In obedience to the requirements of the statute, I have the honor to report the condition, the amount and cost of the public printing, binding, lithographing, and engraving; the amount and cost of all papers purchased for the same; a statement of the contracts entered into for the purchase of paper; all payments made during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883, including those for material and labor for the Congressional Record; the amount of work ordered and done, with a general classification thereof, for each Department; the number of persons employed in the Government Printing Office, and the time each has been employed, and the amount each has received.

The law also provides that the Public Printer shall report "such further information touching all matters connected with the Printing Office as may be in his possession."

In presenting my first annual report, in order to comply with the law, as I understand it, it becomes necessary to give more of the details than have heretofore been presented, that Congress may better understand the work of the office under my charge. When I entered upon the discharge of my duties as Public Printer I found the office embarrassed by a large deficiency, empty warehouses, and much of the machinery in use of old and discarded patterns and badly worn, which caused great

delay and needless expense in the execution of work. It was also evident, even to the eye of one of limited experience in the printing business, that there was pressing need of a thorough reorganization of the Government Printing Office. With the large sum of money appropriated for printing and binding I could not shrink from the responsibility which I felt resting upon me, to so reorganize the various departments of the office as to result in faithful, efficient, and economical management of all its vast machinery. To this important work—the magnitude of which can scarcely be realized—I have given my best efforts. It is not possible to give all the details of reorganization, and I shall only take up a few of the more important branches.

LITHOGRAPHING AND ENGRAVING.

The lithographing and engraving required for Congress and the Departments has been increasing quite rapidly of late years.

Contrary to the custom heretofore prevailing in the office, I have caused parties awarded work to enter into a written contract with sufficient bonds (when necessary) for the faithful performance of the work called for in their bid. Where under the law proposals are not required, a letter is sent to contractors asking for an estimate on the proposed work. By adopting this method I am always advised in advance as to the exact cost of this class of illustrations, whereas, under the previous system, parties doing the work were at liberty to fix their price, and it was impossible for the Public Printer to arrive at the cost of the proposed work until it was completed and bills rendered. Under the present rule, no lithographing or engraving of any description is ordered until the office is advised of the exact cost. All such proposals are received in writing and placed on file. The Public Printer not unfrequently must stand between irresponsible bidders and the Department for which this class of work is ordered, and all his official acts from the proposal to the award of contract will be found on file in this office. Good and satisfactory printing cannot be executed with inferior plates, and it has been my endeavor to award the contracts to the lowest bidder, having in view the best interests of the Government. During the past year this office has suffered but little, if any, embarrassment from contractors for this class of work, and all such lithographing, &c., has received the approval of the Department for which the work was intended.

It will be seen elsewhere in this report that the expenditure for lithographing and engraving has been reduced nearly \$100,000 during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883.

PAPER FOR PUBLIC PRINTING.

Sealed proposals are received and the contracts awarded by the Joint Committee on Printing of both Houses, for supplying the various kinds

of paper, card-board, &c., required for the public printing for the year ending February 28.

The awards appear in detail elsewhere in this report. The demands of the service require that the warehouses should always have a supply of the requisite grades of paper on hand. Without good paper it will be impossible to turn out satisfactory work. The receipt, inspection, and approval of the paper is a very important duty, requiring the services of a paper expert. The importance of this branch of the service prompted me to appoint a superintendent who is required to see that every bundle of paper is properly inspected and fully up to contract in quality, weight, and finish. He also inspects all card-board, binders' board, &c., and indorses all bills for the same. These invoices are part of the files of the office. No paper is paid for until it has been inspected and approved and the proper indorsement made on the invoices by the Superintendent of Paper. The item of waste paper in this office as in all others must receive careful attention, and the quantity is increased or diminished as care is taken to accommodate the blanks or books to regular sizes of paper. Special attention has been given to this part of the work, with gratifying results.

It had become customary to use very heavy and costly paper on blanks and jobs for which a lighter and cheaper paper was really better. Much waste of fine paper had occurred by using the regular sizes on irregular forms, and I have now the proper size and quality manufactured for these forms, and in these particulars a very large saving in cost of stock has been effected. In many of these cases, also, it has reduced the cost of presswork.

PAY DEPARTMENT.

