Abstract of Information Available

Based on the information available, human remains representing, at least, six individuals have been reasonably identified. The 16 lots of associated funerary objects include ceramics, faunal remains, lithics, and shell.

In 2017, 2019 and 2020, human remains and associated funerary objects were removed from the Mussel Camp site (01MG107), Morgan County, Alabama. The human remains and objects were removed as part of potential ARPA violation prosecutions and held as evidence until present. No known individuals were identified.

In 2019, human remains and associated funerary objects were removed from the Cypress Creek site (1LU12) and Colliers Cave site (1LU494), Lauderdale County, Alabama. The human remains and objects were removed as part of potential ARPA violation prosecutions and held as evidence until present. No known individuals were identified.

Determinations

The Tennessee Valley Authority has determined that:

- The human remains described in this notice represent the physical remains of six individuals of Native American ancestry.
- The 16 lots of objects described in this notice are reasonably believed to

have been placed intentionally with or near individual human remains at the time of death or later as part of the death rite or ceremony.

- The Absentee Shawnee Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma; Alabama-Coushatta Tribe of Texas; Cherokee Nation; Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana; Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians; Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma; Jena Band of Choctaw Indians; Kialegee Tribal Town; Poarch Band of Creek Indians; Shawnee Tribe; The Chickasaw Nation; The Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma; The Muscogee (Creek) Nation; The Seminole Nation of Oklahoma; Thlopthlocco Tribal Town; and the United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians in Oklahoma have priority for disposition of the human remains and associated funerary objects described in this notice.

Claims for Disposition

Written claims for disposition of the human remains and associated funerary objects in this notice must be sent to the appropriate official identified in this notice under **ADDRESSES**. If no claim for disposition is received by September 10, 2026, the human remains and associated funerary objects in this notice will become unclaimed human remains and associated funerary objects. Claims for disposition may be submitted by:

1. Any lineal descendant, Indian Tribe, or Native Hawaiian organization identified in this notice.
2. Any lineal descendant, Indian Tribe, or Native Hawaiian organization not identified in this notice who shows that they have priority for disposition.

Disposition of the human remains and associated funerary objects in this notice may occur on or after October 10, 2025. If competing claims for disposition are received, the Tennessee Valley Authority must determine the most appropriate claimant prior to disposition. Claims for joint disposition of the human remains and associated funerary objects are considered a single claim and not competing claims. The Tennessee Valley Authority is responsible for sending a copy of this notice to the lineal descendants, Indian Tribes, and Native Hawaiian organizations identified in this notice and to any other consulting parties.

Notice of Inventory Completion: University of Florida, Florida Museum of Natural History, Gainesville, FL

AGENCY: National Park Service, Interior.

ACTION: Notice.

SUMMARY: In accordance with the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), the University of Florida, Florida Museum of Natural History (FLMNH), has completed an inventory of human remains and associated funerary objects and has determined that there is a cultural affiliation between the human remains and associated funerary objects and Indian Tribes or Native Hawaiian organizations in this notice.

DATES: Repatriation of the human remains and associated funerary objects in this notice may occur on or after October 10, 2025.

Abstract of Information Available

Burial Island Mound (8SO29) is a prehistoric burial mound near the mouth of North Creek. In 1974, Shepard Associates, Architects & Planners, Inc. performed a survey, finding this burial mound. The site was on private property and accessible by boat. In spring 1987, The site was vandalized. George Luer collected artifacts from this looter spoil. Luer presented this collection to the FLMNH, and it was accessioned in 2002. Human remains representing at least two individuals have been identified. The 10 associated funerary objects include six pottery sherds and four shells.

Cultural Affiliation

Based on the information available and the results of consultation, cultural affiliation is reasonably identified by the geographical location or acquisition history of the human remains and associated funerary objects described in this notice.

Determinations

The FLMNH has determined that:

- The human remains described in this notice represent the physical remains of two individuals of Native American ancestry.
- The 10 objects described in this notice are reasonably believed to have been placed intentionally with or near individual human remains at the time of death or later as part of the death rite or ceremony.
- There is a connection between the human remains and associated funerary objects described in this notice and the Miccosukee Tribe of Indians and the Seminole Tribe of Florida.

Requests for Repatriation

Written requests for repatriation of the human remains and associated funerary objects in this notice must be sent to the authorized representative identified in this notice under **ADDRESSES**. Requests for repatriation may be submitted by:

1. Any one or more of the Indian Tribes or Native Hawaiian organizations identified in this notice.
2. Any lineal descendant, Indian Tribe, or Native Hawaiian organization not identified in this notice who shows, by a preponderance of the evidence, that the requestor is a lineal descendant or an Indian Tribe or Native Hawaiian organization with cultural affiliation.

Repatriation of the human remains and associated funerary objects described in this notice to a requestor may occur on or after October 10, 2025. If competing requests for repatriation are received, the FLMNH must determine the most appropriate requestor prior to repatriation. Requests for joint repatriation of the human remains and associated funerary objects are considered a single request and not competing requests. The FLMNH is responsible for sending a copy of this notice to the Indian Tribes and Native Hawaiian organizations identified in this notice.

SUMMARY: In accordance with the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), the Mississippi Department of Archives and History (MDAH) has completed an inventory of human remains and has determined that there is a cultural affiliation between the human remains and Indian Tribes or Native Hawaiian organizations in this notice.

DATES: Repatriation of the human remains in this notice may occur on or after October 10, 2025.

The National Park Service is not responsible for the determinations in this notice.

Abstract of Information Available

Human remains representing, at least, three individuals have been identified from 22LE504 (MLe18), Lee County, MS. No associated funerary objects are present. Albert Spaulding conducted excavations at the site in 1939–1940 and discovered 13 burials. At an unknown point in time (likely in the 2000s), some of the remains were sent to the University of Alabama, although MDAH retained legal control.

Human remains representing, at least, one individual have been identified from 22LE524 (MLe18), Lee County, MS. No associated funerary objects are present. In 1937, Moreau B. Chambers excavated this site and discovered several burials. At an unknown point in time, this individual was sent to the University of Alabama, although MDAH retained legal control.

Human remains representing, at least, one individual have been identified from 22LE907 (ImmokaKina'Fa' site), Lee County, MS. No associated funerary objects are present. Burials were discovered during a salvage excavation at the site in 1996 by Mississippi State University. In 1998 the human remains were sent from the Cobb Institute of Archaeology to the University of Alabama. In 2025 legal control of the human remains were transferred to the MDAH by the Cobb Institute of Archaeology.

The MDAH has no record of any potentially hazardous substances used to treat the human remains listed in this notice.

Cultural Affiliation

Based on the information available and the results of consultation, cultural affiliation is reasonably identified by the geographical location or acquisition history of the human remains described in this notice.

Determinations

The Mississippi Department of Archives and History has determined that:

- The human remains described in this notice represent the physical remains of five individuals of Native American ancestry.
- There is a connection between the human remains and associated funerary objects described in this notice and The Chickasaw Nation.
