January 20

In the afternoon, at the U.S. Capitol, following his swearing-in and Inaugural Address in the Capitol Rotunda and remarks to an overflow crowd in Emancipation Hall, the President attended an inaugural lunch in the National Statuary Hall.

January 21

In the morning, at the Washington National Cathedral, the President and Mrs. Trump attended a prayer service.

In the evening, the President had a telephone conversation with Lyn Ulbricht, mother of Ross W. Ulbricht, founder of the Silk Road e-commerce website, to discuss his decision to grant a pardon to her son.

During the day, the President met with Speaker of the House of Representatives J. Michael Johnson and Senate Majority Leader John R. Thune.

January 22

In the afternoon, the President met with Reps. Donald J. Bacon, Brian K. Fitzpatrick, and Michael V. Lawler.

During the day, in the Oval Office, the President participated in an interview with Sean Hannity of Fox News Channel's "Hannity" program for later broadcast. He was also briefed on the shooting in Nashville, TN.

Also during the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Crown Prince Mohammad bin Salman bin Abd al-Aziz Al Saud of Saudi Arabia to discuss efforts to bring stability to the Middle East, bolster regional security, and combat terrorism, as well as Saudi Arabia's international economic ambitions and Saudi Arabia-U.S. trade relations.

The President announced the nomination of L. Brent Bozell III to be Chief Executive Officer of the U.S. Agency for Global Media.

The President announced the nomination of Andrew F. Puzder to be U.S. Ambassador to the European Union.

The President announced the appointment of Sean Curran as Director of the U.S. Secret Service.

January 23

In the afternoon, the President had an intelligence briefing. Later, he had a telephone conversation with President Nayib Bukele of El Salvador to discuss cooperation on stopping illegal immigration and cracking down on transnational gangs such as Tren de Aragua. The President also praised President Bukele's exemplary leadership in the region. Later, he recorded a video message. Then, he participated in a swearing-in ceremony for senior staff.

January 24

In the morning, the President and Mrs. Trump traveled to Fletcher, NC, where, upon arrival at Asheville Regional Airport, they were greeted on the tarmac by Gov. William B. Lee of Tennessee, Republican National Committee Chair Michael Whatley, and Gov. Joshua H. Stein of North Carolina. Then, they greeted supporters.

In the afternoon, the President traveled to Swannanoa, NC, where he met with families affected by Hurricane Helene. Later, he traveled to Los Angeles, CA, where, upon arrival at the Los Angeles International Airport, he was greeted on the tarmac by Gov. Gavin C. Newsom of California. Then, he toured the Pacific Palisades neighborhood to view areas damaged by recent wildfires and received a briefing on the response to the fires.

In the evening, while aboard Marine One en route to Los Angeles International Airport, the President had a telephone conversation with Secretary of Defense Peter B. Hegseth to congratulate him on his Senate confirmation. Then, he traveled to Las Vegas, NV, where, at the Trump International Hotel Las Vegas, he remained overnight.

The White House announced that the President will travel to Las Vegas, NV, on January 25.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with King Abdullah II of Jordan to thank him for his longtime friendship and discuss the importance of regional peace, security, and stability. The King congratulated the President on his Inauguration.

January 26

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Keir Starmer of the United Kingdom to offer his condolences for the recent death of the Prime Minister's brother Nick, express his best wishes to the British royal family, and discuss the recent release of Israeli-British citizen Emily Damari from Hamas captivity in Gaza, Palestinian Territories, and how both countries can promote a fair bilateral economic relationship. He also had a telephone conversation with King Hamad bin Isa Al Khalifa of Bahrain to discuss their mutual support for regional peace and security, including through work to promote peace through the Abraham Accords. The King congratulated the President on his Inauguration.

January 27

In the evening, the President returned to Washington, DC.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Narendra Modi of India to discuss expanding and deepening India-U.S. cooperation on a range of regional issues, including security in the Indo-Pacific, the Middle East, and Europe, as well as plans for the Prime Minister to visit the White House, underscoring the strength of the bilateral friendship and strategic ties. Both leaders emphasized their commitment to advancing the U.S.-India strategic partnership and the Indo-Pacific Quad partnership, with India hosting Quad leaders for the first time later this year. The President emphasized the importance of India increasing its procurement of U.S.-made security equipment and moving toward a fair trading relationship.

January 28

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, in the Oval Office, the President met with White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt to discuss the reported sightings of drones in New Jersey airspace.

January 29

In the evening, the President was briefed on the collision of a military helicopter and an American Airlines passenger aircraft outside of Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport.

January 30

In the morning, the President was updated on the collision of a military helicopter and an American Airlines passenger aircraft at Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport on January 29.

In the afternoon, in the Private Dining Room, the President and Vice President James D. "J.D." Vance had lunch.

January 31

In the afternoon, the President met with Jensen Huang, founder, president, and chief executive officer of NVIDIA Corp., to discuss concerns about artificial intelligence technology developments in China. He also met with Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt in the Oval Office to discuss the President's implementation of tariffs on certain imports from China, Mexico, and Canada into the U.S. Later, he traveled to West Palm Beach, FL, arriving in the evening.

In the evening, upon arrival at Palm Beach International Airport, the President traveled to Palm Beach, FL, where, at his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club, he remained overnight.

The White House announced that the President will welcome Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of Israel to the White House on February 4.

The President announced the nomination of Benjamin Black to be Chief Executive Officer of the U.S. Development Finance Corporation.

