To the Senate and House of Representatives:

In obedience to the laws regulating the public printing, I have the honor to report to you "the exact condition, and the amount and cost of the public printing, binding, lithographing, and engraving; the amount and cost of all papers purchased for the same; a detailed statement of proposals made and contracts entered into for the purchase of paper and other materials; all payments made during the preceding year, under my direction; the amount of work ordered and done, with a general classification thereof for each Department; the number of hands employed in said establishment, and the time each has been employed; and such further information, touching all matters connected with said printing-office, as may be in my possession."

The tabular statements accompanying this report are for the year ending September 30, 1874, and presented in the following order:

The amount realized during the year from the sale of paper-shavings, imperfections, documents, Congressional Records, &c., is \$43,319,99, which has been deposited in the Treasury of the United States, in accordance with the law.

DISTRIBUTION OF DOCUMENTS.

Under the advice and recommendation of the Joint Committee on Printing, the usual number of documents under the order of Congress was, during the first session of the Forty-third Congress, advanced from 1,625 for the Senate, and 1,650 for the House, to 1,900 for each. The number of bills and resolutions was also advanced, under the same advice, from 825 to 925, for both House and Senate, which have been distributed in accordance with the following schedule:

PAPER FOR THE PUBLIC PRINTING.

By virtue of the fourth section of the act of July 27, 1866, the Joint Committee on Printing has the exclusive control of the matter of contracting for paper for the public printing, and of "fixing a standard of paper for the different descriptions of congressional and executive printing." Under the direction of the committee, contracts were entered into for supplying any required quantities of the various kinds for the year ending on the 31st December, 1874, with the following persons:

There remained on hand at the end of the year papers of various kinds, as will be seen by reference to the same statement, amounting in value to \$127,918.78.

LITHOGRAPHING AND ENGRAVING FOR CONGRESSIONAL DOCUMENTS.

The aggregate amount paid for this character of work was \$19,899.87, as will appear by reference to Statement No. 6.

MAPPING FOR THE SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES.

The amount expended for this class of work during the past year was \$1,209.97.

THE PUBLIC BINDING.

The amount expended during the year ending September 30, 1874, on account of the public binding was \$549,078.20, the details of which will be found in Statement No. 5. The value of materials on hand at the end of the year was \$108,916.12.

CONGRESSIONAL PRINTING AND BINDING.

There were printed for the Senate 1,847 bills and joint resolutions, 58 executive documents, 130 miscellaneous documents, and 478 reports of committees. For the House there were printed 3,871 bills and joint resolutions, 290 executive documents, 301 miscellaneous documents, and 843 reports of committees.

PUBLISHING THE PROCEEDINGS AND DEBATES OF CONGRESS.

The printing of the proceedings and debates at this Office having been made a subject of discussion and legislation during the first session of the Forty-third Congress, I would most respectfully present a brief history of that question as it appears from the record:

On the second day of April, 1872, the following law of Congress was approved:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Congressional Printer is hereby directed to enter into a contract on behalf of the General Government with Franklin Rives, Jefferson Rives, and George A. Bailey, for the reporting and printing of the debates of Congress for the term of two years, on and from the fourth day of March, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, in accordance with a proposed form of contract from the said Rives & Bailey submitted to and approved by the Joint Committee on Public Printing on the part of the Senate.

SEC. 2. That for the purpose aforesaid there be appropriated and paid, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of four hundred thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, the accounts having been approved, as in previous years, by the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House, or their representatives.

Sec. 3. That no person shall be employed as a reporter for the Honse without the approval of the Speaker of the Honse: Provided, That it shall be the duty of the Joint Committee on Public Printing to publish an advertisement once a week for four weeks, in one paper in each of the cities of Washington, Philadelphia, New York, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, Louisville, Saint Louis, and San Francisco, inviting proposals in detail for reporting and for printing, together and separately, the debates of the Fortythird, the Forty-fourth, and the Forty-fifth Congresses, together or separately, and to report all proposals which may be received before the designated day to Congress, at the earliest practicable date, with estimates, hereby directed to be made by the Congressional Printer, of the cost of reporting the debates, and of printing them at the

Government Printing Office, accompanied by the recommendations of the Joint Committee on Public Printing on all proposals and estimates so submitted; and that the bills for such advertising be paid in equal parts from the contingent funds of the Senate and of the House of Representatives: And provided further, That no debates shall be reported or published at public expense, after the close of the present Congress, except upon written contracts entered into therefor under the authority of Congress.

