CELEBRATING JAMES T.  
SANDORO'S 80TH BIRTHDAY

**HON. TIMOTHY M. KENNEDY**

OF NEW YORK

IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

*Tuesday, September 3, 2024*

Mr. KENNEDY. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to celebrate James T. Sandoro on his 80th birthday. A respected historian, vehicle appraiser, and proud Buffalo booster, Mr. Sandoro has made an indelible impact on the Buffalo community.

Born on September 9, 1944, Mr. Sandoro is a lifelong Buffalonian. He attended St. Joseph's Grammar School and graduated from Bennett High School in 1962. He continued his education at the University at Buffalo, where he studied business education and graduated in 1971.

In 1962, Mr. Sandoro became the proprietor of Buffalo Motor Car, a licensed New York State Auto dealer. Mr. Sandoro collects, restores, and deals automobiles, motorcycles, and collector vehicles. He has appraised thousands of vehicles for community members, museums, and collectors from around the world, earning numerous national awards for his vehicle frames.

Further, in 1997, Mr. Sandoro and his wife, Mary Ann, founded their nonprofit organization The Buffalo Transportation Pierce-Arrow Museum. The museum opened in 2001 and is located on 263 Michigan Avenue in downtown Buffalo. Mr. and Mrs. Sandoro have donated their extensive vehicle collection, curated over five decades, to the museum. The Sandoro collection, which includes many automobiles that were once produced in Buffalo, is regarded as one of the most unique collections in the world.

The Pierce-Arrow Museum is also home to the 1927 Buffalo Filling Station, designed by Frank Lloyd Wright. The station, which was intended to be developed in Buffalo but never came to fruition, was built as an extension to the museum in 2024.

Throughout his career, Mr. Sandoro has been honored by numerous national publications for his work in car collecting. He has been named in USA Today and the New York Times, as well as car collector publications including Old Cars Weekly and Automobile Quarterly. Additionally, Mr. Sandoro has appeared on numerous radio, television, and cable shows, and has served as an auto historian consultant on major feature films, including "Once Upon a Time in America" with Robert De Niro. He is also a published author, with his book "Actual Cash Value-Value Guide to Older Cars" being used nationally by car enthusiasts, insurance companies, and many others.

In 2004, he helped JMU reach the FCS National Championship game, where they would defeat Montana 31–21. This victory became JMU's first NCAA Division I-AA championship.

From 2006 to 2012, Coach Newsome worked for Virginia Tech football as an offensive line coach under Hall of Fame coach Frank Beamer before returning to JMU.

In 2014, Coach Newsome became head football coach for his alma mater, Emory & Henry. In his first season, Coach Newsome was named Old Dominion Athletic Conference Coach of the Year as he compiled an 8–2 record for the Wasps that season.

Coach Newsome compiled six winning seasons during his Emory & Henry tenure as head coach and oversaw the team's transition from NCAA Division III to NCAA Division II.

His lifelong commitment to Virginia football and the players he coached is well documented, serving various coaching roles at the high school and collegiate levels.

I wish my fraternity brother in Beta Lambda Zeta, Coach Newsome, well in his retirement. I thank him and Southwest Virginia thanks him for his contributions to the game of football in our region.

In 2006, she began her time at the California State Senate, representing District 10 until 2014. Ellen continued to blaze trails in the Senate as only the second woman ever to serve as the California Senate majority leader for 4 years.

Under her tenure, Majority Leader Corbett authored over 160 bills that were signed into law tackling issues faced by everyday Californians. Those issues included infrastructure for public schools, expanding EV charging, child safety, marriage equality, and the California Homeowner Bill of Rights.

Continuing her career in public service, Ellen was elected to the East Bay Regional Parks District Board of Directors, representing Ward 4 until her passing. In this position, she was a fierce advocate for accessible open space. Serving as President of the Board, the Parks were in her capable hands during the first year of the pandemic.

Throughout her life and career, Ellen was a tireless advocate for the communities she rep-

resented. She was a fierce environmentalist and a serial breaker of glass ceilings. Ellen was a person of consequence with a genuinely meaningful public service career. Our communities will deeply miss her presence. We send our deepest condolences to her son Ryan, as well as her other surviving family, friends, and former staff who were lucky to have her as their boss and mentor.

As Deputy Commissioner of the Erie County Board of Elections and Vice Chair of the Erie County Democratic Committee, Champ supported democracy through his work, impressing upon others the power of a vote to express one's values and shape our future. A man of great faith and devotion, Champ was an active member of Elim Christian Fellowship under the leadership of Bishop T. Anthony Bronner.

Transcending his passion for the community was his love and devotion to his family. He leaves behind his father Arthur O. Mr. Speaker, today, I introduce the Pacific Defense Small Business Incentive Act of 2024, which would allow small businesses in the Pacific Insular Areas to become more active participants in the defense industrial base. Specifically, my legislation would authorize an incentive payment equal to five percent of a Department of Defense contract to prime contractors who subcontract to a small business concern in the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, or American Samoa.

Providing access to defense contracts is critical, especially as the United States continues to execute its Indo-Pacific strategy, promoting a free-and-open region and defending Pacific Island interests. Empowering our small businesses located at the forefront of the Indo-Pacific will not only streamline defense projects and initiatives but will also spur local economic growth in our U.S. Pacific Insular Areas.

My bill, the Pacific Defense Small Business Incentive Act, seeks to bridge the gap between Pacific-based entrepreneurs and prime contractors throughout the United States by incentivizing strategic partnerships. Continued defense buildup in areas like the Marianas further necessitates the need for local business participation. This bipartisan legislation provides an impetus for contracting like the Indian Incentive Program authorized by Congress in 1988, which has been considerably impactful for Native American and Native Hawaiian small business concerns.

The DOD Office of Small Business Programs under the Biden Administration has emphasized that America's small businesses are "essential to U.S. national security" and the "heartbeat of the U.S. economy". I could not agree more but add that Pacific small businesses are indeed America's small businesses.

The gentlelady from American Samoa, Ms. RADEWAGEN, is an original cosponsor of the bill. I urge all my colleagues to consider this crucial legislation and the elevation of Pacific small businesses in defense contracting.
