Resolved, That the bill from the House of Representatives (H.R. 7147) entitled “An Act making further consolidated appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, and for other purposes.”, do pass with the following

7 *The explanatory statement regarding this Act, printed*
8 *in the House section of the Congressional Record on or*
9 *about January 22, 2026, and submitted by the chair of the*
10 *Committee on Appropriations of the House, shall have the*
11 *same effect with respect to the allocation of funds and im-*
12 *plementation of this Act as if it were a joint explanatory*
13 *statement of a committee of conference, except that the con-*
14 *tents printed under the headings “U.S. Immigration and*
15 *Customs Enforcement” and “Border Security Operations”*
16 *under the heading “U.S. Customs and Border Protection”*
17 *shall have no force or effect for purposes of this Act, and*
18 *amounts specified in the “Final Bill” column under the*
19 *sub-heading “Border Security Operations” under the head-*
20 *ing “U.S. Customs and Border Protection” and under the*

1 heading “U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement” in
2 the “Department of Homeland Security Act, 2026” table
3 shall all be \$0.

5 *Senate responses to all questions for the record for each*
6 *hearing on the fiscal year 2027 budget submission for the*
7 *Department of Homeland Security held by such Committees*
8 *prior to July 1: Provided further, That not to exceed*
9 *\$15,000 shall be for official reception and representation*
10 *expenses.*

11 *PROCUREMENT, CONSTRUCTION, AND IMPROVEMENTS*

12 *For necessary expenses of the Office of the Secretary*
13 *and for executive management for procurement, construc-*
14 *tion, and improvements, \$8,911,000, to remain available*
15 *until September 30, 2028.*

18 *For necessary expenses of the Management Directorate*
19 *for operations and support, including vehicle fleet mod-*
20 *ernization, \$1,690,380,000, which shall be for the purposes*
21 *and in the amounts specified in the “Final Bill” column*
22 *for Management Directorate, Operations and Support, in*
23 *the “Department of Homeland Security Appropriations*
24 *Act, 2026” table in the explanatory statement described in*
25 *section 4 (in the matter preceding division A of this consoli-*

1 *dated Act): Provided, That not to exceed \$2,000 shall be*
2 *for official reception and representation expenses.*

3 *PROCUREMENT, CONSTRUCTION, AND IMPROVEMENTS*

4 *For necessary expenses of the Management Directorate*
5 *for procurement, construction, and improvements,*
6 *\$58,106,000, to remain available until September 30, 2028.*

7 *FEDERAL PROTECTIVE SERVICE*

8 *The revenues and collections of security fees credited*
9 *to this account shall be available until expended for nec-*
10 *essary expenses related to the protection of federally owned*
11 *and leased buildings and for the operations of the Federal*
12 *Protective Service.*

13 *INTELLIGENCE, ANALYSIS, AND SITUATIONAL AWARENESS*

15 *For necessary expenses of the Office of Intelligence and*
16 *Analysis and the Office of Homeland Security Situational*
17 *Awareness for operations and support, \$340,819,000, of*
18 *which \$121,274,000 shall remain available until September*
19 *30, 2027: Provided, That not to exceed \$3,825 shall for be*
20 *official reception and representation expenses and not to ex-*
21 *ceed \$2,000,000 is available for facility needs associated*
22 *with secure space at fusion centers, including improvements*
23 *to buildings.*

1 *OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL*

2 *OPERATIONS AND SUPPORT*

3 *For necessary expenses of the Office of Inspector Gen-*
4 *eral for operations and support, \$257,599,000, of which*
5 *\$20,000,000 shall be for additional inspections and over-*
6 *sight of detention facilities and shall remain available until*
7 *September 30, 2027, and of which \$12,814,000 shall be for*
8 *oversight of the execution of funds provided in Public Law*
9 *119–21: Provided, That not to exceed \$300,000 may be used*
10 *for certain confidential operational expenses, including the*
11 *payment of informants, to be expended at the direction of*
12 *the Inspector General.*

13 *ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS*

14 *SEC. 101. (a) The Secretary of Homeland Security*
15 *shall submit a report not later than October 15, 2026, to*
16 *the Inspector General of the Department of Homeland Secu-*
17 *riety listing all grants and contracts awarded by any means*
18 *other than full and open competition during fiscal years*
19 *2025 or 2026.*

20 *(b) The Inspector General shall review the report re-*
21 *quired by subsection (a) to assess departmental compliance*
22 *with applicable laws and regulations and report the results*
23 *of that review to the Committees on Appropriations of the*
24 *House of Representatives and the Senate not later than Feb-*
25 *ruary 15, 2027.*