February 1

In the morning, the President traveled to the Trump International Golf Club in West Palm Beach, FL.

In the afternoon, the President returned to Palm Beach, FL, where, at his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club, he remained overnight.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with President Abdelattah Said Elsi of Egypt to thank him for his friendship and discuss the Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam project, as well as Egypt's important role in the release of hostages from Gaza, Palestinian Territories. President Elsi congratulated the President on his Inauguration and expressed his confidence that his leadership could help promote Middle East peace.

The President announced that he had authorized U.S. airstrikes on Islamic State of Iraq and Syria (ISIS) terrorist organization targets in Somalia.

The President announced that he had initiated new U.S. tariffs on imports from Canada, Mexico, and China.

February 2

In the morning, the President traveled to the Trump International Golf Club in West Palm Beach, FL.

In the afternoon, the President returned to his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club in Palm Beach, FL. Later, he returned to Washington, DC, arriving in the evening.

The President announced his intention to withhold future U.S. financial assistance to South Africa due to its land reform practices.

February 3

In the morning, the President had a telephone conversation with President Claudia Sheinbaum Pardo of Mexico to discuss her decision to supply 10,000 Mexican military personnel to the Mexico-U.S. border to aid in stopping the flow of fentanyl and illegal migrants. The President agreed to pause the anticipated tariffs for 1 month to allow Secretary of State Marco A. Rubio, Secretary of the Treasury Scott K.H. Bessent, and Secretary of Commerce Howard W. Lutnick to negotiate with high-level representatives from Mexico.

In the afternoon, in the Oval Office, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Justin P.J. Trudeau of Canada.

The President announced the nomination of Michael Ellis to be Deputy Director of the Central Intelligence Agency.

The President announced the nomination of Sean Parnell to be Assistant to the Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs and Chief Pentagon Spokesman.

The President announced the nomination of Joe Kent to be Director of the National Counterterrorism Center.

February 4

In the afternoon, on the West Wing Portico, the President welcomed Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of Israel. Later, in the Cabinet Room, they had an expanded bilateral meeting. Then, in the State Dining Room, they had dinner.

The President announced the appointment of Pierre Yared as a member of the Council of Economic Advisers and, upon appointment, his designation as Vice Chairman.

The President announced the appointment of Kim Ruhl as a member of the Council of Economic Advisers.

February 5

In the afternoon, in the Oval Office, the President met with Gov. Gregory W. Abbott of Texas. Later, also in the Oval Office, he met with Gov. Gavin C. Newsom of California.

The White House announced that the President will travel to West Palm Beach, FL, on February 7.

February 6

In the morning, in the Cabinet Room, the President met with Republican Members of Congress to discuss tax policy and the Federal budget.

The White House announced that the President will travel to New Orleans, LA, on February 9.

The President announced the nomination of Gadyaces "Gady" Serralta to be Director of the U.S. Marshals Service.

The President announced the nomination of Thomas Rose to be U.S. Ambassador to Poland.

The President announced the nomination of Michael E. Kavoukjian to be U.S. Ambassador to Norway.

The President announced the nomination of Melinda Hildebrand to be U.S. Ambassador to Costa Rica.

February 7

In the morning, on the West Wing Portico, the President greeted Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba of Japan upon his arrival at the White House and responded to a reporter's question. Then, in the Oval Office, he had a meeting with Prime Minister Ishiba, followed by a meeting and lunch in the Cabinet Room.

In the afternoon, in the Roosevelt Room, the President signed Executive orders. Later, he traveled to West Palm Beach, FL. He also had a telephone conversation with President Jose Raul Mulino Quintero of Panama.

In the evening, upon arrival at Palm Beach International Airport, he traveled to Palm Beach, FL, where, at his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club, he remained overnight.

The President announced his decision to dismiss multiple members of the Board of Trustees for the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, including Chairman David M. Rubenstein, and his intention to appoint himself as Chairman.

The President announced his decision to revoke the security clearance and daily intelligence briefing privileges for former President Joseph R. Biden, Jr.

The President announced the appointment of Paula White-Cain as a Special Government Employee and Senior Adviser of the White House Faith Office.

The President announced the appointment of Jennifer S. Korn as Faith Director of the White House Faith Office.

The President announced the appointment of Jackson Lane as Deputy Director of Faith Engagement in the White House Faith Office.

February 8

In the morning, the President traveled to the Trump International Golf Club West Palm Beach in West Palm Beach, FL.

In the afternoon, the President traveled to Palm Beach, FL, where, at his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club, he remained overnight.

February 9

In the morning, the President traveled to West Palm Beach, FL, where, at the Trump International Golf Club West Palm Beach, he played golf with Eldrick T. "Tiger" Woods.

In the afternoon, the President traveled to New Orleans, LA. He was accompanied by his son Eric and daughter-in-law Lara, his daughter Ivanka, Secretary of the Interior Douglas J. Burgum, Rep. Thomas E. Emmer, Jr., and Sens. James E. Risch, David H. McCormick, Lindsey O. Graham, John A. Barasso III, Timothy E. Scott, Katie Britt, Thomas H. Tuberville, Roger W. Marshall, and Eric Schmitt, and spouses and family members. While en route aboard Air Force One, he signed the proclamation designating February 9 as Gulf of America Day. Later, upon

arrival at Caesars Superdome, he greeted a group of first responders and survivors of the terrorist attack in New Orleans on January 1, participated in an interview with Brett Baier of Fox News, and attended Super Bowl LIX.

