Executive Summary

Public Law Citation

Section 6 of the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act of 1998 (SNPLMA), as amended, Public Law 105–263, requires “the Secretary [of the Interior], in cooperation with the Secretary of Agriculture, to submit to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate and the Committee on Resources [now the Committee on Natural Resources] of the House of Representatives an annual report on all transactions under this act.” This report covers activities for fiscal year (FY) 2022.

FY 2022 Summary

In FY 2022, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) disposed of 366 acres, generating over \$128 million in revenue. The City of North Las Vegas disposed of 206 acres, generating over \$36 million in revenue. In addition, of lands the BLM previously conveyed, Clark County generated over \$398 million through land sales and leases. Under SNPLMA, 85 percent of the revenue generated by the City of North Las Vegas and Clark County were deposited into the special Treasury account. Recipients of SNPLMA funds initiated 75 new projects in FY 2022 and completed 13 projects approved in prior years. These completed projects have led to the implementation of conservation, restoration, and fuels treatments, and capital improvements on Federal lands. Ongoing or newly initiated projects will deliver comparable results as they are completed.

Background

SNPLMA authorizes the sale of certain BLM-administered public lands in the Las Vegas Valley. Revenues generated from those land sales are deposited into a special Treasury account from which expenditures can be authorized to fund Federal, state, and local projects that support economic development and create new employment opportunities. In addition, SNPLMA directs the BLM to convey certain public lands to Clark County and the City of North Las Vegas and provides that revenue generated by the county or city from those conveyed lands must also be deposited into the SNPLMA special Treasury account. Since the SNPLMA program's inception, public land sales in the Las Vegas Valley, including interest earned and other transactions, have generated nearly \$4.8 billion (see Appendix A). The Secretary of the Interior (Secretary), with concurrence from the Secretary of Agriculture, has approved the expenditure of over \$3.4 billion (see Appendix B) for more than 1,400 projects (Appendix C) since the inception of SNPLMA.

The BLM, in collaboration with the National Park Service (NPS); the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS); the Bureau of Reclamation; the United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service (USDA FS); the State of Nevada; affected units of local and regional governments in Clark, Lincoln, and White Pine Counties and Carson City; Lake Tahoe stakeholders; and other interested parties, developed a process for recommending expenditures of the special Treasury account to the Secretaries of the Interior and Agriculture, which is referred to as a "round." Once a round has been approved for funding, projects authorized under that round are implemented by the five Federal agencies and eligible non-Federal entities specified in SNPLMA. These projects benefit communities and public lands throughout the State of Nevada, Lake Tahoe Basin, and Lake Mead National Recreation Area. They have funded the creation of local parks, trails, and natural areas; conservation, restoration, and fuels treatments; capital improvements on certain Federal lands; and acquisition of environmentally sensitive lands and interests in lands.

The BLM and its partners appreciate the importance of their role as stewards of these public lands and public funds. This FY 2022 annual report to Congress highlights the many benefits resulting from the implementation of SNPLMA. FY 2022 Summary of Accomplishments

In FY 2022, the BLM disposed of 366 acres, generating over \$128 million. The City of North Las Vegas Job Creation Zone¹ disposed of 206 acres, generating over \$36 million. In addition, of lands the BLM previously conveyed, Clark County Cooperative Management Area² generated over \$398 million through land sales and leases. See Table 1 for a summary of land disposals by BLM and the City of North Las Vegas, Table 2 for a summary of revenue received from lands conveyed to Clark County, and Appendix D for a summary of land disposals completed under SNPLMA since inception.

In FY 2022, recipients of SNPLMA funds initiated 75 new projects, and completed and closed out 13 projects approved in prior years (see Table 3 for a summary by category and Appendix E for additional project details). These completed projects led to implementation of conservation, restoration, and hazardous fuels treatments, and capital improvements on Federal lands.

¹ Division B, Title XXX, Subtitle J, Sec. 3092(c) of the Carl Levin and Howard P. “Buck” McKeon National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2015, Public Law 113–291, directs the BLM to convey certain lands within a Job Creation Zone to the City of North Las Vegas. The conveyance requires that when the city conveys the lands, they do so at fair market value and the gross proceeds from the sale be deposited into the SNPLMA special Treasury Account in accordance with Section 4(e) of SNPLMA.

² Section 4(g) of SNPLMA directs the BLM to convey certain lands within a Cooperative Management Area near Harry Reid International Airport to Clark County. The conveyance requires that when the county conveys or leases the lands, they do so at fair market value and distribute 85 percent of the proceeds to the SNPLMA special Treasury account, 5 percent to the State of Nevada, and 10 percent to the Clark County Department of Aviation. A smaller portion of the 85 percent of proceeds deposited into the SNPLMA special Treasury account pursuant to 4(g) is only available to the Secretary of Agriculture for the acquisition of environmentally sensitive land in the Lake Tahoe Basin pursuant to Section 3 of the Santini-Burton Act, Public Law 96–586.