1 *SEC. 102. (a) Not later than 30 days after the last*
2 *day of each month, the Chief Financial Officer of the De-*
3 *partment of Homeland Security shall submit to the Com-*
4 *mittees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives*
5 *and the Senate a monthly budget and staffing report that*
6 *includes total obligations of the Department for that month*
7 *and for the fiscal year at the appropriation and program,*
8 *project, and activity levels, by the source year of the appro-*
9 *priation.*

10 *(b) The initial staffing report submitted pursuant to*
11 *subsection (a) shall be the baseline for which the Depart-*
12 *ment of Homeland Security may increase or decrease staff-*
13 *ing levels for any program, project, or activity pursuant*
14 *to section 503(a)(4) of this Act.*

15 *SEC. 103. (a) The Secretary of Homeland Security, in*
16 *consultation with the Secretary of the Treasury, shall notify*
17 *the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Rep-*
18 *resentatives and the Senate of any proposed transfers of*
19 *funds available under section 9705(g)(4)(B) of title 31,*
20 *United States Code, from the Department of the Treasury*
21 *Forfeiture Fund to any agency within the Department of*
22 *Homeland Security.*

23 *(b) None of the funds identified for such a transfer may*
24 *be obligated until the Committees on Appropriations of the*

1 *House of Representatives and the Senate are notified of the*
2 *proposed transfer.*

3 *SEC. 104. All official costs associated with the use of*
4 *Government aircraft by Department of Homeland Security*
5 *personnel to support official travel of the Secretary and the*
6 *Deputy Secretary shall be paid from amounts made avail-*
7 *able for the Office of the Secretary.*

8 *SEC. 105. (a) The Under Secretary for Management*
9 *shall brief the Committees on Appropriations of the House*
10 *of Representatives and the Senate not later than 45 days*
11 *after the end of each fiscal quarter on all Level 1 and Level*
12 *2 acquisition programs on the Master Acquisition Oversight*
13 *List between Acquisition Decision Event and Full Oper-*
14 *ational Capability, including programs that have been re-*
15 *moved from such list during the preceding quarter.*

16 *(b) For each such program, the briefing described in*
17 *subsection (a) shall include—*

18 *(1) a description of the purpose of the program,*
19 *including the capabilities being acquired and the*
20 *component(s) sponsoring the acquisition;*

21 *(2) the total number of units, as appropriate, to*
22 *be acquired annually until procurement is complete*
23 *under the current acquisition program baseline;*

24 *(3) the Acquisition Review Board status, includ-*
25 *ing—*

1 (A) the current acquisition phase by incre-
2 ment, as applicable;

3 (B) the date of the most recent review; and

4 (C) whether the program has been paused or
5 is in breach status;

6 (4) a comparison between the initial Depart-
7 ment-approved acquisition program baseline cost,
8 schedule, and performance thresholds and objectives
9 and the program's current such thresholds and objec-
10 tives, if applicable;

11 (5) the lifecycle cost estimate, adjusted for com-
12 parison to the Future Years Homeland Security Pro-
13 gram, including—

14 (A) the confidence level for the estimate;

15 (B) the fiscal years included in the esti-
16 mate;

17 (C) a breakout of the estimate for the prior
18 five years, the current year, and the budget year;

19 (D) a breakout of the estimate by appro-
20 priation account or other funding source; and

21 (E) a description of and rationale for any
22 changes to the estimate as compared to the pre-
23 viously approved baseline, as applicable, and
24 during the prior fiscal year;

1 (6) a summary of the findings of any inde-
2 pendent verification and validation of the items to be
3 acquired or an explanation for why no such
4 verification and validation has been performed;

5 (7) a table displaying the obligation of all pro-
6 gram funds by prior fiscal year, the estimated obliga-
7 tion of funds for the current fiscal year, and an esti-
8 mate for the planned carryover of funds into the sub-
9 sequent fiscal year;

10 (8) a listing of prime contractors and major sub-
11 contractors; and

12 (9) narrative descriptions of risks to cost, sched-
13 ule, or performance that could result in a program
14 breach if not successfully mitigated.

15 (c) The Under Secretary for Management shall submit
16 each approved Acquisition Decision Memorandum for pro-
17 grams described in this section to the Committees on Appro-
18 priations of the House of Representatives and the Senate
19 not later than five business days after the date of approval
20 of such memorandum by the Under Secretary for Manage-
21 ment or the designee of the Under Secretary for Manage-
22 ment.

