Res. 77, terminating the national emergency declared to impose duties on articles imported from Canada, and S.J. Res. 81, terminating the national emergency declared to impose duties on articles imported from Brazil, individually, and when discharged, Senate proceed to its consideration; and that there be up to six hours for debate on each joint resolution, with the time equally divided between the Leaders, or their designees; and that following the use or yielding back of that time, Senate vote on passage of the resolution. **Page S6992**