In the evening, upon arrival at Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base New Orleans, prior to boarding Air Force One, the President posed for photographs with local law enforcement. Then, he returned to Washington, DC, arriving early the following morning.

The President announced his decision to withhold aid to South Africa due to its land reform practices, which was formally initiated by Executive Order 14204 of February 7, "Addressing Egregious Actions of the Republic of South Africa."

The President announced that he had instructed Secretary of the Treasury Scott K.H. Bessent to discontinue minting operations for pennies.

February 10

In the morning, upon arrival at the White House from Joint Base Andrews, MD, the President exited Marine One and answered a reporter's question about tariffs. Later, in the Oval Office, he had an intelligence briefing.

During the day, the President recorded an interview with Mark Levin of Westwood One's "The Mark Levin Show" for later broadcast.

The President announced that he had named Richard A. Grenell as interim Executive Director of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

The President announced that he had dismissed the current membership of the Boards of Visitors for the Army, Air Force, Navy, and Coast Guard service academies.

The President announced the nomination of Howard Brodie to be U.S. Ambassador to Finland.

February 11

In the morning, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Anthony Albanese of Australia to discuss Australia-U.S. cooperation on defense industrial capacity, mutually beneficial trade and investment, resilient critical mineral supply chains, and concerns about China's aggressiveness, and emphasize their commitment to advancing Australia-U.S. relations and upholding a free and open Indo-Pacific.

In the afternoon, on the West Wing Portico, the President greeted King Abdullah II and Crown Prince Hussein of Jordan. Then, in the Oval Office, they had a meeting. Later, in the Cabinet Room, he had a meeting and lunch with King Abdullah and Crown Prince Hussein. During their meetings, the President and King Abdullah discussed Jordan-U.S. relations and the situation in Gaza, Palestinian Territories, with the President reiterating that Hamas must release all hostages, including all U.S. citizens, by February 15, and asked for the King's assistance in ensuring that Hamas, as well as the leaders of the region, understand the severity of the situation. The President thanked the King for Jordan's longstanding commitment to promoting and advancing regional peace and discussed the President's goal of ensuring the reconstruction of Gaza and providing options for the people of Gaza in order to live in security, dignity, and free of Hamas's administration. King Abdullah congratulated President Trump on his successful first weeks in office and thanked the President for his leadership in securing the release of hostages from Gaza and a temporary pause in hostilities.

The President announced the nomination of Terry Cole to be Administrator of the Drug Enforcement Administration.

In the afternoon, the President met with White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt and his national security team. Later, in the Oval Office, he signed Executive orders. He also posted an entry to his Truth Social feed on his being elected Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

During the day, in the Oval Office, the President had a telephone conversation with President Zelenskyy to discuss the ongoing Russian conflict and efforts to bring peace, including an upcoming meeting in Munich, Germany, with Vice President James D. "J.D." Vance and Secretary of State Marco A. Rubio leading a U.S. delegation. National Security Adviser Waltz also attended.

President Al-Sharaa concluded with his hope that Syria would serve as a critical link in facilitating trade between east and west and invited U.S. companies to invest in Syrian oil and gas. President Recep Tayyip Erdogan of Turkey joined the meeting by telephone and offered his appreciation for President Trump's decision to lift U.S. sanctions on Syria. The leaders also discussed the Russia-Ukraine war and the conflict in Gaza, Palestinian Territories. Then, the President participated in a Gulf Cooperation Council family photograph and leaders meeting.

Upon arrival at the Stansted Airport, they traveled to London, United Kingdom, where, upon arrival at the Winfield House, the U.S. Ambassador's residence, the President spoke with reporters and answered questions. They remained overnight at the Winfield House.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Narendra Modi of India to wish him a happy birthday and thank him for his support in efforts to end the conflict between Ukraine and Russia.

September 17

In the afternoon, the President and Mrs. Trump traveled to Windsor, United Kingdom. Upon arrival at Windsor Castle, they participated in an arrival ceremony, stage coach procession, and review of the honor guard with King Charles III and Queen Consort Camilla. U.S. Ambassador to the United Kingdom Warren Stephens and his wife Harriet, White House Chief of Staff Susan Wiles, Secretary of State Marco A. Rubio, Secretary of the Treasury Scott K.H. Bessent, and Special Envoy to the Middle East Steven C. Witkoff; and Prince William and Princess Catherine of Wales also attended. Then, also at Windsor Castle, in the Royal Collection Display, they viewed artifacts exhibiting British-U.S. relations with King Charles and Queen Consort Camilla. Prince William, Princess Catherine, Secretary Rubio, and Secretary Bessent also attended. Later, they had a private luncheon with King Charles and Queen Consort Camilla.

Later in the afternoon, at St. George's Chapel, the President and Mrs. Trump paid respects at the tomb of Queen Elizabeth II, participated in a wreath-laying ceremony, and listened to a

children's choir perform. Chief of Staff Wiles, Secretary Rubio, Secretary Bessent, and Deputy Chief of Staff Daniel J. Scavino, Jr., also attended. Following the ceremony, the President visited with the girls and boys in the choir and participated in a tour of the chapel with Mrs. Trump.

Later in the afternoon, on the East Lawn of Windsor Castle, the President and Mrs. Trump attended a "Beating Retreat" military ceremony and viewed a flyover of F-35 and Red Arrow military aircraft with King Charles and Queen Consort Camilla.