FY 2022 Project Accomplishments by Category

The following sections include category descriptions as well as the number of projects completed in FY 2022 and a list of quantitative accomplishments (summed across projects within each individual category). For further information, see Appendix C for the status of the SNPLMA projects and Appendix E for individual accomplishments for projects completed in FY 2022. Environmentally Sensitive Land Acquisitions

SNPLMA funds have been used to acquire environmentally sensitive land and interests in land within Nevada, with priority given to lands in Clark County. Environmentally sensitive lands are those that promote the preservation of natural, scientific, aesthetic, historical, cultural, watershed, wildlife, and other resource values; enhance recreational opportunities and public access; provide for better management of public land through consolidation of Federal ownership; or otherwise serve the public interest.

Terminated Projects: 2

Summary of FY 2022 Accomplishments:

Two projects were terminations and have no accomplishments to report. Under SNPLMA, the acquisition of environmentally sensitive land must have a willing seller. The sellers each received the fair market appraisal from the Department of the Interior Office of Valuation Services. However, the value of the properties did not meet the expectations of the sellers, and both sellers elected to discontinue the acquisition process.

Capital Improvements

SNPLMA funds have been used for capital improvements at Lake Mead National Recreation Area, the Desert National Wildlife Refuge Complex, Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area, Great Basin National Park, the Spring Mountains National Recreation Area, and other areas administered by the BLM or the USDA FS in Clark, Lincoln, and White Pine Counties. Capital improvement projects include the repair or rehabilitation of existing infrastructure, construction of new facilities, and other improvements needed to protect resource values.

Completed Projects: 5

Summary of FY 2022 Accomplishments:

Construct, Refurbish, and Improve

- 1 building, facility, and/or amenity constructed or refurbished.
- 1 building or facility that supports green sustainability designed and constructed.

- 61 recreation facilities or structures constructed or improved.
- 1 mile of recreational roads, trails, or routes constructed or improved.
- 10 acres of cultural/paleontological resources surveyed, inventoried, or monitored.
- 10 acres of invasive plant species treated or restored.

Outreach and Education

- 70 new interpretive or education publications/signs/kiosks/displays produced and installed.
- 3 databases, reports, and/or other electronic means of documenting activities developed and implemented.

Multi-Species Habitat Conservation Plan

The Clark County Multiple Species Habitat Conservation Plan (MSHCP) and Environmental Impact Statement for Issuance of a Permit to Allow Incidental Take of 79 Species in Clark County, Nevada (FWS, 2000) focuses on sensitive, threatened, and endangered species, including the threatened Mojave desert tortoise. The plan ensures that the loss of habitat, as authorized by an incidental take permit issued by the FWS under the authority of Section 10 of the Endangered Species Act, is adequately minimized. Clark County, other permittees, and the Federal agencies on whose land these actions take place work together to implement projects under this category of work.

No projects were completed in this category in FY 2022.

Parks, Trails, and Natural Areas

This project category benefits local communities through the development of parks, trails, and natural areas in Clark, Lincoln, and White Pine Counties. Carson City is also eligible for funding, subject to certain limitations (i.e., lands within the Carson City boundary and within the 100-year Federal Emergency Management Agency designated floodplain of the Carson River). Funds are provided for the acquisition of lands, easements, or rights-of-way necessary to develop projects as well as for construction or renovation of such projects by local and regional governmental entities.

Terminated Projects: 1

Summary of FY 2022 Accomplishments:

One project was a termination and has no accomplishments to report. The Milestone Park project was terminated by the City of North Las Vegas because of changing site and economic conditions.

Conservation Initiatives

Conservation initiatives promote the preservation, maintenance, and improvement of Federal lands and resources in Clark, Lincoln, and White Pine Counties and Carson City, Nevada (subject to the same limitations referenced in the parks, trails, and natural areas category). Conservation initiatives include planning, implementation, and monitoring. They also include programs critical to protecting and sustaining resources in Nevada, such as the cleanup and prevention of litter and unauthorized dump sites, natural and cultural resource protection, recreation, environmental education and interpretation, and habitat restoration.

Completed Projects: 2

Summary of FY 2022 Accomplishments:

Cultural, Historical, and Natural Resources

- 2,413 acres of hazardous fuels treated in non-wildland urban interface areas.
- 2,413 acres of invasive plant species surveyed, inventoried, or monitored.
- 2,464 acres of invasive plant species treated or restored.
- 5 threatened and endangered species recovery actions implemented.
- 1 mile of riparian stream or shoreline habitat treated, enhanced, or restored.
- 1 acre of wetland/riparian habitat treated, enhanced, or restored.
- 2,463 acres of upland habitat treated, enhanced, or restored.
- 2,463 acres of upland habitat inventoried or monitored.

Outreach and Education

- 1 new interpretive or education publication/sign/kiosk/display produced and installed.

