Senate passed H.R. 6201, Families First Coronavirus Response Act.

Measures Passed:

Families First Coronavirus Response Act: By 90 yeas to 8 nays (Vote No. 76), Senate passed H.R. 6201, making emergency supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020, 60 Senators having voted in the affirmative, and after taking action on the following amendments proposed thereto:

Rejected:

By 3 yeas to 95 nays (Vote No. 73), Paul Amendment No. 1556, to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to require a social security number for purposes of the child tax credit, to provide the President the authority to transfer funds as necessary, and to terminate United States military operations and reconstruction activities in Afghanistan. (A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing that the amendment, having failed to achieve 60 affirmative votes, was not agreed to.)

By 47 yeas to 51 nays (Vote No. 74), Murray/Gillibrand Amendment No. 1559, to provide Americans with paid sick time and paid leave so that they can address their own health needs and the health needs of their families. (A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing that the amendment, having failed to achieve 60 affirmative votes, was not agreed to.)

By 50 yeas to 48 nays (Vote No. 75), Johnson Amendment No. 1558, to strike Federally mandated sick pay and paid family leave and replace it with financial support provided through State administered unemployment insurance systems and funds. (A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing

that the amendment, having failed to achieve 60 affirmative votes, was not agreed to.)
