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UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENT

S. 744 (ORDER NO. 80)

Ordered, That following Leader remarks on Thursday, June 27, 2013, the Senate resume consideration of S. 744, a bill to provide for comprehensive immigration reform and for other purposes, with the time until 11:30 a.m. equally divided and controlled between the two Managers, or their designees, and Senators permitted to speak for up to 10 minutes each; provided, that upon disposition of the Foxx nomination and the resumption of Legislative Session, all post-cloture time on the committee-reported substitute amendment, as amended, be considered expired; provided further, that the pending amendments to the underlying bill be withdrawn; provided further, that the Majority Leader be recognized for the purpose of raising points of order against the remaining pending amendments to the substitute amendment; further, that after the amendments fall, the Senate vote on adoption of the committee-reported substitute amendment, as amended; provided further, that upon disposition of the committee-reported substitute amendment, the Senate vote on the motion to invoke cloture on S. 744, as amended; further, that if cloture is invoked, it be considered as if cloture had been invoked at 7:00 a.m. on Thursday, June 27.

Ordered further, That the post-cloture time on the committee-reported substitute amendment run as if cloture was invoked at 1:00 a.m. on Wednesday, June 26, 2013.

Ordered further, That the following amendments not be subject to modification or division and that no second degree amendments be in order to any of these amendments prior to votes in relation to the amendments:

- Boxer Amdt. No. 1240;
- Reed (RI) Amdt. No. 1224;
- Cruz Amdt. No. 1320.

Ordered further, That with respect to the cloture motion filed on S. 744, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived.

Ordered further, That all time during adjournment, recess, Morning Business, and Executive Session count post-cloture on Amdt. No. 1183, as modified.

Ordered further, That the filing deadline for second degree amendments to Amdt. No. 1183, as modified, be 4:00 p.m. on Monday, June 24, 2013.

Ordered further, That the filing deadline for first degree amendments to the committee-reported substitute amendment to S. 744 be 12:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 25, 2013.

Ordered further, That the filing deadline for second degree amendments to the committee-reported substitute amendment be 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday, June 26, 2013. (*June 18, 21, 24, 25, 26, 2013.*)

 "And in all cases of conference asked after a vote of disagreement, etc., the conferees of the House asking it are to leave the papers with the conferees of the other * * *." The House agreeing to the conference usually acts on the report before the House requesting a conference.
