To the Senate and House of Representatives :

In compliance with the provisions of law, I have the honor to submit the annual report of this office, showing "the exact condition of the public printing, binding, and engraving, the amount and cost of such printing, binding, and engraving, the amount of paper purchased for the same, and such further information as may be within my knowledge in regard to all matters connected therewith." Also, a statement showing "the number of hands employed, and the length of time each has been employed." The tabular statements accompanying this report are made up for the year ending on the 30th of September, 1867, and are as follows :

- No. 1. Showing the documents printed by authority of law, or by order of either house of Congress, the cost of printing and binding them, and the manner in which they were distributed.
- No. 2. Showing the cost of the printing and binding ordered by the Executive and Judicial departments of the government.
- No. 3. Showing the disbursements on account of the public printing.
- No. 4. Showing the disbursements on account of paper for the public printing.
- No. 5. Showing the disbursements on account of the public binding.
- No. 6. Showing the disbursements on account of lithographing and engraving for the Senate and House of Representatives.
- No. 7. Showing the number of hands employed, the length of time each was employed, and the amount earned by each, for the year ending October 31, 1867.

COST OF THE PUBLIC PRINTING AND BINDING.

Statements No. 1 and No. 2 will show the *approximate* cost of the public printing and binding for each department of the government during the year ending on the 30th of September, 1867, as it appears on the books of this office. The statement No. 1, exhibiting the cost of the printing, binding, and lithographing and engraving for Congress, is given very much in detail, with the view of showing the cost of each of the annual reports and other public documents which were printed in excess of the usual number, (1,550 copies,) and the manner in which they were authorized to be distributed. The *actual* disbursements of the office, as detailed in statements Nos. 3, 4, 5, and 6, were as follows :

The cost of the paper and other materials remaining on hand on the 30th of September, 1867, was \$371,626 06, being \$31,366 54 *less* than at the commencement of the year ; so that the aggregate cost of the printing and binding amounts to the sum of \$1,630,584 93, (or \$294,233 28 *less* than for the preceding year,) which may be apportioned as follows :

By reference to statement No. 1, it will be seen that a large number of the public documents ordered to be printed, either by law, by order of the Senate, or the House of Representatives, were for distribution by the Executive departments and bureaus.

The amount realized during the year from the sale of waste paper, paper shavings, documents, &c., is \$20,566 15, which has been deposited in the treasury of the United States, as required by law.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE PUBLIC DOCUMENTS.

Inquiry is frequently made as to the manner in which the usual or regular number (1,550) of executive and miscellaneous documents and reports of com-

mittees are distributed; as also the bills and joint resolutions, of which seven hundred copies are printed. This information is given in the following statement

Such number of *extra* copies of the public documents are printed as are authorized by law, or may be directed by the special order of the Senate or House of Representatives; and these are distributed in the manner directed by law or by the house ordering them.

PAPER FOR THE PUBLIC PRINTING.

The fourth section of the act of July 27, 1866, gives to the Joint Committee on Printing the exclusive control of contracting for paper for the public printing, and of "fixing a standard of paper for the different descriptions of congressional and executive printing." Under the direction of the committee contracts were entered into for supplying any required quantities of the various kinds for the year ending on the 31st of December, 1867, with the following persons :

CLASS 1.—*Fine uncalendered Printing Paper, measuring 24 by 38 inches, 45 pounds to the ream of 500 sheets.*

Timothy Keeney, North Manchester, Connecticut, 19,000 reams, (more or less.) at \$8 88½.

CLASS 2.—*Fine calendered Printing Paper, measuring 24 by 38 inches, 53 pounds to the ream of 500 sheets.*

C. R. Baer, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, 4,000 reams, at \$12 56.

S. D. Warren, Boston, Massachusetts, 4,000 reams, (more or less,) at \$12 72.

CLASS 3.—*Superfine Printing Paper, hard sized and supercalendred, 24 by 32 inches, 45 pounds to the ream of 500 sheets.*

Charles Magarge & Co., Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, 1,000 reams, at \$11 70.

