December 31, 2022

The following list includes the President's public schedule and other items of general interest announced by the Office of the Press Secretary and not included elsewhere in this Compilation.

January 1

In the afternoon, the President traveled to Wilmington, DE, where he attended Mass at Saint Ann Parish. Later, he traveled to Greenville, DE, where, at his residence, he remained overnight.

January 2

During the day, from his residence in Greenville, DE, the President had a telephone conversation with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine to make it clear that the U.S. and its allies and partners would respond decisively if Russia further invaded Ukraine, express support for diplomatic efforts, starting next week with the bilateral Strategic Stability Dialogue, at the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) through the NATO-Russia Council, and at the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe, reaffirm the U.S. commitment to Ukraine's sovereignty and territorial integrity, and emphasize his support for confidence-building measures to deescalate tensions in Donbas and active diplomacy to advance the implementation of the Minsk Agreements, in support of the Normandy Format.

The White House announced that the President will return to Washington, DC, on January 3.

January 3

In the morning, the President returned to Washington, DC. Later, in the Oval Office, he and Vice President Kamala D. Harris had an intelligence briefing.

January 4

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President and Vice President Kamala D. Harris had an intelligence briefing.

January 5

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President and Vice President Kamala D. Harris had an intelligence briefing.

The White House announced that the President and Dr. Biden will travel to Boulder, CO, and Las Vegas, NV, on January 7.

The White House announced that the President will travel to Atlanta, GA, on January 11.

The President declared a major disaster in Washington and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State, Tribal, and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by flooding and mudslides from November 13 through 15.

January 6

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing.

During the day, the President spoke with White House Press Secretary Jennifer R. Psaki.

The White House announced further details on the President and Dr. Biden's travel to Boulder County, CO, on January 7.

January 7

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing. Later, he and Dr. Biden traveled to Denver, CO, arriving in the afternoon.

In the afternoon, upon arrival at Denver International Airport, the President and Dr. Biden were greeted by Governor Jared S. Polis, Lt. Gov. Dianne Primavera, and State Senate President Leroy Garcia. Then, they traveled to Louisville, CO, where, upon arrival in the Harper Lake neighborhood, they were greeted by Mayor Ashley Stolzmann of Louisville, Boulder County Sheriff Joe Pelle, Chief John Willson of the Louisville Fire Protection District, received a briefing from State and local officials, toured an area damaged by the Marshall Fire, visited with affected residents, and thanked first responders. The President gave out challenge coins to the fire and rescue officials. Gov. Polis, Sen. John W. Hickenlooper, Sen. Michael F. Bennet, and Rep. Joseph D. Neguse also participated. Then, at the Louisville Recreation and Senior Center, they met with families impacted by the Marshall Fire.

In the evening, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Broomfield, CO, where, at Rocky Mountain International Airport, on the tarmac they greeted U.S. Ambassador to Switzerland Scott Miller and his husband, LGBTQ rights activist and philanthropist Tim Gill. Then, they traveled to Paradise, NV. Upon arrival at Harry Reid International Airport, the President invited Rep. Suzanne K. Lee and her son Cody aboard Air Force One for a tour of the plane. Then, he and Dr. Biden traveled to Las Vegas, NV, where, at the Vdara Hotel and Spa at ARIA Las Vegas, they remained overnight.

The White House announced further details on the President and Dr. Biden's travel to Las Vegas, NV, on January 7 and 8.

The President announced his intention to nominate Alice C. Hill to be Deputy Administrator for Resilience at the Federal Emergency Management Agency in the Department of Homeland Security.

January 8

In the morning, at the Smith Center for the Performing Arts, the President and Dr. Biden attended the memorial service for former Senate Majority Leader Harry M. Reid. Vice President Kamala D. Harris and her husband Douglas C. Emhoff also attended. Prior to the service, the President escorted former Sen. Reid's wife Landra to her seat.

In the afternoon, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Joint Base Andrews, MD, arriving in the evening.

In the evening, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Camp David, MD.

The President made additional disaster assistance available to Kentucky by authorizing an increase in the level of Federal funding for emergency work in the Commonwealth as a result of severe storms, straight-line winds, flooding, and tornadoes on December 10 and 11.

January 9

The White House announced that the President will return to Washington, DC, on January 10.

January 10

In the morning, the President returned to Washington, DC. Later, in the Oval Office, he had an intelligence briefing.

The White House announced further details on the President's travel to Atlanta, GA, on January 11.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed of Ethiopia to discuss the ongoing conflict in Ethiopia and opportunities to advance peace and reconciliation, commend Prime Minister Abiy on the recent release of several political prisoners, and review ways to accelerate dialogue toward a negotiated cease-fire, the urgency of improving humanitarian access across Ethiopia, and the need to address the human rights concerns of all affected Ethiopians, including detentions of Ethiopians under the state of emergency. President Biden expressed concern that the ongoing hostilities, including recent air strikes, continue to cause civilian casualties and suffering, and he reaffirmed the U.S. commitment to work alongside the African Union and regional partners to help Ethiopians peacefully resolve the conflict.

Also during the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Mayor Eric Adams of New York City to express his heartfelt condolences and offer support following the devastating fire at an apartment building in the Bronx borough.

The President declared a major disaster in Missouri and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by severe storms, straight-line winds, and tornadoes on December 10.

January 11

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing. Later, he traveled to Atlanta, GA, arriving in the afternoon. Sen. Raphael G. Warnock; Reps. Nikema Williams, Sanford D. Bishop, Jr., Lucia K. McBath, Carolyn Bourdeaux, Henry C. Johnson, Jr., and Lisa Blunt Rochester; and Democratic National Committee Vice Chair of Civic Engagement and Voter Protection Keisha Lance Bottoms accompanied him. He also had a telephone conversation with Stacey Y. Abrams, founder of Fair Fight and Georgia Democratic gubernatorial candidate.

In the afternoon, at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change, the President and Vice President Kamala D. Harris met with Bernice, daughter, and Martin Luther King III, son, Andrea, daughter-in-law, and Yolanda, grand-daughter, of Martin Luther King, Jr., and Coretta Scott King and participated in a wreath-laying ceremony at their crypt. Then, at the Ebenezer Baptist Church, they were greeted by Sen. Warnock, senior pastor of the church, toured the historic sanctuary, and met with Sens. Warnock and T. Jonathan Ossoff and Reps. Williams, Bishop, McBath, Bourdeaux, and Johnson. He also spoke briefly to reporters.

