UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENTS**H.R. 2048 (ORDER NO. 87)**

1.—*Ordered*, That following Morning Business on Monday, June 1, 2015, the Senate resume consideration of H.R. 2048, an Act to reform the authorities of the Federal Government to require the production of certain business records, conduct electronic surveillance, use pen registers and trap and trace devices, and use other forms of information gathering for foreign intelligence, counterterrorism, and criminal purposes, and for other purposes. (May 31, 2015.)

S. 1357 (ORDER NO. 86)

2.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 1357, a bill to extend authority relating to roving surveillance, access to business records, and individual terrorists as agents of foreign powers under the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978 until July 31, 2015, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum under Rule XXII be waived. (May 23, 2015.)

S. 534 (ORDER NO. 22)

3.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 534, a bill to prohibit funds from being used to carry out certain Executive actions related to immigration, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (Feb. 27, 2015.)
