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## UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENT

## S. 1260 (ORDER NO. 58)

1.—*Ordered*, That on Wednesday, May 26, 2021, upon the conclusion of Morning Business, the Senate resume consideration of S. 1260, a bill to establish a new Directorate for Technology and Innovation in the National Science Foundation, to establish a regional technology hub program, to require a strategy and report on economic security, science, research, innovation, manufacturing, and job creation, to establish a critical supply chain resiliency program, and for other purposes; provided, that the following amendments be called up and reported by number:

- Amdt. No. 2014 (Durbin)
- Amdt. No. 1710 (Kennedy)
- Amdt. No. 1811 (Sullivan);

provided further, that at 12:00 noon the Senate vote in relation to the Sullivan amendment and at 2:30 p.m., the Senate vote in relation to the Durbin and Kennedy amendments, with no amendments in order to these amendments prior to a vote in relation to the amendment; further, that 60-affirmative votes be required for adoption of the amendments, with the exception of the Sullivan amendment; provided further, that there be two minutes of debate, equally divided, prior to each vote.

*Ordered further*, That the filing deadline for first degree amendments be 2:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 26, 2021.

*Ordered further*, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on Amdt. No. 1502, offered by the Senator from New York (Mr. Schumer), to S. 1260 and the motion to invoke cloture on S. 1260, the mandatory quorum calls under Rule XXII be waived. (*May 25, 2021.*)

## H.R. 3233 (ORDER NO. 60)

2.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to H.R. 3233, an Act to establish the National Commission to Investigate the January 6 Attack on the United States Capitol Complex, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. (*May 25, 2021.*)
