His dedication to serving his community and helping his patients led Mr. Robinson to quickly rise through the ranks to Emergency Medical Technician, officially becoming a certified paramedic in 2017.

Amid the national healthcare provider shortage brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic, Mr. Robinson stepped up to become a paramedic preceptor. In this role, he shared his years of experience and depth of knowledge with interns, supporting them in obtaining their paramedic licenses. In recognition of his outstanding service to our Solano County community, Mr. Robinson was bestowed the prestigious Stars of Life award by the American Ambulance Association in 2023.

Mr. Robinson is also a pivotal member of Medic Ambulance's emergency response team. A notable emergency in 2024 demonstrates Mr. Robinson's exceptional leadership while precepting an intern in the field. Dispatched with the intern to aid a citizen who had been shot in the chest, Mr. Robinson quickly assessed the patient had diminished lung sounds and was struggling to draw in oxygen. Mr. FITZPATRICK. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to recognize an exceptional constituent from my district, Mr. Sandy Oppenheimer. As a United States Navy World War II Veteran, a newspaper editor, a volunteer, and a marathon runner, Sandy has found ways to serve his country and his community. He continues to inspire all generations.

Eighty-two years ago, Sandy served bravely aboard the heavy cruiser USS *Salt Lake City* (CA-25) during some of the most famous battles in history like the Doolittle Raid, Battle of the Coral Seas, and the Battle of Midway. He was there when the flag was raised at Iwo Jima. Today, he is one of only three remaining survivors of one of the Navy's most storied ships.

Sandy was born September 1, 1925, in New York City. This year (2025), he will turn 100.

His father was a World War I Veteran, who died when Sandy was just 11, and left four young boys—at the height of the Depression—alone with their young mother. She went

to work, and the older boys watched the younger boys. All four boys went on to serve in our Armed Forces, in the Navy, the Army, the Air Force, and the Marines.

After WWII, Sandy attended New York University on the G.I. Bill, graduated with a degree in accounting, but went into journalism. He began a long career in journalism as the United Press International bureau chief in Guam. After a few more stops, he moved with his wife Mary and two young children, in 1954, to Levittown, and spent more than 50 years with the Bucks County Courier Times. He served as its editor for many of those years, writing the reader-favorite front page column, "Good Evening", which he signed with only his initials.

Sandy still remembers the day President Kennedy was assassinated, and sending people to find and stop the trucks that were just heading out with that day's edition, and pulling his team together to put out a new edition with the terrible news.

He also feels great pride when contacted by best-selling authors like Erik Larson, and Hall of Fame reporter Claire Smith, thanking him for giving them their first job.

He was an active volunteer and board member in many community organizations. Sandy was one of the earliest presidents of the Bucks County Free Library, and helped start it on its path to what it is today.

Sandy and Mary, who passed away five years ago, were charter members of the Bucks County Road Runners, and ran marathons throughout the country. Recently, Sandy was honored as the first recipient of the Newtown Library Company's Honorary Runner award at their annual 5K. He was surrounded by members of the news media who remembered working for him and members of the running community, happy to see him again.

Sandy still reads three newspapers every day from cover to cover. He appreciates the work of reporters getting a good story out to the readers and knows the importance of informing the community of the important issues we face every day.

We thank him for his service to our country and our community.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor Detective Michael Nakahara of the Lake County Sheriff's Office I have named Detective Nakahara as the California 4th District's Public Safety Hero of the Year for Lake County because of his extraordinary selflessness, dedication and service to others.

Born in Japan and raised in Hawaii by his parents, Scott and Susan Nakahara, Detective Nakahara graduated from the Hawai'i Preparatory Academy in 2014 before attending the San Joaquin Delta College P.O.S.T. Academy in 2021. He joined the Lake County Sheriff's Office later that year and, through his hard work, was assigned to the Major Crimes Unit in February 2024. In addition to his investigative duties, Detective Nakahara serves as an Explorer Advisor for the Lake County Sheriff's Office Explorer Post, mentoring young people interested in careers in law enforcement. His contributions to the department were recognized in December 2024 when he was awarded the Lake County Sheriff's Office Community Service Award and Sheriff's Citation.