Later in the afternoon, following his remarks at the Atlanta University Center Consortium, the President participated in a photo line.

In the evening, the President returned to Washington, DC. Sens. Amy J. Klobuchar, Jeffrey A. Merkley, Alejandro Padilla; and Reps. Joyce Beatty, Terrycina A. Sewell, John P. Sarbanes, and Lisa Blunt Rochester accompanied him.

During the day, in the Red Room, the President met with National Security Adviser Jacob J. Sullivan.

January 12

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Joint Base Myer-Henderson Hall, VA, where they attended the funeral service for former Army Chief of Staff Gen. Raymond T. Odierno, USA, with the President making remarks. Later, they returned to Washington, DC. Then, at the U.S. Capitol, in the Rotunda, they paid their respects at a public viewing of former Sen. Harry M. Reid who lay in state and in the Mansfield Room, visited with members of the Reid family. Before leaving the Capitol, he visited with a group of Senate pages and posed for photographs with Sens. Cory A. Booker and Thomas R. Carper. He also answered a question

from a reporter and stopped by the office of Senate Minority Leader A. Mitchell McConnell, speaking with outer office staff.

January 13

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, at the Russell Senate Office Building of the U.S. Capitol, in the Kennedy Caucus Room, the President had a working lunch with the Senate Democratic Caucus to discuss the urgent need to pass legislation to protect the constitutional right to vote and the integrity of elections. Before departing the Capitol, outside the Russell Building, he spoke briefly with a U.S. Capitol Police officer.

Later in the afternoon, in the Oval Office, the President met with Sens. Kyrsten L. Sinema and Joseph A. Manchin III to discuss voting rights.

The President announced his intention to nominate Patricia Neuman to be a member of the Boards of Trustees for the Supplementary Medical Insurance Trust Fund Board, the Federal Hospital Insurance Trust Fund, and the Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance Trust Fund, and the Federal Disability Insurance.

During the day, in the Roosevelt Room, the President met with Domestic Policy Council Director Susan E. Rice, White House Press Secretary Jennifer R. Psaki, and other senior advisers to discuss a congressional update.

In the evening, the President traveled to Greenville, DE, where, at his residence, he remained overnight.

In the afternoon, the President and his grandson Hunter traveled to Greenville, DE, where, at the St. Joseph on the Brandywine Roman Catholic Church, they attended Mass. Then, they returned to the President's residence, where the President remained overnight.

During the day, the President was briefed on the hostage situation at the Beth Israel Congregation synagogue in Colleyville, TX, and continued to received updates from senior staff throughout the day.

The President declared a major disaster in Alaska and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State, Tribal, and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by severe storms, straight-line winds, flooding, landslides, and mudslides from October 29 to November 1, 2021.

January 16

In the morning, the President had a telephone conversation with Attorney General Merrick B. Garland to discuss the resolution of the hostage situation at the Beth Israel Congregation synagogue in Colleyville, TX. Later, he and Dr. Biden traveled to Philadelphia, PA, where, at Philabundance, a local hunger relief organization, they were greeted by Philabundance Chief Executive Officer Loree D. Jones and Repack Supervisor Damien Hernandez, former Rep. Robert A. Brady, and AmeriCorps Chief Executive Officer Michael D. Smith. In the afternoon, at the Philabundance facility, the President and Dr. Biden visited with staff and volunteers and participated in a service project packing food boxes in observance of Martin Luther King Day. Later, they returned to Greenville, DE, where, at their residence, they remained overnight.

During the day, the President spoke with White House Press Secretary Jennifer R. Psaki about the hostage situation in Colleyville.

The White House announced that the President will return to Washington, DC, on January 17.

The White House announced that the President will meet virtually with Prime Minister Fumio Kishida of Japan on January 21.

January 17

In the evening, the President and Dr. Biden returned to Washington, DC.

January 18

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing. Later, in the Roosevelt Room, he and Vice President Kamala D. Harris had an economic briefing.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with President Sauli Niinistö of Finland to discuss shared concerns over Russia's unprovoked military buildup on Ukraine's borders and review the close Finland-U.S. defense partnership and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's role in ensuring security in northern Europe, as well as that of the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe to continue dialogue toward deescalation of tensions and addressing challenges to European security.

Participating in the meeting were Sens. Robert J. Portman, C. Jeanne Shaheen, Kevin Cramer, Amy J. Klobuchar, Christopher S. Murphy, Richard Blumenthal, Roger F. Wicker, and James E. Risch.

Later, he had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, the President traveled to Camp David, MD, where he remained overnight.

During the day, in the Oval Office, the President met with White House Chief of Staff Ronald A. Klain and Director of Communications Kate Bedingfield. Also in the Oval Office, he met with Special Presidential Envoy for Climate John F. Kerry.

The White House announced that the President will welcome Chancellor Olaf Scholz of Germany to the White House in February.

National Security Adviser Jacob J. Sullivan and Counselor Steven J. Ricchetti joined the President in person at Camp David, with other national security officials participating via secure videoconference.

January 23

The White House announced that the President will return to Washington, DC, on January 24.

January 24

In the morning, the President returned to Washington, DC. Later, in the Oval Office, he had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, in the Situation Room, the President participated in secure videoconference with European leaders to discuss continued close consultation and coordination with transatlantic allies and partners in response to Russia's military buildup on Ukraine's borders, reiterate their support for Ukraine's sovereignty and territorial integrity, underscore their shared desire for a diplomatic resolution to the current tensions, and review recent engagements with Russia in multiple formats, including preparations to impose massive consequences and severe economic costs on Russia for such actions as well as to reinforce security on North Atlantic Treaty Organization's (NATO) eastern flank. Participating in the meeting were President Ursula von der Leyen of the European Commission; President Charles Yvon Michel of the European Council; President Emmanuel Macron of France, Chancellor Olaf Scholz of Germany, Prime Minister Mario Draghi of Italy, Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg of NATO, President Andrzej Duda of Poland, and Prime Minister Boris Johnson of the United Kingdom.

In the evening, the President had a telephone conversation with Mayor Eric Adams of New York City to offer his condolences for the shooting of two New York Police Department officers on January 21, reiterate his admiration and gratitude for the men and women of law enforcement as well as Mayor Adams's his efforts to combat gun violence and violent crime, and discuss his administration's commitment to bolster State and local law enforcement agencies. He also had a telephone conversation with Fox News White House Correspondent Peter Doocy.