In conformity with this law, the Joint Committee on Printing for the Forty-second Congress issued advertisements inviting proposals, under a detailed schedule, for publishing the proceedings and debates of the Forty-third, Forty-fourth, and Forty-fifth Congresses. Others bid for this work; and, as Congressional Printer, I responded to the wish of the committee, by submitting the following estimates, in accordance with its published schedule, for the performance of the service at the Government Printing-Office:

- 1. To publish in a daily folio sheet, which shall contain no political matter, and which shall be issued in time to be sent, and shall be sent, by the earliest mails sent from Washington City post-office on the morning of its publication, the proceedings and debates of the preceding day, in solid brevier type, (printed extracts to be set in nonpareil.) when they shall not exceed forty columns, and when they exceed forty columns until the contractor, (the Congressional Printer,) using all due diligence, shall find its publication practicable, at \$1.50 for each and every thousand ems, printer's measurement, which is to include the entire cost of composition, proof-reading, correction, and making up, of every size of type used, and without any extra charges, whether for tabular work, corrections, alterations, additions in proofs, waiting for copy, messengers, or for any other work or service connected with the putting in type correcting, and preparing for the press the said daily sheet.
- 2. To print five hundred copies of the said daily sheet of four pages, and to furnish paper for the same, paper weighing not less than 45 pounds per ream, of as good a quality as the paper of Class 1, used at the Government Printing-Office, and without any extra charge for mailing, or for any other work or service, at \$9.39 for the five hundred copies.
- 3. To print such additional copies of the said daily sheet of four pages on the same quality of paper, and without any extra charge, at 2 cents for each and every copy ordered by Congress, without any extra charge for mailing, or for any other work or service.
- 4. To transpose the reports of proceedings and debates so printed in the said daily sheet into quarto form, without any extra charge for any corrections, alterations, or additions which may be necessary, and to prepare the same for the press at three cents for each and every one thousand ems, printer's measurement.
- 5. To print one thousand copies of the said quarto sheet of eight pages, and to furnish paper for the same, paper weighing not less than 45 pounds per ream, of as good quality as the paper of Class 1, used at the Government Printing-Office, and to drypress the same without any extra charge for any other work or service in connection with the same, at \$3.18 for the one thousand copies.
- 6. To print such additional copies of the said quarto sheet of eight pages on the same quality of paper, and without any extra charge, at 82 cents for each and every one hundred copies ordered by Congress.
- 7. To publish the laws passed by Congress in the same manner as the proceedings and debates, at \$1.50 for each and every one thousand ems, printer's measurement, which is to cover the whole cost of composition, correction, and making up, without any extra charges whatever.
 - 8. To publish a "History of the bills and resolutions," at \$2.50 for each and every

thousand ems, printer's measurement, which is to include the entire cost of compiling the same and preparing it for press in quarto form.

9. To publish index of the proceedings and debates, and of the laws, to be inserted once only in the publications for each session of Congress, at \$2.50 for each and every thousand ems, printer's measurement, which is to include the entire cost of compiling the same, putting them in type, and preparing them for the press, in quarto form.

On the 3d day of March, 1873, Congress passed the following act:

* * * Provided, That until a contract is made the debates shall be printed by the Congressional Printer, under the direction of the Joint Committee on Printing on the part of the Senate.

In pursuance of the requirements of this act, the publication of the proceedings and debates of the executive or special session of the Senate was transferred to this Office, under the schedule of rates furnished by the committee, and upon which my estimates were based, and this publication was continued here until the close of that session.

The proceedings and debates of the first session of the Forty-third Congress have also been printed at this Office, under the direction of the Joint Committee on Printing on the part of both houses; the House committee, which did not exist during the special session of the Senate, having since been appointed.

At the outset of this printing at the Government Printing-Office, the committee determined to name the daily publication The Congressional Record, and establish for it a quarto instead of a folio form, such as had been used in printing the Globe. This change involved some increase in the expense of the daily; but the great convenience which a quarto has over a folio form for this purpose was adjudged by the committee to amply compensate therefor. Indeed, when the Fortythird Congress convened, the quarto form of the daily Record met with so much favor in both houses, that the committee adopted and continued it throughout the session.

