SPECIAL REPORT ON COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

SUMMARY

The Committee on Energy and Natural Resources conducted an extensive oversight and legislative program during the 115th Congress. A total of 511 bills and resolutions, 40 nominations, 184 executive communications, and 55 petitions and memorials were referred to the Committee for consideration.

The Committee and its four subcommittees held a total of 86 public hearings, including four field hearings, during the 115th Congress. These hearings included 48 oversight hearings, 17 legislative hearings, two joint legislative and oversight hearings, and 15 nomination hearings. The Committee also held 15 business meetings.

Action was completed on a broad range of oversight, legislative, and executive matters. A total of 158 bills and one funding resolution were reported by the Committee.

Of the 159 bills and resolutions reported by the Committee, 50 were signed into law. In addition, approximately 19 other measures considered by the Committee were enacted into law as part of measures not otherwise under the Committee's jurisdiction.

A total of 40 nominations of 36 individuals submitted by President Trump were referred to the Committee during the 115th Congress. Of the 40 nominations, 40 were reported by the Committee, of which 27 were confirmed by the Senate.

The Committee filed 158 reports on measures it ordered reported, and published 75 hearing records.

MEMBERSHIP

The Senate appointed majority and minority members of the Committee for the 115th Congress with the adoption of S. Res. 369 (majority) and S. Res. 370 (minority) on January 9, 2018. S. Res. 369 appointed Senator Murkowski as Chairman and S. Res. 370 appointed Senator Cantwell as Ranking Member. The Senate reconstituted the membership of the Committee with the adoption of S. Res. 57 on February 9, 2017 to appoint Senator Strange to the vacancy left by Senator Sessions. The Senate also adopted S. Res. 370 on January 9, 2018 to appoint Senator Smith to the Committee to fill the vacancy left by Senator Franken.

JURISDICTION

Rule XXV(1)(g)(1) of the Standing Rules of the Senate provides the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources with jurisdiction over all proposed legislation, messages, petitions, memorials, and other matters relating to the following subjects: matters relating to the following subjects:

1. Coal production, distribution, and utilization.
2. Energy policy.
3. Energy regulation and conservation.
4. Energy related aspects of deepwater ports.
5. Energy research and development.
6. Extraction of minerals from oceans and Outer Continental Shelf lands.
7. Hydroelectric power, irrigation, and reclamation.
8. Mining education and research.
9. Mining, mineral lands, mining claims, and mineral conservation.
10. National parks, recreation areas, wilderness areas, wild and scenic rivers, historical sites, military parks and battlefields, and on the public domain, preservation of prehistoric ruins and objects of interest.
11. Naval petroleum reserves in Alaska.
12. Nonmilitary development of nuclear energy.
13. Oil and gas production and distribution.
14. Public lands and forests, including farming and grazing thereon, and mineral extraction therefrom.
15. Solar energy systems.
16. Territorial possessions of the United States, including trusteeships.

FULL COMMITTEE

JURISDICTION

During the 115th Congress, the Full Committee retained jurisdiction, without reference to a subcommittee, over the following matters: National Energy Policy, including international energy affairs and emergency preparedness; nuclear waste policy; privatization of federal assets; territorial policy (including changes in status and issues affecting Antarctica); Native Hawaiian matters; and ad hoc issues. In addition, other issues are retained in the Full Committee on an ad hoc basis. Generally, these are issues which (1) require expeditious handling, or (2) substantially overlap two or more subcommittee jurisdictions, or (3) are of exceptional national significance in which all Members wished to participate fully.

NOMINATIONS

Forty presidential nominations of 36 individuals (including first and second nominations of the same individual) were referred to the Committee during the 115th Congress.

Of the 23 nominations submitted during the first session, 18 were confirmed, one remained in status quo at the end of the first session by unanimous consent, notwithstanding the provisions of rule XXXI, paragraph six, of the Standing Rules of the Senate, and four were returned to the President at the end of the first session pursuant to rule XXXI, paragraph six of the Standing Rules of the Senate.

Of the 17 nominations submitted during the second session (including the nomination that remained in status quo between the first and second session and the four nominations resubmitted after the original nominations were returned at the end of the first session) eight were confirmed (including one of the resubmitted nominations) two were withdrawn by the President (both of which had been resubmitted after the original nominations were returned at the end of the first session), and seven of the nominations were returned to the President at the end of the second session (including one that had been resubmitted after having been returned at the end of the first session) under the provisions of rule XXXI, paragraph 6, of the Standing Rules of the Senate.