23 SEC. 106. (a) None of the funds made available to the
24 Department of Homeland Security in this Act or prior ap-
25 propriations Acts may be obligated for any new pilot or

1 *demonstration unless the component or office carrying out*
2 *such pilot or demonstration has documented the informa-*
3 *tion described in subsection (c).*

4 (b) *Prior to the obligation of any such funds made*
5 *available for “Operations and Support” for a new pilot or*
6 *demonstration, the Under Secretary for Management shall*
7 *provide a report to the Committees on Appropriations of*
8 *the House of Representatives and the Senate on the infor-*
9 *mation described in subsection (c).*

10 (c) *The information required under subsections (a)*
11 *and (b) for a pilot or demonstration shall include the fol-*
12 *lowing—*

13 (1) *documented objectives that are well-defined*
14 *and measurable;*

15 (2) *an assessment methodology that details—*

16 (A) *the type and source of assessment data;*

17 (B) *the methods for, and frequency of, col-*
18 *lecting such data; and*

19 (C) *how such data will be analyzed; and*

20 (3) *an implementation plan, including mile-*
21 *stones, cost estimates, and implementation schedules,*
22 *including a projected end date.*

23 (d) *Not later than 90 days after the date of completion*
24 *of a pilot or demonstration described in subsection (e), the*
25 *Under Secretary for Management shall provide a report to*

1 *the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Rep-*
2 *resentatives and the Senate detailing lessons learned, actual*
3 *costs, any planned expansion or continuation of the pilot*
4 *or demonstration, and any planned transition of such pilot*
5 *or demonstration into an enduring program or operation.*

6 (e) *For the purposes of this section, a pilot or dem-*
7 *onstration program is a study, demonstration, experi-*
8 *mental program, or trial that—*

9 (1) *is a small-scale, short-term experiment con-*
10 *ducted in order to evaluate feasibility, duration, costs,*
11 *or adverse events, and improve upon the design of an*
12 *effort prior to implementation of a larger scale effort;*
13 *and*

14 (2) *uses more than 10 full-time equivalents or*
15 *obligates, or proposes to obligate, \$5,000,000 or more,*
16 *but does not include congressionally directed pro-*
17 *grams or enhancements and does not include pro-*
18 *grams that were in operation as of the date of the en-*
19 *actment of this Act.*

20 (f) *For the purposes of this section, a pilot or dem-*
21 *onstration does not include any testing, evaluation, or ini-*
22 *tial deployment phase executed under a procurement con-*
23 *tract for the acquisition of information technology services*
24 *or systems, or any pilot or demonstration carried out by*

1 *a non-Federal recipient under any financial assistance*
2 *agreement funded by the Department.*

3 *SEC. 107. (a) None of the funds appropriated or other-*
4 *wise made available by this Act may be used by the Office*
5 *of Intelligence and Analysis of the Department of Homeland*
6 *Security to conduct a covered activity (as defined by section*
7 *6303 of the Intelligence Authorization Act for Fiscal Year*
8 *2025 (division F of Public Law 118–159)).*

9 *(b) Nothing in this section shall be construed as lim-*
10 *iting or superseding the authority of any official within the*
11 *Department of Homeland Security to conduct legal, pri-*
12 *vacy, civil rights, or civil liberties oversight of the intel-*
13 *ligence activities of the Office of Intelligence and Analysis.*

14 *(c) Nothing in this section shall be construed to pro-*
15 *hibit, or to limit the authority of, personnel of the Office*
16 *of Intelligence and Analysis of the Department of Homeland*
17 *Security from sharing intelligence information with, or re-*
18 *ceiving information from—*

19 *(1) foreign, State, local, tribal, or territorial gov-*
20 *ernments (or any agency or subdivision thereof);*

21 *(2) the private sector; or*

22 *(3) other elements of the Federal Government, in-*
23 *cluding the components of the Department of Home-*
24 *land Security.*

1 *SEC. 108. (a) The Inspector General shall report to*
2 *the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Rep-*
3 *resentatives and the Senate on a quarterly basis on over-*
4 *sight of the funding provided to the Department in Public*
5 *Law 119–21.*

6 *(b) The quarterly report required in subsection (a)*
7 *shall include—*

8 *(1) a review of the spend plans for every pro-*
9 *gram, project, or activity funded by the Department*
10 *under Public Law 119–21, including the current sta-*
11 *tus of obligated funds compared to spend plan projec-*
12 *tions; and*

13 *(2) a summary of the audits being conducted on*
14 *the Department’s contracting, procurement, and ac-*
15 *quisition activities resulting from Public Law 119–*
16 *21.*

17 *(c) Beginning one year after the date of enactment of*
18 *this Act, and annually thereafter, the Inspector General*
19 *shall submit a comprehensive report to the Committees on*
20 *Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the*
21 *Senate on the audits, inspections, and evaluations con-*
22 *ducted on funds provided and activities undertaken in Pub-*
23 *lic Law 119–21 and shall also provide recommendations in*
24 *such report on ways to improve effectiveness and efficiency*

