No. 3867, offered by the Senator from Rhode Island (Mr. Reed), as modified, and H.R. 4350 ripen at 5:30 p.m. on Monday, November 29, 2021; provided further, that the filing deadline for first degree amendments to Amdt. No. 3867, as modified, and H.R. 4350 be at 3:30 p.m. on Monday, November 29, 2021; further, that with respect to the motions to invoke cloture on Amdt. No. 3867, as modified, and H.R. 4350, the mandatory quorum calls under Rule XXII be waived. (*Nov. 19, 2021.*)

2.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 4, a bill to amend the Voting Rights Act of 1965 to revise the criteria for determining which States and political subdivisions are subject to section 4 of the Act, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. (*Nov. 1, 2021.*)

**S. 2747 (ORDER NO. 125)**

3.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 2747, a bill to expand Amercians' access to the ballot box and reduce the influence of big money in politics, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. (*Oct. 18, 2021.*)