MEASURES ENACTED INTO LAW

Public Law 115–5 (H.J. Res. 38), a joint resolution disapproving the rule submitted by the Department of the Interior known as the Stream Protection Rule. H.J. Res. 38 passed the House by a roll call vote of 228–194 on February 1, 2017. The Senate passed H.J. Res. 38 by a roll call vote of 54–45 on February 2, 2017. The President approved the measure on February 16, 2017.

Public Law 115–12 (H.J. Res. 44), a joint resolution disapproving the rule submitted by the Department of the Interior relating to Bureau of Land Management regulations that establish the procedures used to prepare, revise, or amend land use plans pursuant to the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976. H.J. Res. 44 passed the House by a roll call vote of 234–186 on February 7, 2017. The Senate passed H.J. Res. 44 by a roll call vote of 51–48 on March 7, 2017. The President approved the measure on March 27, 2017.

Public Law 115–18 (S.J. Res. 1), a joint resolution approving the location of a memorial to commemorate and honor the members of the Armed Forces who served on active duty in support of Operation Desert Storm or Operation Desert Shield. The Committee discharged the resolution by unanimous consent on March 8, 2017, without written report. The measure passed the Senate without amendment and with a preamble by Unanimous Consent on March 8, 2017 and the President approved the measure on March 31, 2017.

Public Law 115–20 (H.J. Res. 69), a joint resolution disapproving of the rule submitted by the Department of the Interior under Chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, relating “Non-Subsistence Take of Wildlife, and Public Participation and Closure Procedures, on National Wildlife Refuges in Alaska.” H.J. Res. 69 passed the House by a roll call vote of 225–193 on February 16, 2017. The Senate passed H.J. Res. 69 by a roll call vote of 52–47 on March 21, 2017. The President approved the measure on April 3, 2017.

Public Law 115–51 (H.R. 873), the Global War on Terrorism War Memorial Act, an act to authorize the Global War on Terror Memorial Foundation to establish the National Global War on Terrorism Memorial as a commemorative work in the District of Columbia. An identical measure, S. 926 was considered before the Subcommittee on National Parks at a legislative hearing on July 19, 2017. S. Hrg. 115–417. H.R. 873 passed the House on July 28, 2017 by voice vote and the Senate passed the act without an amendment by unanimous consent on August 4, 2017. The President approved the measure on August 18, 2017.

Public Law 115–53 (H.R. 339), to amend Public Law 94–241 with respect to the Northern Mariana Islands. The Committee discharged the measure by unanimous consent on August 1, 2017. The Senate passed H.R. 339 with an amendment by unanimous consent

on August 1, 2017. On August 11, 2017, the House agreed to the Senate amendment, and the President approved the measure on August 22, 2017.

Public Law 115–78 (S. 190), to provide for consideration of the extension under the Energy Policy and Conservation Act of non-application of No-Load Mode energy efficiency standards to certain security or life safety alarms or surveillance systems, and for other purposes. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without amendment favorably on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–76. The Senate passed S. 190 without amendment on August 1, 2017, by unanimous consent. S. 190 passed the House on October 11, 2017, by voice vote, and the President approved the measure on November 2, 2017.

Public Law 115–97 (H.R. 1), to provide for reconciliation pursuant to Titles II and V of the concurrent resolution on the budget for Fiscal Year 2018. The House passed H. Con. Res. 71 on October 5, 2017, by a roll call vote of 219–206. The Senate passed H. Con. Res. 71 with an amendment by a roll call vote of 51–49 on October 19, 2017. The House agreed to the Senate amendment by a roll call vote of 216–212 on October 26, 2017. Section 2001 of H. Con. Res. 71 instructed the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee to raise \$1 billion in new revenue during Fiscal Years 2018–2027. Pursuant to its reconciliation instructions, the Committee ordered Title II of the measure to be reported with an amendment favorably on November 15, 2017. Title II provides for the establishment of an oil and gas leasing program in the 1002 Area of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge; increases the annual limitation on offshore revenue sharing under section 105(f)(1) of the Gulf of Mexico Energy Security Act; and authorizes the Secretary of Energy to drawdown and sell five million barrels of crude oil from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve during Fiscal Years 2026 and 2027. (The Committee on the Budget printed the Committee’s reconciliation recommendations pursuant to H. Con. Res. 71 in December 2017, S. Prt. 115–20.) The House passed H.R. 1 on a roll call vote of 227–205 on November 16, 2017. The Senate passed H.R. 1 with an amendment on a roll call vote of 51–49 on December 2, 2017. The Senate and House agreed to reconcile their differences in a conference committee and the conference report was filed on December 15, 2017. H. Rept. 115–466. The House passed the conference report on a roll call vote of 227–203 on December 19, 2017. The Senate receded from its amendment and concurred with an amendment on a roll call vote of 51–48 on December 20, 2017. The House passed the Senate amendment by a roll call vote of 224–201 on December 20, 2017, and the President approved the measure on December 22, 2017.