1 *provision of such support to Federal, State, and local agen-*
2 *cies in other law enforcement and emergency humanitarian*
3 *efforts; the purchase and lease of up to 7,500 (6,500 for re-*
4 *placement only) police-type vehicles; the purchase, mainte-*
5 *nance, or operation of marine vessels, aircraft, and un-*
6 *manned aerial systems; and contracting with individuals*
7 *for personal services abroad; \$11,083,012,000; of which*
8 *\$3,274,000 shall be derived from the Harbor Maintenance*
9 *Trust Fund for administrative expenses related to the collec-*
10 *tion of the Harbor Maintenance Fee pursuant to section*
11 *9505(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (26 U.S.C.*
12 *9505(c)(3)) and notwithstanding section 1511(e)(1) of the*
13 *Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 551(e)(1)); of*
14 *which \$550,000,000 shall be available until September 30,*
15 *2027; and of which such sums as become available in the*
16 *Customs User Fee Account, except sums subject to section*
17 *13031(f)(3) of the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconcili-*
18 *ation Act of 1985 (19 U.S.C. 58c(f)(3)), shall be derived*
19 *from that account: Provided, That not to exceed \$34,425*
20 *shall be for official reception and representation expenses:*
21 *Provided further, That not to exceed \$150,000 shall be*
22 *available for payment for rental space in connection with*
23 *preclearance operations: Provided further, That not to ex-*
24 *ceed \$2,000,000 shall be for awards of compensation to in-*

1 *formants, to be accounted for solely under the certificate of*
2 *the Secretary of Homeland Security.*

3 *PROCUREMENT, CONSTRUCTION, AND IMPROVEMENTS*

4 *For necessary expenses of U.S. Customs and Border*
5 *Protection for procurement, construction, and improve-*
6 *ments, including procurement of marine vessels, aircraft,*
7 *and unmanned aerial systems, \$222,886,000, which shall*
8 *be for the purposes and in the amounts specified in the*
9 *“Final Bill” column for U.S. Customs and Border Protec-*
10 *tion, Procurement, Construction, and Improvements, in the*
11 *“Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act,*
12 *2026” table in the explanatory statement described in sec-*
13 *tion 4 (in the matter preceding division A of this consoli-*
14 *dated Act), of which—*

15 *(1) amounts made available for Border Security*

17 *(5) announcing publicly the intention to make or*
18 *award items under paragraph (1), (2), (3), or (4) in-*
19 *cluding a contract covered by the Federal Acquisition*
20 *Regulation.*

21 *(b) If the Secretary of Homeland Security determines*
22 *that compliance with this section would pose a substantial*
23 *risk to human life, health, or safety, an award may be made*
24 *without notification, and the Secretary shall notify the*
25 *Committees on Appropriations of the House of Representa-*

1 *tives and the Senate not later than three full business days*
2 *after such an award is made or letter issued.*

3 *(c) A notification under this section—*

4 *(1) may not involve funds that are not available*
5 *for obligation; and*

6 *(2) shall include the amount of the award; the*
7 *fiscal year for which the funds for the award were ap-*
8 *propriated; the type of contract; and the account from*
9 *which the funds are being drawn.*

10 *SEC. 508. Notwithstanding any other provision of law,*
11 *no agency shall purchase, construct, or lease any additional*
12 *facilities, except within or contiguous to existing locations,*
13 *to be used for the purpose of conducting Federal law enforce-*
14 *ment training without advance notification to the Commit-*
15 *tees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and*
16 *the Senate, except that the Federal Law Enforcement*
17 *Training Centers is authorized to obtain the temporary use*

1 *cept that necessary funds may be expended for each project*
2 *for required expenses for the development of a proposed pro-*
3 *spectus.*

4 *SEC. 510. Sections 522 and 530 of the Department of*
5 *Homeland Security Appropriations Act, 2008 (division E*
6 *of Public Law 110–161; 121 Stat. 2073 and 2074) shall*
7 *apply with respect to funds made available in this Act in*
8 *the same manner as such sections applied to funds made*
9 *available in that Act.*

10 *SEC. 511. (a) None of the funds made available in this*
11 *Act may be used in contravention of the applicable provi-*
12 *sions of the Buy American Act.*

13 *(b) For purposes of subsection (a), the term “Buy*
14 *American Act” means chapter 83 of title 41, United States*
15 *Code.*

16 *SEC. 512. None of the funds made available in this*
17 *Act may be used to amend the oath of allegiance required*
18 *by section 337 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (8*
19 *U.S.C. 1448).*

20 *SEC. 513. (a) None of the funds provided or otherwise*
21 *made available by this Act may be made available to carry*
22 *out section 872 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6*
23 *U.S.C. 452) unless explicitly authorized by the Congress*
24 *after the date of enactment of this Act.*

1 (b) Subsection (a) shall not apply to the use of the
2 authorities provided by such section 872—