CLASS 4.—*Map Paper.*

Timothy Keeney, North Manchester, Connecticut, 20,000 pounds, (more or less,) of any required sizes and weights, at 29 cents per pound.

CLASS 5.—*Writing Papers.*

John H. Hall, New York, 20,000 reams, (more or less,) of such sizes and weights as might be required, at 30 cents per pound.

CLASS 6.—*Paper for Post Office Blanks.*

A. D. Jessup, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, 163,400 pounds, (more or less,) of various weights and sizes, at 21 $\frac{3}{4}$ cents per pound.

Statement No. 4, appended to this report, exhibits the exact quantity of each kind of paper purchased during the year ending on the 30th of September, 1867, and the cost per ream. The aggregate amount expended was \$635,106 09. There remained on hand at the end of the year papers of various kinds, as will be seen by reference to the same statement, amounting in value to \$227,991 21.

The contracts for paper for the year 1867 were made at prices averaging about thirty per cent. lower than for several years past, and it is expected that the contracts for 1868, which will be entered into in January, will show a further reduction in cost.

LITHOGRAPHING AND ENGRAVING FOR CONGRESSIONAL DOCUMENTS.

The aggregate amount paid for this character of work was \$108,624 75, the details of which will be found in Statement No. 1. The illustrations accompanying the Annual Report of the Commissioner of Patents on Arts and Manufactures absorb the principal part of the appropriation for lithographing and engraving, those for the Report for 1866 costing about \$65,000. They are indispensable to a proper understanding of the Report, and are very handsomely executed, at prices which are deemed reasonable for the character of the engravings. Proposals for this work are invited by public advertisement yearly, and the contract is awarded by the Joint Committee on Printing to the lowest bidder for the style of work advertised for. The Report of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, communicated at the second session of the 39th Congress, was published in unusually large numbers, in part for foreign distribution, the lithographing for which cost the sum of \$30,752 39.

MAPPING FOR THE SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES.

Some of the Records of the Supreme Court of the United States, which are ordered to be printed, are accompanied by maps, plats, diagrams, &c., and a small number of copies in *fac-simile*, on tracing linen, are required for the use of the court. These, for the last year, cost the sum of \$2,515 92.

THE PUBLIC BINDING.

The amount expended on account of the public binding during the year ending on the 30th of September, 1867, was \$386,203 98, the details of which will be found in Statement No. 5. The value of the materials on hand at the end of the year was \$58,338 75, being \$31,000 less than the amount remaining over at the end of the preceding year.

CONDITION OF THE PUBLIC PRINTING AND BINDING.

Attached to Statement No. 1 will be found a list of the documents, &c., unfinished on the 30th of September, 1867, the end of the year for which the statistical portion of this report is made up. At the present time, (December 26,) the condition of the public printing and binding is as follows :

Expressions of Condolence and Sympathy on the Assassination of President Lincoln.—The joint resolution approved on the 2d of March, 1867, directs “that, in addition to the number of copies of papers relating to foreign affairs, now authorized by law, there shall be printed for distribution by the Department of State, on fine paper, with wide margin, a sufficient number of copies of the appendix to the diplomatic correspondence of 1835 to supply one copy to each senator and each representative of the thirty-ninth Congress, and to each foreign government, and one copy to each corporation, association, or public body, whose expressions of condolence or sympathy are published in said volume. One hundred of these copies to be bound in full Turkey morocco, full gilt, and the remaining copies to be bound in half Turkey morocco, marble edged.” In accordance with the provisions of this resolution, three thousand copies have been printed, and are now in the hands of the binder. It is a very handsomely printed and bound volume of nearly one thousand quarto pages, with a correct likeness of the late President Lincoln engraved on steel.