Public Law 115–101 (H.R. 560), to amend the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area Improvement Act to provide access to certain vehicles serving residents of municipalities adjacent to the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area. H.R. 560 passed the House by voice vote on January 30, 2017. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–51. The Senate passed the H.R. 560 without amendment by voice vote on December 21, 2017, and the President approved the measure on January 8, 2018.

Public Law 115–102 (H.R. 1242), to establish the 400 Years of African-American History Commission, and for other purposes. Similar legislation, S. 392 was considered before the Committee and ordered to be reported without amendment on March 30, 2017. H.R. 1242 passed the House as amended on May 1, 2017. The Senate passed the act without amendment by voice vote on December 21, 2017 and the President approved the measure on January 8, 2018.

Public Law 115–103 (H.R. 1306), to provide for the conveyance of certain Federal land in the State of Oregon, and for other purposes. An identical measure, S. 508 was considered before the Committee and ordered to be reported without amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–65. H.R. 1306 passed the House on July 11, 2017 by voice vote. It was received in the Senate and held at the desk on July 12, 2017, and subsequently passed the Senate without amendment by voice vote on December 27, 2017. The President approved the measure on January 8, 2018.

Public Law 115–104 (H.R. 1927), to amend title 54, United States Code, to establish within the National Park Service the African American Civil Rights Network. The Committee discharged the measure by unanimous consent on December 21, 2017, without written report. The Senate passed H.R. 1927 without amendment by voice vote on September 21, 2017, and the President approved the measure on January 8, 2018.

Public Law 115–108 (H.R. 267), to redesignate the Martin Luther King, Junior, National Historic Site in the State of Georgia. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–49. H.R. 267 passed the House on March 15, 2017, and the Senate passed the act without amendment on December 21, 2017, by voice vote. The President approved the measure on January 8, 2018.

Public Law 115–109 (H.R. 381), to designate a mountain in the John Muir Wilderness of the Sierra National Forest as “Sky Point.” H.R. 381 passed the House by voice vote on January 30, 2017. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–111. The Senate passed H.R. 381 without amendment by voice vote on December 21, 2017, and the President approved the measure on January 10, 2018.

Public Law 115–110 (H.R. 699), to amend the Omnibus Public Land Management Act of 2009 to modify provisions relating to certain land exchanges in the Mt. Hood Wilderness in the State of Oregon. H.R. 699 passed the House on February 27, 2017, by a roll call vote of 415–1. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–59. The Senate passed H.R. 699 without amendment by voice vote on December 21, 2017, and the President approved the measure on January 10, 2018.

Public Law 115–111 (H.R. 863), to facilitate the addition of park administration at the Coltsville National Historical Park. H.R. 863 passed the House on February 27, 2017, by a roll call vote. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–70. The Senate passed H.R. 863 without amendment by voice vote on December 21, 2017, and the President approved the measure on January 10, 2018.

Public Law 115–115 (H.R. 518), to amend the Energy Policy and Conservation Act to exclude power supply circuits, drivers, and devices designed to be connected to, and power, light-emitting diodes or organic light-emitting diodes providing illumination from energy conservation standards for external power supplies, and for other purposes. H.R. 518 passed the House on January 23, 2017, by voice vote. The Committee discharged the measure by unanimous consent on December 21, 2017, without written report. The Senate passed H.R. 518 by voice vote on December 21, 2017, and the President approved the measure on January 12, 2018.

Public Law 115–116 (H.R. 954), to remove the use restrictions on certain land transferred to Rockingham County, Virginia, and for other purposes. Furthermore, to eliminate the requirement that the county include information concerning the use of the transferred land for a child care center in biennial reports to the Department of the Interior. The Committee considered an identical measure, S. 331 which was ordered to be reported without amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–39. H.R. 954 passed the House by voice vote on July 11, 2017 and subsequently by the Senate on December 21, 2017 by voice vote. The President approved the measure on January 12, 2018.

