UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENTS

H.R. 2206 (ORDER NO. 146)

1.—*Ordered*, That at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, May 17, 2007, the Senate resume consideration of H.R. 2206, an act making emergency supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2007, and for other purposes; provided that one hour after the Senate convenes and notwithstanding the provisions of Rule XXII, the Senate proceed to a vote on the motion to invoke cloture on Amdt. No. 1123 offered by the Senator from Nevada (Mr. Reid) and the Senator from Kentucky (Mr. McConnell), with the time prior to the vote equally divided between the two Leaders or their designees.

Ordered further, That if cloture is invoked on Amdt. No. 1123, then all other amendments and motions be withdrawn, the substitute amendment be agreed to, the bill be read a third time and the Senate then immediately proceed to a vote on passage of the bill; further, that if the bill, as amended, passes, the Senate insist on its amendment and request a conference with the House, and the Chair be authorized to appoint conferees with the preceding all occurring without intervening action or debate. (*May 11, 16, 2007.*)

CONFERENCE REPORT TO ACCOMPANY S. CON. RES. 21

2.—*Ordered*, That following the disposition of H.R. 2206, the Senate begin debate on the Conference Report to accompany S. Con. Res. 21, an original concurrent resolution setting forth the congressional budget for the United States Government for fiscal year 2008 and including the appropriate budgetary levels for fiscal years 2007 and 2009 through 2012, notwithstanding the receipt of the papers; provided that the time until 3:00 p.m. shall be equally divided between the Senator from North Dakota (Mr. Conrad) and the Senator from New Hampshire (Mr. Gregg) or their designees.

Ordered further, That at 3:00 p.m. the Senate proceed to a vote on adoption of the Conference Report, notwithstanding the receipt of the papers and provided that the House has adopted the Conference Report by that time; further, that if the House has not acted by that time, the Senate vote shall be delayed until the House has adopted the Conference Report; provided further, that if the House does not act on Thursday, May 17, 2007, then there shall be one hour each for the Chairman and Ranking Member to use prior to the vote on adoption of the Conference Report whenever the Senate considers the Conference Report and that it be in order to consider it notwithstanding the provisions of Rule XXII. (*May 16, 2007.*)

S. 1348 (ORDER NO. 144)

3.—*Ordered*, That on Monday, May 21, 2007, no earlier than 5:30 p.m., the Senate proceed to a vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 1348, a bill to provide for comprehensive immigration reform, and for other purposes; provided that if cloture is invoked, the motion be agreed to without any intervening action or debate.

Ordered further, That the Senator from Alabama (Mr. Sessions) have up to 3 hours under his control to speak on Monday, May 21, 2007 and up to 2 hours on Tuesday, May 22, 2007; provided further, that the hour prior to the vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to the bill shall be reserved for the two Leaders or their designees.

Ordered further, That relative to the cloture motion filed on the motion to proceed to S. 1348, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (*May 14, 15, 2007.*)
