

which is available for employees of State agencies, local educational agencies, and school food authorities through the FNS public website, as a guest user or with Login.gov. While training requirements are mandatory, using the USDA Professional Standards Trainings and Tracker Tool (PSTTT) is voluntary. The tool facilitates compliance with HHFKA requirements and is provided at no cost. In addition, FNS provides a mobile-friendly version of the PSTTT application to ensure easy usage and accessibility across mobile devices. The application is compatible with all mobile operating systems (iOS, Android, and Windows).

The user can create a user profile with the following information:

- School District/Address
- School Name/Address
- Individual’s Name
- Email Address
- Job Title and Role
- Hiring Date

The user will enter the following information:

- Key Area
- Training Topic
- Learning Objective
- Training Title
- Training Hours/Minutes
- Date of Training
- Training Provider or Organization (including State, local or national)

The user can enter multiple employee names for one specific training. Users can print certificates of completion for trainings. The tool provides the user with the ability to export and save results in multiple file formats,

including portable document format (.pdf), Microsoft Excel (.xlsx), and Word Files versions 2000 or higher (.docx). Streamlined and intuitive navigation is offered to allow for easy access to all functionalities. In July 2025, the PSTTT integrated the former Professional Standards Training Database into the PSTTT, allowing for guest user access to search for relevant professional standards trainings to take in addition to logging completed trainings—this resulted in renaming the tool from the “Professional Standards Training Tracker Tool” to the “Professional Standards Trainings and Tracker Tool” to more accurately reflect the PSTTT’s capabilities. In this notice, the previous requirements listed as “State agency personnel” and “school nutrition professionals” has been clarified to include the estimated burden encompasses the time users are expected to spend using the tool (e.g., searching and logging trainings).

Affected Public: State, Local, and Tribal Government. Respondent groups include State agency personnel and school nutrition professionals.

Estimated Number of Respondents: The total estimated number of respondents is 10,006. This includes six State agency personnel and 10,000 school nutrition professionals who voluntarily choose to utilize this tracking tool as registered users. All respondents will be offered a 60-minute training webinar on features of the tool.

Estimated Number of Responses per Respondent: Total estimated number of responses per respondent across the

entire collection is seven. The estimated number of responses per respondent for the tracking tool is five. The tracking tool users will first be required to create their user profile, which will be saved for future use. It is estimated that the user will be searching for trainings, updating, and managing their records on a quarterly basis. The estimated number of responses per respondent for the training webinar is two; one for the live webinar and one for the recorded training.

Estimated Total Annual Responses: 70,042.

Estimated Time per Response: The average estimated time per response for all of the participants, across all of the activities in this collection, is approximately 14 minutes (0.24 hours). For the USDA Professional Standards Trainings and Tracker Tool (PSTTT), the estimated time of response varies from five to 10 minutes depending on familiarity of the tool and the number of reports created, with an average estimated time of 7.5 minutes (0.125 hours) for all participants. The annual training webinar of 60 minutes (1 hour) will be available for all participants. Participants will search for and record trainings into the tracking tool, which is estimated to take 5 minutes (0.083 hours) to complete.

Estimated Total Annual Burden on Respondents: 17,090.25 hours (rounded to 17,090 hours).

Abstract: The Woodsy Owl-Smoky Bear Act of 1974 established the Woodsy Owl symbol and slogan, authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to manage the use of the slogan and symbol, authorizes the licensing of the symbol for commercial use, and provides for continued protection of the symbol. Part 272 of Title 36 of the Code of Federal Regulations authorizes the Chief of the Forest Service to approve commercial use of the Woodsy Owl

symbol and to collect royalty fees. Commercial use includes replicating Woodsy Owl symbol or logo on items, such as tee shirts, mugs, pins, figurines, ornaments, stickers, and toys and using the image and or slogan of the icon in motion pictures, documentaries, TV, magazine stories, books, magazines, and other for-profit paper products.

Woodsy Owl is America's symbol for the conservation of the environment. The public service campaign slogans associated with Woodsy Owl are "Give a Hoot, Don't Pollute" and "Lend a Hand, Care for the Land." The mission statement of the Woodsy Owl's conservation campaign is to help young children discover the natural world and join in life-long actions to care for that world.

The USDA Forest Service National Symbols Program Manager will use the collected information to determine if the applicant will receive a license or renewal of an existing license and the associated royalty fees. Information collected includes, but is not limited to, tenure of business or non-profit organization, current or planned products, physical location, projected sales volume, and marketing plans. Licensees submit quarterly reports, which include:

1. A list of each item sold with the Woodsy Owl symbol.
2. Projected sales of each item.
3. Sales price of each item.
4. Total sales subject to Forest Service royalty fee.
5. Royalty fee is due based on sales quantity and price.
6. Description and itemization of deductions (such as fees waived or previously paid as part of advance royalty payment).
7. New total royalty fee the business or organization must pay after deductions.
8. Running total amount of royalties accrued in that fiscal year; and
9. Typed name and signature of the business or organizational employee certifying the truth of the report.

Data gathered in this information collection is not available from other sources.