The pay-roll of the Government Printing Office will average about \$5,000 per day, and any loss of time in the payment of employes is a matter worthy of careful consideration. I abolished the former pay system—which resulted in filling the corridors on pay-days, necessitating great confusion, loss of time, &c.—and provided suitable rooms for the disbursing officer, fixed specific pay-days, and required employes to visit the cashier's room, in sections of 25 each, in the order in which their names appeared on the pay-rolls. The new system works admirably, avoids all confusion, and there is a great saving of time, which, in the payment of from 2,100 to 2,300 people, is an important consideration. As the amount of money that can be drawn from the Treasury by the Public Printer at one time is limited, it was formerly the practice of the office to exhaust such fund, almost invariably closing up the pay-roll with but a portion of a department paid. The employes complained that they had no regular pay-days, and I designated the 3d, 8th, and 13th working days of each month as the regular pay-days, and directed that proper assignment be made for each. Under the present system all the employes know the exact date upon which they will receive their pay.

APPOINTMENTS.

The subject of appointments is a heavy tax upon the Public Printer's time, and the pressure has been much greater than ever since the Civil Service rules went into effect. The custom was for each Foreman to appoint or discharge at will; there was no record aside from the pay-roll, and it was simply impossible for the head of the office to know who was in his employ except as shown on the pay-rolls. I adopted the rule that the Public Printer, being responsible for the work of the office, should make all the appointments. A complete "Record of Employés," by States, was made up, is corrected daily, and is checked up with the pay-rolls. A weekly consolidated report is then prepared and laid on the Public Printer's desk, showing all the appointments, resignations, deaths, transfers, &c., so that the head of the office is invariably advised of any changes among the employés of this large establishment; and I confidently believe that the shorter hours of service, and better pay than prevails in outside offices, together with due care in selection and appointments, has resulted in making the force now employed in the Government Printing Office of such skill and efficiency as was never exceeded, if equaled, in any other printing establishment in the world.

Upon taking charge of the office I found a very heavy force of employés at work, and no vacancies in any positions. I also found that the distribution of the patronage and places was not in accordance with equal justice to all the States—since the District of Columbia, adjacent and Eastern States were represented by a very much larger number than their proper quotas, while the Western and Southern States had far less than the number to which they would be entitled on a fair division of the patronage. It has been my aim to correct this as far as possible, as vacancies have occurred, and although it must be a matter of considerable time to effect the desired result, I have so far succeeded that the States last named have now a much better representation in the office than at any previous time.

ACCOUNTS.

With a view of having every official transaction shown both in detail and in consolidated form, quite a number of new books have been opened during the past year. They are intended to be a faithful record of every transaction, and Congress can be furnished with any desired information in relation to the office, upon the shortest possible notice. It has been my purpose to adopt a perfect system of checks and counter-checks of one book upon another, and with the Treasury Department, which with the vouchers on file will make the record complete. The work of the office seemed to have outgrown the organization, and I have steadily endeavored to apply business rules to its management, to the end especially that there should be a book for every transaction, and every transaction shown in the book. Among these it may be

well to mention the Cash Record Book, never before used in this office, which shows every dollar's transaction, and a true daily cash balance, so that Congress or any one interested can, in a brief space of time, examine and trace every transaction involving the expenditure of Government funds.

SANITARY CONDITION.

The entire establishment has been thoroughly cleaned, renovated, and painted within and without, and strict rules for the preservation of cleanliness adopted and enforced. In accordance with an act of Congress, the old and very faulty system of water-closets has been removed and a new and modern one put in. The old floors of the building, which had become decayed and dangerous, have been removed and new ones put down. Several hundred tons of printed matter, which had accumulated on the upper floors, making them exceedingly unsafe, have been removed and stored elsewhere. It may, therefore, be safely claimed that the sanitary and general condition of the office is far better than ever before, and by strict enforcement of rules laid down for the government of the very large force of employés it is believed this condition may be preserved in the future.

DRYING ROOM ABOLISHED.

Upon taking charge of this office it was found that the old and discarded system of "wetting" and "making ready" calendered paper was still practiced. To do this required a force of about thirty-five employés. This system had been abandoned in all the first-class printing offices of the country for many years, and that of working "dry" paper adopted. I therefore dismissed this force and adopted the more modern plan, and the result has been that the gloss and finish of the paper is preserved; sharper and better printing done; the printed sheets much more rapidly and easily manipulated in the folding-room and bindery, and a saving in expense amounting to fully \$20,000 to \$25,000 per annum effected.

NO DEFICIENCY.

