#### S. 1370

4.-Ordered, That with respect to S. 1370, an Act to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to treat certain military survivor benefits as earned income for purposes of the kiddie tax, the papers to be held at the Desk; provided, that if the House passes a bill identical to S. 1370, the House bill be considered read three times and passed; provided further, that the motion to reconsider be considered made and laid upon the table, with no intervening action or debate; further, that upon passage of the House bill, S. 1370 be indefinitely postponed. (May 21, 2019.)

#### H.R. 268 (ORDER NO. 15)

5.—Ordered, That with respect to the cloture motions on Amdt. No. 201, offered by the Senator from Alabama (Mr. Shelby), and H.R. 268, an Act making supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019, the mandatory quorums under Rule XXII be waived; provided, that the filing deadline for first degree amendments be 4:00 p.m. on Monday, April 1, 2019.