The White House announced that the President will travel to Pittsburgh, PA, on January 28.

January 25

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President and Vice President Kamala D. Harris had an intelligence briefing.

Atlantic Treaty Organization and the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe to address Russia's destabilizing military buildup along Ukraine's borders. National Security Adviser Jacob J. Sullivan also attended.

Also during the day, in the Oval Office, the President met with author and Holocaust survivor Bronia Brandman and her daughter Etta Brandman in recognition of International Holocaust Remembrance Day.

February 22

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President and Vice President Kamala D. Harris had an intelligence briefing.

During the day, the President met with Minister of Foreign Affairs Dmytro Kuleba of Ukraine to reaffirm the U.S. commitment to Ukraine's sovereignty and territorial integrity, update Foreign Minister Kuleba on the U.S. response to Russia's decision to recognize the independence of the Donetsk and Luhansk regions of Ukraine, including new U.S. sanctions, affirm the continuation of U.S. security assistance and macroeconomic support, and reiterate U.S. readiness, in close cooperation with allies and partners, to respond swiftly and decisively to any further Russian aggression against Ukraine.

Also during the day, in the Oval Office, the President met with National Security Adviser Jacob J. Sullivan and Deputy National Security Adviser Jonathan Finer to discuss the situation in Ukraine.

February 23

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President and Vice President Kamala D. Harris had an intelligence briefing.

In the evening, the President had a telephone conversation President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine to condemn the unprovoked and unjustified attack by Russian military forces and brief him on U.S. efforts to rally international condemnation, including at the U.N. Security Council, as well further outreach with the leaders of the Group of Seven (G–7) nations, to coordinate the imposition of severe international sanctions on Russia.

The President declared a major disaster in Nebraska and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State, Tribal, and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by severe storms, straight-line winds, and tornadoes on December 15, 2021.

February 24

In the morning, in the Situation Room, the President and Vice President Kamala D. Harris met with the National Security Council to discuss the situation in Ukraine. Breyer.

In the morning, in the Situation Room, the President participated in a video conference with heads of state and government of North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) countries to discuss the security situation in and around Ukraine, announce the ordered deployment of additional U.S. forces to augment defense capabilities in Europe to support NATO allies, and welcome the decision to activate NATO's defensive plans and elements of the NATO Response Force to strengthen its collective posture, as well as the commitments by allies to deploy additional land and air forces to the eastern flank and maritime forces from the High North to the Mediterranean. Later, he had an intelligence briefing. Then, the President had a telephone conversation President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine to commend the brave actions of the Ukrainian people fighting to defend their country and convey ongoing U.S. economic, humanitarian, and security support as well as continued efforts to rally other countries to provide similar assistance.

Breyer. He also spoke with White House Press Secretary Jennifer R. Psaki about the selection of Judge Jackson as his Supreme Court nominee.

In the afternoon, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Greenville, DE, arriving in the evening.

In the evening, at their residence in Greenville, the President and Dr. Biden remained overnight.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with President Ursula von der Leyen of the European Commission to discuss a coordinated package of sanctions directed at President Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sergey Viktorovich Lavrov of Russia and members of the Russian national security team.

Also during the day, in the China Room, the President participated in an interview with historian Heather Cox Richardson and gave her a tour of the Cabinet Room. He also recorded an interview in the Diplomatic Reception Room with Brian Tyler Cohen of the podcast "No Lie With Brian Tyler Cohen" for later broadcast.

Also during the day, in the Oval Office, the President met with Secretary of State Antony J. Blinken, National Security Adviser Jacob J. Sullivan, and White House Press Secretary Jennifer R. Psaki, and other senior staff.

The White House announced that the President and Vice President Kamala D. Harris will participate in a secure call with their national security team to discuss the latest developments in Ukraine and Russia's premeditated, unprovoked, and unjustified attack on Ukraine from the President's residence in Greenville, DE, on March 1.

The President announced his intention to nominate Ketanji Brown Jackson to be an Associate Justice on the U.S. Supreme Court.

The President announced his intention to nominate Jay Shambaugh to be Under Secretary for International Affairs at the Department of the Treasury.

The President announced his intention to nominate William Duncan to be Ambassador to El Salvador.

The President announced his intention to nominate Lesslie Viguerie to be Ambassador to Kyrgyzstan.

The President announced his intention to nominate Denis Udall and Tess Udall to be trustees of the Morris K. Udall Scholarship and Excellence in National Environmental Policy Foundation.

February 26

In the morning, from his residence in Greenville, DE, the President participated in a secure call with his national security team to discuss the latest developments in Ukraine and Russia's premeditated, unprovoked, and unjustified attack on Ukraine. Vice President Kamala D. Harris also joined the call.

February 27

In the afternoon, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Wilmington, DE, where, at the Wilmington Country Club, they attended a memorial service for Joan Olivere, mother of the President's daughter-in-law Hallie Biden, wife of his late son Beau.

During the day, the President received regular updates from his national security team on Russia and Ukraine.

The White House announced that the President will return to Washington, DC, on February 28.

The President made additional disaster assistance available to Puerto Rico by authorizing an increase in the level of Federal funding for Public Assistance projects undertaken in the Commonwealth as a result of earthquakes from December 28, 2019, through July 3, 2020.

The President declared a major disaster in Kentucky and ordered Federal assistance to supplement Commonwealth and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by severe storms, straight-line winds, tornadoes, flooding, landslides, and mudslides from December 31, 2021, through January 2, 2022.

February 28

March 2

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing. Later, he and Dr. Biden traveled to Duluth, MN, arriving in the afternoon. Sens. Amy J. Klobuchar, Tina F. Smith, and Tammy S. Baldwin; and Reps. Mark Pocan and Ronald J. Kind accompanied them.

In the afternoon, upon arrival at the Duluth International Airport, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Superior, WI. While en route to the campus of the University of Wisconsin– Superior, on the Wisconsin side of the John Blatnik Memorial Bridge, they stopped at a maintenance shed, where he visited with a group of ironworkers. Both Wisconsin and Minnesota State and local officials as well as members of their congressional delegations also participated. Then, at the University of Wisconsin–Superior, they participated in a photo line with State, local, and university officials. Later, they traveled to Duluth. Upon arrival at the Duluth International Airport, they returned to Washington, DC, arriving in the evening.

