Measures Introduced: Nine bills and five resolutions were introduced, as follows: S. 3060–3068, S.J. Res. 91–93, and S. Res. 470–471. **Page S7785**

S. 673, to amend the Miccosukee Reserved Area Act to authorize the expansion of the Miccosukee Reserved Area and to carry out activities to protect structures within the Osceola Camp from flooding. (S. Rept. No. 119–90). **Page S7783**

Brazil Tariffs: By 52 yeas to 48 nays (Vote No. 594), Senate passed S.J. Res. 81, terminating the national emergency declared to impose duties on articles imported from Brazil, after Committee on Finance was discharged from further consideration. **Pages S7766–79**

Bat Week: Committee on Environment and Public Works was discharged from further consideration of S. Res. 454, expressing support for the designation of the week of October 24, 2025, to October 31, 2025, as “Bat Week”, and the resolution was then agreed to. **Page S7787**

Res. 471, calling on Congress, schools, and State and local educational agencies to recognize the significant educational implications of dyslexia that must be addressed, and designating October 2025 as “National Dyslexia Awareness Month”. **Pages S7787–88**

Res. 80, providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Bureau of Land Management relating to “National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska Integrated Activity Plan Record of Decision”, Senate vote on the motion at 11:30 a.m.; and if agreed to, all time be deemed expired and Senate vote on passage no earlier than Thursday, October 30, 2025, and following the vote on the motion to proceed to S.J. Res. 80, Senate execute the order of October 28, 2025, in relation to the nomination of Edmund G. LaCour, Jr., of Alabama, to be United States District Judge for the Northern District of Alabama; and that if Senator Kennedy makes a motion to proceed to S.J.