In the evening, in St. George's Hall at Windsor Castle, the President and Mrs. Trump attended a state banquet and after-dinner reception with King Charles and Queen Consort Camilla. The President's daughter Tiffany and her husband Michael Boulos also attended. They remained overnight at Windsor Castle.

The President announced his decision to designate "Antifa" as a major terrorist organization and his recommendation that those funding it be "thoroughly" investigated.

September 18

In the morning, at Windsor Castle, the President and Mrs. Trump participated in a farewell with King Charles III and Queen Consort Camilla. Later, the President traveled to Buckinghamshire, United Kingdom, where, at the Chequers estate, he toured a collection of artifacts of former Prime Minister Winston Churchill and met with Prime Minister Keir Starmer of the United Kingdom. Secretary of State Marco A. Rubio, White House Chief of Staff Susan Wiles, Deputy Chief of Staff for Legislative, Political, and Public Affairs James Blair, Deputy Chief of Staff for Policy Stephen Miller, Personal Aide to the President Walt Nauta, and Communications Adviser Margo Martin accompanied him.

In the afternoon, at the Chequers estate, following a reception with business leaders, the President and Prime Minister Starmer viewed a demonstration of skydivers. Secretary Rubio, Secretary Bessent, Secretary of Commerce Howard W. Lutnick, Chief of Staff Wiles, White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt, Deputy Chief of Staff Miller, Communications Director Steven Cheung, and Deputy Chief of Staff Blair also attended. Later, he traveled to Stansted, United Kingdom. Then, he and Mrs. Trump returned to Washington, DC, arriving in the evening. The President's daughter Tiffany and her husband Michael Boulos accompanied them.

During the day, at the Chequers estate, the President recorded an interview with Martha MacCallum, anchor of Fox News Channel's "The Story" program, for later broadcast.

September 19

In the morning, the President had a telephone conversation with President Xi Jinping of China to discuss bilateral trade issues, fentanyl production and transshipment, the need to bring the war between Russia and Ukraine to an end, the approval of a deal on TikTok ownership, and plans to meet in person during the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) summit in Gyeongju, South Korea, on October 31 and November 1. Later, in the Oval Office, he had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, in the Oval Office, the President signed Executive orders.

During the day, the President authorized Secretary of War Peter B. Hegseth to order a lethal kinetic strike on a sea vessel affiliated with a designated terrorist organization conducting drug trafficking in the U.S. SOUTHCOM area of responsibility, which killed three male operatives. The President announced that he had withdrawn the nomination of Erik Siebert to be U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia.

The President announced the nomination of Lindsey Halligan to be U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia.

September 21

In the morning, the President traveled to Glendale, AZ.

In the afternoon, at State Farm Stadium, during the memorial service for Turning Point U.S.A. Founder and Executive Director Charles J. Kirk, the President spoke with former White House Senior Adviser Elon R. Musk. Later, he returned to Washington, DC, arriving in the evening.

September 22

In the afternoon, the President had a telephone conversation with President Kasym-Zhomart Tokayev of Kazakhstan to discuss Kazakhstan's projected purchase of \$4 billion worth of U.S. locomotives and rail equipment.

In the evening, the President traveled to New York City. Upon arrival at the John F. Kennedy International Airport, the President traveled to Trump Tower, where, at his residence, he remained overnight. He also had a telephone conversation with Speaker of the House of Representatives J. Michael Johnson and Senate Majority Leader John R. Thune to discuss the deadline to pass spending legislation to fund Federal Government operations.

Also in the evening, the President had a telephone conversation with President Emmanuel Macron of France.

The White House announced that the President will meet bilaterally with Secretary-General António Manuel de Oliveira Guterres of the United Nations, President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine, President Javier Milei of Argentina, and President Ursula von der Leyen of the European Commission in New York City on September 23.

The White House announced that the President will host a multilateral meeting with Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Indonesia, Turkey, Pakistan, Egypt, the United Arab Emirates, and Jordan in New York City on September 23.

The White House announced that the President will travel to Long Island, NY, on September 26.

September 23

In the morning, the President traveled to United Nations Headquarters.

In the afternoon, the President traveled to Trump Tower.

In the evening, the President and Mrs. Trump traveled to the Lotte New York Palace hotel, where they attended a United Nations Leaders Reception. Later, they traveled to the John F. Kennedy International Airport, where, upon arrival, they returned to Washington, DC.

The President announced that he had canceled a meeting with House Minority Leader Hakeem S. Jeffries and Senate Minority Leader Charles E. Schumer scheduled at the White House for September 25.

The White House announced further details on the President's travel to Long Island, NY, on September 26.

September 24

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, the President was briefed on the shooting at the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement Field Office in Dallas, TX.

In the evening, in the Rose Garden, the President hosted a dinner for the Rose Garden Club, which included a performance by the Marine Corps Silent Drill Platoon on the South Lawn. Later, in the Oval Office, he greeted members of the Marine Corps Silent Drill Platoon and presented them with challenge coins. Deputy Attorney General Todd Blanche and Federal Bureau of Investigation Director Kashyap P. "Kash" Patel also attended.

The President announced his decision to impose a tariff of 100 percent on U.S. imports of "any branded or patented pharmaceutical product," effective October 1, provided that the manufacturer is not actively building a domestic production facility.