3 (1) to allocate or reallocate the functions of the
4 Assistant Secretary for the Countering Weapons of
5 Mass Destruction Office to other offices and organiza-
6 tional units within the Department consistent with
7 the “Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction” table
8 in the explanatory statement described in section 4
9 (in the matter preceding division A of this consoli-
10 dated Act); or

11 (2) to allocate or reallocate any other functions
12 of the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office
13 to other offices and organizational units within the

18 *SEC. 518. Notwithstanding any other provision of this*
19 *Act, none of the funds appropriated or otherwise made*
20 *available by this Act may be used to pay award or incentive*
21 *fees for contractor performance that has been judged to be*
22 *below satisfactory performance or performance that does not*
23 *meet the basic requirements of a contract.*

24 *SEC. 519. (a) None of the funds made available in this*
25 *Act may be used to maintain or establish a computer net-*

1 *work unless such network blocks the viewing, downloading,*
2 *and exchanging of pornography.*

3 *(b) Nothing in subsection (a) shall limit the use of*
4 *funds necessary for any Federal, State, tribal, territorial,*
5 *or local law enforcement agency or any other entity car-*
6 *rying out criminal investigations, prosecution, or adjudica-*
7 *tion activities.*

8 *SEC. 520. None of the funds made available in this*
9 *Act may be used by a Federal law enforcement officer to*
10 *facilitate the transfer of an operable firearm to an indi-*
11 *vidual if the Federal law enforcement officer knows or sus-*
12 *pects that the individual is an agent of a drug cartel unless*
13 *law enforcement personnel of the United States continu-*
14 *ously monitor or control the firearm at all times.*

15 *SEC. 521. (a) None of the funds made available in this*
16 *Act may be used to pay for the travel to or attendance of*
17 *more than 50 employees of a single component of the De-*
18 *partment of Homeland Security, who are stationed in the*
19 *United States, at a single international conference unless*
20 *the Secretary of Homeland Security, or a designee, deter-*
21 *mines that such attendance is in the national interest and*

3 (1) *the number of full-time positions affected by*
4 *such change;*

5 (2) *funding required for such change for the cur-*

9 (4) *for a structural pay reform, an analysis of*
10 *compensation alternatives to such change that were*
11 *considered by the Department.*

12 *(b) Subsection (a) shall not apply to such change if—*

13 (1) *it was proposed in the President’s budget*
14 *proposal for the fiscal year funded by this Act; and*

15 (2) *funds for such change have not been explic-*
16 *itly denied or restricted in this Act.*

17 *SEC. 524. (a) Any agency receiving funds made avail-*
18 *able in this Act shall, subject to subsections (b) and (c),*
19 *post on the public website of that agency any report re-*
20 *quired to be submitted by the Committees on Appropria-*
21 *tions of the House of Representatives and the Senate in this*
22 *Act, upon the determination by the head of the agency that*
23 *it shall serve the national interest.*

24 *(b) Subsection (a) shall not apply to a report if—*

10 *reprogramming and transfer authority provided in section*

13 SEC. 525. (a) *Funding provided in this Act for “Oper-*
14 *ations and Support” may be used for minor procurement,*
15 *construction, and improvements.*

16 (b) *For purposes of subsection (a), “minor” refers to*
17 *end items with a unit cost of \$250,000 or less for personal*
18 *property, and \$4,000,000 or less for real property.*

19 SEC. 526. *The authority provided by section 532 of*

24 SEC. 527. (a) *Except as provided in subsection (b),*
25 *none of the funds made available in this Act may be used*

1 *to place restraints on a woman in the custody of the De-*
2 *partment of Homeland Security (including during trans-*
3 *port, in a detention facility, or at an outside medical facil-*
4 *ity) who is pregnant or in post-delivery recuperation.*

5 *(b) Subsection (a) shall not apply with respect to a*
6 *pregnant woman if—*

7 *(1) an appropriate official of the Department of*

24 *and in no case may a pregnant woman be restrained in*
25 *a face-down position with four-point restraints, on her*

3 *straints shall be positioned, to the maximum extent feasible,*

19 *sult of an allegation described in paragraph (3), upon the*
20 *request of such individual.*

21 *SEC. 529. Section 519 of division F of Public Law*
22 *114–113, regarding a prohibition on funding for any posi-*
23 *tion designated as a Principal Federal Official, shall apply*

13 *(2) submits to the Committees on Appropriations*

19 *(b) None of the funds provided to the Department of*
20 *Homeland Security by the Technology Modernization Fund*
21 *shall be available for obligation until 15 days after a report*
22 *on such funds has been transmitted to the Committees on*
23 *Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the*
24 *Senate.*

1 (c) *The report described in subsection (b) shall in-*
2 *clude—*

3 (1) *the full project proposal submitted to and ap-*
4 *proved by the Fund’s Technology Modernization*
5 *Board;*

