### Chamber Action

#### Routine Proceedings, pages S7705–S7741

Measures Introduced: Twenty-two bills and four resolutions were introduced, as follows: S. 3034–3055, and S. Res. 463–466. **Pages S7729–30**

#### Measures Passed:

**Wetlands Conservation and Access Improvement Act:** Committee on Environment and Public Works was discharged from further consideration of H.R. 2316, to amend the Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Act to provide that interest on obligations held in the Federal aid to wildlife restoration fund shall become available for apportionment at the beginning of fiscal year 2033, and the bill was then passed. **Page S7734**

**Foreign Adversary Communications Transparency Act:** Senate passed S. 259, to direct the Federal Communications Commission to publish a list of entities that hold authorizations, licenses, or other grants of authority issued by the Commission and that have certain foreign ownership. **Page S7734**

**Strengthening Support for American Manufacturing Act:** Senate passed S. 99, to require the Secretary of Commerce to produce a report that provides recommendations to improve the effectiveness, efficiency, and impact of Department of Commerce programs related to supply chain resilience and manufacturing and industrial innovation. **Pages S7734–35**

**National Cholesterol Education Month:** Senate agreed to S. Res. 464, designating September 2025 as “National Cholesterol Education Month” and September 30, 2025, as “LDL-C Awareness Day”. **Page S7735**

**National Childhood Cancer Awareness Month:** Senate agreed to S. Res. 465, designating September 2025 as “National Childhood Cancer Awareness Month”. **Page S7735**

#### Measures Considered:

**Continuing Appropriations and Extensions Act:** Senate continued consideration of the motion to proceed to consideration of H.R. 5371, making con-

tinuing appropriations and extensions for fiscal year 2026. **Pages S7705–20**

**Shutdown Fairness Act:** By 54 yeas to 45 nays (Vote No. 585), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to close further debate on the motion to proceed to consideration of the S. 3012, to appropriate funds for pay and allowances of excepted Federal employees for periods of work performed during a lapse in appropriations.
