REVISED SUBALLOCATION OF BUDGET ALLOCATIONS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2019

The Committee on Appropriations submits the following report on the revised suballocation of budget allocations for fiscal year 2019. The 302(b) suballocations and resulting total 302(a) meet the levels prescribed by the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018.

Pursuant to section 30104 of the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018, the House Budget Committee submitted an allocation for fiscal year 2019 for the Committee on Appropriations. The funding levels submitted in this Committee report meet the levels stipulated for the Committee on Appropriations by the Budget Committee in its submission printed in the Congressional Record of May 10, 2018. Further, submission of this report meets the requirement of section 302(b) of the Congressional Budget and Impoundment Control Act of 1974 and resulting requirement under the Rules of the House. At this time, the Committee has completed its work on reporting out all twelve appropriations bills for fiscal year 2019, and supports final consideration of all bills in the House.

DISSENTING VIEWS

Democrats opposed the revised allocations, which directed an additional \$32 million to the Homeland Security bill. Even before this revision, the Homeland Security allocation was more than enough to adequately fund programs that address actual security threats.

While scoring changes from other bills may have yielded additional funds for the last bill the committee considered, Democrats would have preferred to find a way to restore funding to important programs such as job training in the Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education bill or basic education in the State and Foreign Operations bill.

Funding levels are a direct reflection of our priorities. Investing in healthcare and education of the most vulnerable pays dividends for future generations. Building walls sets the world on a path of distrust.

Overall, the allocations from House Republicans shortchange the American people, waste taxpayer dollars on the President's disgraceful immigration policies, and fail to invest in economic growth and job creation. We can and must do better.
