to support the deployment of nuclear energy projects; Gonzalez (TX) (No. 5) that increases and decreases the Army Corps of Engineers’ Civil Department of the Army, Construction account by \$40 million to direct the Secretary to fund water and wastewater infrastructure projects in South Texas; Gonzalez (TX) (No. 6) that increases and decreases the Army Corps of Engineers’ Civil Department of the Army, Construction account by \$27 million to stress the importance of reimbursing the Port of Brownsville for the advanced funding they contributed to Segment B of the Brazos Island Harbor (BIH) Channel Improvement Project; Hernandez (No. 9) that increases and decreases funding by \$75 million for the Department of Energy’s Office of Electricity to support research and development, improve electricity delivery, enhance grid resiliency, and expand access to a secure and reliable power supply in Puerto Rico; Hernandez (No. 10) that increases and decreases funding by \$35 million for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to support drinking water system improvements, water infrastructure upgrades, and the repair, modernization, and construction of projects aimed at addressing Puerto Rico’s aging water infrastructure; Higgins (LA) (No. 11) that increases and decreases \$50 million from U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Operation and Maintenance to support spot dredging the Vermilion River; Hill (No. 12) that increases and decreases funds in the OM Corp Account; Houchin (No. 13) that increases and decreases funding at the Department of Energy to streamline and update policies to ensure they better reflect the challenges facing state energy offices nationwide; Kiggans (VA) (No. 14) that increases and decreases Department of Energy, Nuclear Energy Programs funding by \$1,000,000 for the purpose of supporting the research, development, and demonstration of advanced small and micro nuclear reactors to enhance grid resilience and energy security, including potential applications for critical infrastructure and remote or austere environments; Kiggans (VA) (No. 15) that increases and decreases Army Corps of Engineers Flood Control and Coastal Emergencies program funding for the purpose of supporting flood and storm damage reduction efforts in coastal regions; Kiggans (VA) (No. 16) that increases and decreases Corps of Engineers, Operation and Maintenance funding by \$1,000,000 for the purpose of supporting dredging and navigation maintenance to ensure safe and reliable access to harbors that are critical for Navy and sealift operations; Kiggans (VA) (No. 17) that increases and decreases Department of Energy, Energy Programs Grid Deployment funding by \$1,000,000 for the purpose of strengthening grid resilience and reliability to protect critical infrastructure, including military and
