HONORING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF SUE BAUER

Ms. CHU. Mr. Speaker, I rise to honor the life and legacy of Sue Bauer, who tragically passed away on March 22, 2026.

Ms. Bauer dedicated her life to public service. Her legacy will live on in the hearts of all whose lives she's changed and in the generations of leaders she fostered over her decades of work in Glendora and across the San Gabriel Valley.

In 1994, Ms. Bauer became Mayor Pro Tem of the City of Glendora. Three years later, she became the second female mayor since the city's founding in 1887, serving her city with compassion and integrity.

As mayor, Ms. Bauer responded to the growing need for additional recreation programs for youth by establishing the Mayor's Youth Task Force. She researched gaps in existing services, created a master plan for Glendora's families and youth, and secured voter approval for \$ 1.4 million in funding to build the Timothy Crowther Teen & Family Center at Dawson Park, a site that has continued to grow over the years.

Ms. Bauer played an essential role in strengthening Glendora's finances and overseeing the development of the Glendora Marketplace, now home to several businesses and retailers. Because of Ms. Bauer, the Marketplace has become a cornerstone of the Glendora community, generating millions of dollars annually for the city.

Ms. Bauer also served on many boards and commissions, continuing her involvement by serving as Chairperson of the Glendora Planning Commission, Glendora Delegate to the San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments, and Regional Council Member for District 33 of the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG). Her leadership demonstrated a lifetime dedicated to public service and her deep love of Glendora.

A champion of women's rights, Ms. Bauer served as president of the Glendora League of Women Voters and was a longtime member of the Glendora Women's Club, where she also served as president. As a member of the Glendora Historical Society and the Friends of the Library, Ms. Bauer recognized the importance of learning and the arts to her community.

Ms. Bauer was born in Alaska and moved along the West Coast throughout her childhood because of her father's career with the Federal Aviation Agency (FAA). She moved to Glendora in the late 1950s and graduated in 1961 from the newly built Glendora High School, becoming part of its first class to attend all four years. She later attended and graduated from Citrus College and the University of Southern California (USC).

Sue Bauer's resilience, humility, and unwavering commitment to public service inspired

everyone who had the privilege of knowing her. I ask my colleagues to join me in commemorating her life and recognizing her incredible legacy.

REMEMBERING SARAH MILGRIM AND YARON LISCHINSKY

Ms. DAVIDS of Kansas. Mr. Speaker, I rise today in somber recognition that May 21, 2026, will mark one year since the tragic and senseless killing of Sarah Milgrim and Yaron Lischinsky outside of the Capital Jewish Museum in Washington, D.C.

Sarah grew up in Prairie Village, Kansas, a community where I have the honor of serving in Congress. She graduated from Shawnee Mission East High School and the University of Kansas. She was a devoted member of Congregation B'nai Jehudah and was dedicated to fostering understanding and connection not only between Israel and the United States, but between Israel and the Palestinian people. Her partner, Yaron, shared that commitment.

In the aftermath of the October 7, 2023, Hamas terrorist attack, Sarah advocated for the release of Israeli hostages and worked closely with survivors who had experienced gender and sexual based violence. Those who knew Sarah say that her gentle, calm, and compassionate disposition made her the perfect fit for such a difficult role.

Yaron, an employee with the Embassy of Israel, worked to forge stronger ties between Israel and its neighbors in the Middle East. Yaron's loved ones say that he always had a smile on his face and a welcoming presence.

We must continue Sarah and Yaron's legacy of peacebuilding and stand strong against increasing threats of antisemitism—recommitting ourselves to a world where no one fears for their safety just because of who they are. Antisemitism has no place in our communities, and we all must all stand up against the hatred and bigotry that threaten to divide us.

