) Title 38, United States Code, authorizes the
4 Secretary of Veterans Affairs to furnish hospital and
5 domiciliary care, medical services, nursing home
6 care, and related services to eligible and enrolled vet-
7 erans, but only to the extent that appropriated re-
8 sources and facilities are available for such purposes.

9 (2) For 19 of the past 22 fiscal years, funds
10 have not been appropriated for the Department of
11 Veterans Affairs for the provision of health care as
12 of the commencement of the new fiscal year, causing
13 the Department great challenges in planning and
14 managing care for enrolled veterans, to the det-
15 riment of veterans.

16 (3) The cumulative effect of insufficient, late,
17 and unpredictable funding for the Department for
18 health care endangers the viability of the health care
19 system of the Department and impairs the special-
20 ized health care resources the Department requires
21 to maintain and improve the health of sick and dis-
22 abled veterans.

23 (4) Appropriations for the health care programs
24 of the Department have too often proven insufficient
25 over the past decade, requiring the Secretary to ra-

1 tion health care and Congress to approve supple-
2 mental appropriations for those programs.

3 (5) Providing sufficient, timely, and predictable
4 funding would ensure the Government meets its obli-
5 gation to provide health care to sick and disabled
6 veterans and ensure that all veterans enrolled for
7 health care through the Department have ready ac-
8 cess to timely and high quality care.

9 (6) Providing sufficient, timely, and predictable
10 funding would allow the Department to properly
11 plan for and meet the needs of veterans.

12 **SEC. 3. TWO-FISCAL YEAR BUDGET AUTHORITY FOR CER-**
13 **TAIN MEDICAL CARE ACCOUNTS OF THE DE-**
14 **PARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.**

15 (a) TWO-FISCAL YEAR BUDGET AUTHORITY.—

16 (1) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 1 of title 38, United
17 States Code, is amended by inserting after section
18 113 the following new section:

19 **“§ 113A. Two-fiscal year budget authority for certain**
20 **medical care accounts**

21 “(a) IN GENERAL.—Beginning with fiscal year 2011,
22 new discretionary budget authority provided in an appro-
23 priations Act for the appropriations accounts of the De-
24 partment specified in subsection (b) shall be made avail-
25 able for the fiscal year involved, and shall include new dis-

cretionary budget authority for such appropriations accounts that first become available for the first fiscal year after such fiscal year.

“(b) MEDICAL CARE ACCOUNTS.—The medical care accounts of the Department specified in this subsection are the medical care accounts of the Veterans Health Administration as follows:

“(1) Medical Services.

“(2) Medical Support and Compliance.

“(3) Medical Facilities.”.

(2) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of sections at the beginning of chapter 1 of such title is amended by inserting after the item relating to section 113 the following new item:

“113A. Two-fiscal year budget authority for certain medical care accounts.”.

SEC. 4. COMPTROLLER GENERAL OF THE UNITED STATES
STUDY ON ADEQUACY AND ACCURACY OF
BASELINE MODEL PROJECTIONS OF THE DE-
PARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS FOR
HEALTH CARE EXPENDITURES.

(a) STUDY OF ADEQUACY AND ACCURACY OF BASELINE MODEL PROJECTIONS.—The Comptroller General of the United States shall conduct a study of the adequacy and accuracy of the budget projections made by the Enrollee Health Care Projection Model, its equivalent, or other methodologies, as utilized for the purpose of esti-

1 mating and projecting health care expenditures of the De-
2 partment of Veterans Affairs (in this section referred to
3 as the “Model”) with respect to the fiscal year involved
4 and the subsequent four fiscal years.

5 (b) REPORTS.—

6 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than the date of
7 each year in 2011, 2012, and 2013, on which the
8 President submits the budget request for the next
9 fiscal year under section 1105 of title 31, United
10 States Code, the Comptroller General shall submit to
11 the appropriate committees of Congress and to the
12 Secretary a report.

13 (2) ELEMENTS.—Each report under this para-
14 graph shall include, for the fiscal year beginning in
15 the year in which such report is submitted, the fol-
16 lowing:

17 (A) A statement whether the amount re-
18 quested in the budget of the President for ex-
19 penditures of the Department for health care in
20 such fiscal year is consistent with anticipated
21 expenditures of the Department for health care
22 in such fiscal year as determined utilizing the
23 Model.

24 (B) The basis for such statement.

1 (C) Such additional information as the
2 Comptroller General determines appropriate.

3 (3) AVAILABILITY TO THE PUBLIC.—Each re-
4 port submitted under this subsection shall also be
5 made available to the public.

6 (4) APPROPRIATE COMMITTEES OF CONGRESS
7 DEFINED.—In this subsection, the term “appro-
8 priate committees of Congress” means—

9 (A) the Committees on Veterans’ Affairs,
10 Appropriations, and the Budget of the Senate;
11 and

12 (B) the Committees on Veterans’ Affairs,
13 Appropriations, and the Budget of the House of
14 Representatives.

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
