*The July 30 USARSO HQ's Departure Ceremony on Soldier's Field.



Retired 33rd Infantry Regiment soldiers return to Panama

PANAMA CANAL - It wasn't going to be a run-of-the-mill tour once Col. Davis "Steve" Stevenson saw all responses start to roll in. As a matter of fact, it looked more like an entire regiment was regrouping for a careful inspection of its old post and a real trip down memory lane. And that's exactly what happened this week as 75 retired 33rd Infantry Regiment soldiers and their wives spent four days touring the sights many hadn't seen since their tour of duty in the first half of this century.

Stevenson, John E. Schmidt Jr., and Andy Demes of Montvale, N.J., helped organize the tour. Demes served at Fort

Kobbe in the 33rd Tank Company from 1950 to 1953. "At that time," said Demes, "we used Hanger One as our motor pool depot of tanks, M24s, half tracks, and an assortment of other vehicles. Fort Kobbe has sure changed a lot since those years." Demes said that it was a little difficult to find the barracks where the Tank Company was assigned.

Joe Dyer of Roanoke, Va., was stationed in the Canal Zone from 1947 to 1950 and worked in the 660 Topographical Battalion at Fort Sherman. One job Dyer remembers is making three isthmian passes to obtain the most accurate measurement of the variance in sea level between the Atlantic and the Pacific. He and his unit also surveyed a lot of the rough terrain between Panama and the

Costa Rican border.

"Of course you couldn't use automobiles for that - there were no roads," said Dyer. "Back then we used a theodolite for surveying topography, and because there wasn't a developed system of roads, we had to use mule teams to get where we wanted to go. Food and supplies were delivered by helicopter. We'd clear off the mountain top for the supply drop, but if the chopper missed the drop target, it would take two days to find the supplies in the dense jungle."

Dyer said that it was common to be in the jungle from four to six weeks at a time. Like many of the retired soldiers on the tour, Dyer was one of the first to become a "Jungle Expert" after following the training program at the Jungle Operations Training Battalion. Many of those first jungle experts became JOTB instruc-

Many of the wives who accompanied their husbands on the tour had also been in Panama in the first half of the century.

"Many things have changed and many things seem to be the same," said Jane Douglas. "Fort Clayton hasn't changed much at all. It was a great place to live and a great place to raise a family, as it is today, I imagine. I remember there wasn't any glass in the windows back then, only louvers and screens. Also, over on the Atlantic side, most of the houses used solar panels to heat the wa-

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Exercise Support Command, Teams, hold inactivation ceremony

FORT CLAYTON – After a history of exceptional support in numerous exercises, operations, and contingencies for Army South, the Exercise Support Command and the Theater Equipment and Maintenance Site consecutively cased their colors in one inactivation ceremony at Fort Clayton on June 4. ESC military personnel will be reassigned to other duties while the TEAMS mission will be reassigned to Army Reserve units in Puerto Rico.

The ESC provided operational and logistical exercise planning, coordinated with TEAMS for equipment and supplies, and provided command and control for over 45,200 National Guard soldiers throughout the theater. Over 70 schools and clinics were constructed or renovated, as well as 87 km of roads, 18 wells, 23 culverts, and one aquifer system. More than 140,000 people were provided medical treatment.

TEAMS was officially activated in 1993 at Fort Kobbe through a combined effort of USARSO and the National Guard Bureau. TEAMS was reorganized under the ESC in 1995. TEAMS primarily supported Joint Chief of Staff major engineering exercises and National Guard Overseas Deployments for Training. TEAMS also coordinated, prepared, loaded and shipped equipment and supplies for JCS exercises. The TEAMS' mission has grown dra-

matically since its inception, but its underlying purpose has remained the same – to provide a forward logistical base and equipment staging area to support the on-going engineer and medical exercises, as well as contingency operations throughout the SOUTHCOM area of responsibility.

Maj. Gen. Philip R. Kensinger Jr., USARSO's commanding general, said that USARSO depended on the United States Army National Guard to help safeguard, maintain and provide logistical support to the theater's numerous exercises, operations, and contingencies, including logistical support in the implementation of the military drawdown. "How can we repay you for the service you have provided in these foreign lands," asked Kensinger. "You and Col. Rivera will not be forgotten."

