S. 240, to amend the Crow Tribe Water Rights Settlement Act of 2010 to make improvements to that Act. (S. Rept. No. 119–93)

S. 546, to amend the Omnibus Public Land Management Act of 2009 to make a technical correction to the water rights settlement for the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes of the Duck Valley Reservation. (S. Rept. No. 119–94)

S. 640, to amend the Omnibus Public Land Management Act of 2009 to make a technical correction to the Navajo Nation Water Resources Development Trust Fund, to amend the Claims Resolution Act of 2010 to make technical corrections to the Taos Pueblo Water Development Fund and Aamodt Settlement Pueblos' Fund. (S. Rept. No. 119–95)

H.R. 4550, to reauthorize the United States Grain Standards Act, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute. Page S7902

Measures Passed:

Critical Infrastructure Manufacturing Feasibility Act: Senate passed S. 1872, to direct the Secretary of Commerce to conduct a study on the feasibility of manufacturing in the United States products for critical infrastructure sectors, after agreeing to the committee amendment in the nature of a substitute. Page S7904

NET Act: Senate passed S. 503, to direct the Federal Communications Commission to evaluate and consider the impact of the telecommunications network equipment supply chain on the deployment of universal service. Pages S7904–05

34th Anniversary of North Macedonia Independence: Committee on Foreign Relations was discharged from further consideration of S. Res. 399, congratulating the people of North Macedonia on the 34th anniversary of their independence and celebrating the 30th anniversary of diplomatic relations

between North Macedonia and the United States, and the resolution was then agreed to. Page S7905

C5+1 Diplomatic Platform: Committee on Foreign Relations was discharged from further consideration of S. Res. 459, honoring the strategic importance of the C5+1 diplomatic platform and recognizing the deepening partnership between the United States and the nations of Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, and Uzbekistan, and the resolution was then agreed to.

Continuing Appropriations and Extensions Act: Senate resumed consideration of the motion to proceed to consideration of H.R. 5371, making continuing appropriations and extensions for fiscal year 2026. Pages S7877–82

By 54 yeas to 44 nays (Vote No. 603), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to close further debate on the motion to proceed to consideration of the bill. Page S7881

H.R. 2478, to amend the Investment Company Act of 1940 to postpone the date of payment or satisfaction upon redemption of certain securities in the case of the financial exploitation of specified adults, and for other purposes, with an amendment (Rept. 119-361);

H.R. 3234, to amend the Federal Deposit Insurance Act to modify the amount of reciprocal deposits of an insured depository institution that are not considered to be funds obtained by or through a deposit broker, and for other purposes, with an amendment (Rept. 119-362);

H.R. 3484, to terminate unused authorities of the Securities and Exchange Commission that were established pursuant to the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act, with an amendment (Rept. 119-363);

H.R. 3682, to amend the Financial Stability Act of 2010 to require the Financial Stability Oversight Council to consider alternative approaches before de-

termining that a U.S. nonbank financial company shall be supervised by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, and for other purposes, with an amendment (Rept. 119-364);

H.R. 5262, to amend the Federal Deposit Insurance Act, the Bank Holding Company Act of 1956, and the Home Owners' Loan Act to require the consideration of certain entities and factors when evaluating proposed acquisitions, mergers, consolidations, assumptions of liabilities, or transfers of assets, and for other purposes, with an amendment (Rept. 119-365);

H.R. 5270, to require the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System to issue rules to establish certain methodologies and scenarios used in stress testing, and for other purposes, with an amendment (Rept. 119-366);

H.R. 5276, to amend the Economic Growth, Regulatory Relief, and Consumer Protection Act to adjust the Community Bank Leverage Ratio, and for other purposes, with an amendment (Rept. 119-367);

H.R. 5291, to amend the Bank Holding Company Act of 1956 to generally permit holding merchant banking investments of up to 15 years, with an amendment (Rept. 119-368);

H.R. 5317, to amend the Federal Deposit Insurance Act to ensure that certain custodial deposits of

well capitalized insured depository institutions are not considered to be funds obtained by or through deposit brokers, and for other purposes, with an amendment (Rept. 119–369); and

H.R. 5344, to amend the Kleptocracy Asset Recovery Rewards Act to extend the Kleptocracy Asset Recovery Rewards Pilot Program, and for other purposes, with an amendment (Rept. 119–370).
