UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENTS

S.J. RES. 28 (ORDER NO. 479)

1.—Ordered, That following Leader Remarks on Wednesday, May 25, 2016, the Senate resume consideration of S.J. Res 28, joint resolution providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Secretary of Agriculture relating to inspection of fish of the order Siluformes; provided, that the time be equally divided between opponents and proponents until 11:00 a.m., with the Senator from New Hampshire (Mrs. Shaheen) controlling 10 minutes of the proponent time; provided further, that, notwithstanding Rule XXII and the Congressional Review Act, all time on S.J. Res. 28 be deemed expired at 11:00 a.m. (May 24, 2016).

S. 2943 (ORDER NO. 469)

2.—Ordered, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 2943, a bill to authorize appropriations for fiscal year 2017 for military activities of the Department of Defense, for military construction, and for defense activities of the Department of Energy, to prescribe military personnel strengths for such fiscal year, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (May 23, 2016).

HOUSE MESSAGE TO ACCOMPANY S. 764

3.—Ordered, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to concur in the House amendment to S. 764, a bill to reauthorize and amend the National Sea Grant College Program Act, and for other purposes, with Amdt. No. 3450, offered by the Senator from Kentucky (Mr. McConnell), the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (Mar. 14, 2016.)

H.R. 2685 (ORDER NO. 118)

4.—Ordered, That with respect to the cloture motion on the motion to proceed to H.R. 2685, an act making appropriations for the Department of Defense for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2016, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum under Rule XXII be waived. (Nov. 3, 2015.)

S. 1881 (ORDER NO. 169)

5.—Ordered, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 1881, a bill to prohibit Federal funding of Planned Parenthood Federation of America, the mandatory quorum under Rule XXII be waived. (Aug. 3, 2015.)

S. 1357 (ORDER NO. 86)

6.—Ordered, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 1357, a bill to extend authority relating to roving surveillance, access to business records, and individual terrorists as agents of foreign powers under the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978 until July 31, 2015, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum under Rule XXII be waived. (May 23, 2015.)

S. 534 (ORDER NO. 22)

7.—Ordered, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 534, a bill to prohibit funds from being used to carry out certain Executive actions related to immigration, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (Feb. 27, 2015.)