When I assumed the position of Public Printer, one of the first duties devolving upon me was to apply to Congress for a deficiency to supply the necessary material for doing the work for the two and one-half months ending the fiscal year of my predecessor, June 30, 1882.

I am pleased to inform Congress that the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883, closed without any deficiency, but with an unexpended balance in the Treasury. By inaugurating reforms, some of which are herein referred to, keeping a correct record of all orders for materials, lithographing, &c., and earnestly endeavoring to insure a judicious management of the finances generally, no suspension of work became necessary, nor were any of the employés furloughed during the closing months of the fiscal year, contrary to the usual custom, and there were sufficient

funds at my disposal to supply the usual and necessary amount of material during the whole year. In addition to this the office has been painted, presses, machinery, and material much improved, quite a large addition of new, latest improved and fast presses and machinery bought in place of old ones, some of which were disposed of, as will appear elsewhere in this report; warehouses fairly supplied with stock and material, and the suspended work well advanced, while more work was done during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883, than ever before in any one year in the history of the office, as will be seen by reference to the tabular statements herewith.

PIECE WORK.

In a great workshop like the Government Printing Office, where labor enters so largely into the annual expenditures, there should be strict discipline, with neither place nor space for indolent employés or drones. In the reorganization of the office, where I have found anything that tended in that direction I have used my best endeavors to correct it. Finding that the amount of work accomplished on what was known as the "day tables" in the bindery was far below what it should have been, on the 1st of April 130 employés—sewers—were ordered paid by the piece instead of \$11 per week, which they were receiving. Care was taken in arranging the scale of wages to give all such employés an opportunity to earn as much by the piece as they were receiving by the week, provided they did the work. The wisdom of this reform is conceded upon all sides. The worthy, industrious, and careful sewers can earn as much, and if there is sufficient work a fraction more than they formerly received, while those who were not returning a *quid pro quo* with the needle very naturally fell back to their places in the rear. I am glad to say that in inaugurating and carrying out this reform—after it was explained to them—I had the very cordial support of a great many Senators and Representatives, whose attention was attracted to the matter by a number of their constituents who were interested.

SLOW PRESSES.

I find that there has been a great waste of time and money on account of the use of numerous old-fashioned printing-presses, nearly all of which have been almost constantly running day and night for a long series of years—in many cases double the "life" of an ordinary printing-press—and are consequently very badly worn, and with so much "lost motion" as to render it extremely difficult to do even passable work on them, and only at a very slow speed. It is evidently in the interest of economy to substitute presses which can do as much work in one day as some of those now in use can do in two. The press facilities have not been equal to the demands upon the office, requiring a vast amount of night work at increased expense, and I have endeavored to improve them so far as the limited means at my command would permit.

For instance, many of these are the old "Adams" presses—size 27 x 41—originally costing about \$2,800, now having a capacity of about 600 per hour, and each costs \$3.10 per day to operate. While a new-style, two-revolution, fast-cylinder press—42 x 56—costing about \$5,500, will print a sheet double the size of the Adams and more than twice as fast, giving it an actual capacity four times greater than the former press, and costing precisely the same per diem to operate.

SAFETY FROM FIRE.

Until the present year there have never been any measures taken to render this office comparatively safe from fire, or, in case of sudden alarm, any systematized plan to prevent the loss of life or limb of its employés, among whom are more than a thousand females.

In accordance with an act of Congress, since its last session there have been provided a strong steam force-pump, equal in power to a modern steam fire-engine; also five iron stand-pipes, reaching from the ground to the roof, with hose openings in each for every floor in the building, and to these are kept at all times attached and ready for work one hundred feet of hose, with pipe, for each opening, so that upon an alarm of fire the steam pump can be started and the building flooded with water in a very short time—probably in most cases before the city fire department could arrive. There have also been erected three large and commodious balcony fire-escapes, with openings on each floor, more particularly for the egress of the female employés, and an iron fire-ladder alongside each stand-pipe, from ground to roof, for the use of the firemen and male employés. In addition to these are two canvas fire-escapes, reaching from the upper floor to the ground, and an iron tramway or fire "trolley" running entirely around the building at the top, to which is attached an iron bucket and chains, for the relief of any person or persons in the upper stories who might be cut off from help by fire below. Bows and arrows were also provided by the special commission, which would enable life-lines to be shot or thrown through the upper windows. Up to the time these changes were made the entire office was supplied with only a three-inch connection with the water-mains, which barely gave sufficient water for daily office use, and was wholly inadequate for fire purposes. But by the kindly co-operation of Mr. Edward Clark, Architect of the Capitol, and also a member of the special commission, the office has now more than double the former supply, and quite ample to render the new fire apparatus in every way efficient. All the outside doors were originally hung so as to open towards the inside of the building, and in case of a panic, with the pressure against them, it would have been impossible to have opened them. The hinges have been changed so as to open either way, and egress cannot thereby be obstructed. Besides all these ample facilities for the safe egress of employés in case of sudden alarm of fire, the entire force of females has been divided up into companies of forty each, and each company placed in charge of a captain,