6 (2) *the finalized interagency agreement between*
7 *the Department and the Fund including the project’s*
8 *deliverables and repayment terms, as applicable;*

9 (3) *a detailed analysis of how the project will*
10 *supplement or supplant existing funding available to*
11 *the Department for similar activities;*

12 (4) *a plan for how the Department will repay*
13 *the Fund, including specific planned funding sources,*
14 *as applicable; and*

15 (5) *other information as determined by the Sec-*
16 *retary.*

17 *SEC. 533. Within 60 days of any budget submission*
18 *for the Department of Homeland Security for fiscal year*
19 *2027 that assumes revenues or proposes a reduction from*
20 *the previous year based on user fees proposals that have not*
21 *been enacted into law prior to the submission of the budget,*
22 *the Secretary of Homeland Security shall provide the Com-*
23 *mittees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives*
24 *and the Senate specific reductions in proposed discre-*
25 *tionary budget authority commensurate with the revenues*

20 *(1) is not a United States citizen or a member*

19 Health and Human Services, the Attorney General, the Sec-
20 retary of State, and the Committees on Appropriations of
21 the House of Representatives and the Senate.

22 (d) If the monthly estimates described in subsection (b)
23 are not provided for the purposes described, the reprogram-
24 ming and transfer authority provided in section 503 of this
25 Act shall be suspended until such time as the required esti-

1 *mates are provided to the Committees on Appropriations*
2 *of the House of Representatives and the Senate.*

3 *SEC. 538. (a) The Secretary of Homeland Security*
4 *shall, on a monthly basis beginning immediately after the*
5 *date of enactment of this Act, develop estimates of the num-*
6 *ber of individuals anticipated to be detained in and re-*
7 *moved from the United States.*

8 *(b) The Secretary shall ensure that, at a minimum,*
9 *the estimates developed pursuant to subsection (a)—*

10 *(1) cover the current fiscal year and the fol-*
11 *lowing fiscal year;*

12 *(2) include a breakout by demographics, to in-*
13 *clude single adults and family units;*

14 *(3) undergo an independent validation and*
15 *verification review;*

16 *(4) are used to inform policy planning and*
17 *budgeting processes within the Department of Home-*
18 *land Security; and*

19 *(5) are included in the budget materials sub-*
20 *mitted to Congress for each fiscal year beginning after*
21 *the date of enactment of this Act and in support of—*

22 *(A) the President's annual budget request*
23 *pursuant to section 1105 of title 31, United*
24 *States Code;*

1 (B) any supplemental funding request sub-
2 mitted to Congress;

3 (C) any reprogramming and transfer notifi-
4 cation pursuant to section 503 of this Act; and

5 (D) such budget materials shall include—

6 (i) the most recent monthly estimates
7 developed pursuant to subsection (a);

8 (ii) a description and quantification of
9 the estimates used to justify funding re-
10 quests for Department programs related to
11 border security, immigration enforcement,
12 and immigration services;

13 (iii) a description and quantification
14 of the anticipated workload and require-
15 ments resulting from such estimates; and

16 (iv) a confirmation as to whether the
17 budget requests for impacted agencies were
18 developed using the same estimates.

19 (c) The Secretary shall share the monthly estimates de-
20 veloped pursuant to subsection (a) with the Attorney Gen-
21 eral, the Secretary of State, and the Committees on Appro-
22 priations of the House of Representatives and the Senate.

23 (d) If the monthly estimates described in subsection (b)
24 are not provided for the purposes described, the reprogram-
25 ming and transfer authority provided in section 503 of this

1 *Act shall be suspended until such time as the required esti-*
2 *mates are provided to the Committees on Appropriations*
3 *of the House of Representatives and the Senate.*

4 *SEC. 539. (a) Prior to the Secretary of Homeland Se-*
5 *curity requesting assistance from the Department of Defense*
6 *for border security operations, the Secretary shall ensure*
7 *that an alternatives analysis and cost-benefit analysis is*
8 *conducted before such request is made, which shall include*
9 *an examination of obtaining such support through other*
10 *means.*

11 *(b) Not later than 30 days after the date on which a*
12 *request for assistance is made, the Secretary of Homeland*
13 *Security shall submit to the Committees on Appropriations*
14 *of the House of Representatives and the Senate a report de-*
15 *tailing the types of support requested, the alternatives anal-*
16 *ysis and cost-benefit analysis described in subsection (a),*
17 *and the operational impact to Department of Homeland Se-*
18 *curity operations of any Department of Defense border secu-*
19 *rity support requested by the Secretary.*

20 *(c) Not later than 30 days after the date on which a*
21 *request made for assistance is granted and quarterly there-*
22 *after through the duration of such assistance, the Secretary*
23 *of Homeland Security shall submit to the Committees on*
24 *Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the*