September 26

In the afternoon, the President returned to Washington, DC.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Gov. Tina Kotek of Oregon.

The President announced his decision, at the request of Secretary of Homeland Security Kristi L. Noem, to direct Secretary of War Peter B. Hegseth to "provide all necessary troops" to support the protection of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement facilities in Portland, OR.

September 28

In the afternoon, the President returned to Washington, DC.

October 1

In the afternoon, in the Oval Office, the President signed Executive orders.

During the day, in the Roosevelt Room, the President recorded an interview with Daniel Baldwin of One America News Network for later broadcast.

October 2

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President had an intelligence briefing.

In the evening, at the U.S. Naval Observatory, the President and Mrs. Trump had dinner with Vice President James D. "J.D." Vance and his wife Usha.

During the day, the President met with Office of Management and Budget Director Russell T. Vought to discuss potential budget cuts to Government agencies and programs.

October 3

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President participated in a swearing-in ceremony for Christine Jack Toretta as U.S. Ambassador to Sweden.

In the afternoon, in the Oval Office, the President recorded a video message on Hamas's acceptance of the cease-fire plan he proposed with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of Israel on September 29.

The President announced that he had "reversed the cuts" scheduled for homeland security and counterterrorism funding designated for New York City and State.

The White House announced that the President will travel to Naval Station Norfolk, VA, on October 5.

October 4

In the morning, the President traveled to the Trump National Golf Club Washington, D.C., in Potomac Falls, VA.

In the afternoon, the President returned to Washington, DC.

October 5

In the morning, the President and Mrs. Trump traveled to Norfolk, VA, arriving in the afternoon. Secretary of Veterans Affairs Douglas A. Collins, White House Chief of Staff Susan Wiles, Rep. Ronny L. Jackson, Domestic Policy Council Director Vincent Haley, and U.S. Chief of Protocol Monica Crowley accompanied them.

In the afternoon, upon arrival at Naval Station Norfolk Chambers Field, the President and Mrs. Trump were greeted on the tarmac by Naval Station Norfolk Commanding Officer Capt. Matt Schlarmann, USN. Then, at Naval Station Norfolk, the President and Mrs. Trump were greeted by Secretary of War Peter B. Hegseth, posed for photographs with sailors, and observed a naval sea power demonstration on the USS *George H.W. Bush*. Secretary of the Navy John Phelan also attended. Later, they returned to Washington, DC, arriving in the evening.

During the day, the President in an interview through a text exchange with Jake Tapper of CNN's "State of the Union" program.

October 6

The White House announced that the President will welcome President Alexander Stubb of Finland to the White House on October 9.

October 7

In the morning, on the West Wing Portico, the President greeted Prime Minister Mark Carney of Canada.

In the afternoon, in the Cabinet Room, the President and Prime Minister Carney had a working lunch. Later, in the Oval Office, the President met with Edan Alexander, a U.S. citizen who was captured during the October 7, 2023, Hamas attacks on Israel and released on May 12.

October 8

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President had an intelligence briefing.

In the evening, the President participated in a live telephone interview with Sean Hannity for Fox News Channel's "Hannity" program.

During the day, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of Israel. He also participated in a telephone interview with Barak Ravid of Axios. He also participated in an interview with Steve A. Holland of Reuters.

October 9

In the afternoon, on the West Wing Portico, the President welcomed President Alexander Stubb of Finland.

Then, he traveled to the Sharm El Sheikh Congress Center, where he participated in a photographic opportunity with President el-Sisi and answered questions from reporters.

In the evening, also at the Sharm El Sheikh Congress Center, the President participated in a greeting with world leaders, including, among others, President Emmanuel Macron of France, Prime Minister Keir Starmer of the United Kingdom, Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni of Italy, and Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan of Armenia. Later, he traveled to Royal Air Force Mildenhall, United Kingdom.

October 14

In the morning, the President returned to Washington, DC.

In the afternoon, on the West Wing Portico, the President greeted President Javier Milei of Argentina.

The President announced that under his "standing authorities as Commander in Chief" Secretary of War Peter B. Hegseth had ordered a U.S. lethal kinetic strike on a vessel affiliated with a Designated Terrorist Organization (DTO) conducting narcotrafficking in the U.S. SOUTHCOM area of responsibility, just off the Coast of Venezuela, killing "six male narcoterrorists aboard the vessel."

The White House announced that the President will meet with President Volodymyr Zelenskyy of Ukraine on October 17.

October 15

In the morning, the President participated in a telephone interview with Jake Tapper of CNN.

In the evening, in the East Room, the President hosted a dinner to raise money for the new White House ballroom construction.

During the day, the President participated in a telephone interview with Eric Cortellessa, senior political correspondent of TIME magazine.

October 16

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President had an intelligence briefing.

In the afternoon, the President had a telephone conversation with President Vladimir Vladimirovich Putin of Russia to discuss the U.S. cease-fire agreement between Hamas and Israel, bilateral trade issues, and the ongoing conflict in Ukraine, on which the leaders agreed to direct high-level advisers to meet in the coming week, followed by a meeting between the Presidents in Budapest, Hungary, the following week. President Putin thanked First Lady Melania Trump for her "involvement with children." Vice President James D. "J.D." Vance and Secretary of State Marco A. Rubio also participated.