March 3

In the morning, in the Situation Room, the President participated in a secure video conference with Prime Minister Scott Morrison of Australia, Prime Minister Narendra Modi of India, and Prime Minister Fumio Kishida of Japan, to discuss the Russia's war against Ukraine, agree to stand up a new humanitarian assistance and disaster relief mechanism to enable Quad nations to meet future humanitarian challenges in the Indo-Pacific, and reaffirm their commitment to a free and open Indo-Pacific, in which the sovereignty and territorial integrity of all states is respected and countries are free from military, economic, and political coercion. Later, he had an intelligence briefing.

During the day, in the Oval Office, the President met with Secretary of Energy Jennifer M. Granholm, National Economic Council Director Brian C. Deese, National Security Adviser Jacob J. Sullivan, and other members of his national security team to discuss energy.

In the evening, the President had a telephone conversation with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine to receive an update on the fire at the Zaporizhzhia nuclear power plant and join President Zelenskyy in urging Russia to cease its military activities in the area and allow firefighters and emergency responders to access the site. He also had a telephone conversation with Under Secretary of Energy for Nuclear Security and Administrator of the National Nuclear Security Administration Jill Hruby to receive an update on the situation at the plant.

March 4

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, prior to his remarks on manufacturing in the South Court Auditorium of the Dwight D. Eisenhower Executive Office Building, the President participated in a virtual tour and greeting with employees of Siemens USA manufacturing facilities in Pomona, CA, and Grand Prairie, TX. Siemens USA Chief Executive Officer Barbara Humpton also attended. Later, during his meeting with President Sauli Niinistö of Finland in the Oval Office, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Magdalena Andersson of Sweden to discuss Sweden-U.S. relations. Later, he traveled to Greenville, DE, arriving in the evening.

In the evening, the President traveled to his residence, where he remained overnight.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with President Andrzej Duda of Poland to discuss the joint response, in close coordination with our allies and partners, to Russia's unprovoked and unjustified invasion of Ukraine, including ongoing efforts to impose severe consequences on Russia, the need for humanitarian assistance to Ukraine, and Poland's hospitality in hosting and assisting nearly 700,000 Ukrainians and others who have fled the war so far. President Biden underscored the U.S. commitment to the security of Poland and other North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) allies and welcomed Poland's partnership in hosting 9,000 U.S. forces, including 4,700 additional servicemembers deployed there in recent weeks, to reassure eastern flank allies, deter Russian aggression against NATO, and stand with Polish counterparts to maintain security and stability in Europe. The President announced the designation of the following individuals as members of a Presidential delegation to attend the U.S. National Day at the Expo 2020 Dubai in Dubai, United Arab Emirates, on March 6: Gina M. March 5

In the morning, the President traveled to Wilmington, DE, where, at the Hotel du Pont, he and Secretary of Labor Martin J. Walsh attended the Labor Unity Roundtable hosted by the AFL– CIO, with leaders of national labor unions, to discuss issues affecting union members, review the unprecedented economic growth and jobs numbers, including 678,000 jobs added in February and a 3.8-percent drop in the unemployment rate, and take note of administration efforts to create union jobs and protect Davis-Bacon provisions contained in the bipartisan infrastructure law and the American Rescue Plan. White House Senior Adviser Mike Donilon and Director of the Office of Public Engagement Cedric L. Richmond also attended.

Then, he had a telephone conversation with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine to highlight ongoing U.S. actions, along with those of allies, partners, and private industry, to raise the costs on Russia for its aggression in Ukraine, including the decision by Visa and Mastercard to suspend service in Russia, review his administration's efforts to surge security, humanitarian, and economic assistance to Ukraine, working closely with Congress to secure additional funding, and reiterate his concern about the recent Russian attack on a Ukrainian nuclear power plant, commending the skill and bravery of the Ukrainian operators who kept the reactors in safe condition.

March 6

In the morning, from his residence in Greenville, DE, the President was briefed on the devastating impact of tornadoes that struck Iowa on March 5, reached out to Gov. Kimberly K. Reynolds of Iowa, and directed Secretary of Homeland Security Alejandro N. discuss the latest developments regarding Russia and Ukraine, affirm their determination to continue raising the costs on Russia for its unprovoked and unjustified invasion of Ukraine, and underscore their commitment to continue providing security, economic, and humanitarian assistance to Ukraine.

During the day, the President joined portions of meetings between members of the Congressional Black Caucus and Congressional Asian Pacific American Caucus and White House senior staff to discuss shared policy priorities.

March 8

President Biden expressed appreciation for Turkey's efforts to support a diplomatic resolution to the conflict, as well as Turkey's recent engagements with regional leaders to help promote peace and stability.

March 11

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing. Later, he traveled to Philadelphia, PA.

In the afternoon, at the Hilton Philadelphia at Penn's Landing hotel, prior to his remarks at the House Democratic Caucus Issues Conference, the President greeted Speaker Nancy Pelosi, Majority Leader Steny H. Hoyer, Majority Whip James E. Clyburn, Assistant Speaker Katherine M. Clark, and Democratic Caucus Chairman Hakeem S. Jeffries and Vice Chairman Peter R. Aguilar. Later, at Hon. Luis Muñoz-Marín Elementary School, he participated in a photo line with State, local, and labor leaders. Then, he and Secretary of Education Miguel A. Cardona toured the library and a classroom with Principal Amanda Jones, received an overview on afterschool art and language programs from teachers Courtney Allred and Wilma Hernandez, and visited with students. Gov. Thomas W. Wolf of Pennsylvania, Mayor Jim Kenney of Philadelphia, Reps. Brendan F. Boyle and Mary Gay Scanlon, and American Federation of Teachers President Randi Weingarten, and National Education Association Secretary-Treasurer Noel Candelaria. During the day, the President spoke with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine to underscore his support for the Ukrainian people as they continue to defend their country against Russia's unprovoked and unjustified attack, including by surging U.S. security, humanitarian, and economic assistance to Ukraine, and update him on U.S. actions in coordination with the Group of Seven (G–7) nations and the European Union to further raise the costs on Russia.

Tomasz Piotrowski, and Commanding General of the 18th Division Gen. Jaroslaw Gromadziński of Poland; and U.S. Ambassador to Poland Mark Brzezinski. Then, he traveled to the G2A Arena Centrum Wystawienniczo-Kongresowe Województwa Podkarpackiego, where, at a barber shop, he and Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III visited with members of the U.S. Army's 82d Airborne Division who were waiting for haircuts and, in a nearby cafeteria, greeted U.S. servicemembers who had just finished a pizza lunch. During the day, the President also received a negative result on a COVID-19 test.

