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PERSONNEL DIVISION

The number of full-time employees on the rolls decreased by 4, from 6,295 on June 30, 1958 to 6,291 on June 30, 1959.

The Government Printing Office Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners during the year received and rated 2,824 applications. A total of 833 placements were made from registers maintained by the Board.

An inspection of our activities was made by the U. S. Civil Service Commission from February 15 through March 4, 1960. The report was that our program was being administered in a satisfactory manner. However, suggestions were made for strengthening our Federal Merit Promotion Program.

During the year, over 2,600 employees received influenza inoculations under the direction of the Medical Officer.

After the passage of Public Law 86-382, Federal Employees' Health Benefits Act of 1959, a great deal of preliminary work was done to educate employees concerning the features of the various plans from which they had an opportunity to choose, and all training was completed before June 30, 1960. The protection, under this Law, became effective on July 10, 1960 insofar as Government Printing Office employees were concerned.

A new Printing Plant Worker examination was announced on September 29, 1959, as a result of which 2,682 applications were received.

At the request of the U. S. Civil Service Commission, the Board is considering announcement of examinations for Offset Duplicating Press Operator and Lithographic Offset Pressman.

Classes in Job Instruction were conducted during the year for uprate journeymen through the rank of foreman. There were 16 classes and 156 employees received certificates of completion.

All hourly-salaried employees were granted an increase during the year, including those in the Field Service Division.

DIVISION OF FINANCE AND ACCOUNTS

The Division of Finance and Accounts is under the supervision of the Comptroller of the Government Printing Office. It is organized as follows: Office of Comptroller; Appropriation Accounting and Auditing Section; Payroll and Time Records Section; Computing Section (includes General Files); Billing and Collecting Section; Traffic Section; Composition Measuring Section; Electronic Data Processing Section (includes Accounting and Audit Control and Cost Accounts).

The Comptroller is responsible for the legal, fiscal, and budgetary operations, and the preparation and interpretation of management and operating reports prepared from financial data.

The duties and responsibilities of the division are reflected in the following operations performed: accounting, financial control; bookkeeping; cost and time recording; current cost analyses; measuring ems of type in composition; audit of vouchers for paper, supplies and materials, printing procured commercially, and miscellaneous contracts; computing charges for printing and binding work and blank paper and supplies furnished to customer agencies; preparation of bills to customer agencies and the collection and accounting for same; preparation of claims for money due the Government Printing Office; collection of all moneys due the Office from claims, damages, and sales of Government property; the development, preparation, and operation of the Responsibility reporting system and charts and management analyses of same; preparation of annual budget submitted to the Congress for Printing and Binding for Congress, and for the Government Printing Office Revolving Fund; studies in connection with rates for printing and binding operations and their readjustment; cumulative computation of costs of each job as work progresses through the plants; preparation and audit of payrolls; administration of the annual and sick leave laws and regulations; preparation of reports pertaining to retirement deductions, life insurance, and health insurance as well as reports regarding the Government's contributions for same; performance of all functions necessary in connection with the administrative processing of claims for and against the U. S. Government Printing Office; and the rendering of decisions and furnishing of legal advice with respect to the applicability of the laws, regulations, and decisions of the Congress and regulating agencies of the Government.

PURCHASING DIVISION

The dollar value of Purchasing Division procurement activity increased to \$54,726,848 from the previous year's \$49,253,303. The breakdown is as follows: Commercial printing, \$28,103,604; paper, envelopes, and cartons, \$23,463,863; material and supplies, \$2,504,151; and machinery and equipment, \$655,228.

The value of commercial printing went up by about \$3,756,000. while the cost of paper went up approximately \$1,005,000.

Tonnage of paper purchased decreased from 185,999,021 pounds in 1959 to 164,915,616 pounds in 1960.

The average paper inventory was 30,889,149 pounds, about the same as the previous year. This figure includes an average of about 3,500,000 pounds on hand with commercial printers, but does not include about 2,500,000 pounds on hand awaiting release from Tests.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1960, the workload of the Stores Section showed a continuing increase in volume. Paper and envelope receipts showed a marked increase. Shipments of printed matter and blank paper to out-of-town destinations increased approximately ten percent. Shipments of waste paper and metal also increased.

