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UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENTS

S. 4344 (ORDER NO. 373)

1.—*Ordered*, That the vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 4344, a bill to extend section 702 of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978 for 3 years, occur at a time to be determined by the Majority Leader in consultation with the Democratic Leader, no later than Friday, May 1. (*Apr. 28, 2026.*)

H.R. 4016 (ORDER NO. 136)

2.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the entered motion to reconsider the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to H.R. 4016, an Act making appropriations for the Department of Defense for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. (*Oct. 16, 2025.*)

S. 2882 (ORDER NO. 167)

3.—*Ordered*, That with respect to the entered motion to reconsider the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 2882, a bill making continuing appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2026, and for other purposes, the mandatory quorum call under Rule XXII be waived. (*Oct. 9, 2025.*)

S. 2806 (ORDER NO. 161)