March 26

Then, also at the Presidential Palace, he and President Duda had a restricted bilateral meeting to discuss ongoing international efforts to impose sanctions on Russia for its unjustified and unprovoked attack on Ukraine, review their shared commitment to continue supporting the Government and people of Ukraine, thank President Duda and the people of Poland for opening their homes and hearts to Ukrainian refugees, pledge continued U.S. support for these humanitarian assistance efforts, and underscore the unwavering U.S. commitment to article 5 and the security of all North Atlantic Treaty Organization allies. The leaders discussed Poland-U.S. defense cooperation and U.S. support for Europe's efforts to reduce its reliance on Russian energy and toward meeting climate goals. Secretary Blinken and Head of International Policy Bureau Jakub Kumoch of Poland also attended. Later, he traveled to PGE Narodowy Stadium, where he was greeted by Mayor Rafal Trzaskowski of Warsaw and Prime Minister Mateusz Morawiecki of Poland. Then, they visited with Ukrainian refugees and volunteers and were briefed by Polish officials and nongovernmental organizations, such as World Central Kitchen, providing humanitarian services to refugees. Think Food Group Chair Emeritus and World Central Kitchen Founder and Chief Feeding Officer José Ramón Andrés Puerta, U.S. Ambassador to Poland Mark F. Brzezinski, Secretary Blinken, U.S. Agency for International Development Administrator Samantha Power, and World Central Kitchen Relief Team Culinary Operations Manager Elyssa Kaplan and Chef Lead Cathy Kossack also attended.

The President declared a major disaster in Washington and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State, Tribal, and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by severe winter storms, straight-line winds, flooding, landslides, and mudslides from January 1 through 15.

The President declared a major disaster exists in Puerto Rico and ordered Federal aid to supplement Commonwealth and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by a severe storm, flooding, and landslides from February 4 through 6.

March 30

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President had an intelligence briefing. Later, he had a telephone conversation with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine to discuss the ongoing work by the U.S. and its allies to deliver military, economic, and humanitarian assistance to Ukraine and impose severe costs on Russia for its aggression against Ukraine, and review the U.S. fulfillment of security assistance requests from Ukraine, the critical effects those weapons have had on the conflict, and continued efforts by the U.S., allies, and partners to identify additional capabilities to help the Ukrainian military defend its country. President Biden informed President Zelenskyy of the U.S. intention to provide Ukraine with \$500 million in direct budgetary aid and reviewed additional sanctions and humanitarian assistance announced last week. Secretary of Commerce Gina M. Raimondo accompanied him.

Later in the afternoon, upon arrival at Yokota Air Base, the President was greeted by Minister of Foreign Affairs Yoshimasa Hayashi of Japan, U.S. Ambassador to Japan Rahm I. Emanuel and his wife Amy Rule, Lt. Gen. Ricky N. Rupp, USAF, commander of U.S. Forces, Japan, and commander of the Fifth Air Force, Pacific Air Forces, and his wife Charlotte, CMS Wendell Snider, USAF, and Deputy Director of Protocol Sergio "Don" Misa. Then, he traveled to Tokyo, Japan. Secretary Raimondo accompanied him.

In the evening, the President traveled to the Chief of Mission Residence, where he participated in a room dedication in memory of former Secretary of Transportation Norman Y. Mineta with Ambassador Emanuel. U.S. Trade Representative Katherine C. Tai also attended. Then, he traveled to the Okura Tokyo hotel, where he remained overnight.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister–designate Anthony Albanese of Australia to congratulate him on his election and reaffirm the steadfast U.S. commitment to the Australia-U.S. alliance and his intention to work closely with the new Government to make it stronger still, beginning with the upcoming Quad leaders summit in Tokyo, Japan, as a vital opportunity to exchange views and drive practical cooperation in the Indo-Pacific.

He also had a telephone conversation with Gov. Gregory W. Abbott of Texas to offer any Federal assistance needed in the aftermath of the shooting.

May 25

June 21

Prior to the photo, the President answered a few questions from reporters. He remained overnight at the Schloss Elmau.

June 27

In the morning, at the Schloss Elmau, on the Yoga Pavilion, the President participated in a session on Ukraine with leaders of Group of Seven (G–7) nations and the European Union. President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine joined the session via videoconference.

In the afternoon, at the Schloss Elmau, in the Front Courtyard, the President participated in a greeting and family photo with G–7 and European Union leaders, outreach partners, and heads of international organizations, followed by a working lunch on climate, energy, and health in the Fidelio restaurant. Then, also in the Front Courtyard, they participated in a working session on food security and gender equality. The President remained overnight at the Schloss Elmau.

The White House announced further details on the President's travel to Jerusalem, Israel, the West Bank, and Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, from July 13 through 16.

Later in the evening, the President traveled to the Palacio Real, where he and Dr. Biden attended a dinner for heads of state and government and heads of international organizations invited to the official North Atlantic Treaty Organization summit and their spouses, hosted by King Felipe and Queen Letizia of Spain, and participated in a family photo. Later, they returned to the InterContinental Madrid hotel, where they remained overnight.

During the day, at the Schloss Elmau, on the margins of the Group of Seven (G–7) nations summit, the President met with President Macky Sall of Senegal, the current chair of the African Union, to discuss the impact of Russia's war against Ukraine on food security in Africa, the coming G–7 announcement on further efforts to support food security, and the G–7 Partnership for Global Infrastructure and Investment, including a new flagship project to invest in a new industrial-scale vaccine manufacturing facility in Senegal with the potential to produce hundreds of millions of doses of vaccines annually for COVID–19 and other diseases.

September 16

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, on the West Wing Portico, the President participated in the departure of President Matamela Cyril Ramaphosa of South Africa.

Later in the afternoon, in the Oval Office, the President had separate meetings with Cherelle Griner, wife, and Lindsay Colas, agent, of WNBA's Phoenix Mercury center Brittney Griner, who was arrested by Russian authorities on February 17 and sentenced to prison on August 4, and Elizabeth Whelan, sister of Paul N. Whelan, a U.S. citizen who was arrested and held on espionage charges by Russian security services in Moscow, Russia, on December 28, 2018, to reassure them of his commitment to secure the release of their loved ones as soon as possible, as well other U.S. nationals who are wrongfully detained or held hostage in Russia and around the world, and offer his support to their families, in providing all possible assistance while his administration pursues every avenue to bring them home. National Security Adviser Jacob J. Sullivan also attended both meetings.