Col. Angel M. Rivera, ESC commander and Deputy Chief of Staff for Reserve Affairs, said that the humanitarian assistance given to the thousands of victims of hurricanes Mitch and George would be remembered by all. ESC and TEAMS supported National Guard units providing medical care, and repairing and building roads and schools in the wake of the disasters. ESC and TEAMS have also provided invaluable assistance to the USARSO relocation effort to Fort Buchannan, Puerto Rico.

"The soldiers and families of ESC and TEAMS have always given their best," said Rivera. "Thanks for your help."

FSU receives Panama Canal College

BALBOA – In a distinguished ceremony held June 4 at the Panama Canal College, Florida State University formally received administrative control of the Panama Canal College facility located in La Boca. Dr. Lawrence G. Abele, FSU vice president of Academic Affairs, Tallahassee, was present at the ceremony, as was U.S. Ambassador Simon Ferro.

The ceremony followed an agreement signed with the City of Knowledge on May 7 as part of the compliance with the Panama Canal Treaty implementation.

The "Key to the City" was passed from the Interoceanic Region Authority (ARI) chief administrator Dr. Nicolas Barletta to Dr. Juan David Morgan of the City of Knowledge who then passed the key to Dr. Abele in a historic gesture of goodwill. FSU is a participant in the City of Knowledge, a collaboration between Panamanian universities and many universities worldwide that will occupy much of Fort Clayton after the reversion of the Panama Canal at the end of this year. The City of Knowledge will be a home to institutions like FSU dedicated to an interchange of ideas, both academic and cultural.

Dr. Abele said during the ceremony that it was a great honor for FSU to be associated with the City of Knowledge, and that the university was looking forward to continued service to the Panamanian community by providing a U.S. style education to Panamanians and citizens of other countries. Dr. Abele said that the isthmus of Panama has always been a land bridge for the dissemination of knowledge, and that FSU will continue to carry on this legacy.

To the many students, scholars, and other dignitaries present at the ceremony, U.S. Ambassador Simon Ferro said that the ceremony marked a significant place in history because, up to that moment, only entities of a military nature had been reverted to Panama according to the 1977 Panama Canal Treaty. Ferro said that it was a moment of real celebration because that day, a complete university was being transferred to the City of Knowledge with the aim of continuing to provide benefits of higher education. "The new relationship with FSU," said Ferro, "facilitates continued access to U.S. university

courses and post graduate education and joint investigations.'

Dr. Barletta stated, "This is a special occasion in the process of reverting the territory and activities of the Panama Canal to Panama as ordained in the Panama Canal Treaty. Today, we accept possession of the Panama Canal College facility and transfer the administrative use of the facility to FSU as part of the City of Knowledge. By our actions, Panama and the U.S. are demonstrating efforts to improve humanity by providing superior education in science, technology and cultural studies to the international community.'

Speaking on behalf of the board of directors of the City of Knowledge, Dr. Morgan said that the occasion was also a time to celebrate the present and the future of FSU in Panama after more than 40 years of contributing to the education of many of Panama's professionals. "The City of Knowledge salutes this transition and the extraordinary results that await as FSU leads us to greater discoveries in science, technology, and humanities," said Morgan. He added that the participation of FSU in the City of Knowledge represented a positive step in the realization of Panama's goals for the City of Knowledge.

FSU has been active in Panama since 1957, and its Panama Canal Branch is currently located in El Dorado. The university will soon move to the La Boca site under the new name of FSU Panama Canal College Branch. Classes are scheduled to begin at the new site on the 25th of August.

June 14: 222nd birthday of the Stars and Stripes

June 14 commemorates another U.S. Flag Day, birthday of the Stars and Stripes.

The Flag of the United States of America was approved by the Continental Congress on June 14, 1777, one year after the Declaration of Independence. However it was not officially adopted until 1780.

Flag Day was established on May 30, 1916, by proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson, but it was not until 1949, when President Harry Truman signed the legislation, that it became a national observance.

A description of the American flag is as follows:

Thirteen red and white stripes, each representing one England.

 Fifty stars representing each state of the Union, the last star added for the state of Hawaii, 1960.

