NOTICES REGARDING MEAT INSPECTION

WEIGHT OF SAUSAGE IN BOXES FOR THE U. S. NAVY

Inspectors will please be governed in accordance with the following request from the U. S. Navy:

Specifications for certain items such as bologna sausage require the product to be delivered in boxes weighing 50 pounds net. This standard weight was adopted for deliveries in large quantities and was not intended to restrict the purchase of small quantities by certain small vessels, the complements of which do not make it economical to purchase in the standard container.

These specifications, as adopted, technically require the inspectors of the Bureau of Animal Industry to inspect only 50 pound packages but it is requested that the necessary instructions be issued that in all cases where the order is for less than 50 pounds the inspector inspect such smaller quantity.

It should be noted that this does not apply to a quantity greater than 50 pounds and all such quantities will necessarily have to be in multiples of 50 pounds.

APPROVAL OF STENCILS, BOX DIES, AND BRANDS

Referring to notice contained in Service and Regulatory Announcements of March, 1924, under the caption, "Approval of stencils, box dies, and brands," the following is a supplemental list of names and words approved for all establishments, for application by means of stencils, box dies, or brands, and such markings may be applied individually or in combination with other approved markings, provided the combinations are applicable to the products, are not inconsistent, and do not result in false or deceptive labeling.

Any of the words or names may be applied in singular or plural form, as may be appropriate.

The approvals cover also recognized abbreviations of the words and names included in this and previous lists, such as E. I. M., Reg., Spec., Pkld., N. Y., C. C., P. P., Bf., Pk., etc.

The approval of stencils, box dies, and brands should be construed as in blanket form so far as concerns the omission or addition of any statement of quantity. Stencils, box dies, and brands bearing only statements of quantity do not require approval.

The words "brand," "style," and "cut" may be used interchangeably as qualifications. Where such qualifications accompany names covered by blanket approvals, they shall be applied in the same size and style of letters as the names qualified. The qualifications may also be added to names approved in unqualified form, without restrictions as to comparative size and style. It should be understood, however, that such designations as "ham style," "pork style," "beef style," "kosher style," etc., are not permitted.

In case of doubt as to the scope of approvals, inspectors should refer questions to the Washington office for a ruling.

THE FOOT-AND-MOUTH SITUATION

The following press statement issued by the department June 28, deals with the outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in California:

Continued improvement in the foot-and-mouth disease situation in California is reported by the United States Department of Agriculture for the week ended June 28. New infection was found on only three days and was limited to a small area in Los Angeles County. Five herds, containing 483 cattle altogether, were involved. These were slaughtered promptly. In Tulare, Fresno, and Merced Counties there has been no recurrence of infection since the outbreaks reported a week ago. On June 28 department records showed that all diseased herds had been slaughtered and buried and the premises disinfected. The situation is more favorable than at any time during the outbreak.

Although danger of the spread of foot-and-mouth disease is now considered remote, there is no relaxation in the rigidity of inspection and in the disinfection, including that of all railroad cars used in the transportation of livestock anywhere in the State. At a conference held at Reno, Nev., on June 23, attended by livestock sanitary officials of 11 Western States and of the United States Department of Agriculture, important modifications of State regulations were agreed upon. These will facilitate tourist travel and permit the movement of 300,000 lambs from northern California and Oregon through California to mid-western markets.

Toll of the Disease

The toll of foot-and-mouth disease up to June 28 has amounted to nearly 100,000 head of livestock. Slaughter reports show the following approximate figures for different classes of animals: 50,000 cattle, 25,000 sheep, 22,000 hogs, 800 goats. About 450 premises have been infected altogether. Indemnities for the livestock slaughtered have amounted to approximately \$3,700,000, which is being shared equally by the Federal Government and the State of California.

SATURDAY HALF-HOLIDAYS

The following Executive Order of the President, dated June 13, 1924, is quoted:

It is hereby ordered that from the second Saturday of June to the second Saturday of September, both inclusive, of each year until further notice, four hours, exclusive of time for luncheon, shall constitute a day's work on Saturdays for all clerks and other employees of the Federal Government, wherever employed; and all Executive or other orders in conflict herewith, except the Executive Order of April 4, 1908, relating to certain naval stations, are hereby revoked.

Provided, however, That this Order shall not apply to any bureau or office of the Government, or to any of the clerks or other employees thereof, that may for special public reasons be excepted therefrom by the head of the department or establishment having supervision or control of such bureau or office, or where the same would be inconsistent with the provisions of existing law.