Coast Survey Report for 1866, with maps, 6,050 copies. The publication of the Annual Coast Survey Reports is invariably delayed for a year after the printing is ordered, on account of the length of time required by the Coast Survey Office to prepare the charts for printing. This volume will not, consequently, be issued until near the close of the year 1868.

Report of the Commissioner of Patents for 1866.—This report will make three large octavo volumes, comprising two volumes of descriptions of patents, of about 800 pages each, and one volume of designs of about 1,100 pages. The printing and binding of 20,550 copies (61,650 volumes) has been ordered by Congress, 4,000 for distribution by Senators, 10,000 by Representatives, and 5,000 by the Commissioner of Patents. A large portion of the Report has been printed, and nearly all of it is ready for press.

Agricultural Report for 1866.—This report makes a single volume of 692 pages, including thirty-six full pages of illustrations engraved on wood, and numerous small engravings of agricultural machinery, &c. 189,550 copies have been ordered to be printed and bound ; 19,000 for distribution by Senators, 145,000 by Representatives, and 24,000 by the Commissioner of Agriculture. The entire edition of the Report has been printed, and bound copies are now being rapidly delivered. The estimated cost of printing and binding this volume is \$159,953 53, or only eighty-four cents per copy. It may be worthy of remark that this is the first, and the only, book yet printed on “Bullock’s Patent Rotary Perfecting Press,” one of which has recently been put into operation in this establishment. It is a machine of immense power and rapidity, and the work turned out by it will compare very favorably with that executed by any other power press in present use.

Army Register of Volunteers.—Fifty thousand copies of this register were ordered to be printed, *for sale at cost*, by the joint resolution of June 30, 1864. An edition of five thousand copies of the first four volumes was printed, but finding very little demand for the work, the edition of the residue of the volumes was reduced to one thousand. When completed the work will comprise eight volumes, averaging about 500 pages. The eighth volume only remains to be completed.

Report of the Academy of Sciences for 1866.—On the 19th of March last the Senate ordered the printing of 1,000 copies of this Report, in addition to the usual number, but the manuscript has not yet reached this office.

Colonial Charters and State Constitutions.—On the 2d of March, 1867, the Senate adopted a resolution directing “that the Committee on Printing cause to be prepared for publication a volume containing the colonial charters and the various State constitutions of each State of the United States, together with all amendments thereto at any time in force, arranging the same in chronological order for each State, with suitable indexes ; and that it be printed for the use of the Senate.” The manuscript for this volume has not yet been received.

The Medical and Surgical History of the Rebellion, authorized to be printed by the first section of the act of July 23, 1865, will make several large quarto volumes. The printing of this work has recently been commenced, and, from the peculiar character of the work, its progress must necessarily be slow and tedious. No period can be fixed at which its completion may be expected.

The Biennial Register (or Blue Book) for 1867.—The manuscript for this volume was received at the same time with the documents accompanying the annual message of the President to Congress, and, being deemed of less importance, has been laid aside until the latter shall be completed. The register will then be printed and bound with the least possible delay.

Some of the department reports communicated to Congress at the commencement of the present session of Congress have been printed, and the others are nearly completed, so that the whole of them will be ready for distribution at an early day.

In conclusion, I will repeat what was stated in a former report from this office, that the laws of Congress providing for extra copies of bureau reports, for the use of the bureaus, do not, in many cases, accomplish the purposes for which they were intended—to save labor in this office and expense to the government. In some cases the number of copies authorized by law are not deemed sufficient for public purposes, and applications are frequently made to Congress for an increase of the number, which are always successful, when the entire work has to be reprinted. Moreover, requisitions are continually being made upon this office by the Executive Departments and Bureaus for extra copies of reports either made or to be made to Congress, which, it appears to me, the law plainly prohibits me from printing. By a revision of the laws, so as to allow the Chiefs of Bureaus all the copies that may be necessary, and including the extra copies of all the annual reports authorized by law to be made to Congress, the work could be executed more promptly, at less cost, and with far greater satisfaction to all concerned. I trust that this subject may receive the consideration of Congress.