Lake Tahoe Restoration Projects

SNPLMA was amended in 2003 to provide funding for the Federal share of the Lake Tahoe Environmental Improvement Program, as set forth in the Lake Tahoe Restoration Act of 2000, Public Law 106–506, and the Department of the Interior and Related Agencies Appropriations Act of 2004, Public Law 108–108. Lake Tahoe Restoration projects funded by SNPLMA range from controlling and eradicating aquatic invasive species, to capturing and controlling stormwater, to improving USDA FS facilities and trails, all of which aim to protect and restore the extraordinary natural and recreational resources of the Lake Tahoe Basin.

No projects were completed in this category in FY 2022.

Hazardous Fuels Reduction and Wildfire Prevention

SNPLMA was amended in 2006 to allow funding for development and implementation of comprehensive, cost-effective, multijurisdictional hazardous fuels reduction and wildfire prevention plans for the Lake Tahoe Basin, the Carson Range in Douglas and Washoe Counties and Carson City, and the Spring Mountains in southern Nevada. Hazardous fuels reduction and wildfire prevention projects may include project-level planning, fuels reduction treatment activities, and sustainable biomass and biofuels energy development and production activities.

No projects were completed in this category in FY 2022.

Eastern Nevada Landscape Restoration Projects

SNPLMA was amended in 2006 to allow funding for implementation of the Eastern Nevada Landscape Restoration Project, which promotes resilient and healthy ecosystems within the Great Basin in White Pine and Lincoln Counties. Projects include planning, implementation, research, monitoring, environmental analysis and associated documentation, and delivery of programs such as fire management and improvements to forests and restoration of native woodlands (including riparian and aspen communities) and rangelands. Research projects must demonstrate a practical application to the management of Federal lands to be accepted for consideration.

Completed Projects: 3

Summary of FY 2022 Accomplishments:

Cultural, Historical, and Natural Resources

- 3,000 acres of cultural/paleontological resources surveyed, inventoried, or monitored.
- 5,000 acres of hazardous fuels treated in non-wildland urban interface areas.
- 2,000 acres of invasive plant species surveyed, inventoried, or monitored.
- 2,000 acres of conservation actions for nonlisted species implemented.
- 4,000 acres of upland habitat treated, enhanced, or restored.
- 2,000 acres of upland habitat surveyed, inventoried, or monitored.
- 2,600 acres of invasive plant species treated or restored.
- 20 miles of roads or trails decommissioned and/or rehabilitated.

Outreach and Education

- 2 outreach contacts made.

Payment of 15 percent of total receipts from disposals of public land to the State of Nevada education fund and local water and aviation entities, as required by SNPLMA, reduces the amount available to the Secretary by \$656,248,267. Mandatory set-asides for specific purposes reduce the amount available by another \$602,235,801. Finally, operational expenses through FY 2022 of \$119,102,915 (2.6 percent of total revenue through FY 2022) for implementation of the act further reduce the amount available for distribution. Considering these deductions, the net amount of total revenue available since inception to the Secretary for distribution from the SNPLMA special Treasury account is \$3,043,154,610. The Secretary has allocated over \$3 billion for projects in 18 rounds of funding.



I am pleased to transmit the “Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 Accomplishments” report to Congress per the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act (SNPLMA) of 1998, as amended (Public Law 105–263).

SNPLMA authorizes the Secretary of the Interior to sell certain public lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) within a specific boundary around Las Vegas, Nevada. Eighty-five percent of the revenue generated from those land sales funds Federal, State, and local projects that support economic development and create new employment opportunities throughout Nevada; at the Lake Mead National Recreation Area, including the portion in Arizona; and at Lake Tahoe, including the portion in California. The remaining 15 percent of the revenue is distributed to the State of Nevada’s general education program and the Southern Nevada Water Authority for water treatment and transmission facility infrastructure in Clark County, Nevada.

In FY 2022, BLM held one SNPLMA land sale and disposed of 366 acres, generating over \$128 million in revenue. The City of North Las Vegas¹ disposed of 206 acres, generating over \$36 million in revenue. In addition, of lands that BLM previously conveyed under SNPLMA, Clark County generated over \$398 million through land sales and leases. Recipients of SNPLMA funds initiated 75 new projects in FY 2022 and completed 13 projects approved in prior years. These completed projects led to the implementation of conservation, restoration, and hazardous fuels treatments, as well as capital improvements.

Similar letters and copies of the enclosed report are being sent to the Chair and Ranking Member of the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources; the Chair and Ranking Member of the House Committee on Natural Resources; and certain members of the congressional delegations from Nevada, Arizona, and California.

¹ Public Law 113–291 provides for separate conveyances to the City of Las Vegas and the City of North Las Vegas of parcels designated as “Job Creation Zones.” The legislative provisions for these conveyances all provide that the cities may sell the conveyed lands if certain conditions are met and the proceeds from those sales are to be distributed in accordance with section 4(e) of SNPLMA.


