## Senate

### Chamber Action

*Routine Proceedings, pages S5529–S5682*

**Measures Introduced:** Three bills were introduced, as follows: S. 2579–2581. **Page S5526**

**Invest In America Act—Agreement:** Senate continued consideration of H.R. 3684, to authorize funds for Federal-aid highways, highway safety programs, and transit programs, taking action on the following amendments proposed thereto:

#### Adopted:

By 90 yeas to 7 nays (Vote No. 291), Carper (for Padilla) Amendment No. 2133 (to Amendment No. 2137), to amend the Indian Health Care Improvement Act to expand the funding authority for renovating, constructing, and expanding certain facilities. (A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing that the amendment, having achieved 60 affirmatives votes, be agreed to.) **Pages S5553–56**

By 95 yeas to 1 nay (Vote No. 292), Carper (for Thune) Amendment No. 2162 (to Amendment No. 2137), to address the workforce needs of the telecommunications industry. (A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing that the amendment, having achieved 60 affirmatives votes, be agreed to.) **Pages S5553–56**

#### Rejected:

By 45 yeas to 48 nay (Vote No. 293), Carper (for Barrasso) Amendment No. 2180 (to Amendment No. 2137), to limit the use of certain funds made available for grants to enable the sustained cost-effective implementation of updated building energy codes. (A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing that the amendment, having failed to achieve 60 affirmative votes, was not agreed to.)

A unanimous-consent-time agreement was reached providing that Senate vote on or in relation to Schumer (for Lummis) Amendment No. 2181 (listed above), at 11:45 a.m., on Tuesday, August 3, 2021, with no amendments in order to the amendments prior to a vote on or in relation to the amendment, with 60-affirmative votes required for adoption, and two minutes of debate equally divided prior to the vote. **Page S5558**

A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing for further consideration of the bill at approximately 10:30 a.m., on Tuesday, August 3, 2021. **Page S5682**