Detective Nakahara demonstrated his skill while working on Lake County's first-ever fentanyl homicide case. Beginning in February 2024, he partnered with Sergeant Jeffrey Mora to investigate the tragic death of 17-year-old

Illeanna Frease, a Native American youth. Despite this being his first major case, as well as his first homicide case, Detective Nakahara tackled the investigation with tireless resolve. Over several months, he authored numerous reports and search warrants and conducted extensive interviews, allowing the evidence to guide him to the truth. His tenacity led to the arrest and charging of a suspect with second-degree murder who will face a jury trial this March. This case garnered widespread support from the Native American community at both the local and state levels and underscores the critical role Detective Nakahara plays in bringing justice to victims and their families.

Beyond his law enforcement duties, Detective Nakahara is an engaged member of our Lake County community. During the 2024 football season, he volunteered over 100 hours as an assistant coach for the Youth Varsity Kelseyville Chiefs in the Kelseyville Chiefs Youth Football League. His efforts helped instill values of teamwork, sportsmanship, and personal integrity in young athletes while strengthening the bond between the Sheriff's Office and the local community.

Mr. Speaker, Detective Michael Nakahara embodies the highest ideals of law enforcement—courage, dedication, and an unwavering pursuit of justice. Our citizens of Lake County and the Sheriff's Office can depend on him to protect and serve with honor and integrity. It is my privilege to recognize and commend Detective Nakahara for his outstanding contributions, and I ask my colleagues to join me in honoring him today.

### IN MEMORY OF JUDGE JOHN D. ALLEN

Mr. BISHOP. Mr. Speaker, it is with a heavy heart that I rise today to honor the memory of a loving husband, doting father and grandfather, dedicated public servant, and my friend of longstanding, Judge John D. Allen. Sadly, Judge Allen passed from labor to reward on February 16, 2025. A celebration of his life will be held on February 21, 2025 at St. Mary's Road United Methodist Church in Columbus, Georgia.

Judge Allen was born on January 17, 1943, to the union of Daniel and Beatrice Allen, in racially segregated Columbus, Georgia. It seemed like all the odds were against him of one day becoming a Superior Court Judge. Despite the lack of Black role models in the law as he was growing up, Judge Allen kept education as his main priority. He graduated from Tuskegee University in 1966 with a Bachelor's degree in Mechanical Engineering.

A distinguished cadet in the ROTC, Judge Allen was commissioned into the Air Force in 1966 as a 2nd Lieutenant Pilot. By the end of his Air Force career, Judge Allen had attained the rank of the Captain and flown over 280 combat missions across Southeast Asia wherein he took out enemy anti-aircraft positions and made the battlefields safer for an untold number of American troops and our allies. He then went on to serve in Tampa, Florida as an academic and flight instructor until

his discharge in July of 1973. He left the Air Force as a highly decorated pilot, earning 23 Air Medals, 2 Air Force Commendation Medals, and numerous other awards for his service during the Vietnam War.

In 1975, Judge Allen earned a Juris Doctor from the University of Florida, and he was admitted to the Georgia bar in 1976. From 1976 to 1987, he maintained a private law practice in the Columbus area. At that time, Judge Allen and I were two of only four black lawyers in town.

Judge Allen continued to break barriers when he began serving as a Columbus Recorder's Court Judge for one year before assuming a position on the State Court for Muscogee County in 1987. In 1993, he was appointed to the position of Chattahoochee Judicial Circuit Superior Court Judge. He was re-elected in every election since his appointment, until he retired from the bench in 2013.

