Committee on Armed Services: Committee ordered favorably reported 288 military nominations in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Space Force.

NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM

Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs: Committee concluded a hearing to examine reauthorization of the National Flood Insurance Program, focusing on local perspectives on challenges and solutions, including S. 2968, to reauthorize the National Flood Insurance Program, S. 3349, to prohibit the Federal Insurance Office of the Department of the Treasury and other financial regulators from collecting data directly from an insurance company, and S. 1380, to amend the Cooperative Forestry Assistance Act of 1978 to provide States and communities with additional assistance to plant and maintain trees, after receiving testimony from Mayor Steve Patterson, Athens, Ohio, on behalf of the National League of Cities; Michael Hecht, Greater New Orleans, Inc., New Orleans, Louisiana, on behalf of the Coalition for Sustainable Flood Insurance; and Daniel Kaniewski, Marsh McLennan, New York, New York.

Committee on Foreign Relations: Committee concluded a hearing to examine the nominations of Kamala Shirin Lakhdhir, of Connecticut, to be Ambassador

to the Republic of Indonesia, Courtney Diesel O'Donnell, of California, to be United States Permanent Representative to the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, with the rank of Ambassador, who was introduced by Senator Coons, and Laura Stone, of Utah, to be Ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands, all of the Department of State, and Andrew William Plitt, of Maryland, to be an Assistant Administrator of the United States Agency for International Development, after the nominees testified and answered questions in their own behalf.

Reports Filed: A report was filed on January 23, 2024 as follows: H.R. 7024, to make improvements to the child tax credit, to provide tax incentives to promote economic growth, to provide special rules for the taxation of certain residents of Taiwan with income from sources within the United States, to provide tax relief with respect to certain Federal disasters, to make improvements to the low-income housing tax credit, and for other purposes, with an amendment (H. Rept. 118–353 Pt. 1).

Reports were filed today as follows: H.R. 522, to amend title 38, United States Code, to authorize the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to provide or assist in providing a vehicle adapted for operation by disabled individuals to certain eligible persons, to pay expenses associated with the delivery of such vehicle, and for other purposes, with an amendment (H. Rept. 118–354);

H.R. 443, to direct the Secretary of Labor to train certain employees of Department of Labor how to effectively detect and assist law enforcement in preventing human trafficking during the course of their official duties, and for other purposes, with an amendment (H. Rept. 118–355);

H.R. 6678, to amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to provide that aliens who have been convicted of or who have committed Social Security fraud are inadmissible and deportable, with an amendment (H. Rept. 118–356);

H.R. 6976, to amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to provide that aliens who have been convicted of or who have committed an offense for driving while intoxicated or impaired are inadmissible and deportable, with an amendment (H. Rept. 118–357);

H.R. 6679, to amend the Immigration and Nationality Act with respect to aliens who carried out, participated in, planned, financed, supported, or otherwise facilitated the attacks against Israel, with an amendment (H. Rept. 118–358); and H.R. 5585, to impose criminal and immigration penalties for intentionally fleeing a pursuing Federal officer while operating a motor vehicle, with an amendment (H. Rept. 118–359).