Public Law 115–117 (H.R. 2611), to modify the boundary of the Little Rock Central High School National Historic Site, and for other purposes. The Committee considered S. 1202, similar legislation to H.R. 2611, at a hearing before the Subcommittee on National Parks on July 19, 2017. S. Hrg. 115–417. H.R. 2611 passed the House by roll call vote of 390–0 on September 12, 2017, and the Senate without amendment by voice vote on December 21, 2017. The President approved the measure on January 12, 2018.

Public Law 115–122 (S. 117), to designate a mountain peak in the State of Montana as “Alex Diekmann Peak.” The Committee ordered the measure reported with an amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–94. The Senate passed S. 117 with an amendment on December 20, 2017, by unanimous consent. S. 117 passed the House on January 16, 2018, by roll call vote of 400–3, and the President approved the measure on January 31, 2018.

Public Law 115–128 (S. 1438), to redesignate the Jefferson National Expansion Memorial in the State of Missouri as the “Gateway Arch National Park.” The Subcommittee on National Parks held a hearing on S. 1438 on July 19, 2017. S. Hrg. 115–417. The Committee discharged the measure by unanimous consent on December 21, 2017, without written report. The Senate passed S. 1438 without amendment by voice vote on December 21, 2017, and the House passed the bill by voice vote on February 7, 2018. The President approved the measure on February 22, 2018.

Public Law 115–161 (S. 2030), to deem the compliance date for amended energy conservation standards for ceiling fan light kits to be January 21, 2020, and for other purposes. The Subcommittee on Energy held a hearing on the measure on December 5, 2017. S. Hrg. 115–493. The Committee discharged S. 2030 by unanimous consent on December 21, 2017, without written report. The Senate passed S. 2030 without amendment by unanimous consent on December 21, 2017, and the House passed the bill by voice vote on

March 19, 2018. The President approved the measure on April 3, 2018.

Public Law 115–163 (H.R. 4851), to establish the Kennedy-King National Commemorative Site in the State of Indiana, and for other purposes. The Committee considered measure, S.2332, similar legislation to H.R. 4851. The House passed H.R. 4851 by a roll call vote of 391–0 on March 19, 2018. The Senate passed H.R. 4851 with an amendment on March 22, 2018, and the House agreed to the Senate amendment the same day. The President approved the measure on April 4, 2018.

Public Law 115–169 (S. 167), to designate a National Memorial to Fallen Educators at the National Teachers Hall of Fame in Emporia, Kansas. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported with an amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–95. The Senate passed S. 167 with an amendment by voice vote on December 21, 2017, and the House passed the bill by roll call vote on April 16, 2018. The President approved the measure on April 30, 2018.

Public Law 115–170 (H.R. 4300), to authorize Pacific Historic Parks to establish a commemorative display to honor members of the United States Armed Forces who served in the Pacific Theater of World War II. H.R. 4300 passed the House on December 7, 2017. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without an amendment on March 8, 2018. S. Rept. 115–216. The Senate passed H.R. 4300 by unanimous consent on April 23, 2018, and the President approved the measure on May 7, 2018.

Public Law 115–175 (S. 35), to transfer administrative jurisdiction over certain Bureau of Land Management land from the Secretary of the Interior to the Secretary of Veterans Affairs for inclusion in the Black Hills National Cemetery. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–35. The Senate passed S. 35 by voice vote on December 21, 2017, and the House passed the bill by a roll call vote of 407–0 on May 16, 2018. The President approved the measure on May 25, 2018.

Public Law 115–186 (H.R. 1900), to designate the Veterans Memorial and Museum in Columbus, Ohio, as the National Veterans Memorial and Museum. H.R. 1900 passed the House by voice vote on November 11, 2017. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without an amendment on May 23, 2018. S. Rept. 115–304. The Senate passed H.R. 1900 by voice vote on June 6, 2018, and the President approved the measure on June 21, 2018.

Public Law 115–190 (H.R. 1397), to authorize, direct, facilitate, and expedite the transfer of administrative jurisdiction of certain Federal land. H.R. 1397 passed the House by a roll call vote of 406–0 on July 11, 2017. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without an amendment on March 8, 2018. S. Rept. 115–257. The Senate passed H.R. 1397 by voice vote on May 6, 2018, and the President approved the measure on June 22, 2018.