Judge Allen's diligent judicial service has also been mirrored by his extensive involvement with the local and state communities. In conjunction with his professional accomplishments in the Air Force and on the bench, Judge Allen served on a number of boards and commissions, most notably as Chairman of the Judicial Qualifications Commission, and received many awards and accolades for his service. Judge Allen's contributions to the Columbus area and the state of Georgia even earned him recognition from the Columbus Ledger-Enquirer as one of "100 People to Remember for the Century." Additionally, on April 3, 2021, Judge Allen was inducted into the Georgia Military Veterans Hall Fame for his distinguished service in the Air Force, as well as his decades of contributions to the legal field as an attorney and jurist.

None of Judge Allen's momentous accomplishments would have been possible without the enduring love and support of his late wife Victoria; his former wife Maureen, children John Jr., Geoffrey, and Kevin; and grandchildren, John III and Carson.

A true Georgian devoted to serving his great state, Judge Allen embodied Georgia's state motto, "Wisdom, Justice and Moderation." Judge Allen was a man of great integrity who set a high standard of values that made for a strong foundation of character in himself and in others. He was indeed a trailblazer, and he used his extensive knowledge and experiences to mentor other professionals he met along the way.

On a personal note, I am grateful to have known Judge Allen and counted him as a dear friend. His wise counsel and sage advice have contributed immensely to my success and have been a guiding light for me as I serve in Congress. For that I will always be grateful.

Mr. Speaker, I ask my colleagues to join me, my wife Vivian, and the more than 765,000 people of Georgia's Second Congressional District in honoring the life and legacy of Judge John D. Allen and in extending our deepest sympathies to his family, friends, colleagues, and all those who mourn his loss. We pray that all will be consoled by an abiding faith and the Holy Spirit in the days, weeks, and months ahead.

Mr. SOTO. Mr. Speaker, Ben Larry is the director of human resources for SkyWater Technology in Florida. Ben has been a human resources professional for 34 years. Born and raised in Jackson, Mississippi, Ben earned a Master of Health Services Administration from the University of Kansas. Ben also earned a Bachelor of Arts in economics from Tougaloo College. Ben is a Veteran of the United States Navy.

In addition to his role in human resources, Mr. Larry is recognized as a dedicated advocate for workforce development and community relations/involvement in Osceola County,

especially for underserved students and communities. He has given several SkyWater career opportunity presentations to the faculty, staff, students, and parents at a STEM elementary school, a STEM middle school, a STEM high school, and other middle and high schools across Kissimmee to get kids interested and excited about careers as engineers and technicians in the semiconductor manufacturing industry.

In 2022, Ben partnered with NeoCity Academy to create an internship program for NeoCity Academy students. The idea is to give students exposure to working at SkyWater and in the semiconductor industry as engineers. SkyWater continues to hire three to four NeoCity Academy students each summer to work on meaningful and impactful projects.

Beginning in 2021, Mr. Larry and other SkyWater leaders partnered with Valencia College to help enhance Valencia's mechatronics and robotics curriculum and helped them create their Associate of Arts program in semiconductor engineering. Tragically, the suspect fired upon Canine Officer Murph and struck him in his left paw, causing a serious injury that ultimately resulted in the amputation of his leg. Despite his injury, Canine Officer Murph was able to successfully detain the suspect and prevent further harm to the public. During this incident, Canine Officer Murph displayed exemplary bravery and demonstrated the importance of his specialized training. Canine Officer Murph is currently recovering at home under the care of his partner Officer Hudson. On the day of his return home, K-9 teams across the region lined the streets to honor his service.

Mr. THOMPSON of California. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor Sergeant Erik Olson of the Napa County Sheriff's Office. I have named Sergeant Olson as the California 4th District's Public Safety Hero of the Year for

Napa County as a result of his extraordinary selflessness, dedication and service to others.

Born in Hayward, California, Sergeant Olson moved to Napa in 1980. He is a graduate of Vintage High School and holds a Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice Administration from Sonoma State University. Sergeant Olson attended the Napa Valley College Police Academy, graduating as class president in 2005.