The incoming telephone traffic, including local, Government, long-distance, information, and also miscellaneous calls within the Government Printing Office average 500 calls during the peak hours of the day. There were 215,482 outgoing message-unit calls at a cost of \$8,102. Long-distance calls completed amounted to 6,456 at a cost of \$9,768. The majority of these are charged to jacket numbers.

MAINTENANCE DIVISION

The division has been very active in connection with engineering and construction work. Work on the air-conditioning project is nearing completion. Extensive drawings and specifications have been prepared for closing in an area on the 5th floor of Building 1 (formerly a light court) for use by Documents Division for much-needed storage space.

The personnel total in the division has declined from 261 to 258 during the fiscal year. The Office lost-time injury rate is 25% below that of all Federal establishments.

DIVISION OF TESTS AND TECHNICAL CONTROL

The Division tested 11,135 samples during the year as follows:

There were 337 rejections for noncompliance with specifications. Of these, 247 were of paper, 17 of envelopes, 50 of ink, and 23 of miscellaneous materials. Paper rejections amounted to 7,820,233 pounds--4.35% of our total procurement. The rejections were for reasons tabulated hereinafter;

Of 136,081,492 envelopes, 867,000 were rejected, principally for deficiency in bursting strength or adhesive quality.

The Division manufactured 227,613 pounds of printing ink, including mimeograph, multilith, stamp-pad, and numbering-machine ink; standardized 13,811,504 pounds of type metal and produced 133,625 pounds of molded glue, 115,719 pounds of adhesives, and 2,403 press rollers requiring 15,109 pounds of composition.

Innumerable specifications for supplies and materials were prepared or revised to keep them up to date, and tests and experiments on the use of supplies were carried on continuously.

DOCUMENTS DIVISION

During the fiscal year 1960, a total of 175,456,662 publications were distributed, of which 51,406,414 were sold for a gross amount of \$8,512,937., an increase over last year of \$1,626,778. The return to the United States Treasury as earnings amounted to \$4,109,562.

Sales of Publications

The annual physical inventory of sales publications on hand as of June 30, 1960 showed 27,128 different titles for a total of more than 33,000,000 copies of publications. Of the 51,406,414 publications sold, 1,849,824 were sold by the main bookstore and its two branches. Receipts from bookstore sales were \$353,817., an increase of more than \$13,369 over fiscal year 1959, in serving 95,650 customers.

The Documents Division ordered from the Government Printing Office printing in the amount of \$4,248,440.

Documents Library

Total workload for the Library was 48,099 publications for fiscal year 1960, of which 26,304 were added to the permanent collection. This was an increase over fiscal year 1959.

During the fiscal year 1960, a total of 5,371,156 copies of publications were sent to depository libraries, which included 12,148 miscellaneous publications and 9,337 congressional bills and resolutions.

PLANNING DIVISIONS

The Divisions of Planning Service, Plant Planning, and Typography and Design, under the direction of the Planning Manager, processed 100,162 jackets--an increase of 869 over the last fiscal year.

Orders for printing and binding in excess of 100,000 were processed in fiscal 1960 for the first time since 1952. This year, we received 100,162 orders; in 1952 we received 106,017. In the intervening years the average of annual orders was 93,051.

These 100,162 orders were handled with 39.7 percent fewer employees on the Division rolls than in 1952. In 1952 we had 104 employees; today 67 are on our rolls. In other words, we now have 6 employees where we formerly had 10 for a similar workload.

Twenty percent of the orders received were procured from commercial sources. This, too, is a record breaker. In all, 20,247 orders were routed from this Division to Commercial Procurement. Our lowest recent figure was 15,446 orders in fiscal year 1954. These orders were handled as follows: 2,937 under simplified-bidding procedure; 1,012 under page-rate contracts, and 16,298 through regular procedure.

Our personnel was hard-pressed to render acceptable service to customers and to give customers the attention which was demanded because of the great loss of employee services due to leave taking. Several of our employees had prolonged sieges of illness. Sick-leave usage was heavy in the last half of the year. Total sick leave increased by approximately 20%. This situation promises to continue and is aggravated by the use of annual leave by employees who are approaching retirement.