During the day, in the Roosevelt Room, the President recorded an interview with Maria Bartiromo of the Fox News Channel's "Sunday Morning Futures" for later broadcast. October 17

In the evening, upon arrival at Palm Beach International Airport, the President traveled to Palm Beach, FL, where, at his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club, he remained overnight.

During the day, in the Oval Office, the President greeted Italian tenor Andrea Boccelli, who sang a portion of "Time to Say Goodbye" for the President and staff.

The President announced that he had signed a commutation for former Rep. George Santos, ordering his immediate release from prison.

October 18

In the morning, the President traveled to the Trump International Golf Club in West Palm Beach, FL.

In the afternoon, the President returned to Palm Beach, FL, where, at his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club, he remained overnight.

The President announced an October 17 U.S. airstrike that destroyed a "large drug-carrying submarine" that was navigating toward the U.S. on a "well-known narcotics trafficking transit route" between Venezuela and Trinidad and Tobago, which was loaded with fentanyl and other illegal narcotics according to U.S. intelligence, with four "known narcoterrorists" on board the vessel, two of whom were killed, with the surviving operatives to be returned to their countries of origin, Ecuador and Colombia, for detention and prosecution.

October 19

In the morning, the President traveled to the Trump International Golf Club in West Palm Beach, FL.

In the afternoon, the President returned to his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club in Palm Beach, FL.

In the evening, the President returned to Washington, DC.

The President announced the nomination of Mark Savaya to be U.S. Special Envoy to Iraq.

October 20

In the morning, on the West Wing Portico, the President greeted Prime Minister Anthony Albanese of Australia.

The President announced the nomination of William J. Crain to be a judge on the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Louisiana.

The President announced the nomination of Alexander C. Van Hook to be a judge on the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Louisiana.

October 21

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President participated in a ceremony for the Richard Nixon Foundation's Architect of Peace Award.

In the evening, in the Rose Garden, the President hosted a dinner for the Rose Garden Club.

During the day, the President spoke with Speaker of the House of Representatives J. Michael Johnson and Senate Majority Leader John R. Thune. He also met in the Oval Office with Sens. Joshua D. Hawley and Thomas H. Tuberville. He also had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Narendra Modi of India.

October 22

The President declared a disaster in Nebraska and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State and local response efforts due to damage resulting from severe storms, straight-line winds, and flooding from August 8 through 10.

The President declared a disaster in Alaska and ordered Federal assistance to supplement State and local response efforts due to damage resulting from severe storms, flooding, and remnants of Typhoon Halong from October 8 through 13.

The President announced his approval of \$2.5 million to Missouri in disaster assistance funds for severe storms, high winds, large hail, flash flooding, and tornadoes, which occurred earlier this year.

The President announced his approval of \$260,000 in public assistance funds to the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe.

October 23

The President announced the termination of "all trade negotiations" with Canada due to its "egregious behavior" in reference to Ontario Province's sponsorship of an advertisement in order "to interfere with the decision of the U.S. Supreme Court and other courts" concerning the U.S. use of tariffs.

The White House announced further details on the President's travel to Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, on October 26 and 27; Tokyo, Japan, from October 27 through 29; and Busan, South Korea, on October 29 and 30.

The White House announced that the President will meet with President Lee Jae-myung of South Korea in Busan, South Korea, on October 29.

The White House announced that the President will meet with President Xi Jinping of China in Busan, South Korea, on October 30.

The White House announced that the President and Mrs. Trump will welcome military, law enforcement, and adoptive and foster families for Halloween activities at the White House on October 30.

October 24

In the evening, the President traveled to Ramstein Air Base in Ramstein-Miesenbach, Germany, arriving the following morning.

October 25

In the afternoon the President traveled to Al Udeid Air Base in Al Rayyan, Qatar, arriving in the evening. Secretary of State Marco A. Rubio also joined the President in Doha.

In the evening, the President traveled to Selangor, Malaysia, arriving the following morning.

During the day, en route aboard Air Force One, the President had a telephone conversation with Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi of Japan.

The President announced his decision to impose a supplemental tariff of 10 percent on U.S. imports from Canada due to Ontario Province's running an advertisement on the U.S. use of tariffs relying on quotations from former President Ronald Reagan on the harmful effects of trade tariffs and protectionist trade policy disputed by the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation and Institute and considered a "misrepresentation of the facts and hostile act" by the President.

October 26

In the morning, upon arrival at the Kuala Lumpur International Airport, the President was greeted on the tarmac by Prime Minister Anwar Ibrahim, Minister of Home Affairs Saifuddin Nasution bin Ismail, Ambassador to the U.S. Muhammad Shahrul Ikram Yaakob, Chief of Protocol Yubazlan Yusof, Chief of Ceremony Rozainor Ramli, and Minister of Foreign Affairs Mohamad bin Hasan of Malaysia; and U.S. Ambassador to Malaysia Edgard Kagan and his wife Cynthia Gire and Chargé d'Affaires Joy M. Sakurai of the U.S. Mission to the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN). Then, the President participated in an arrival ceremony. Later, he traveled to the Kuala Lumpur Convention Centre in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

In the afternoon, at the Kuala Lumpur Convention Centre, the President participated in an ASEAN summit lunch, family photograph with leaders, and a cultural performance. Later, he traveled to the Ritz-Carlton, Kuala Lumpur, hotel, where he remained overnight.

October 27

In the morning, the President traveled to Tokyo, Japan, arriving in the afternoon.