with several aids, and in case of alarm these companies are taken out by designated fire-escapes, under the charge and aid of the men appointed for the purpose. The first trial of the system demonstrated the fact that the bindery, containing about five hundred women and nearly one hundred men, was emptied in less than one minute; and it is believed that after more trials the entire office can be cleared in less than two minutes. It, therefore, may be fairly stated that for the first time in the history of the office it is reasonably safe from fire, and its employés from danger of loss of life or limb caused by a stampede or want of sufficient egress.

CONGRESSIONAL RECORD.

As will be seen elsewhere, the amount of matter in the *Congressional Record* during the last Congress shows an unprecedented increase, being about 20 per cent. Upon assuming the position of Public Printer I found it was a matter of very general complaint among members of both Houses that there had been much delay and irregularity in the morning issue of the *Record*, and inquiry at the post-office showed the fact that when published in time for the early mails it was the exception and not the rule.

A careful and thorough reorganization of the *Record* department was effected, new type and machinery were provided, a new and more thorough system of doing the work was inaugurated, and the result has seemed to meet the wishes of Congress in increased regularity and promptness of issue, in improved typographical appearance, and, with but very rare exceptions, in time for the early morning mails; and notwithstanding the immense demand made upon the resources of the office at various times during the last session—and the very great increase in the volume of matter—the copies were almost invariably laid upon the desks of Members at 8 o'clock each morning. These few exceptions were due only to the fact that the copy was not furnished in time by the official reporters, who, I understand, were so overtaxed that it was impossible for them to keep up with the work.

In this connection I desire to say that if necessary, and the copy is promptly furnished, the facilities and present organization of the *Record* department will enable me in an emergency to print a *Record* containing twofold more matter than the present issue; and I refer to this matter that Congress may know that the non-appearance of the issue promptly every morning at 8 o'clock will be solely for want of copy or the withholding and delay of "proofs" until so late in the night as to render it impossible.

Another result of the reorganization of this division of the office has been that both the bound edition and the index, although consisting of more volumes than ever before, have been completed at a much less proportionate expense, and in a very much shorter time after the adjournment of Congress.

The question of the propriety of printing in the *Record* speeches

which were never delivered before Congress has at times been discussed in Congress and by the press of the country. If it should be decided to stop this practice it would materially lessen the expense of this publication.

PRINTING FOR THE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENTS.

In making the appropriation from year to year for printing for the Executive Departments it is evident that Congress intended to confine the orders within certain limits mentioned for the respective Departments. All such printing is done on requisitions signed by the head of the Department or some assistant designated by him. The Comptroller inclines to the view that the Public Printer cannot exceed the allotment in any case. It is impossible to confine the work in process of completion to the exact figures mentioned. Aside from this it not unfrequently occurs that for the last six to eight weeks of the fiscal year the appropriation or allotment may become exhausted for one Department, causing serious inconvenience and delays to public business, while some other Department may have an unexpended balance.

It would seem that the embarrassment in many cases might be obviated if the Public Printer were authorized, in his discretion, with the approval of the Joint Committee on Printing, to transfer the unexpended allotment on his books from one Department to another; this would in nowise increase the appropriation. If this were done with the consent of the head of the Department interested, the intention of Congress in restricting the amount of work done would still be carried out, and such action would at the same time furnish the various Departments with the really necessary printing, and consequently avoid any interruption of public business.

It is very necessary that the Executive printing and binding should be executed neatly and promptly. Realizing fully that any delay in this class of printing would have a tendency to work injury to the public doing business with the various Departments, I have endeavored to cause all such Executive printing to be completed and delivered at the earliest possible moment. I deemed this branch of the work of sufficient importance to merit special attention. The officers in the various Departments interested can vouch for the measure of efficiency attained in that direction. Where delays have occurred it has been on account of the failure of contractors to furnish the necessary paper. The amount of work done for the various Executive Departments shows a substantial increase in quantity, and the cost of the same is shown in this report in detail.