CERTIFICATES TO ACCOMPANY GOATS TO CANADA

On page 90 of Service and Regulatory Announcements for September, 1921, instructions were given for the dipping of goats destined to Canada. Under date of June 25, 1924, the Canadian Veterinary Director General informed the bureau that his department will no longer insist upon the dipping of goats provided they are accompanied by a certificate of a bureau inspector stating that they have not been exposed to infection. The certificate of inspection to be issued for goats in these instances will be form Q. D. 17.

AMENDMENT TO THE ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

EMPLOYEES AS WITNESSES

By Memorandum No. 488 of the office of the Secretary, dated June 19, 1924, paragraph 59 of the Administrative Regulations of the department is amended to read as follows:

(a) *Appearance*.—Unless properly subpoenaed, no employee of this department shall produce department records or documents or testify in respect to any matter relating to the work of the department or of which his knowledge is based directly or indirectly upon department records or upon his personal observation or service in the department, except on behalf of the United States or of a cooperating State or subdivision thereof. Employees engaged in the enforcement of the migratory bird treaty act and officials of the Forest Service designated by the Secretary to aid in the enforcement of the laws of the States with regard to stock, for the prevention and extinguishment of forest fires, and for the protection of fish and game, may, upon request of proper local officials, testify and produce the necessary records and documents on behalf of a State in respect to violations of the laws of the States relating to these subjects.

When properly subpoenaed in any judicial proceeding, each employee shall give prompt notice, either by letter or telegram, to the chief of the bureau wherein he is employed, stating the names of the parties litigant, the time and place named in the subpoena, and, in addition, unless the proceeding originated in the department, the subject matter of the controversy and the nature of the testimony which it is expected will be required. Unless otherwise instructed, the employee will appear and testify. Whenever the production of the records or the giving of testimony will be contrary to the interests of the public service or will interfere substantially with the performance by the employee of his official duties, permission to testify shall be refused. In cases of doubt, upon application to him by any chief, the solicitor shall give prompt advice as to whether an employee is properly subpoenaed or whether, if so subpoenaed, he can be compelled to testify.

Immediately upon his return to duty, following appearance in a case not originating in the department, each employee shall report to his chief the date and place of his appearance, names of the parties litigant, time spent in travel and attendance, expenses incurred and fees, if any, whether either has been paid, and, if so, by whom, and the nature of his testimony.

(b) *Witness fees*.—No employee of the department who appears to produce department records or to testify in a judicial proceeding in which he is prohibited by these regulations from producing records or testifying unless properly subpoenaed shall accept any fee or compensation other than reimbursement of his travel and subsistence expenses unless authorized to do so in advance by his chief. No employee shall receive or be authorized to accept witness fees in any case unless he is required to take leave without pay for the time consumed in responding to the subpoena, and then only in an amount not exceeding the amount deducted from his salary on account of such leave without pay.

Whenever an employee properly subpoenaed appears in a judicial proceeding in accordance with these regulations, the chief of the branch of the department wherein he is employed shall inform him, if practicable, in advance whether he will be required to take leave; and, if so, whether the same shall be with or without pay for the time consumed in responding to the subpoena. In general, employees who appear as witnesses otherwise than in the interest of the Government of the United States shall be required to take leave. In case of doubt, upon application to him by any chief, the Solicitor shall give prompt advice as to whether the law permits the appearance of the employee without taking leave.

(c) *Expense of travel and subsistence*.—When any employee appears as a witness on behalf of the United States in any case originating in this department, or a field employee engaged in the enforcement of the migratory bird law appears on behalf of a State in prosecutions under State laws for the protection of migratory birds, or of officials of the Forest Service designated by the Secretary of Agriculture to aid in the enforcement of the laws of the States with regard to stock, for the prevention and extinguishment of forest fires, and for the protection of fish and game, appearing on behalf of a State in prosecutions under State laws, his expenses for travel and subsistence will be paid in accordance with the Fiscal Regulations.

When an employee appears as a witness on behalf of the United States in any case not originating in this department, his account for travel and subsistence should be presented to the marshal or other officer of the court authorized to pay the expenses of witnesses.

When an employee appears in any judicial proceeding on behalf of any party other than the United States, he should arrange in advance with the party in whose interest he appears for his travel and subsistence expenses.