The proceedings and debates of the late session were exceedingly voluminous, and it should be borne in mind that the Committee on Printing, in its advertisement of proposals for the performance of this service, named forty columns of the late Globe as the maximum space to be occupied in each daily issue. The Record of the late session shows that the proceedings and debates of a single day in one instance filled eighty-eight pages of its issue, which is equivalent to about one hundred and fifty columns of the Globe. This, however, is an isolated case, and has been referred to for the purpose of stating the fact that this large amount of matter was placed upon the desks of the Senators and Representatives at the opening of the session on the following morning.

Upon one occasion only during the late session did the Record fail to present a full report of the previous day's proceedings, and that failure was caused by a protracted session of the Senate, which continued until 7 o'clock a.m. In a very few instances the Record failed to reach the early mails. When this did occur, it was occasioned by an

unusual accumulation of matter, and under the advice of the committee in charge of the work, that it would be best to furnish the desks of the Senators and Representatives at the opening of each session with a full report of the proceedings of the previous day, even if it should involve an occasional failure to reach the early mail. This line of policy enabled me to present in the RECORD uniformly as full and complete a history of each day's proceedings as was possible under the circumstances.

The following facts relating to the publication of the proceedings and debates of the late session in the RECORD, will afford a correct idea of the extent of the work. It numbers one hundred and sixty-one issues, with an average of thirty-nine pages each, the minimum number being four, and the maximum eighty-eight pages. The average number of columns of the GLOBE issued in the daily RECORD during the session was about sixty, being fifty per cent. above the largest number named in the advertisement of the committee for proposals for this service.

On the 20th of June last, when the first session of the Forty-third Congress was near its close, the following joint resolution was passed, and, under the approval of the President, became law:

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Congressional Printer be, and he is hereby, directed to keep a separate and exact account in detail of all the expenditures for printing, mailing, and binding the Congressional Record, including specific statements of the cost of all machinery and material which may have been or shall be used for publication of said Record, commencing with its first publication at the Government Printing-Office; and that he shall publish the amounts thus yearly expended in his next succeeding annual report, and each succeeding report, separately from other disbursements of his Office.

I would most respectfully state that it is not possible under the circumstances of the case to comply strictly with all the requirements of the above resolution. The RECORD printing was precipitated upon this Office on the 4th of March, 1873, under my estimates for the work, and without previous notice or preparation. Indeed, no time was given me to organize a separate and distinct department for the service, or to open and keep separate accounts for the labor and material involved. I entered upon this new duty at once, and issued a number of the RECORD on the 5th of March, the day following the transfer, by using the material, machinery, and labor then in use here in prosecuting the public printing and binding. It was not possible, under these circumstances, to "keep a separate and exact account in detail of all the expenditures" of that work. Indeed, at that time, I did not deem it necessary to do so, for the reason that, in my judgment, the work should be charged up in accordance with my estimates relating thereto, and I so ordered at that time, knowing that the Government would only be taxed for its absolute cost for labor and material, and that this, in no event, would exceed those estimates. It is not, therefore, possible for me at this late day to comply strictly with the terms of the

above resolution so far as it relates to printing of proceedings, &c., done one year and a half ago, for the special session of the Senate, and which was made a subject of report to Congress at its late session.

So far as controlling circumstances will permit, I have complied with the requirements of the foregoing resolution relating to the printing of the proceedings and debates of the first session of the Forty-third Congress. I have kept a separate and exact account of all labor, material, &c., expended on that work for that session, so far as possible, and the amount so expended is set forth in tables Nos. 8, 9,10, and 11 of this report. There was expended for type, cases, stands, imposing stones, galleys, composing-sticks, &c., for making the Record ready for press, the sum of \$15,733.56. The cost of labor, paper, gas, &c., used for this work, is set forth explicitly, so far as it is possible to disentangle it from a large establishment, aggregating from comparatively small items an annual business of nearly two millions of dollars, with its machinery, labor, &c., intermixed, through the system of economy adopted in its operation for the sole benefit of the Government.

The books and accounts of this Office relating to the RECORD are now so well arranged and systematized that hereafter there will be no difficulty in furnishing upon short notice the cost of material and labor used upon it for any day of its publication.