INTRODUCTION OF THE FEDERAL EMPLOYEE SHORT-TERM DIS- ABILITY INSURANCE ACT OF 2026

Ms. NORTON. Mr. Speaker, today, I introduce the Federal Employee Short-Term Disability Insurance Act of 2026, which would make short-term disability insurance available to federal employees. Employees would be responsible for 100 percent of the premiums and would receive benefits for up to one year. In-

surance companies would be prohibited from excluding federal employees, or charging them higher premiums, based on preexisting conditions. Many private-sector employers make available disability insurance to their employees.

I began examining how we could provide federal employees with short-term disability insurance at group rates and with guaranteed coverage after learning that many of them buy such insurance in the individual market, which can have high premiums and exclude those with preexisting conditions. Although federal employees have good health insurance, health insurance benefits do not replace lost income. Moreover, while federal employees may have available sick or annual leave, they may not have enough such leave to pay the bills if they cannot work for an extended period, such as following surgery. Although the federal government provides disability benefits to federal employees who become permanently disabled, federal employees do not qualify for these benefits until they have worked for the federal government for at least 18 months. The Office of Personnel Management would contract with insurance companies to provide short-term disability insurance.

According to the Social Security Administration, a 20-year-old worker has a one-in-four chance of becoming disabled by retirement age. The majority of disabilities are not caused by major accidents, but by injuries or illnesses, according to the Council for Disability Awareness.

I urge my colleagues to support this bill.

He helped organize the Freedom Party in Benavides, Texas, and led the creation of a vocational school for veteran focused on mechanics. Later, he settled in Corpus Christi, where he owned and operated Mendez Automatic Transmission for 47 years.

Alongside his professional and civic accomplishments, he built a loving family, sharing 62 years of marriage with his wife.

HONORING BASEBALL HALL OF FAMER RAY BROWN

Mr. JORDAN. Mr. Speaker, I rise to honor and to commend to the House the legacy of Ohio native Ray Brown, legend of Negro League baseball and member of the Baseball Hall of Fame.

Raymond Leslie Brown was born in Alger in 1908. In 1926, he graduated from Alger High School, where he played shortstop on the baseball team—which went undefeated in his senior year. He attended Wilberforce University before leaving to pursue a career in baseball.

After brief stints with teams in Dayton, Indianapolis, and Detroit, Brown signed with the Homestead Grays in 1932. He quickly established a reputation as one of the game's most effective pitchers, leading the league in wins eight times. Over one stretch in the 1936 and 1937 seasons, he won 28 straight games.

His success on the mound contributed richly to the dominance of the Grays, who won two World Series and eight total pennants in a nine-year period during his time with the team. Brown threw a one-hit shutout in the 1944 Negro World Series and pitched a seven-inning perfect game the next year.

Ray Brown died in Dayton in 1965. While his stellar baseball exploits were not widely acknowledged during his lifetime, Coopers-town rectified this oversight in 2006, inducting him posthumously into the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

On Thursday, May 14, 2026, the Village of Alger and the team at Hardin County Historical Museums will host a ceremony where the recently refurbished local park will be named after Ray Brown. Highlights of the ceremony will include the unveiling of an Ohio Historical Marker and a two-panel mural featuring scenes from his time in baseball.

Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the people of Ohio's 4th Congressional District, I join in the tributes to the late Ray Brown and his storied baseball career. I thank the leadership of the Village of Alger and Hardin County Historical Museums for their efforts to celebrate this local legend.

Beyond childhood intervention programs, Foothill Family specializes in mental health care at the community level. The holistic services are targeted toward members of our community of every age, assisting children, teens, and adults navigate their unique circumstances and complex challenges. For a century, Foothill Family has worked to ensure that every member of our community has the safety, stability, and opportunities for long-term success that they deserve.

When the Eaton Fire devastated our community in January 2025, Foothill Family responded immediately with crisis therapy, emotional support, and essential resources. While immediate relief is critical in the aftermath of a disaster, healing continues long afterward. That's why their creation of the Eaton Bloom program has been essential to support families as they navigate the ongoing emotional impact of the Eaton Fire.