Public Law 115–191 (H.R. 1719), to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to acquire approximately 44 acres of land in Martinez, California, for inclusion in the John Muir National Historic Site, and for other purposes. The Committee considered S. 729, companion legislation to H.R. 1719. S. 729 was ordered to be reported without amendment by the Committee on March 30, 2017. S. Rept.

115–47. H.R. 1719 passed the House as amended by roll call vote of 401–15 on July 11, 2017 and the Senate passed the measure by unanimous consent June 6, 2018. The President approved the measure on June 22, 2018.

Public Law 115–200 (H.R. 219), to correct the Swan Lake hydroelectric project survey boundary and to provide for the conveyance of the remaining tract of land within the corrected survey boundary to the State of Alaska. The Committee considered S. 267, companion legislation to H.R. 219. S. 267 was ordered to be reported without amendment by the Committee on June 8, 2017. S. Rept. 115–98. H.R. 219 passed the House by voice vote on February 6, 2018. The Senate passed H.R. 219 without amendment by unanimous consent on June 28, 2018, and the President approved the measure on July 20, 2018. The measure was also included within H.R. 5895, the Energy and Water, Legislative Branch, and Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act, 2019, as passed by the Senate on June 25, 2018.

Public Law 115–201 (H.R. 220), to authorize the expansion of an existing hydroelectric project, and for other purposes (the Terror Lake Hydroelectric Project in Alaska). The Committee considered S. 214, companion legislation to H.R. 220. S. 215 was ordered to be reported without amendment by the Committee on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–105. On June 27, 2017, the House passed H.R. 220 as amended by voice vote. The Senate passed H.R. 220 without amendment by unanimous consent on June 28, 2018, and the President approved the measure on July 20, 2018. The measure was also included within H.R. 5895, the Energy and Water, Legislative Branch, and Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act, 2019, as passed by the Senate on June 25, 2018.

Public Law 115–202 (H.R. 446), to extend the deadline for commencement of construction of a hydroelectric project (the Gathright Hydroelectric Project in Virginia). The Committee considered S. 730, companion legislation to H.R. 446. S. 730 was ordered to be reported without amendment by the Committee on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–82. On June 12, 2017, the House passed H.R. 446 without amendment by voice vote. The Senate passed H.R. 446 without amendment by unanimous consent on June 28, 2018, and the President approved the measure on July 23, 2018. The measure was also included within H.R. 5895, the Energy and Water, Legislative Branch, and Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act, 2019, as passed by the Senate on June 25, 2018.

Public Law 115–203 (H.R. 447), to extend the deadline for commencement of construction of a hydroelectric project (the Flannagan Dam and Reservoir Hydroelectric Project in Virginia). The Committee considered S. 730, companion legislation to H.R. 447. S. 730 was ordered to be reported without amendment by the Committee on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–82. H.R. 447 passed the House without amendment by voice vote on June 12, 2017. The Senate passed H.R. 447 without amendment by unanimous consent on June 28, 2018, and the President approved the measure on July 23, 2018. The measure was also included within H.R. 5895, the Energy and Water, Legislative Branch, and Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act, 2019, as passed by the Senate on June 25, 2018.

Public Law 115–204 (H.R. 951), to extend the deadline for commencement of construction of a hydroelectric project (the W. Kerr Scott Hydropower Project in North Carolina). The Committee considered S. 723, companion legislation to H.R. 951. S. 723 was ordered to be reported with an amendment by the Committee on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–80. On June 12, 2017, the House passed H.R. 951 by voice vote. The Senate passed H.R. 951 without amendment by unanimous consent on June 28, 2018, and the President approved the measure on July 23, 2018. The measure was also included within H.R. 5895, the Energy and Water, Legislative Branch, and Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act, 2019, as passed by the Senate on June 25, 2018.

Public Law 115–205 (H.R. 2122), to reinstate and extend the deadline for commencement of construction of a hydroelectric project involving Jennings Randolph Dam. The Committee considered S. 710, companion legislation to H.R. 2122. S. 710 was ordered to be reported with an amendment by the Committee on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–103. H.R. 2122 passed the House by voice vote on June 12, 2017. The Senate passed H.R. 2122 without amendment by unanimous consent on June 28, 2018, and the President approved the measure on July 23, 2018. The measure was also included within H.R. 5895, the Energy and Water, Legislative Branch, and Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act, 2019, as passed by the Senate on June 25, 2018.