It is not practicable to present in this report "specific statements of the cost of all machinery which may have been or shall be used for publication of said RECORD, commencing with the first publication at the Government Printing Office," and for the reason that no machinery has been purchased for this specific work since it became the inheritance of this Office, and that which has been called into use for this service had been purchased and used for the general printing and binding for the Government years before the transfer of the printing of the proceedings and debates of Congress was made to this Office. The powerful engine which propels the machinery of the entire establishment works only a few hours each day in printing the Daily Record, and that chiefly out of the regular working-time of the Office. It also propels the presses on which the bound edition of the RECORD is printed, these being used for that special purpose only a few weeks, and then only in part. It is difficult, therefore, to state the cost of that machine so far as its value applies to that item in the general business of the Office. The same may be said of the presses, shafting, pulleys, belting, &c., that are applied to that peculiar service. The number of presses used in printing the daily publication depends entirely upon the length of the proceedings. For instance, when the daily fills but four pages, it requires only one press for the work; while, when it makes eightyeight pages, six presses are called in requisition. In this way the cost of the machinery used is graduated by the extent of the proceedings. To establish that cost, under the peculiar circumstances of the case,

"specifically," seems to be impossible. It is used only a fraction of the time for this peculiar class of work, the balance of the time being occupied for other useful purposes for the Government. It had been purchased and paid for prior to the printing of the proceedings and debates at this Office.

So far as practicable, it is my duty, as it is my pleasure, to comply with all the requirements of the law relating to the duties of this Office.

The laws, which have heretofore been published in the GLOBE, do not appear in the RECORD, they having been excluded by the action of Congress.

I would most respectfully call your attention to the facts and figures contained in the comparative statement of the actual expense of printing the proceedings and debates of the first session of the Forty-third Congress, when considered in connection with my estimates for performing the service, made to the Joint Committee on Printing, in acordance with their request therefor. This statement shows conclusively that the actual cost of the work has not come up to the estimates by nearly 20 per cent.

I would state that, in accordance with the recommendation of the Joint Committee on Printing, I entered into an arrangement with Mr. Harrison H. Dodge to prepare an index for the congressional edition of the Record, at a price not to exceed \$1.25 per 1,000 ems. The work of preparation was prosecuted with diligence, and every effort used to render the index as nearly perfect as possible. It involved much time and labor, and, when completed, it was found to contain 2,367,000 ems. The work has been faithfully and intelligently performed, and the index, though not without some defects, is, taken as a whole, quite as free from objection as any of its predecessors. I settled with Mr. Dodge for the performance of this service by paying him \$2,362.25, which is at the rate of about \$1 per 1,000 ems.

In this connection, I would most respectfully suggest, in view of the experiences of furnishing this index, that accuracy may be secured and time and expense saved by engaging the services of a competent and industrious clerk, who shall devote his time, from the early part of a session to its close, to the work of comparing the daily reports with the Journals of each House, and thereby avoiding errors that are not infrequent in the numbering of bills, &c., and to perfecting an index as fast as the Record goes to press, that will be completed nearly simultaneously with the close of a session.

THE DEPARTMENT PRINTING AND BINDING.

The law of May 8, 1872, which provides that the several Departments of the Government shall make annual estimates for the printing and binding required by them respectively for the year, took full effect on

the 1st of July, 1873, and the following is the result thereof for the year ending June 30, 1874:

PRINTING AND BINDING AGRICULTURAL REPORTS.

The Commissioner of Agriculture, in his annual report, has taken occasion to allude somewhat censoriously to my action in declining to print and bind 460,000 copies of his annual reports for 1872 and 1873, for the use of Congress, under his requisition therefor, when I could find neither law nor authority to enter upon the work; neither had I the necessary funds with which to perform the service. I am at a loss to divine the purpose of the Commissioner in thus criticising my conduct, unless it is to create the impression in the public mind that I am derelict in duty and act without a proper regard for the agricultural interests of the country.

I have no purpose to challenge the motives which have prompted the Commissioner in this very eccentric performance, but would most respectfully present the following statement of facts, with the correspondence corroborative of them, as an act of simple justice to the Commissioner and myself, and in which, I think, will be found a full justification of my conduct in refusing to yield to an unwarranted demand.

In the month of July last I received the following letter from the Commissioner of Agriculture, accompanied by the requisitions referred to therein:

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, Washington, July 8, 1874.