September 17

In the morning, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to London, United Kingdom, arriving in the evening.

In the evening, upon arrival at London Stansted Airport, the President and Dr. Biden were greeted on the tarmac by U.S. Ambassador to the United Kingdom Jane Hartley and her husband Ralph Schlosstein; and Lord Lieutenant of Essex Jennifer Tolhurst and Special Representative of the Foreign Secretary Nicholas Jarrold of the United Kingdom. Then, they traveled to the Winfield House, the residence of the U.S. Ambassador to the United Kingdom, where they remained overnight.

September 18

In the afternoon, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Westminster Hall, where they were greeted by Lady Usher of the Black Rod Sarah Clarke and paid respects at the public viewing of Queen Elizabeth II of the United Kingdom. U.S. Ambassador to the United Kingdom Jane Hartley also attended. Then, they traveled to Lancaster House, where they were greeted by Secretary of State for Foreign, Commonwealth, and Development Affairs James Cleverly and Head of Government Hospitality Robert Alexander. Later, they traveled to Buckingham Palace, where they were greeted by Master of the Household Vice Adm. Tony Johnstone and attended a reception hosted by King Charles III.

In the evening, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to the Winfield House, the residence of the U.S. Ambassador to the United Kingdom, where they remained overnight.

The White House announced that the President will travel to New York City from September 20 through 22.

The White House announced that the President will travel to Wilmington, DE, on September 24 and 25.

The White House announced that the President will welcome Major League Baseball's Atlanta Braves to the White House on September 26 to celebrate their 2021 World Series Championship.

The President declared an emergency in Puerto Rico and ordered Federal assistance to supplement Commonwealth and local response efforts due to the emergency conditions resulting from Tropical Storm Fiona beginning on September 17 and continuing.

September 19

In the morning, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Westminster Abbey, where they were greeted by Dean of Westminster Abbey Rev. David Hoyle and attended the state funeral service for Queen Elizabeth II of the United Kingdom.

In the afternoon, the President and Dr. Biden returned to Washington, DC. While en route aboard Air Force One, he had a telephone conversation with Gov. Pedro R. Pierluisi of Puerto Rico to discuss the island's immediate needs in the wake of Hurricane Fiona's landfall and the surge of Federal support available to local communities as damage assessments and recovery efforts continue.

During the day, the President had a conversation with Charlene Cakora, to inform her that his administration had secured the release of her brother, Mark R. Frerichs, a U.S. civil engineer who was kidnapped in Afghanistan on January 31, 2020, and was believed to be held by the Haqqani Network, a faction of the Afghan Taliban.

September 20

In the afternoon, the President traveled to New York City.

In the evening, the President traveled to a private residence. Later, he traveled to the InterContinental New York Barclay hotel, where he remained overnight.

The President announced his intention to nominate Roger F. Nyhus to be Ambassador to Barbados, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia, Antigua and Barbuda, Dominica, Grenada, and Saint Vincent and the Grenadines.

The President announced his intention to nominate Lynne M. Tracy to be Ambassador to Russia.

The President announced his intention to nominate Travis Hill to be a member of the Board of Directors for the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and, upon confirmation, designate him Vice Chair.

The President announced his intention to nominate Jonathan McKernan to be a member of the Board of Directors for the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

The President declared a major disaster for the Muscogee (Creek) Nation and ordered Federal aid to supplement the Tribal Nation's response and recovery efforts in the areas affected by severe storms, tornadoes, and flooding from May 2 through 8.

September 21

In the morning, the President traveled to United Nations Headquarters, where, he participated in a pull-aside meeting with President Csaba Kőrös of the 77th Session of the U.N. General Assembly. U.S. Permanent Representative to the United Nations Linda Thomas-Greenfield and National Security Adviser Jacob J. Sullivan also attended.

In the afternoon, the President traveled to 583 Park Avenue, where, prior to his remarks at the U.S-hosted replenishment conference for the Global Fund To Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria, he participated in a pull-aside meeting with President Emmanuel Macron of France to reaffirm their continued support for Ukraine's efforts to defend itself against Russian aggression and discuss efforts to prevent Iran from acquiring a nuclear weapon, as well as ongoing cooperation in the Indo-Pacific region and challenges posed by China. On the margins of the pledging conference, he also had a meeting with President Yoon Suk Yeol of South Korea to reaffirm their commitment to strengthening the South Korea-U.S. alliance, ensuring close cooperation to address the threat posed by North Korea, and discuss ongoing cooperation on a broad range of priority issues, including supply chain resilience, critical technologies, economic and energy security, global health, and climate change.

In the evening, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to the American Museum of Natural History, where they were greeted by President of the Board of Trustees Ellen V. Futter and Director Lisa Gugenheim and hosted a leaders' reception for heads of delegation to the United Nations General Assembly.

During the day, at U.N. Headquarters, on the margins of the General Assembly, the President met with Prime Minister Fumio Kishida of Japan to discuss the importance of advancing a free and open Indo-Pacific, emphasize the importance of strengthening and modernizing their security alliance, and thank the Prime Minister for Japan's historic \$1.08 billion pledge to the Global Fund's seventh round of replenishment.

The White House announced that the President will travel to Fort Lauderdale, FL, on September 27.

September 22

Later, he traveled to a private residence.

In the evening, the President returned to Washington, DC, arriving in the evening. His granddaughter Finnegan accompanied him.

September 23

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing.

During the day, the President and Vice President Kamala D. Harris met with members of their economic team, including Secretary of the Treasury Janet L. Yellen, Secretary of Commerce Gina M. Raimondo, and Chair of the Council of Economic Advisers Cecilia E. Rouse, to discuss a U.S. economic strategy focused on long-term growth and investment, increased manufacturing, and fiscal discipline. The President reiterated his commitment to bringing down prices, including by implementing the historic reforms in the recently enacted Inflation Reduction Act and CHIPs and Science Act, with the goal of transitioning to more stable growth without giving up our historic economic gains, and directed the team to press the energy industry to ensure that the drop in global oil prices is passed along at the pump to consumers.

The White House announced that the President and Dr. Biden will travel to Wilmington, DE, on September 24.