Public Law 115–206 (H.R. 2292), to extend a project of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission involving the Cannonsville Dam. The Committee considered S. 734, companion legislation to H.R. 2292. S. 734 was ordered to be reported with an amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–83. H.R. 2292 passed the House by a roll call vote of 400–1 on June 12, 2017. The Senate passed H.R. 2292 without amendment by unanimous consent on June 28, 2018, and the President approved the measure on July 23, 2018. The measure was also included within H.R. 5895, the Energy and Water, Legislative Branch, and Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act, 2019, as passed by the Senate on June 25, 2018.

Public Law 115–219 (S. 490), to reinstate and extend the deadline for commencement of construction of a hydroelectric project involving the Gibson Dam. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute on June 8, 2017. S. Rept. 115–100. The Senate passed S. 490 with an amendment by unanimous consent on June 28, 2018, and the House passed the bill by voice vote on July 16, 2018. The President approved the measure on July 27, 2018.

Public Law 115–229 (H.R. 4645), to amend the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act to designate certain segments of the East Rosebud Creek in Carbon County, Montana, as components of the Wild and Scenic Rivers System. Similar legislation, S. 501 was considered by the Committee and was ordered to be reported without amendment favorably on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–42. The Senate passed S. 502 without amendment by unanimous consent on December 20, 2017. H.R. 4645 passed the House by voice vote on July 17, 2018 and was subsequently passed by the Senate on July 25, 2018. The President approved the measure on August 2, 2018.

Public Law 115-246 (H.R. 589), to establish Department of Energy policy for science and energy research and development programs, and reform National Laboratory management and technology transfer programs, and for other purposes. H.R. 589 passed the House by voice vote on January 24, 2017. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without amendment favorably on March 8, 2018. S. Rept. 115-242. The Senate passed H.R. 589 with an amendment by voice vote on July 23, 2018, and the President approved the measure on September 28, 2018.

Public Law 115-247 (H.R. 1109), to amend section 203 of the Federal Power Act to set a \$10 million threshold on mergers and consolidations by public utilities that require Federal Energy Regulatory Commission approval. H.R. 1109 passed the House by voice vote on June 12, 2017. The Subcommittee on Energy held a hearing on H.R. 1109 on October 3, 2017. S. Hrg. 115-318. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute on March 8, 2018. S. Rept. 115-253. H.R. 1109 passed the Senate with an amendment by voice vote on May 21, 2018, the House passed the Act with an amendment by unanimous consent on September 13, 2018. The President approved the measure on September 28, 2018.

Public Law 115-248 (S. 97), to enable civilian research and development of advanced nuclear energy technologies by private and public institutions, to expand theoretical and practical knowledge of nuclear physics, chemistry, and materials science, and for other purposes. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115-115. The Senate passed S. 97 with amendments by voice vote on March 7, 2018, and the House approved the bill by voice vote on September 13, 2018. The President approved the measure on September 28, 2018.

Public Law 115-252 (H.R. 698), to require a land conveyance involving the Elkhorn Ranch and the White River National Forest in the State of Colorado, and for other purposes. H.R. 698 passed the House by voice vote on February 6, 2017. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported without an amendment on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115-69. The Senate passed H.R. 698 without amendment by unanimous consent on September 18, 2018, and the President approved the measure on October 3, 2018.

Public Law 115-255 (H.R. 46), to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to conduct a special resource study of Fort Ontario in the State of New York. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115-110. The Senate passed H.R. 46 with an amendment by voice vote on September 18, 2018 and the House passed the act by unanimous consent on September 25, 2018. The President approved the measure on October 9, 2018.

Public Law 115-275 (H.R. 1037), to authorize the National Emergency Medical Services Memorial Foundation to establish a commemorative work in the District of Columbia and its environs, and for other purposes. The Committee reported the bill (S. 1692) without amendment on March 8, 2018. The bill passed the House by a roll call vote of 414-0 on July 18, 2018, and passed the Senate without amendment by unanimous consent on October 11, 2018. The President approved the measure on November 3, 2018.

Public Law 115-279 (H.R. 2615), to authorize the exchange of certain land located in Gulf Islands National Seashore, Jackson County, Mississippi, between the National Park Service and the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and for other purposes. The Subcommittee on National Parks held a hearing on H.R. 2615 on February 14, 2018. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute on March 8, 2018. S. Rept. 115-228. The Senate passed H.R. 2615 with an amendment by voice vote on October 11, 2018, and the House passed the act by roll call vote of 375-1 on November 13, 2018. The President approved the measure on November 20, 2018.