1 *Senate, a report detailing the assistance provided and the*
2 *operational impacts to border security operations.*

3 *SEC. 540. Funds made available in this Act or any*
4 *other Act for Operations and Support may be used for the*
5 *necessary expenses of providing an employee emergency*
6 *back-up care program.*

7 *SEC. 541. (a) If the reporting requirement set forth*
8 *in paragraph (2) under the heading “Federal Emergency*
9 *Management Agency—Disaster Relief Fund” in the De-*
10 *partment of Homeland Security Appropriations Act, 2015*
11 *(Public Law 114–4), as applied in this fiscal year by sec-*
12 *tion 306 of this Act, is not submitted to the Committees*
13 *on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the*
14 *Senate and published on the Agency’s website not later than*
15 *the fifth business day of the applicable month, the amount*
16 *made available for “Office of the Secretary and Executive*
17 *Management—Operations and Support—Management and*
18 *Oversight” shall be reduced by \$100,000 for each day such*
19 *report is not submitted and published on the Agency’s*
20 *website.*

21 *(b) During any period in which the total number of*
22 *requests for reimbursement for a covered expense for indi-*
23 *vidual assistance or public assistance related to emergency*
24 *(42 U.S.C. 5122(1)) or major disaster (42 U.S.C. 5122(2))*
25 *declarations under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief*

1 *and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.) that*
2 *the Department of Homeland Security has been considering*
3 *under final review for greater than 60 days exceeds 500,*
4 *the amount made available for “Office of the Secretary and*
5 *Executive Management—Operations and Support—Man-*
6 *agement and Oversight” shall be reduced by \$100,000 for*
7 *each day during such period on which the cumulative total*
8 *of requests over 60 days in final review exceeds 500.*

9 (c) *Subsection (b) shall not apply if the balance of*
10 *funding for the Disaster Relief Fund is sufficient only for*
11 *the purpose of obligating funds for activities determined to*
12 *be lifesaving or life-sustaining.*

13 SEC. 542. *Section 16005(c) of title VI of division B*
14 *of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act*
15 *(Public Law 116–136) shall be applied as if the language*
16 *read as follows: “Subsection (a) shall apply until September*
17 *30, 2026.”.*

18 SEC. 543. *The levels for appropriations accounts speci-*
19 *fied for classified programs in this Act shall conform to the*
20 *direction included in the classified annex accompanying*
21 *this Act and shall be implemented in a manner consistent*
22 *with section 545.*

23 SEC. 544. *Upon a determination by the Director of*
24 *National Intelligence that such action is necessary and in*
25 *the national interest, the Director may, with the approval*

1 *of the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Director of*
2 *the Office of Management and Budget, transfer amounts for*
3 *the National Intelligence Program consistent with the per-*
4 *centage caps specified in section 503(c): Provided, That*
5 *such authority to transfer may not be used unless for higher*
6 *priority items, based on unforeseen intelligence require-*
7 *ments, than those for which originally appropriated and*
8 *in no case where the item for which funds are requested*
9 *has been denied by the Congress: Provided further, That a*
10 *request for any transfer of funds using authority provided*
11 *in this section shall be made consistent with the require-*
12 *ments of section 503(d)(1).*

13 *SEC. 545. Within seven days of the date of enactment*
14 *of this Act, and quarterly thereafter, the Department shall*
15 *submit to the Committees on Appropriation of the House*
16 *of Representatives and the Senate—*

17 *(1) an obligation plan by program, project, or*
18 *activity for each component receiving funds from*
19 *Public Law 119–21;*

20 *(2) estimated fee collections for each component*
21 *collecting new or enhanced fees authorized by Public*
22 *Law 119–21, delineated by collections that a compo-*
23 *nent will retain and collections that a component will*
24 *remit to other agencies or the Treasury; and*

1 (3) *an obligation plan by program, project, or*
2 *activity for fee collections identified in paragraph (2)*
3 *as being retained by a component within the Depart-*
4 *ment.*

5 SEC. 546. (a) *None of the funds appropriated or other-*
6 *wise made available to the Department of Homeland Secu-*
7 *rity by this Act may be used to prevent any of the following*
8 *persons from entering, for the purpose of conducting over-*
9 *sight, any facility operated by or for the Department of*
10 *Homeland Security used to detain or otherwise house*
11 *aliens, or to make any temporary modification at any such*
12 *facility that in any way alters what is observed by a vis-*
13 *iting Member of Congress or such designated employee, com-*
14 *pared to what would be observed in the absence of such*
15 *modification:*

16 (1) *A Member of Congress.*

17 (2) *An employee of the United States House of*
18 *Representatives or the United States Senate des-*
19 *ignated by such a Member for the purposes of this sec-*
20 *tion.*

