The rule further provides that provisions of section 1017 of the Impoundment Control Act of 1974 shall not apply to a bill or joint resolution introduced with respect to the special message transmitted under section 1012 of that Act on June 3, 2025. Finally, the rule provides that House Resolution 492 is hereby adopted. Testimony was heard from Representatives Aderholt, DeLauro and Johnson of Texas.