The color blue signifies loyalty; the color red signifies courage, and the color white signifies liberty. The etiquette and courtesy of the use and handling of the flag include the following:

♦ When raised or lowered, the flag must not touch the ground nor the deck of a ship.

of the 13 original colonies of The Flag House is located on 239 the state of Pennsylvania. In all Arch Street, Philadelphia, Pa.

 Everyone present must salute the flag during the hoisting or low-

When placed at half-mast for the dead, it must be hoisted first to the top of the staff, then lowered into place.

If you are planning to be in Philadelphia, Pa. on or about June 14, it would be an appropriate time to visit the home of the first American flag, known as "Flag House" or "The Betsy Ross House" and located on 239 Arch Street (between Second and Third Streets).

Flag Day is a holiday only in other states the day is observed with school activities and by the

display of the flag on all public buildings and on private homes, serving as a reminder of the Nation's past accomplishments and ongoing dedication to safeguarding individual rights.

Netiquette: E-Mail Etiquette

The following are e-mail etiquette tips (called Netiquette) for internet users:

◆All users of e-mail need to be aware that there is no such thing as a private e-mail. Once a message is sent, there is no guarantee that it will be read only by the recipient. Sometimes an e-mail may get sent to the wrong person, and in addi-

tion, many software programs and online services can access messages even if the message is deleted. As a general rule, do not \$\gamma\$ send personal and confidential emails.

E-mail users need to be aware that some companies monitor employee e-mail to make sure they are not leaking company secrets and confidential messages to unauthorized sources, and also to make sure that users are not wasting time on frivolous messages.

♦ Keep your e-mail messages as concise and to the point as possible to avoid the need for clarification. Consider carefully what you write, especially since it's a permanent record and can be easily forwarded to other e-mail users.

Do not write your e-mails in ALL CAPITAL LETTERS. The use of upper-case letters when sending an e-mail is the equivalent of shouting. Uppercase words should be used sparingly and only when trying to emphasize a point.

"SPAM" is the internet term for junk mail (unsolicited mail, including humor, poems, anecdotes, fiction, nature stories, chain letters, forwarded messages, and others), and very few people enjoy receiving them.

You should get the recipient's permission and ensure that they would like to receive this type of mail before forwarding large amounts of unsolicited information to the people in your address book. Most recipients of "SPAM" simply delete without reading.

◆Keep attachments to a minimum. Large attachments take a long time to download and they take up much memory space in the recipient's com-

> Confirm the addressees (the "To:" and "cc:" lines) in your message be-, fore you send it, to make sure they are going to the proper destination.

◆Always type in your subject line to advise recipients what your message is about.

Once you send a first e-mail you will probably receive a response; if you want to reply to that response, do not start a new e-mail message because this breaks the link (called a "thread"). You should use "reply" to maintain the thread and keep the sequence of the message.

♦ If you are forwarding a message you have received, do not change the wording, and always add your comments at the top.

◆Do not send heated e-mail messages attacking people (these are called "flames"). In fact, avoid e-mail fights, discussions and negative comments that can hurt other people. Whenever possible, sensitive and personal problems should be resolved in person, not by e-mail.

Remember always to include your signature.

Local airmen hold combat dining out



No more surface mail after Aug. 31

The PAO Team coasted home to an easy victory in the Military Team Championship after the competition was decimated by PCS's and TDY's.






that cafe feeling."

ter, and it worked very well."

Both wives and husbands remembered having to use 25 cycle electricity for base housing instead of today's 60 cycle.

"That created a big problem for high-tech radios. Only radios with two tubes could pick up a signal. Any more tubes and the signal became too weak to enjoy," said Dyer.

The oldest stories came from 92-year "young" James Sauer of Owensboro, Ky., who served in Panama from 1925 to 1929 and had returned with his son, Bruce. Sauer was assigned horse stable duty back then when horses were the main way to get from point A to point B. The Fort Clayton horse stables were located where one might think they should have been

located and that is right near the main gate. As a matter of fact, the stables were located where the Aqua Center and those other long and narrow single story buildings are located now.

"There wasn't much to do for relaxation back then," says Sauer. "You could go downtown for much of the same reasons soldiers still go downtown or you could go horseback riding on the Las Cruces Trail that crosses the Isthmus if you go far enough."