Overtime work was reduced in fiscal 1960 by some 2,543 hours.

During the past several years there has been a steady decline in the number of waivers issued; in fiscal 1960 there were 1,248 compared to 1,215 in 1958 and 1,544 in 1957.

PRODUCTION DIVISIONS

During fiscal year 1960, out of 38,017 jackets which were closed out, 30,598 were on schedule, or a performance of 80% on time.

The Apprentice program continued to advance during the year, with apprentices being advanced to new assignments in accordance with schedule. Final assignments have been made in some instances, as the first group is now in the latter part of its training.

Night Production Manager (Congressional Printing)

During the past year the Record totaled 31,220 pages--an all-time high. There were 181 issued, with an average of 172.3 pages per issue. Approximately 42.9% of these pages were devoted to Senate proceedings; 24.5% to House proceedings; 27.7% to Appendix, and 3.2% to the Daily Digest, with 1.6% being blanks and fillers.

The personnel of the Night Production divisions numbered 1,611 at the close of the fiscal year as compared with 1,593 at the close of the previous fiscal year.

Total Bill prints handled numbered 23,622 compared with 22,252 for the last fiscal year.

The equivalent of 2,004 16-page forms were printed in Offset Division during the fiscal year compared with 2,860 the previous year.

As the fiscal year closed, we were nearing the end of the first complete Congress for which the House Calendar was printed by offset. While the Calendar was handled efficiently and schedules met, a preliminary report on the cost indicated that all operations should be surveyed and procedures corrected to bring this cost in line. The prime purpose of this change was to reduce the workload for group 33 presses; this was accomplished, inasmuch as Calendar forms sent to Letterpress fell some 2,500 below the previous second-session year; in fact, the relief was greater than anticipated, as the press run has been increased considerably since the change was made. The Senate Calendar, still routed to Letterpress, was printed 172 times with a total of 4,032 pages. While total pages of committee calendars increased greatly, the forms imposed declined, indicating a continuation of the trend to keep these publications up to date by proofing, with only an occasional printing.

The total number of hearings received (in addition to appropriation hearings) was 647, of which 273 were Senate and 374 were House, compared with 539 for the previous fiscal year.

Hearings for the Senate and House Appropriations Committees totaled 32,104 pages for the House and 16,409 pages for the Senate against last year's 30,084 for the House and 17,347 for the Senate.

The budget proper totaled 1,030 pages; the District of Columbia Budget 70 pages; and the Appendix 192 pages for a total of 1,292 pages, a decrease of 60 pages from last year's total of 1,352 pages.

Binding Division

Numerous changes in the physical set-up of the Bindery were made during the year. Part of the moves were made for the continuing expansion of the Off-set Division, part because of the request of the Librarian of Congress to move the Library Branch Bindery back to the main Office, and part for streamlining of certain bindery activities. These moves, while necessary, nevertheless created a number of temporary production problems and affected over-all production, especially in the hard-binding products. Most seriously affected was machine sewing. The production maintained was only 62 percent of the prior year's total. Also, the number of books finished, number of cases made, and number of pamphlets covered all showed sharp drops in total production.

Notable improvement was made in our folding-machine production. The hourly output increased on seven of the eight machine groups. As the folding unit represents a sizable segment of the bindery operations, the increase is important in helping maintain schedules. The size of the Congressional Record was such that a higher percentage of all issues coming off the press had to be gathered and stitched. The increase was 19 percent. There was a similar situation regarding the Federal Register.

Composing Division

As of June 30, the total number of employees in the Division shows 1,529 on the rolls in 1960 and 1,572 the previous year. For the past 8-year period the last day of the fiscal year shows:

According to production records, 2,724,254,600 ems were produced this year. Last year, it was 2,753,302,700. This seemingly points to a decrease of 29,048,100 ems. But such is not the case. Operation and Class numbers were changed, which took type away from measurable composition. The 13,500 measurable hours lost by the Class changes, converted into the em count would have produced at least 63,352,600 ems more than now shown on the records.

