CALIFORNIA

Old Don Pedro Parking Area Renovation (Central California District) 1 acre permanently closed. In March 2025, the Mother Lode Field Office issued a [Decision Record](#) authorizing the expansion and improvement of the Old Don Pedro Parking Area (NEPA Number: [DOI-BLM-CA-C080-2025-0007-EA](#)). This decision closed approximately 1 additional acre to shooting in accordance with 43 CFR 8365.2-5 as a developed recreation site.

Barnes Grade Recreation Area (Northern California District) 1,120 acres permanently closed. In September 2025, the Applegate Field Office issued a [Decision Record](#) authorizing the construction of the Barnes Grade Recreation Area (NEPA Number: [DOI-BLM-CA-N020-2025-0018-EA](#)). The development will include three parking areas, one day-use area, a nine-hole disc golf course, and related infrastructure. This decision closed approximately 1,120 acres to shooting in accordance with 43 CFR 8365.2-5 as a developed recreation site.

NEVADA

Garnet Hill Recreation Area Management Plan (Ely District) 20 acres permanently closed. In November 2023, the Bristlecone Field Office issued a [Decision Record](#) authorizing the construction of

new recreational facilities and the enhancement of existing facilities at both the Garnet Hill and Egan Crest trailhead areas (NEPA Number: [DOI-BLM-NV-L060-2023-0003-EA](#)). This decision closed approximately 20 acres to shooting in accordance with 43 CFR 8365.2-5 as a developed recreation site.

UTAH

Coal Creek Campground (Color Country District) 55 acres permanently closed. In November 2024, the Cedar City Field Office issued a [Decision Record](#) authorizing the construction of the Coal Creek Campground (NEPA number: [DOI-BLM-UT-C010-2024-0036-EA](#)). This decision closed 55 acres to shooting in accordance with 43 CFR 8365.2-5 as a developed recreation site.

Beas Lewis Flat Campground (Color Country District) 134 acres permanently closed. In November 2024, the Richfield Field Office issued a [Decision Record](#) authorizing the construction of the Beas Lewis Flat Campground (NEPA Number: [DOI-BLM-UT-C020-2025-0025-EA](#)). This decision closed approximately 134 acres to shooting in accordance with 43 CFR 8365.2-5 as a developed recreation site.

Bears Ears National Monument Resource Management Plan (Canyon Country District) 8,043 acres permanently closed. In January 2025, the Monticello Field Office issued a [Record of Decision](#) for the approved Bears Ears National Monument Resource Management Plan, prohibiting recreational shooting in all campgrounds, developed recreation sites, rock writing sites, and structural cultural sites on 8,043 acres of the monument (NEPA Number: [DOI-BLM-UT-Y020-2022-0030-RMP-EIS](#)). Legal hunting would continue to be allowed.

Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument Resource Management Plan (Paria River District) 163,000 acres permanently closed. In January 2025, the Paria River District Office issued a [Record of Decision](#) for the approved Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument Resource Management Plan, prohibiting recreational shooting on approximately 163,000 acres (8.7 percent) of the monument (NEPA Number: [DOI-BLM-UT-P010-2022-0006-RMP-EIS](#)). The prohibition includes areas within 600 feet of archaeological and historic resources, front country areas, and within 600 feet of residences, campgrounds, developed recreation facilities, and four specific routes for public health and safety reasons. Legal hunting would continue to be allowed.

Hamburger Rock Campground Expansion (Canyon Country District) 8 acres permanently closed. In July 2025, the Monticello Field Office issued a [Decision Record](#) authorizing expansion of the Hamburger Rock Campground in Bears Ears National Monument (NEPA Number: [DOI-BLM-UT-Y020-2025-0012-EA](#)). This decision closed approximately 8 additional acres to shooting in accordance with 43 CFR 8365.2-5 as a developed recreation site.

Recapture Reservoir Boat Ramp and Parking (Canyon Country District) 1 acre permanently closed. In August 2025, the Monticello Field Office issued a [Decision Record](#) authorizing the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources to improve boat access at Recapture Reservoir by constructing a boat ramp, formalizing the parking lot, and adding facilities including vault toilet (NEPA Number: [DOI-BLM-UT-Y020-2025-0023-EA](#)). This decision closed approximately 1 acre to shooting in accordance with 43 CFR 8365.2-5 as a developed recreation site.