Public Law 115-306 (S. 440), a bill to establish a procedure for the conveyance of certain Federal property around the Dickinson reservoir in the State of North Dakota. The Subcommittee on Water and Power held a hearing on S. 440 on June 14, 2017. S. Hrg. 115-38. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute on May 17, 2018. S. Rept. 115-313. The Senate passed S. 440 by unanimous consent on October 4, 2018. The House passed S. 440 with an amendment by voice vote on November 13, 2018, and the Senate agreed to the House amendment by unanimous consent on November 27, 2018. The President approved the measure on December 11, 2018.

Public Law 115-308 (S. 2074), a bill to establish a procedure for the conveyance of certain Federal property around the Jamestown Reservoir in the State of North Dakota, and for other purposes. The Subcommittee on Water and Power held a hearing on S. 2074 on February 28, 2018. S. Hrg. 115-505. The Committee ordered the measure to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute on May 17, 2018. S. Rept. 115-315. The Senate passed S. 2074 by unanimous consent on October 4, 2018. The House passed S. 2074 with an amendment by voice vote on November 13, 2018, and the Senate agreed to the House amendment by unanimous consent on November 27, 2018. The President approved the measure on December 11, 2018.

Public Law 115-345 (H.R. 1733), to direct the Secretary of Energy to review and update a report on the energy and environmental benefits of the re-refining of used lubricating oil. H.R. 1733 passed the House by voice vote on December 12, 2017. The Committee discharged H.R. 1733 by unanimous consent on December 20, 2018, without written report, and the Senate passed the measure without an amendment by unanimous consent on December 20, 2018. The President approved the measure on December 21, 2018.

Public Law 115-429 (H.R. 4689), to authorize early repayment of obligations to the Bureau of Reclamation within the Northport Irrigation District in the State of Nebraska. The House passed H.R. 4689 by a roll call vote on September 12, 2018. The Committee discharged the measure by unanimous consent on December 22, 2018, without written report. The Senate passed H.R. 4689 without amendment by unanimous consent on December 22, 2018, and the President approved the measure on January 10, 2019.

Public Law 115-431 (H.R. 6602), to reauthorize the New Jersey Coastal Heritage Trail Route. The Senate considered S. 3291, companion legislation to H.R. 6602, at a hearing before the Subcommittee on National Parks on December 12, 2018. H.R. 6602

passed the House on December 20, 2018 by a roll call vote of 382–9. It passed the Senate without amendment by voice vote on December 22, 2018. The President approved the measure on January 10, 2019.

In addition, six public laws not specifically under the jurisdiction of the Committee incorporated provisions that were jurisdictional to the Committee.

Public Law 115–31 (H.R. 244), the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2017. Section 431 of Division G of Public Law 115–131, the Department of the Interior, Environment and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, incorporated by reference S. 131, the Alaska Mental Health Trust Land Exchange. The Committee ordered S. 131 to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute on March 30, 2017. S. Rept. 115–117. H.R. 244 passed the House on May 3, 2017 by roll call vote of 309–118. The Senate passed H.R. 244 on May 4, 2017 on a roll call vote of 79–18, and the President approved the measure on May 5, 2017.

Public Law 115–141 (H.R. 1625), the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2018. The bill passed the House by a roll call vote of 256–167 on March 22, 2018, and passed the Senate on a roll call vote of 65–32 on March 23, 2018. The President approved the measure on March 23, 2018.

Division G of Public Law 115–141, the Department of the Interior, Environment and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, contained five separate measures considered by Committee. These measures include:

- Section 116 includes S. 213, to designate the wilderness within the Lake Clark National Park and Preserve in the State of Alaska as the Jay S. Hammond Wilderness Area. The Committee ordered S. 213 reported without amendment on March 30, 2017; S. Rept. 115–108.
- Section 121(a) incorporates by reference section 7130 of S. 1460, the Energy and Natural Resources Act, to authorize the modification of the Second Division Memorial; the language was identical to S. 907.
- Section 121(a) incorporates by reference section 7134 of S. 1460, the Energy and Natural Resources Act, to establish the Ste. Genevieve National Historic Site in the State of Missouri; the language was identical to S. 1335. The Committee ordered S. 1335 reported without amendment on March 8, 2018; S. Rept. 115–233.
- Section 121(b) incorporates by reference H.R. 1281, a bill to extend the authorization of the Highlands Conservation Act, as introduced in the 115th Congress.
- Section 121(b) incorporates by reference H.R. 4134, the Cecil D. Andrus-White Clouds Wilderness Redesignation Act, as introduced in the 115th Congress.