The President declared a major disaster in Alaska and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State, Tribal, and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by a severe storm, flooding, and landslides from September 15 through 20.

September 24

In the morning, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Greenville, DE. Later, he traveled to Hockessin, DE, where, at the Sanford School, he attended his granddaughter Natalie's field hockey game.

In the afternoon, the President returned to his residence in Greenville, where he remained overnight.

In the evening, via a prerecorded video message, the President and Dr. Biden delivered remarks to the Global Citizen Festival in New York City to thank the climate advocates who helped to secure passage of the Inflation Reduction Act, highlight the law's historic clean energy investments toward tackling the climate crisis and lowering energy costs, and encourage attendees to continue driving the fight against climate change.

The White House announced that the President's scheduled travel to Orlando and Fort Lauderdale, FL, on September 27 had been postponed due to Tropical Storm Ian.

The President declared an emergency in Florida and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State, Tribal, and local response efforts due to the emergency conditions resulting from Tropical Storm Ian beginning on September 23 and continuing.

September 25

In the afternoon, at Fieldstone Golf Club, the President played golf with Ron Olivere, father in-law of his late son Beau. He remained overnight at his residence in Greenville.

The White House announced that the President will return to Washington, DC, on September 26.

September 26

In the morning, the President returned to Washington, DC.

The White House announced that the President and Dr. Biden will welcome President Emmanuel Macron of France and his wife Brigitte for a state visit to the U.S., including a state dinner at the White House, on December 1.

September 27

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing.

In the morning, the President had separate telephone conversation with Mayor Jane Castor of Tampa, FL, Mayor Kenneth T. Welch of St. Petersburg, FL, and Mayor Frank Hibbard of Clearwater, FL, to discuss preparations for the potential impacts from Hurricane Ian. Hurricane Ian, review ongoing efforts Federal, State, and local governments have taken to preposition resources and initiate evacuation operations, including the resources made available through the Federal emergency declaration approved by the President over the weekend. Federal Emergency Management Agency Administrator Deanne Bennett Criswell also joined the calls, with White House Press Secretary Karine Jeanne-Pierre attending in the Oval Office.

In the evening, the President had a telephone conversation with Gov. Ronald D. DeSantis of Florida to discuss the steps the Federal Government is taking to help Florida prepare for Hurricane Ian, expected to make landfall on Florida's Gulf Coast as a major hurricane in subsequent days, and commit to continued close coordination.

September 28

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing. Later, prior to his remarks at the White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health, at the Ronald Reagan Building and International Trade Center, he participated in a photo line with Secretary of Agriculture Thomas J. Vilsack, Sens. Cory A. Booker, Deborah A. Stabenow, and Michael K. Braun, and Reps. James P. McGovern and Rosa L. DeLauro.

In the afternoon, in the Roosevelt Room, the President received a briefing from his senior economic team, including Secretary of the Treasury Janet L. Yellen, Secretary of Energy Jennifer M. Granholm, Secretary of Labor Martin J. Walsh, and Chair of the Council of Economic Advisers Cecilia E. Rouse, for an update on global financial and energy markets. They reported that the national economy remained resilient in the face of global challenges and discussed the need to continue to making progress in reducing prices and implementing the administration's public investment plan in national infrastructure, manufacturing, and the clean energy transition. The President directed his team to stay in frequent touch with partners, allies, and key market actors and brief him regularly as conditions evolve.

In the evening, prior to his remarks at the Democratic Governors Association reception, at a private residence, the President participated in a photo line with Gov. Philip D. Murphy of New

Jersey and his wife Tammy, Gov. John C. Carney, Jr., of Delaware, and Mayor Muriel E. Bowser of Washington, DC.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Mayor Kevin B. Anderson of Fort Myers, FL, and left messages for Mayor John Gunter of Cape Coral, FL, Mayor Erik J. Arroyo of Sarasota, FL, and Chair of the Board of County Commissioners Bill Truex of Charlotte County, FL, to let them know their communities have full Federal Government support behind them as Hurricane Ian made landfall on the Gulf Coast and that Federal agencies were prepared to assist with ongoing needs including support for the elderly members of the community, families that live in mobile homes, and other community members particularly vulnerable to the impacts of the storm.

September 29

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing. He also had a telephone conversation with Gov. Ronald D. DeSantis of Florida to discuss his administration's effort to support Florida in response to Hurricane Ian, including the issuance of a disaster declaration, and sending his Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Administrator Deanne Bennett Criswell to Florida the next day to monitor response efforts and see where additional support might be needed.

Also in the morning, the President had a telephone conversation with Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners Cecil Pendergrass of Lee County, FL, to discuss ways administration efforts to support Lee County in the immediate aftermath of Hurricane Ian, including meeting immediate needs for search-and-rescue efforts and power restoration as well as helping to address challenges faced by local hospitals and problems presented by damaged roads and bridges, and reassure him of continued Federal support leveraging all the resources at its disposal. FEMA Administrator Criswell also participated.

In the afternoon, at FEMA headquarters, the President was greeted by Secretary of Homeland Security Alejandro N. Mayorkas and FEMA Administrator Criswell and received a briefing on impacts from Hurricane Ian and ongoing Federal response efforts.

In the evening, on the North Portico, the President welcomed leaders of Pacific Island nations and participated in a family photo. Then, in the State Dining Room, he hosted a dinner for the leaders and their delegations.

During the day, the President spoke with nearly 50 elected officials and community leaders from across Pennsylvania as part of the White House "Communities in Action: Building a Better Pennsylvania" event hosted by the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs and Office of Public Engagement.

The President made additional disaster assistance available to Alaska by authorizing an increase in the level of Federal funding for emergency protective measures undertaken in the State as a result of a severe storm, flooding, and landslides from September 15 through 20.

The President declared a major disaster in Florida and ordered Federal aid to supplement State, Tribal, and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by Hurricane Ian beginning on September 23 and continuing.

The President declared an emergency in South Carolina and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State, Tribal, and local response efforts due to the emergency conditions resulting from Hurricane Ian beginning on September 25 and continuing.

September 30

In the morning, the President had an intelligence briefing. Later, at the U.S. Supreme Court, the President and Dr. Biden were greeted by Jeff Minear, Senior Counselor to Chief Justice John G. Roberts, Jr., and signed the guestbook, with Chief Justice Roberts joining them. Then, in the Chief Justice's Conference Room, they participated in a greeting with Supreme Court Justices, and Associate Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson's husband Patrick and daughters Leila and Talia. Vice President Kamala D. Harris and her husband Douglas C. Emhoff also participated. Then, they attended the investiture ceremony for Justice Jackson.