Col. A. M. Clapp, Public Printer:

DEAR SIR: I send to-day requisition for twenty-five thousand copies of the Annual Report of this Department of the year 1872, and the same number of the report of 1873, the manuscript of which I send to you herewith. These are for the use of this Department, and are authorized by the appropriation of fifty thousand dollars made to this Department for this purpose.

There is also a requisition for one hundred and eighty thousand for the use of the House of Representatives, and fifty thousand for the use of the Senaté, of the report of 1872, and the same number of copies, for the same use, of the report of 1873.

I was absent when the letter and requisitions above referred to were received, and they were forwarded to me. The following is my reply thereto:

Buffalo, July 13, 1874.

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your favor of the 8th instant, which has been forwarded to me at this point; also, the accompanying requisitions, No. 111, for the printing and binding of 25,000 copies of the Annual Report of the Commissioner of Agriculture for 1872, and 25,000 copies of his Annual Report for 1873; No. 112, for printing and binding, for the use of the United States House of Representatives, 180,000 copies of the Annual Report of the Commissioner of Agriculture for 1872; 50,000 copies of same for the use of the United States Senate; No. 113, for a like number, for the House and Senate, of the Report of the Commissioner of Agriculture for 1873.

In reply to your note and its accompanying requisitions, I am constrained to say, most respectfully, that I return the several requisitions to your Department, for the reasons hereinafter set forth.

I return requisition No. 111, for the reason that there is no appropriation for the public printing and the public binding, for the present fiscal year, with which to perform this service. The appropriation for the public printing and binding, and for the paper for the public printing for this year, is \$1,645,507.66, and the printing and binding authorized thereby is as follows:

This sum of money being all that has been appropriated for the public printing and binding for the present fiscal year, all of which is specifically designated, and the appropriation for the Department of Agriculture being insufficient to answer requisition No. 111, you will readily perceive that I have no funds at my command that will enable me to fill this order. It is not proper that I should divert any funds not appropri-

ated to your Department under the annual appropriation for this branch of the public service, for the execution of this order.

If I am not in error, requisition No. 111 is based upon a clause in the sundry civil appropriation bill, which appropriates to the Department of Agriculture, "For publishing the Report of the Commissioner of Agriculture for the years 1872 and 1873, the sum of \$50,000." I am neither directed nor authorized by this law to print and bind, as you require, 50,000 copies of your reports, and cannot perform that service without using moneys therefor which have been appropriated for other purposes. To do this would be a clear violation of law, and involves an act inconsistent with my sense of duty.

Whenever moneys shall be placed to the credit of the fund for printing and binding for this fiscal year, equal to provide for this requisition, it will afford me pleasure to perform the service; but, until that is done, I cannot, consistently with my sense of duty, undertake the work.

Requisitions Nos. 112 and 113, I infer, are made under that clause in the act making appropriations for the sundry civil expenses of the Government for the year ending June 30, 1875, which provides "That hereafter the Congressional Printer shall print, upon the order of the heads of the Executive Departments respectively, only such limited numbers of the annual reports of such Departments, and necessary accompanying reports of subordinates, as may be deemed necessary for the use of Congress."

I cannot regard this provision as retroactive in its effect, even if it applies to your Department, and hence, as it only relates to the future, it cannot properly include the reports of former years. In my judgment, it affords neither you nor me sufficient authority to order or print and bind reports made prior to its enactment. To my mind, the terms of this provision are explicit, and in my opinion it only relates to the future, giving no authority to order the printing of reports made prior to its passage.

If, however, you take a different view of the case, and prefer to controvert my opinion relating thereto, I trust that you will bring the case to the attention of the Secretary of the Interior, that he may present it to the Attorney-General for his opinion thereupon. If the law-officer of the Government shall decide that you have the authority, under the provision of the law to which I have made reference, to order me to print and bind 180,000 copies of the Agricultural Report for 1872 for the use of the House of Representatives, and 50,000 copies for the use of the Senate, and a like number of the report of 1873, involving an expense of \$275,000, for which there is no provision under my estimates for my appropriation for the present year, I shall defer to his judgment, and proceed with the work so far as I have funds therefor, not otherwise appropriated.

If I am in error as to the provisions of the law under which you make these several requisitions upon me, you will please so inform me, and indicate the provisions under which you take action.

