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## UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENTS

## H.R. 4373 (ORDER NO. 310)

1.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to H.R. 4373, an Act making appropriations for the Department of State, foreign operations, and related programs for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. (*Mar. 29, 2022.*)

## HOUSE MESSAGE TO ACCOMPANY H.R. 5746

2.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to concur in the House amendment to the Senate amendment to H.R. 5746, an Act to amend title 51, United States Code, to extend the authority of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to enter into leases of non-excess property of the Administration, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. ## H.R. 4350 (ORDER NO. 144)

No. 3867, as modified, and H.R. 4350, the mandatory quorum calls under Rule XXII be waived. (*Nov. 19, 29, 2021.*)

## S. 4 (ORDER NO. 143)

4.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 4, a bill to amend the Voting Rights Act of 1965 to revise the criteria for determining which States and political subdivisions are subject to section 4 of the Act, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. (*Nov. 1, 2021.*)

## S. 2747 (ORDER NO. 125)

5.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 2747, a bill to expand Americans' access to the ballot box and reduce the influence of big money in politics, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. (*Oct. 18, 2021.*)
