## A BILL

To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to provide that aliens who have been convicted of or who have committed Social Security fraud are inadmissible and deportable.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Consequences for So-  
5 cial Security Fraud Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. INADMISSIBILITY AND DEPORTABILITY RELATED**  
2 **TO SOCIAL SECURITY FRAUD.**

3 (a) INADMISSIBILITY.—Section 212(a)(2) of the Im-  
4 migration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1182(a)(2)) is  
5 amended by adding at the end the following:

6 “(J) SOCIAL SECURITY FRAUD.—Any alien  
7 who has been convicted of, who admits having  
8 committed, or who admits committing acts  
9 which constitute the essential elements of an of-  
10 fense under section 208 of the Social Security  
11 Act (42 U.S.C. 408) (relating to social security  
12 account numbers or social security cards), an  
13 offense under section 1028 of title 18, United  
14 States Code (relating to fraud and related ac-  
15 tivity in connection with identification docu-  
16 ments, authentication features, and informa-  
17 tion), or a conspiracy to commit such an of-  
18 fense, is inadmissible.”.

19 (b) DEPORTABILITY.—Section 237(a)(2) of the Im-  
20 migration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1227(a)(2)) is  
21 amended by adding at the end the following:

22 “(G) SOCIAL SECURITY FRAUD.—Any alien  
23 who has been convicted of, who admits having  
24 committed, or who admits committing acts  
25 which constitute the essential elements of an of-  
26 fense under section 208 of the Social Security

1 Act (42 U.S.C. 408) (relating to social security  
2 account numbers or social security cards), an  
3 offense under section 1028 of title 18, United  
4 States Code (relating to fraud and related ac-  
5 tivity in connection with identification docu-  
6 ments, authentication features, and informa-  
7 tion), or a conspiracy to commit such an of-  
8 fense, is deportable.”.
