2.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the entered motion to reconsider the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to H.R. 4016, an Act making appropriations for the Department of Defense for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. (*Oct. 16, 2025.*)

S. 2882 (ORDER NO. 167)

UNDER RULE VIII