Also in the morning, the President had a telephone conversation with Gov. Henry D. McMaster of South Carolina to discuss Federal support for South Carolina in preparation for the landfall of Hurricane Ian, including the issuance of an emergency declaration the previous night, and assurances to provide whatever assistance the people of South Carolina need. He also had a telephone conversation with Gov. Ronald D. DeSantis of Florida to discuss the impacts of Hurricane Ian and ongoing recovery efforts.

In the afternoon, in the Oval Office, the President signed into law H.R. 8656, which designates the clinic of the Department of Veterans Affairs in Mishawaka, IN, as the Jackie Walorski VA Clinic. The late Rep. Jacqueline R. Walorski's husband Dean A. Swihart, mother Martha C. Walorski, other family and former staff, Speaker of the House of Representatives Nancy Pelosi, House Minority Leader Kevin O. McCarthy, and Reps. James A. Baird and James E. Banks also attended.

During the day, the President participated in a conference call with more than 1,200 rabbis and clergy members from across the Nation to commemorate the Jewish High Holidays, reaffirm his longstanding commitment to issues of importance to the Jewish community, and express his deep gratitude for their leadership and service. He also had a telephone conversation with Lt. Cmdr. Christopher Hooper, USCG, and Aviation Survival Technician Second Class Zach Loesch, USCG, to thank them for the heroic work that they and their Coast Guard colleagues performed during search-and-rescue operations in response to Hurricane Ian and ask for a report on their ongoing work to rescue Floridians and whether any additional support was needed to accelerate additional rescues.

The President announced his intention to appoint Jules Buenabenta as a member of the President's Advisory Commission on Advancing Educational Equity, Excellence, and Economic Opportunity for Hispanics and, upon appointment, designate him Chair.

The President declared a major disaster exists in Virginia and ordered Federal assistance to supplement Commonwealth, Tribal, and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by flooding and mudslides on July 13 and 14.

The President declared a major disaster for the Seminole Tribe of Florida and ordered Federal aid to supplement the Tribe's efforts in the areas affected by Hurricane Ian beginning on September 23 and continuing.

October 1

The White House announced that the President and Dr. Biden will travel to Puerto Rico and Florida on October 3 and 5, respectively.

The President declared an emergency in North Carolina and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State, Tribal, and local response efforts due to the emergency conditions resulting from Hurricane Ian beginning on September 28 and continuing.

October 2

The White House announced further details on the President and Dr. Biden's travel to Ponce, PR, on October 3.

The White House announced that the President will travel to Wilmington, DE, on October 7.

October 3

In the morning, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Ponce, PR, arriving in the afternoon.

In the afternoon, upon arrival at the Mercedita International Airport, the President and Dr. Biden were greeted on the tarmac by Reps. Nydia M. Velázquez and Jennifer A. González-Colón, Gov. Pedro R. Pierluisi of Puerto Rico and his sister Cary, and Mayor Luis Irizarry Pabón of Ponce. Then, at the Port of Ponce, he received a briefing on the impact of Hurricane Fiona on the island and ongoing recovery efforts and participated in a photo line with Territory and local officials. Later, they traveled to Centro Sor Isolina Ferré Aguayo School, where, in the gymnasium, they participated in a pull-aside meeting with families and community leaders impacted by Hurricane Fiona and visited and posed for photographs with volunteers gathering groceries and household supplies for hurricane-affected residents. Federal Emergency Management Agency Administrator Deanne Bennett Criswell also attended. While at the school, they also participated in a photo line with Puerto Rico Secretary of Health Carlos R. Mellado López, Secretary of Education Eliezer Ramos Parés, Secretary of Family Services Carmen Ana Gonzalez-Magaz, and Secretary of Housing William Rodríguez Rodríguez. Then, they returned to Washington, DC, arriving in the evening.

October 4

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President and Vice President Kamala D. Harris had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, in the Private Dining Room, the President and Vice President Harris had lunch.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Fumio Kishida of Japan to reinforce U.S. commitment to Japan's defense following North Korea's longrange ballistic missile launch over Japan on October 3, condemn the missile test in the strongest terms, recognizing the launch as a danger to the Japanese people, destabilizing to the region, and a clear violation of U.N. Security Council resolutions. The leaders confirmed their commitment to continued close coordination of their immediate and longer term response bilaterally, trilaterally with South Korea, and with the international community, discussed the importance of immediate return and resolution of the cases of Japanese citizens abducted by North Korea, and resolved to continue every effort to limit North Korea's ability to support its unlawful ballistic missile and weapons of mass destruction programs.

Also during the day, the President had a telephone conversation with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine to underscore that the U.S. would never recognize Russia's purported annexation of Ukrainian territory, pledge continued support for Ukraine as it defended itself from Russian aggression, including the provision of a new tranche of \$625 million security assistance including additional weapons and equipment, High Mobility Artillery Rocket System (HIMARS) technology, artillery systems and ammunition, and armored vehicles. President Biden also affirmed continued U.S. readiness to impose severe costs on any individual, entity, or country providing support to Russia's annexation attempt, welcomed the success of the agreement to allow the safe export of Ukrainian grain to global markets, and noted ongoing U.S. efforts to rally the world behind Ukraine. Vice President Harris also joined the call.

October 5

In the morning, the President and Dr. Biden traveled to Fort Myers, FL, arriving in the afternoon.

In the afternoon, upon arrival at the Southwest Florida International Airport, the President and Dr. Biden were greeted on the tarmac by Rep. Byron Donalds, Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners Cecil Pendergrass of Lee County, FL, and a group of first responders. Then, they boarded Marine One for an aerial tour surveying communities damaged by Hurricane Ian. Federal Emergency Management Agency Administrator Deanne Bennett Criswell, Homeland Security Adviser Elizabeth D. Sherwood-Randall, Chairman Pendergrass, and Adviser to the First Lady Anthony Bernal accompanied them. Later, upon arrival in Fisherman's Wharf, they were greeted by Gov. Ronald D. DeSantis of Florida and his wife Casey, participated in a walking tour of the damaged wharf, visited with small-business owners and local residents impacted by Hurricane Ian, and received an operational briefing by Federal, State, and local officials on current response and recovery efforts.

December 22
