# H. R. 5855

To require the Administrator of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to establish and maintain a database and webpage that is available to the public and contains information on the billion-dollar disasters that occur each year in the United States, and for other purposes.

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## A BILL

To require the Administrator of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to establish and maintain a database and webpage that is available to the public and contains information on the billion-dollar disasters that occur each year in the United States, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Measuring the Cost  
5 of Disasters Act of 2025”.

1 **SEC. 2. DATABASE AND WEBPAGE FOR INFORMATION ON**  
2 **BILLION-DOLLAR DISASTERS.**

3 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator of the Na-  
4 tional Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (in this  
5 section referred to as the “Administrator”) shall establish  
6 and maintain a database and webpage that is available  
7 to the public and contains information on each billion-dol-  
8 lar disaster that occurs each year in the United States.

9 (b) UPDATE.—Not less frequently than biannually,  
10 the Administrator shall update the database and webpage  
11 required under subsection (a) as new information is avail-  
12 able.

13 (c) MATTERS TO BE INCLUDED.—The database and  
14 webpage required under subsection (a) shall include the  
15 following:

16 (1) With respect to each billion-dollar disaster  
17 included in the database and webpage—

18 (A) the estimated cost of the disaster;  
19 (B) the type of disaster;  
20 (C) the location of the disaster;  
21 (D) the date or dates of the disaster; and  
22 (E) such other information regarding the  
23 disaster as the Administrator considers appro-  
24 priate.

25 (2) Visual graphs and mapping features show-  
26 ing the trajectory of disasters over time and the dis-

1       tribution of types of disasters across the United  
2       States that are similar, if not identical, to those fea-  
3       tures produced by the National Centers for Environ-  
4       mental Information from 1980 through 2024 and  
5       that were available and updated online at  
6       [www.ncei.noaa.gov/access/billions/](http://www.ncei.noaa.gov/access/billions/) until May 9, 2025.

7       (d) DATA TO BE USED.—In establishing and main-  
8       taining the database required under subsection (a), the  
9       Administrator shall use data available to the Adminis-  
10      trator and may collaborate with Federal and non-Federal  
11      partners as necessary, such as those partners with which  
12      the Administrator collaborated previously while the data-  
13      base specified under subsection (c)(2) was active from  
14      1980 through 2024.

15      (e) INCLUSION OF OTHER DISASTERS.—The Admin-  
16      istrator may include in the database required under sub-  
17      section (a) a disaster that is not a billion-dollar disaster  
18      if the Administrator determines that the inclusion of the  
19      disaster in the database would be appropriate.

20      (f) MAINTENANCE OF EXISTING DATABASE.—The  
21      Administrator shall maintain and update information con-  
22      tained in the previously existing disaster database speci-  
23      fied under subsection (c)(2) on the webpage for the Na-  
24      tional Centers for Environmental Information for  
25      archiving and research purposes.

1       (g) BILLION-DOLLAR DISASTER DEFINED.—In this  
2 section, the term “billion-dollar disaster” means a storm  
3 or severe weather event that results in \$1,000,000,000 or  
4 more in combined direct costs and market costs as deter-  
5 mined by the National Centers for Environmental Infor-  
6 mation.
