A BILL

To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to authorize the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency to establish an industrial control systems cybersecurity training initiative, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Industrial Control Sys-
5 tems Cybersecurity Training Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE INDUSTRIAL CONTROL**
7 **SYSTEMS TRAINING INITIATIVE.**

8 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subtitle A of title XXII of the
9 Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 651 et seq.)
10 is amended by adding at the end the following new section:

11 **“SEC. 2220D. INDUSTRIAL CONTROL SYSTEMS CYBERSECU-**
12 **RITY TRAINING INITIATIVE.**

13 “(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—

14 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Industrial Control Sys-
15 tems Cybersecurity Training Initiative (in this sec-
16 tion referred to as the ‘Initiative’) is established
17 within the Agency.

18 “(2) PURPOSE.—The purpose of the Initiative
19 is to develop and strengthen the skills of the cyber-
20 security workforce related to securing industrial con-
21 trol systems.

22 “(b) REQUIREMENTS.—In carrying out the Initiative,
23 the Director shall—

24 “(1) ensure the Initiative includes—

1 “(A) virtual and in-person trainings and
2 courses provided at no cost to participants;

3 “(B) training and courses available at dif-
4 ferent skill levels, including introductory level
5 courses;

6 “(C) trainings and courses that cover
7 cyber defense strategies for industrial control
8 systems, including an understanding of the
9 unique cyber threats facing industrial control
10 systems and the mitigation of security
11 vulnerabilities in industrial control systems
12 technology; and

13 “(D) appropriate consideration regarding
14 the availability of trainings and courses in dif-
15 ferent regions of the United States; and

16 “(2) engage in—

17 “(A) collaboration with the National Lab-
18 oratories of the Department of Energy in ac-
19 cordance with section 309;

20 “(B) consultation with Sector Risk Man-
21 agement Agencies; and

22 “(C) as appropriate, consultation with pri-
23 vate sector entities with relevant expertise, such
24 as vendors of industrial control systems tech-
25 nologies.

1 “(c) REPORTS.—

2 “(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than one year
3 after the date of the enactment of this section and
4 annually thereafter, the Director shall submit to the
5 Committee on Homeland Security of the House of
6 Representatives and the Committee on Homeland
7 Security and Governmental Affairs of the Senate a
8 report on the Initiative.

9 “(2) CONTENTS.—Each report under para-
10 graph (1) shall include the following:

11 “(A) A description of the courses provided
12 under the Initiative.

13 “(B) A description of outreach efforts to
14 raise awareness of the availability of such
15 courses.

16 “(C) Information on the number and de-
17 mographics of participants in such courses, in-
18 cluding by gender, race, and place of residence.

19 “(D) Information on the participation in
20 such courses of workers from each critical in-
21 frastructure sector.

22 “(E) Plans for expanding access to indus-
23 trial control systems education and training, in-
24 cluding expanding access to women and under-

1 represented populations, and expanding access
2 to different regions of the United States.

3 “(F) Recommendations on how to
4 strengthen the state of industrial control sys-
5 tems cybersecurity education and training.”.

6 (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of contents
7 in section 1(b) of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 is
8 amended by inserting after the item relating to section
9 2220C the following new item:

“Sec. 2220D. Industrial Control Systems Cybersecurity Training Initiative.”.

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