Sauer said that once he was riding along the trail and spotted something shiny half buried in the forest floor. He dismounted and discovered a very old horse stirrup from the days of the Conquistadors. "I traded that stirrup for some more modern decorative Panamanian household articles just before I left Panama and returned to the states," said Sauer, "but I wish I'd kept it."

Many of the duties these former soldiers performed were unusual by today's needs and standards, but they

were as important then as the duties performed by today's soldiers are now. From Oct. of 1911, when the first U.S. Army soldiers were stationed in the Panama Canal Zone, and throughout the 88 years since, the U.S. Army has changed with the times. But one thing hasn't changed, and that is the dedication and devotion to country that soldiers in the Panama Canal have demonstrated throughout their tours of duty.

Before the tour began, Col. Bernardo C. Negrete, Chief of Staff for U.S. Army South, briefed the retired soldiers and their wives on the military drawdown process. All of those present were attentive to drawdown issues and Col. Negrete fielded many pertinent questions.

The retired soldiers of the 33rd Infantry Regiment lamented over the absence of U.S. military after this year, but all felt they had played an important role in the successful defense of the Panama Canal and were proud to have been a strong part in that defense.

7th and 24th Return as Integrated-Component Units

(This article came from the May issue of the Magazine of the Association of the United States Army)

The colors of the 7th Infantry Division and 24th Infantry Division again will be unfurled for active service as the headquarters for two active component/ Army National Guard integrated divisions, according to Army officials.

The divisions will be activated in October 1999. The 7th Division will be located at Fort Carson, Colo., and the 24th Division will be located at Fort Riley, Kan., with a forward element at Fort Jackson, S.C.

An active component major general will command each division, and National Guard enhanced separate brigades will provide combat power. Three enhanced separate brigades will be assigned to each division.

The 7th Infantry Division will be composed of the 41st Infantry Brigade from Oregon, 45th Infantry Brigade from Oklahoma and 39th Infantry Brigade from Arkansas. The 7th Division was inactivated at Fort Ord, Calif., in 1994.

The 24th Division will include the 30th Infantry Brigade (Mechanized) from North Carolina, 218th Infantry

Brigade (Mechanized) from South Carolina and 48th Infantry Brigade (Mechanized) from Georgia. The 24th Division was inactivated at Fort Stewart, Ga., in 1996.

The term "enhanced" refers to increased resources and manning priorities as well as improved training strategies during premobilization that are designed to ensure the ability to be ready to deploy within 90 days after call-up, Army officials said.

National Guard enhanced separate brigades are the Army's primary reserve component ground combat maneuver forces.





The statue of the Black Christ, located off the eastern shore, is just one of the many amazing sites at Isla Grande.



FORT CLAYTON (Contraband Control Office) - As a reminder, in accordance with the Panama Canal Treaty and U.S. Southern Command regulations, duty-free merchandise, whether new or used, cannot be given, transferred or generally sold to non-privilege holders. Violations to these dispositions may subject violators to prosecution under both military and Panamanian laws. It is sometimes permissible to sell an item, but only if Panamanian taxes are paid. Before such a sale, it is strongly recommended that the seller contact the Contraband Control Section for advice at 288-5814.



AAFES new check cashing policy

The AAFES Main Stores have implemented a new check validation process that verifies authorized customers upon check pre-

sentation. This applies to all personnel cashing checks and/ or making merchandise purchases in the Main Store. The new AAFES Corporate Customer Database is a collection of authorized sponsor and family member data re-



ceived from the military Defense Eligibility Enrollment Reporting System and personnel systems of AAFES, NEXCOM and MCX.

All customers not appearing on the AAFES Corporate Customer Datatbase must fill out a copy of the CCD Useform located at the Main Store Cashiers Cage. A copy of this form and the customers ID card will be retained on file at the Main Store.

All active duty, retirees and their family members should already be on the DEERS System and no action on their part is necessary. However, DOD civilians are not included in this database and they will be required to fill out the necessary useform if they wish to present a check for purchase or for cash. After the useform is turned into the Exchange, the system should be updated within 24 - 72 hours. The implementation of this program will be pushed back in Panama until Saturday to allow customers an opportuntity to sign up in advance.