Letterpress Division

The Letterpress Division workload in fiscal year 1960 was comparable to fiscal year 1959 with a .9 percent increase in the number of forms put to press and a .2 percent increase in the total number of press impressions. The major increases in press impressions were on the envelope presses--12,401,181 increase, and on the Record presses--15,648,386 increase, with the greatest decreases on the postal-card presses and Miller Simplexes. There has been a decrease of 81 employees in this Division over the last 3 years.

The Postal Card Section production was down considerably. The total produced during the year was only 59.7 percent of the number produced during the prior year. Extreme fluctuations such as this create serious problems in properly utilizing personnel and equipment.

Of the 181 issues of the Congressional Record, only 10 were stitched on the press. The size of the issues was such that the capacity of the 3 presses was exceeded on a number of occasions. This fact, together with accelerated delivery schedules on this work and other work, necessitated frequent lifting of the forms and some chargeable standby time.

Offset Division

The workload of the Offset Division continued at a high level with more congressional work being switched to this process. The total press impressions dropped from 324,812,011 in fiscal year 1959 to 323,473,983 in 1960. A corresponding drop in press time was noted with the result that the average impressions increased 33 per hour. The time per average makeready increased from 1.23 hours to 1.305. It is believed the increase in 300-line-screen work and the exacting Census work was partly responsible. The number of negatives made by the Negative Section increased 4 percent over fiscal year 1959. Even with this increase, the Section could not handle all of the work. As a result, the procurement program was stepped up by 9 percent and the Photoengraving Section's facilities were utilized to a much greater extent in an effort to provide the service required. The number of jobs issued for commercial printing increased 19 percent and the number of jobs received from commercial concerns for storage of reproducibles jumped 43 percent in fiscal year 1960 over the prior year. It is apparent from the above why the increase in extra hours was required. This Division worked over 130,000 hours of overtime.

Platemaking Division

The workload of the Platemaking Division continued to be very spotty during the year. Although the total square-inch production increased by 12 percent

over fiscal year 1959, this increase was primarily due to a sharp increase in the amount of syndicated stereotype-mat work and offset negative work. During the year many changes were made in an effort to keep costs in line--some 88 man days of enforced leave were taken in the Finishing Section; a cross-training program established in the Photoengraving Section; the Molding Section was merged with the Finishing Section; the metal and wood-blocking units were consolidated, and the plate-vault office relocated. These changes, together with numerous other positive-action improvements, have made it possible to maintain a favorable cost status.

The utilization of camera equipment in the Photoengraving Section helped to relieve an overload in the Offset Negative Section as well as to assist in maintaining an adequate workload in the Photoengraving Section.

Field Service Division

Cost of operation of the Field Plants increased 8.7 percent over fiscal year 1959, while the income increased only 6 percent. The only effect was a cutback in the extent of over-recovery. The number of employees increased from 432 in 1959 to 453 in 1960, with the increase being made in the Departmental Service plant. The increase there was due to two special jobs acquired. The problem of maintaining a balanced workload in the smaller offices continued to be a major problem. It is hoped that greater consolidation of all Governmental printing in these areas can be achieved to obtain maximum efficiency and economy in Government printing. Offset printing and services related thereto continued to show increases generally and paralleled the trend noted by the main Office. Letterpress activities appear to be on the decline except for specialized work.

Library Branch Office

The Library of Congress continued to increase its requirements for catalog cards and salable proof sheets. The total cards printed in fiscal year 1960 shows an increase of 38 percent over 5 years ago. The growth has been steady each year. If this growth continues, it will be necessary to consider increasing our composition facilities or adding a second shift. The Library Binding Section was moved back to the main Office (at the request of the Librarian of Congress) during April 1960, with the transfer being made effective May 1. As a result, this Section of the Branch was working under handicaps for over one month during the year.

Delivery Section

The Delivery Section reported an increase of 1,298 individual shipments or an increase of 15.6 percent over fiscal year 1959, with a 3.2 percent increase in total mileage of the fleet. Even with the increased mileage, the accident-frequency rate decreased from 1.53 to 1.11 during the year.
