AN ACT

To award a Congressional Gold Medal, collectively, to the individuals and communities who volunteered or donated items to the North Platte Canteen in North Platte, Nebraska, during World War II from December 25, 1941, to April 1, 1946.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “North Platte Canteen
3 Congressional Gold Medal Act”.

4 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

5 The Congress finds the following:

6 (1) Home-front volunteerism was integral to the
7 victory of the United States during World War II.
8 Numerous exemplars of patriotism emerged through-
9 out the Midwest, galvanizing the rural United States
10 and the rest of the country supporting the war ef-
11 fort.

12 (2) The North Platte Canteen in North Platte,
13 Nebraska, was one of the largest volunteer efforts of
14 World War II.

15 (3) Canteen services boosted morale in the
16 United States by providing free, wholesome enter-
17 tainment to troops traveling across the country. Ap-
18 proximately 120 community-based canteens operated
19 in the United States during World War II.

20 (4) The North Platte Canteen greeted and
21 served food to approximately 6,000,000 United
22 States troops traveling across the United States
23 from December 25, 1941, to April 1, 1946.

24 (5) On December 17, 1941, the residents of
25 North Platte, Nebraska, received information that a
26 train of Nebraska National Guardsmen would be

1 traveling through North Platte en route to the West
2 Coast of the United States. Although the train car-
3 ried members of the Kansas National Guard, resi-
4 dents of the community welcomed the men from
5 Kansas with food and other items as an appreciation
6 for their service.

7 (6) On December 18, 1941, Rae Wilson, of
8 North Platte, proposed to her community the idea of
9 establishing the North Platte Canteen so that resi-
10 dents could greet United States troops en route to
11 serving the United States in the European Theater
12 or the Pacific Theater.

13 (7) 55,000 individuals, the majority of whom
14 were women, from 125 communities in Nebraska,
15 Colorado, and Kansas donated food and volunteered
16 at the North Platte Canteen for approximately 5
17 years.

18 (8) The North Platte Canteen provided hospi-
19 tality to as many as 24 troop trains per day. During
20 a 1-month period, the volunteers at the Canteen
21 served over 40,000 homemade cookies, 30,000 hard-
22 boiled eggs, 6,500 doughnuts, 4,000 loaves of bread,
23 3,000 pounds of meat, 450 pounds of cheese, 60
24 quarts of peanut butter, 1,350 pounds of coffee,

1 1,000 quarts of cream, 750 dozen rolls, and 600
2 birthday cakes.

3 (9) The North Platte Canteen principally oper-
4 ated at the Union Pacific Railroad station in North
5 Platte, Nebraska, with volunteers from local commu-
6 nities, organizations, churches, schools, and other
7 groups, and without Federal assistance.

8 (10) \$137,000 in cash contributions supported
9 the operations of the North Platte Canteen for al-
10 most 5 years. The funds were raised through benefit
11 dances, scrap-metal drives, school victory clubs, do-
12 nation cans in local businesses, and from the rel-
13 atives of troops who traveled through the North
14 Platte area.

15 (11) In December 1943, the North Platte Can-
16 teen was honored by the United States Army with
17 the presentation of the Meritorious Wartime Service
18 Award by the Secretary of War.

19 (12) In 2004, the 108th Congress passed a res-
20 olution recognizing the heroic efforts of those who
21 made enormous sacrifices to make the North Platte
22 Canteen a success during World War II.

23 **SEC. 3. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.**

24 (a) PRESENTATION AUTHORIZED.—The Speaker of
25 the House of Representatives and the President pro tem-

1 pore of the Senate shall make appropriate arrangements
2 for the presentation, on behalf of Congress, of a gold
3 medal of appropriate design to the individuals and commu-
4 nities who volunteered or donated items to the North
5 Platte Canteen in North Platte, Nebraska, during World
6 War II.

7 (b) DESIGN AND STRIKING.—For purposes of the
8 presentation described in subsection (a), the Secretary of
9 the Treasury (referred to in this Act as the “Secretary”)
10 shall strike a gold medal with suitable emblems, devices,
11 and inscriptions, to be determined by the Secretary.

12 (c) LINCOLN COUNTY HISTORICAL MUSEUM.—Fol-
13 lowing the presentation described in subsection (a), the
14 gold medal shall be given to the Lincoln County Historical
15 Museum in North Platte, Nebraska, where the medal shall
16 be available for display as appropriate and made available
17 for research.

18 **SEC. 4. DUPLICATE MEDALS.**

19 The Secretary may strike and sell duplicates in
20 bronze of the gold medal struck under section 3, at a price
21 sufficient to cover the costs of the medals, including labor,
22 materials, dies, use of machinery, and overhead expenses.

1 **SEC. 5. STATUS OF MEDALS.**

2 (a) NATIONAL MEDALS.—Medals struck under this
3 Act are national medals for purposes of chapter 51 of title
4 31, United States Code.

5 (b) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of sections
6 5134 and 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all medals
7 struck under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic
8 items.

9 **SEC. 6. AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS; PROCEEDS OF**
10 **SALE.**

11 (a) AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS.—There is
12 authorized to be charged against the United States Mint
13 Public Enterprise Fund such amounts as may be nec-
14 essary to pay for the costs of the medals struck under
15 this Act.

16 (b) PROCEEDS OF SALE.—Amounts received from the
17 sale of duplicate bronze medals authorized under section
18 4 shall be deposited into the United States Mint Public
19 Enterprise Fund.