In the afternoon, upon arrival at the Tokyo International Airport, the President was greeted on the tarmac by Chief Cabinet Secretary Minoru Kihara, Ambassador to the U.S. Shigeo Yamada of Japan, and Chief of Protocol Tadayuki Miyashita of Japan; and U.S. Ambassador to Japan George E. Glass and his wife Mary, U.S. Forces Japan Commander Lt. General Stephen F. Jost, USAF, and Deputy Chief of Mission Aaron D. Snipe of the U.S. Embassy in Tokyo. Then, he traveled to the Imperial Palace, arriving in the evening.

In the evening, at the Imperial Palace, the President met with Emperor Naruhito of Japan. Later, he traveled to the Okura Tokyo hotel, where he remained overnight.

During the day, the President directed the Department of War to carry out three lethal kinetic strikes on four vessels operated by Designated Terrorist Organizations (DTO) trafficking narcotics in the Eastern Pacific, killing 14 narcoterrorists, with one survivor to be repatriated to Mexico.

October 28

In the morning, the President traveled to Akasaka Palace, where he was greeted by Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi of Japan and participated in an arrival ceremony. Then, they had a signing ceremony and working lunch. During their meetings, they discussed Japan-U.S. relations, ending the Russia-Ukraine war, and their shared commitment to critical minerals, and the Prime Minister presented the President with a map of major Japanese investments into the U.S. Later, he returned to the Okura Tokyo hotel.

In the afternoon, the President and Prime Minister Takaichi traveled to Yokosuka Naval Base. Upon arrival on the deck of the USS *George Washington*, they were greeted by Commander of the U.S. Indo-Pacific Command Adm. Samuel Paparo, USN, U.S. Seventh Fleet Commander Vice Adm. Fred W. Kacher, USN, U.S. Forces Japan Commander Lt. Gen. Stephen F. Jost, USAF, and Carrier Strike Group 5 Commander Rear Adm. Eric J. "Pappy" Anduze, USN. Later, he returned to the Okura Tokyo hotel in Tokyo, Japan, arriving in the evening.

In the evening, the President traveled to the U.S. Ambassador's Residence. Later, he returned to the Okura hotel, where he remained overnight.

October 29

In the morning, the President traveled to Busan, South Korea. Upon arrival at Gimhae International Airport, the President was greeted on the tarmac by Ambassador to the U.S. Kang Kyung-wha, Chief of Protocol Kim Tae-jin, and 5th Air Mobility Wing Commander Brig. Gen. Kang Kun-shin of South Korea; U.S. Chargé d'Affaires ad interim Y. Kevin Kim of the U.S. Embassy in Seoul, South Korea, and Korea Commander of United Nations Command, Combined Forces Command, and U.S. Forces Korea Gen. Xavier T. Brunson, USA.

In the afternoon, the President traveled to the Gyeongju Arts Center in Gyeongju, South Korea. Later, he traveled to the Gyeongju National Museum, where he participated in an arrival ceremony with President Lee Jae-myung of South Korea. Later, he traveled to the Hilton Gyeongju hotel.

In the evening, during the state banquet hosted by President Lee, the President spoke with Prime Minister Mark Carney of Canada and accepted the Prime Minister's apology for Ontario Province's running an advertisement critical of the U.S. use of tariffs using former quotations from President Ronald Reagan. Later, he remained overnight at the Hilton Gyeongju.

The President announced his decision to approve South Korea's construction of a nuclear-powered submarine to supplement the diesel-powered submarines currently in use based on a negotiated tariff-reduction arrangement and various U.S. trade and investment commitments by South Korea.

The President announced that he had instructed the Department of War to resume the testing of nuclear weapons "on an equal basis" to align with other countries testing programs, effective immediately.

October 30

In the morning, the President traveled to Busan, South Korea, where, at Gimhae Air Base, adjacent to Gimhae International Airport, he greeted President Xi Jinping of China.

In the afternoon, prior to boarding Air Force One, the President participated in a departure ceremony with Second Vice Minister Kim Jina, Deputy Director General for North American Affairs Yi Won-woo, and 5th Air Mobility Wing Commander Brig Gen. Kang Kun-shin of South Korea; and U.S. Chargé d'Affaires ad interim Y. Kevin Kim of the U.S. Embassy in Seoul, South Korea. Then, he traveled to Anchorage, Alaska, crossing the international dateline and arriving at

Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson in the morning. Later, he returned to Washington, DC, arriving in the afternoon.

Later in the evening, on the South Lawn, the President and Mrs. Trump hosted military, law enforcement, and adoptive and foster families for trick-or-treating and Halloween activities.

October 31

In the morning, the President traveled to West Palm Beach, FL, arriving in the afternoon.

In the afternoon, upon arrival at Palm Beach International Airport, the President traveled to his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club in Palm Beach, FL. He also inspected the renovation work underway at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

In the evening, at the Mar-a-Lago Club, the President attended a Halloween party. Secretary of State Marco A. Rubio and his wife Jeannette, the President's daughter Tiffany A. Trump and son-in-law Michael Boulos, and the President's daughter Ivanka M. Trump and son-in-law Jared C. Kushner also attended. He remained overnight at his Mar-a-Lago residence.

During the day, at the Mar-a-Lago Club in Palm Beach, the President recorded an interview with Norah O'Donnell of CBS News's "60 Minutes" program for later broadcast.

