### UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENTS

#### S. 1890 (ORDER NO. 355)

1.—Ordered, That at 5:00 p.m. on Monday, April 4, 2016, the Senate proceed to the consideration of S. 1890, a bill to amend chapter 90 of title 18, United States Code, to provide Federal jurisdiction for the theft of trade secrets, and for other purposes; provided, that there be 30 minutes of debate equally divided in the usual form; provided further, that following the use or yielding back of time, the committee reported substitute amendment be agreed to, the bill, as amended, be read a third time, and the Senate vote on passage of the bill, as amended, with no intervening action or debate; further, that, if passed, the motions to reconsider be considered made and laid upon the table with no intervening action or debate. (Mar. 16, 2016.)

#### HOUSE MESSAGE TO ACCOMPANY S. 764

2.—Ordered, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to concur in the House amendment to S. 764, a bill to reauthorize and amend the National Sea Grant College Program Act, and for other purposes, with Amdt. No. 3450, offered by the Senator from Kentucky (Mr. McConnell), the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (Mar. 14, 2016.)

#### S. 2012 (ORDER NO. 218)

3.—Ordered, That with respect to the motions to invoke cloture on Amdt. No. 2953, offered by the Senator from Alaska (Ms. Murkowski), and S. 2012, a bill to provide for the modernization of the energy policy of the United States, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum under Rule XXII be waived; provided, that the filing deadline for all first degree amendments to Amdt. No. 2953 and S. 2012 be at 1:00 p.m. on Wednesday, February 3, 2016. (*Feb. 2, 2016.*)

### H.R. 2685 (ORDER NO. 118)

4.—Ordered, That with respect to the cloture motion on the motion to proceed to H.R. 2685, an act making appropriations for the Department of Defense for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2016, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum under Rule XXII be waived. (Nov. 3, 2015.)

#### S. 1881 (ORDER NO. 169)

5.—Ordered, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 1881, a bill to prohibit Federal funding of Planned Parenthood Federation of America, the mandatory quorum under Rule XXII be waived. (Aug. 3, 2015.)

#### S. 1357 (ORDER NO. 86)

6.—Ordered, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 1357, a bill to extend authority relating to roving surveillance, access to business records, and individual terrorists as agents of foreign powers under the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978 until July 31, 2015, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum under Rule XXII be waived. (May 23, 2015.)

#### S. 534 (ORDER NO. 22)

7.—Ordered, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 534, a bill to prohibit funds from being used to carry out certain Executive actions related to immigration, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (*Feb. 27, 2015.*)