Division O of Public Law 115–141, the Wildfire Suppression Funding and Forest Management Activities Act, contained two separate measures considered by Committee. These measures include:

- Section 204 addresses cancellation ceilings for stewardship end result contracting projects. A similar provision was included in S. 485, the Stewardship End Result Contracting Improvement Act, and incorporated into the discussion draft ti-

tled “Wildfire Budgeting, Response and Forest Management Act.” The Committee held a hearing on the discussion draft on June 23, 2016.

- Section 211 addresses vegetation management, facility inspection, and operation and maintenance relating to electric transmission and distribution facility rights of way. A similar provision was contained in section 2310 of S. 1460, the Energy and Natural Resources Act. S. 1460 was introduced on June 28, 2017 and placed on the Senate calendar. The Committee held a hearing on section 2310 of S. 1460, and a similar measure, H.R. 1873, the Electricity Reliability and Forest Protection Act, on September 19, 2017.

Public Law 115–244 (H.R. 5895), the Energy and Water, Legislative Branch, and Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act, 2019. Section 205 of the bill is similar to S. 2539, a bill to amend the Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015, to reauthorize certain projects to increase Colorado River System water, which received a subcommittee hearing on March 22, 2018. Section 206, to extend the authorization for the Fort Peck Rural Water System, is also within the Committee’s jurisdiction. H.R. 5895 passed the House of Representatives on June 8, 2018. The Senate passed the bill, with an amendment, on June 25, 2018. A Conference Report was filed on September 10, 2018. H. Rept. 115–929. The Senate agreed to the Conference Report on September 12, 2018, and the House agreed to the Conference Report on September 13, 2018. The President approved the measure on September 21, 2018.

Public Law 115–270 (S. 3021), the America’s Water Infrastructure Act of 2018, to provide for improvements to the rivers and harbors of the United States, to provide for the conservation and development of water and related resources, to provide for water pollution control activities, and for other purposes. This bill contains several provisions considered before the Committee in legislation relating to energy and natural resources management. These measures include: H.R. 648/S. 199, to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to amend the Definite Plan Report for the Seedskaadee Project to enable the use of the active capacity of the Fontenelle Reservoir; H.R. 2457/S. 1142, to extend the deadline for commencement of construction of certain hydroelectric projects in Louisiana; H.R. 2872, to amend the Federal Power Act to promote hydropower development at existing nonpowered dams, and for other purposes; H.R. 2880, to amend the Federal Power Act to promote close-loop pumped storage hydropower, and for other purposes; S. 186, to amend the Federal Power Act to provide that any inaction by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission that allows a rate change to go into effect shall be treated as an order by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for purposes of rehearing and court review; S. 215, to authorize the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to issue an order continuing a stay of a hydroelectric license for the Mahoney Lake hydroelectric project in the State of Alaska, and for other purposes; and S. 724, to amend the Federal Power Act to modernize authorizations for necessary hydropower approvals. Also, section 9301 of S. 1460, the Energy and Natural Resources Act, dealing with the Klamath Water Project, is similar to section

4308 of Public Law 115–270. S. 3021 passed the House on September 13, 2018. This Act passed the Senate with House amendments on October 10, 2018 by a roll call vote of 99–1. The President approved the measure on October 23, 2018.

Public Law 115–307 (S. 1768), to reauthorize and amend the National Earthquake Hazards Reduction Program, and for other purposes. The Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation ordered the bill to be favorably reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute on December 13, 2017. S. Rept. 115–336. This bill passed the Senate on September 27, 2018, and passed the House by voice vote on November 27, 2018. The President approved the measure on December 11, 2018.

Public Law 115–334 (H.R. 2), the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018, to provide for the reform and continuation of agricultural and other programs of the Department of Agriculture through fiscal year 2023, and for other purposes. This measure contains provisions reauthorizing programs of the United States Department of Agriculture such as the Forest Service that fall under the jurisdiction of the Committee. A conference report was filed December 10, 2018. Subsequently the Senate passed the measure by a roll call vote of 87–13 on December 11, 2018, and the House passed the Act on December 12, 2018 by a roll call vote of 360–47. The President approved the measure on December 20, 2018.