The President announced his decision to designate Nigeria a "country of particular concern" due to reported persecution of Christians and that he had asked Rep. Riley Moore and House Appropriations Committee Chairman Rep. Thomas J. Cole to "immediately look into this matter and report back" to him.

The President announced that he had instructed administration lawyers to ask courts for clarification on "how we can legally fund" Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits using Department of Agriculture contingency funds during the ongoing lapse of Federal Government appropriations in light of two courts having "issued conflicting opinions" on the matter.

November 1

In the morning, the President traveled to the Trump International Golf Club West Palm Beach in West Palm Beach, FL.

In the afternoon, the President traveled to Palm Beach, FL, where, at his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club, he remained overnight.

In the evening, the President spoke with Secretary of War Peter B. Hegseth to discuss China-U.S. relations following the President's meeting with President Xi Jinping of China in Busan, South Korea, review the results of his own positive meeting with his counterpart Minister of National Defense Dong Jun of China in Malaysia, and agree that the U.S. and China should set up military-to-military channels to deconflict and deescalate any problems that may arise. At the Mar-a-Lago Club, he also attended a MAGA INC. Candlelight Finance Dinner. He remained overnight at his residence.

The President announced that he had instructed the Department of War to prepare for possible U.S. military action against terrorists operating within Nigeria and threatened to "stop all aid and assistance" if the Nigerian Government "continues to allow the killing of Christians" in that country.

November 2

In the afternoon, the President traveled to West Palm Beach, FL, where, at Palm Beach International Airport, prior to boarding Air Force One, he paid a visit to his "Trump Force One"

airplane, which he used during his 2016, 2020, and 2024 Presidential campaigns. Then, he returned to Washington, DC, arriving in the evening.

November 3

The President announced his intention to ask Secretary of Transportation Sean P. Duffy to conduct a review of New York City's policy of congestion pricing for vehicular entry into Manhattan.

The White House announced that the President will travel to Miami, Florida, on November 5.

November 4

In the afternoon, the President spoke with White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt about the use of the filibuster in the Senate and the administration's intention to comply with Federal court orders to distribute Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits using Department of Agriculture contingency funds during the ongoing lapse of Federal Government appropriations. Later, he met with representatives of Switzerland to discuss trade issues.

The President announced the nomination of Jared Isaacman to be Administrator of the National Space and Aeronautics Administration.

The White House announced that the President will welcome President Ahmad Husayn al-Shara' of Syria to the White House on November 10.

November 5

In the morning, the President traveled to Miami, FL, arriving in the afternoon. His son-in-law Jared C. Kushner and granddaughter Arabella accompanied him.

In the afternoon, at the Kaseya Center Arena, following his remarks at the America Business Forum Miami, the President recorded an interview with Bret Baier of Fox News for later broadcast. Later, he returned to Washington, DC. He also posted to his Truth Social feed a video of his November 3 virtual remarks to the Republican Jewish Coalition's annual leadership summit at the Venetian Expo in Las Vegas, NV.

November 6

In the evening, in the Oval Office, the President met with President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev of Kazakhstan, President Shavkat Mirziyoyev of Uzbekistan, President Emomali Rahmon of Tajikistan, President Serdar Gurbangulyýewiç Berdimuhamedow of Turkmenistan, and President Sadyr Nurgojo uulu Japarov of Kyrgyzstan. countries. During his meeting with President Tokayev, the President had a trilateral telephone conversation with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of Israel in which Kazakhstan agreed it would join the U.S.-brokered Abraham Accords and pursue a path of peace and prosperity in its relations with Israel.

During the day, in the Oval Office, the President met with Sen. Markwayne Mullin.

The President announced a 3-year trade and investment agreement with Uzbekistan in the amount of \$35 billion and over \$100 billion over 10 years in key U.S. sectors, including critical minerals, aviation, automotive parts, infrastructure, agriculture, energy and chemicals, and information technology.

November 8

In the morning, the President traveled to the Trump International Golf Club West Palm Beach in West Palm Beach, FL.

In the afternoon, the President traveled to Palm Beach, FL, where, at his residence at the Mar-a-Lago Club, he remained overnight.

The President announced his recommendation to Senate Republicans to divert health insurance premium subsidies under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act directly to individual marketplace enrollees instead of insurance companies.

November 9

Upon arrival at the White House, after exiting Marine One, he spoke with reporters on the South Lawn.

The President announced the nomination of John Coale to be U.S. Special Envoy to Belarus.

The President announced that he had received the "key to the city of Miami" from Mayor Francis X. Suarez.

November 10

In the morning, in the Oval Office, the President met with President Ahmad Husayn al-Shara' of Syria to discuss peace efforts in the Middle East and Syria's important role in the success and stability of the region.

In the evening, the President recorded an interview with Laura Ingraham of Fox News Channel's "Ingraham Angle" program for later broadcast. He also took Ms. Ingraham on a tour of

the renovations underway in the East Wing and showed her the "Presidential Walk of Fame" display of portraits outside the West Wing.

The President announced his recommendation that any air traffic control workers who did not take time off during the lapse of Federal Government appropriations receive a bonus of \$10,000 "for distinguished service to our country" and that any who did take time off "be substantially docked" once funding is restored.

November 11

The President announced the nomination of Justin Olson to be a judge on the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Indiana.

November 15

The President announced that he will meet with Mayor-elect Zohran K. Mamdani of New York City at the White House on November 21.

November 20

November 21