MONEY-ORDER PRINTING.

Congress at its last session passed a law (Public, No. 62) in regard to the new postal notes, entitled "An act to modify the postal money-order system, and for other purposes," in which the following appears: •

And all blanks, blank-books, and printed or engraved matter supplied to postmasters by the Postmaster-General or used in his Department for the transaction of the money-order business shall be obtained from the

lowest responsible bidders for furnishing printed and engraved matter, respectively, under separate advertisements calling for proposals to furnish the same for a period of four years, upon such conditions as the Postmaster-General may prescribe: *Provided*, That the Public Printer and the Chief of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing of the Treasury Department shall submit, respectively, estimates "of the cost of furnishing such printed and engraved matter" as may be required for use in the money-order business, and they shall furnish such printed and engraved matter whenever upon their estimates of cost the expenditure therefor will be less than upon proposals made as above provided for.

In accordance with the above law I made a careful estimate "of the cost of furnishing such printed matter," based upon a list furnished me by Hon. C. F. McDonald, Superintendent Money-Order System, Post-Office Department. The total estimate of cost was—

For blanks	\$14,933 23
For blank-books	34,645 52

STORAGE.

More room is urgently needed for the storage of printed matter in process of completion at the Government Printing Office. During the last session of Congress the dangerous weight (not to mention the inconvenience) was recognized by Congress in the appropriation of \$5,000 for storage purposes. But as the work is constantly increasing with the growth of the country, the time is close at hand when it will be unavoidably necessary to provide additional room both for storage and operating purposes, by the rental or purchase of the old Congressional Globe building (a portion of which is now occupied under lease by the Government for storage purposes), or by such other additional facilities as the wisdom of Congress may suggest.

CLERICAL WORK.

From year to year the legislative appropriation bill has made provision for four clerks of class four and one of class one. I found that more than double that number had been employed as per diem assistants and paid out of the appropriation for printing and binding, and their employment was unavoidable in order to keep up with the constantly increasing clerical work in the office. I believe it would be better to place the clerks of this office on an equal footing with those in the Departments, and I respectfully suggest that, in addition to the salaries provided by law for the Public Printer and chief clerk, there be allowed—

One disbursing clerk, salary \$2,100.

Four clerks of class four.

Two clerks of class three.

Four clerks of class two.

Four clerks of class one.

One clerk at \$1,000 per annum.

Four messengers.

The disbursing officer has held the position for twenty-three years, and at present disburses between two and three million dollars annually, making good all losses by reason of mistakes in making change, &c. I think he should receive more pay than a clerk who has none of these responsibilities. I take pleasure in testifying to his long, faithful, and valuable services, and in calling attention to the fact that it is the custom in the Departments to allow additional compensation to cashiers whose disbursements are but a small amount as compared with the funds handled annually by the disbursing officer of the Government Printing Office.

REDUCTION IN ORDERS FOR PRINTING.

The business of the office is so organized that estimates of the cost of the proposed work under consideration by Congress can as a general rule be furnished within a very short time. Rule 54 of the Senate says: "Motions to print additional numbers shall also be referred to the Committee on Printing; and when the committee shall report in favor of printing additional numbers, the report shall be accompanied by an estimate of the probable cost thereof." Having no control over the orders for printing, but being held responsible for its economical execution, and believing that Congress also desires to prevent unnecessary expenditures therefor, I deem it proper to suggest that such expenditures could be largely reduced by the enactment of a similar proviso by the House, that when either Committee on Printing shall report in favor of printing additional numbers, the report shall be accompanied by an estimate of the probable cost thereof. The adherence to this rule by the chairman of the Senate Committee on Printing has produced economical results, and could the proviso be extended over all the Congressional printing a great saving in the cost of Congressional work would be effected. In future if work of magnitude and large numbers should be referred by Congress to the Joint Committee on Printing—or a sub-committee composed of certain members of this committee who are practical printers, or with extended experience in the printing business—and if this committee first obtain an estimate from the Public Printer of the cost of such work, then examine carefully into the really necessary and desirable number that should be printed, and report all the facts to Congress before final action is taken, it is believed that it would have a tendency to largely reduce the present volume and expense of the public printing.