In December of 2005 Sergeant Olson began his career with the Napa County Sheriff's Office. During his nineteen years of service, Sergeant Olson has held a multitude of positions, including Marine Patrol Deputy, K-9 Handler, Field Training Officer, Search and Rescue Team Liaison, Community Emergency Response Team Liaison, Napa Sheriff's Mounted Posse Liaison, EVOC/PIT Instructor, and Mobile Field Force Team Leader. Sergeant Olson was promoted to the rank of Sergeant in 2021, retiring his K-9 partner of seven years, Chase. Sergeant Olson currently serves as the Marine Patrol and Off Highway Vehicle Unit Supervisor in Lake Berryessa.

On June 8, 2024, the Napa Central Dispatch received 9-1-1 calls regarding a shooting and fight between ten individuals in the Oak Shores Day Use Area of Lake Berryessa. Sergeant Olson responded to this call, learning as he arrived on the scene there were multiple victims with stab wounds and a gunshot victim. Sergeant Olson then attempted to locate the gunshot victim, breaking up a fight and assisting an unconscious victim in the midst of his search. After locating the shooting victim, Sergeant Olson immediately administered life-saving measures. Tragically, the victim passed from their injuries.

As the only officer on the scene for seven minutes, Sergeant Olson's presence was essential in bringing calm to the situation. He performed essential aid to victims and provided Napa Central Dispatch with critical information to relay to other responding units. Sergeant Olson's quick response allowed the shooting suspect to be apprehended and for safety to be restored to the area.

Sergeant Olson's actions during this incident show selfless dedication and service at the highest levels to our community and the Law Enforcement profession.

Outside of his law enforcement service, Sergeant Olson is also involved in his community, serving at The Father's House "We Love Our City" Ministry, which works in partnership with the Napa Valley Food Bank. Beyond his community service, Sergeant Olson loves to spend time with his wife, Sara, and their two daughters, Kadance and Kirra. He is an avid golfer and enjoys spending time outdoors, both hobbies he enjoys with his family.

Mr. Speaker, Sergeant Olson's actions on June 8, 2024, as well as his nineteen years of work with the Napa County Sheriff's Office, exemplify the ideals of public service. His courage, dedication, and quick-thinking are truly admirable, and we honor him today.

REMEMBERING DR. HAROLD  
JORDAN

Mr. COHEN. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to pay tribute to Dr. Harold Jordan, a pioneering

medical doctor and psychiatrist in my state of Tennessee who passed in December at the age of 87. Dr. Jordan became the first Black resident physician at Vanderbilt University Medical Center in 1964 and Tennessee's first Black Commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. My father, Dr. Morris Cohen, was the Superintendent of the Western State Psychiatric Hospital (now the Western Mental Health Institute) in Bolivar, Tennessee, in the mid-1970s, and worked with Dr. Jordan. After ensuring that every mental health facility in the state was accredited, Tennessee named a building in his honor: the Harold W. Jordan Habilitation Center in Nashville in 1979. Dr. Jordan also served for 18 years as the Chairman of the Psychiatry Department at Meharry Medical College, from which he graduated in 1962. He also served as its acting dean. He won the college's President's Award and its Humanism in Clinical Medicine Award. Vanderbilt established the Harold Jordan Lecture celebrating Diversity, Inclusion and Social Justice in his honor. Born in 1937 in Newnan, Georgia, he knew by the age of seven that he would follow in the footsteps of both his father and grandfather into medicine. He graduated from Morehouse College with a degree in biology in 1958. After medical school, he married a nursing student named Geraldine, who survives him after 62 years of marriage. Family lore says they met while hiding after a bomb threat as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was preparing to speak at nearby Fisk College. Dr. Jordan and his wife raised four children in Nashville and belonged to the Clark Memorial United Methodist Church where he sang in the choir. He served as an officer in both the Tennessee National Guard and the U.S. Army Reserve. Dr. Jordan and his wife retired to Los Angeles to be nearer to their children. I extend my condolences to Dr. Jordan's family, friends and many admirers. He made a profound difference in our state and his compassion, patient care and mentoring of future doctors will be long remembered.