Trusting that an early decision of this question by the Attorney-General may be obtained,

I submitted this correspondence to the chairmen of the Senate and House Committees on Printing, and both concurred in the view I had taken of the question, as appears by the following:

PROVIDENCE, July 16, 1874.

MY DEAR SIR: I have yours of the 14th. It appears to me that you are right in declining the requisitions of the Commissioner of Agriculture—certainly so unless they are sustained by the Attorney-General. The declarations made in the debate of the

Senate, to which I referred you, whatever they may be worth in point of law, would not cover requisitions of this kind. This printing has been heretofore done not by general law, or on requisition of the Commissioner, but by special resolution of Congress, or, before the law requiring the assent of both houses, by resolution of one house.

The following is the reply of the chairman of the Committee on Printing on the part of the House of Representatives:

INDEPENDENCE, IOWA, July 16, 1874.

DEAR SIR: Yours of the 14th, inclosing copy of letter to Commissioner of Agriculture, received.

I think you are right, and approve your course, with this suggestion:

Undoubtedly Congress has appropriated \$50,000 for printing and binding Agricultural Reports for 1872 and 1873. The chairman of Committee on Appropriations recognized the propriety of transferring the sum, or, rather, that item of the bill, to the clause relating to printing and binding, and agreed to yield to me for an amendment to that effect. But before it was reached the House suspended the rules, non-concurred in all remaining Senate amendments, and sent the bill to conference, where, in the hurry, I presume he forgot to have the change made. Inasmuch, therefore, as the above sum is specifically appropriated for that purpose, the Commissioner of Agriculture should take your estimates as to the number of volumes you can print and bind for the two years named for the said sum of \$50,000, should then place it to your credit, and make his requisitions accordingly. Would not such course comply with the enactment, and at the same time accommodate the Agricultural Department so far as the funds would permit?

Certainly, in the absence of legal provisions, I think you are just right in refusing to comply with his demand for 460,000 copies of reports.

In view of the above suggestion I conclude to simply address yourself in reply. Should it be necessary to confer with Senator Anthony in relation to this matter, I will promptly do so when notified.

The Commissioner of Agriculture evinced much anxiety that the reports for 1872 and 1873 should be printed and bound to the value of \$50,000 under the appropriation to his Department, and I was equally anxious to meet his wishes whenever it could be done properly and in accordance with law. Without some direction from the Treasury Department to that effect, I could not see my way clear to perform this service under an appropriation that stood to the credit of the Department of Agriculture. In view of this I suggested a transfer of the appropriation to the credit of this Office, or that the amount be placed in the hands of the Commissioner, to be expended in accordance with the law which authorizes the purchase of extra copies of any document ordered by Congress at cost and 10 per cent. added. Neither of these suggestions met with favor at the Treasury Department, and there the

matter rested until August 14, when the First Comptroller of the Treasury wrote me on this subject as follows:

TREASURY DEPARTMENT, FIRST COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,

August 14, 1874.

SIR: I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 31st of July in relation to the appropriation of \$50,000 for printing and binding the agricultural reports of 1872 and 1873, and asking in substance how the appropriation can be made available for the purpose intended.

I can see no difficulty in the way. The Commissioner of Agriculture disburses moneys appropriated to his Department, and in the discharge of his duties can draw the money from the Treasury as needed, and pay bills for paper, labor, &c., which have been approved by you. The purchase of paper and other material properly belongs to you as well as the employment of labor and supervision of the work, and payment for these can readily be arranged between you and the Commissioner, in which I do not see how there can be any want of harmony between you.

On the receipt of the above, I entered upon the purchase of paper, and made such arrangements in the Office as would enable me to execute this work without interference with, or embarrassment to, its current business. To do this, involved the necessity of independent accounts, &c., which has been attended with extra clerical labor and responsibility, for which no provision is made in the way of compensation. The printing and binding has been executed with as much dispatch as practicable, under the circumstances. I have already delivered 25,000 copies of the report of 1872, and 50,000 copies of 1873, to the Commissioner. The balance of the appropriation will be exhausted in printing and binding such additional copies of the report of 1873 as it will cover—say 50,000 copies, making the entire number of copies of both reports 125,000; all of which, by direction of the Commissioner, have been or are to be delivered to the Department of Agriculture, for its use and distribution. The items of expenditure for this service are not set forth in this report, for the reason that the Commissioner of Agriculture made all disbursements relating to it.


IN CONCLUSION.