UNFINISHED WORK.

When I took charge of the office I found an immense quantity of unfinished work, which had been accumulating from year to year, but since that time it has been given special attention and the amount reduced as far as possible. The amount of this work is a subject which Congress alone has the power to regulate and control. *Forty-two thousand and twelve volumes* of unfinished work were completed and delivered during the last fiscal year.

EMPLOYÉS.

The number of employés is regulated by the demands for work upon the office. The average number at the dates mentioned during the four quarters of the fiscal year was as follows:

In view of the fact that the clerks in the various Departments, working a less number of hours per day, are entitled to thirty days' leave of absence each year, I submit that as a matter of right and justice to the employés of the Government Printing Office, who have ever been faithful day and night, it would seem proper that at least to some extent the law should be so modified that they too can be favored with a leave of absence. A more faithful and devoted class of employés cannot be found in any Department; and I respectfully call the attention of Congress to this question, and express the hope that some provision may be made for them in the direction indicated.

CENSUS WORK.

During the year the various volumes of Census work have been advanced as rapidly as copy was furnished. At times this office has had as high as *twenty tons* of long primer, bavier, and nonpareil type, rule and figure work, locked up, awaiting return of proofs; probably the largest amount of "live matter" ever kept standing at one time in this or any other country, making indispensable large additions to the fonts of body type.

There has at no time been any delay in the work caused by this office.

The total amount expended on account of the Census appropriation during the year was \$134,006.35.

AGRICULTURAL REPORT.

As Congress is aware, the publication of this annual report has been behind for some years, but it is now up to time, and it is believed can be kept so in the future. The entire edition of three hundred thousand copies of the last report has been completed and delivered.

LAWS REGULATING THE PUBLIC PRINTING.

Many of the present laws in regard to printing were passed when work was done by contract, and there was a Superintendent of Printing with an office in the Capitol. Such acts are practically obsolete and should be repealed. The rapid growth and constantly increasing demands of the business of the office are followed by frequent questions of a legal character, and there should be some law officer of the Government to whom the Public Printer can apply for legal advice.

CONFIDENTIAL PRINTING.

There is of necessity quite a variety of the public printing, like the Treaties, Annual Reports of the Heads of Departments, instructions to Government officials, &c., which must be put in type (and while under consideration, or being altered and corrected up to the proper time for promulgation to the public), must be treated as "confidential," so that no undue advantage may be taken of premature publication.

I am inclined to the belief that the Government Printing Office has in many cases been unjustly criticised when papers of this nature have been made public before the proper time. In most cases a large number of proofs have to be taken while being got into proper shape, many of which pass through several different hands after they leave the Printing Office, and a rigid examination into the facts will show that in almost all such cases undue publicity occurred through no fault of this office. Desirous of preventing any repetition of this, so far as the responsibility of this office is concerned, I have adopted such measures as would now seem to render publicity almost impossible. Such work is given only to trustworthy employés and is under the watch and supervision of the Foreman in all its stages. A complete record of every proof and impression is kept, and the copy, proofs, and forms, when not in use, are kept locked up in safes. The precautions taken would seem to render it impossible that any such paper, or parts of same, can now be published before the proper time.

LITHOGRAPHING AND ENGRAVING.

The aggregate amount paid for this character of work was \$154,344.10, as will appear by reference to Statement No. 8.

THE PUBLIC BINDING.

The amount expended for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1883, on account of the public binding was \$627,520.49, the details of which will be found in Statement No. 6. The value of stock on hand at the end of the fiscal year was \$32,130.05.

CONGRESSIONAL PRINTING AND BINDING.

During the first session of the Forty-seventh Congress, from the 1st day of July up to and including the 8th day of August, 1882, there were ordered printed for the Senate 486 bills and joint resolutions, 9 executive documents, 20 miscellaneous documents, 104 reports of committees,

and 8 confidential documents. For the House there were ordered printed 374 bills and joint resolutions, 8 executive documents, 23 miscellaneous documents, and 282 reports of committees.

During the second session of the Forty-seventh Congress there were ordered printed for the Senate 803 bills and joint resolutions, 85 executive documents, 51 miscellaneous documents, 153 reports of committees, 30 resolutions, and 4 confidential documents. For the House there were ordered printed 970 bills and joint resolutions, 108 executive documents, 39 miscellaneous documents, 233 reports of committees, and 8 resolutions.