21 (b) *Nothing in this section may be construed to require*
22 *a Member of Congress to provide prior notice of the intent*
23 *to enter a facility described in subsection (a) for the purpose*
24 *of conducting oversight.*

1 (c) *With respect to individuals described in subsection*
2 *(a)(2), the Department of Homeland Security may require*
3 *that a request be made at least 24 hours in advance of an*
4 *intent to enter a facility described in subsection (a).*

5 *SEC. 547. In addition to amounts otherwise made*
6 *available for such purposes, there is appropriated*
7 *\$30,000,000, for an additional amount for “The Judici-*
8 *ary—Supreme Court of the United States—Salaries and*
9 *Expenses”, to remain available until September 30, 2028:*
10 *Provided, That amounts made available pursuant to this*
11 *section shall be subject to the same authorities and condi-*
12 *tions as if such amounts were provided under the heading*
13 *“The Judiciary—Supreme Court of the United States—*
14 *Salaries and Expenses” in the Financial Services and Gen-*
15 *eral Government Appropriations Act, 2026.*

16 *SEC. 548. There is appropriated \$140,000,000 for an*
17 *additional amount for “Department of Transportation—*
18 *Federal Aviation Administration—Operations” for air*
19 *traffic organization activities, to remain available until*
20 *September 30, 2027: Provided, That the Administrator of*
21 *the Federal Aviation Administration shall only use such*
22 *amounts to provide a rate of pay increase for calendar year*
23 *2026 of 3.8 percent, for air traffic controllers, as defined*
24 *by section 2109(1)(A) of title 5, United States Code, and*
25 *air traffic controller supervisors or managers who are not*

1 covered under such section, but who manage air traffic: Pro-
2 vided further, That such adjustment shall be implemented
3 for all such employees only to the extent the Administrator
4 determines, in his sole discretion, that improvements in
5 workforce scheduling, staffing utilization, or other oper-
6 ational efficiencies are achieved that contribute to address-
7 ing workforce shortfalls and enhancing aviation safety: Pro-
8 vided further, That if the Administrator makes such deter-
9 mination, then such adjustment shall be effective the first
10 pay period beginning after January 1, 2026: Provided fur-
11 ther, That amounts provided by this section shall be subject
12 to the same authorities and conditions as if such amounts
13 were provided by the Department of Transportation Appro-
14 priations Act, 2026.

15 SEC. 549. Notwithstanding section 503(c) of this Act,
16 no amounts may be transferred to “U.S. Customs and Bor-
17 der Protection—Operations and Support” for Border Secu-
18 rity Operations in the “Department of Homeland Security
19 Appropriations Act, 2026” table of the explanatory state-
20 ment regarding this Act, as defined in section 4 (in the mat-
21 ter preceding division A of this consolidated Act).

22 This division may be cited as the “Department of
23 Homeland Security Appropriations Act, 2026”.

1 ***DIVISION B—FURTHER ADDITIONAL***
2 ***CONTINUING APPROPRIATIONS ACT, 2026***

3 *SEC. 101. The Continuing Appropriations Act, 2026*
4 *(division A of Public Law 119–37) is further amended by*
5 *substituting the date of enactment of this Act for the date*
6 *specified in section 106(3).*

7 *SEC. 102. For the purposes of the Continuing Approp-*
8 *riations Act, 2026 (division A of Public Law 119–37), the*
9 *time covered by such Act shall be considered to include the*
10 *period which began on or about February 14, 2026, during*
11 *which there occurred a lapse in appropriations.*

12 *SEC. 103. Amounts made available in division A of*
13 *the Homeland Security and Further Additional Continuing*
14 *Appropriations Act, 2026, the Continuing Appropriations*
15 *Act, 2026 (division A of Public Law 119–37), and Public*
16 *Law 119–21 for personnel pay, allowances, and benefits in*
17 *each department and agency shall be available for payments*
18 *pursuant to subsection (c) of section 1341 of title 31, United*
19 *States Code, and such payments shall be made.*

20 *SEC. 104. All obligations incurred and in anticipation*
21 *of the appropriations made and authority granted by divi-*
22 *sion A of the Homeland Security and Further Additional*
23 *Continuing Appropriations Act, 2026 and the Continuing*
24 *Appropriations Act, 2026 (division A of Public Law 119–*
25 *37) for the purposes of maintaining the essential level of*

1 *activity to protect life and property and bringing about or-*
2 *derly termination of Government function, and for purposes*
3 *as otherwise authorized by law, are hereby ratified and ap-*
4 *proved if otherwise in accord with the provisions of such*
5 *Acts.*

6 *This division may be cited as the “Further Additional*
7 *Continuing Appropriations Act, 2026”.*
