Explanation

Words and figures inclosed in brackets [] are given for information, but do not appear on the title-pages of the publications catalogued. When size is not given, octavo is to be understood. Size of maps is measured from outer edge of border, excluding margin. The dates, including day, month, and year, given with Senate and House documents and reports, are the dates on which they were ordered to be printed. Usually the printing promptly follows the ordering, but various causes sometimes make delays. When Congress and session are not given with the numbers of Senate and House documents and reports, 63d Congress, 1st session, is to be understood.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Superintendent of Documents is authorized to sell at cost any public document in his charge, the distribution of which is not otherwise provided for.

Documents can not be supplied by this Office free to individuals **nor forwarded in advance of payment.**

Documents entered in this catalogue that are for sale by the **Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C.**, are indicated by a star (*) preceding the price named. A dagger (†) indicates that application should be made to the Department, Bureau, or Division issuing the document, a double dagger (‡) indicates that the document is not obtainable, and whenever additional information concerning the method of procuring a document seems necessary it will be found under the name of the Bureau. The Senate and House documents and reports are issued in limited editions and, unless otherwise indicated, may be obtained only through Members of Congress.

In ordering a publication from the Superintendent of Documents, give the name of the issuing Department, Bureau, or Division, and title. If publication is numbered give number also. Do not order by Library of Congress card number.

Read carefully the instructions "How to remit," found at the bottom of the next page.

The accumulation of publications in this Office amounts to several millions, of which over a million are assorted, forming the sales stock. Many rare books are included, but under the law all must be sold "at cost," regardless of their age or scarcity.

In ordering, it should be borne in mind that many of the books have been in stock some time and are apt to be shop-worn. In filling orders, however, the best copy available is sent.

No general price-list of public documents is available, but lists on special subjects will be furnished on application.

MONTHLY CATALOGUE DISTRIBUTION

The Monthly catalogue is sent to each Senator, Representative, Delegate, Resident Commissioner, and officer in Congress, to designated depositories and State and Territorial libraries, to substantially all Government authors, and to as many school, college, and public libraries as the limited edition will supply.

Subscription price to individuals, \$1.10 a year, including index. Back numbers can not be supplied. Please notify the Superintendent of Documents of any change in address.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS CARDS

Numbers to be used in ordering the L. C. catalogue cards will be found at the end of the titles of the more important monographic documents. The figure following the card number (separated from it by a slanting line) indicates the number of cards required for entries suggested (title entry not included) on the cards. The price of the cards is 2c. for the first card and $\frac{1}{2}$ c. for each addi-

ional card for the same title ordered at the same time. **Remittances should be made to the Librarian of Congress.** Cards can not be furnished by the Superintendent of Documents.

INDEX

Beginning with July, 1913, an Index to the Monthly catalogue will be issued at the end of the fiscal year, June, 1914. This will contain index entries for all the numbers issued from July, 1913, to June, 1914, and can be bound with those numbers as an index for the volume. Persons desiring to bind the catalogue at the end of the year should be careful to retain the numbers received monthly, as duplicate numbers can not be supplied.

HOW TO REMIT

Remittances for the documents marked with a star (*) should be made to the **Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C.**, by postal money order, express order, or New York draft. Currency may be sent at sender's risk.

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To facilitate the payment of the cost of documents, the Superintendent of Documents will hereafter accept coupons issued by him instead of cash. Coupons of the value of 5 cents each are sold in sets of 20 for \$1.00. Address order to Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office.

No charge is made for postage on documents forwarded to points in United States, Guam, Hawaii, Philippine Islands, Porto Rico, or to Canada, Cuba, or Mexico. To other countries the regular rate of postage is charged, and remittances must cover such postage.

NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Elaborate and costly documents are frequently printed on the order of and for the use of Congressional committees, and are then not available to the public through the usual sources. Copies of committee publications are not printed for sending to the depository libraries, where they would be preserved for future reference. Copies are not provided for sale to the buyers to whom more than a million public documents of other kinds are annually sold by the Superintendent of Documents. The committees sometimes have a few copies for free distribution, but by the time interested persons learn that the documents are not to be had at the customary places, and find out the name of the committee to which application must be made, the supply in most cases is exhausted. Lately there have been two rather conspicuous examples of documents which all the larger libraries and many interested individuals would wish to have were they not barred by the committee custom. One is Public road systems of foreign countries and of States, 198 pages, printed for the use of the Joint Committee on Federal Aid in the Construction of Post Roads and obtainable only from that committee. The other is the Tariff handbook, two editions, presenting elaborate comparisons between old and new tariffs, prepared for the use of the Committee on Finance, United States Senate, and obtainable only from that committee. This last was entered in the Monthly catalogue for July, 1913. The library interest and the public interest would be served by improved methods in the matter of committee publications.

The Postal guide, August supplement, announces that the Postal laws and regulations, edition of 1913, will be ready for delivery about September 1st. This new edition was directed to be prepared by the Postal appropriation act of Aug. 24, 1912, which appropriated \$55,000 for the printing, binding, and wrapping of 110,000 copies, but nothing for the work of compilation, which is no small task. The Public Printer is directed to retain 5,000 copies for sale at 10 per cent. above the cost of production. This is the first edition of the Postal laws since 1902, though a couple of small supplements have been issued in the interim. The price at which the new edition of Postal laws and regulations will be sold by the Superintendent of Documents is 75 cents.

Two numbers of the Weekly news letter, the new periodical of the Agriculture Department, dated Aug. 13 and Aug. 20, were issued in an imitation typewriter print, but the following numbers, beginning with vol. 1, no. 3, Aug. 27, have been printed at the Government Printing Office. The purpose of the new periodical is to supply early and fresh information to its thousands of volunteer crop correspondents, who do much work in the public interest with little compensation. If the standard of newsmanship and practicality shown in the early numbers can be maintained, the Department will not be able to limit the distribution to its own correspondents. There will be room for a large paid subscription list.

The August supplement to the Postal guide prints the amendments to the parcel post regulations, taking effect Aug. 15, 1913, by which rates are reduced, limit of weight of packages carried is increased, and a C. O. D. service is begun. Though the parcel post is but little more than half a year old, it has already

begun to grow at a rate that indicates a prodigious organization in the near future. It will be a public utility of the first order, and it is most fortunate that it is in the hands of the Government, where it cannot be exploited for private gain.

The World trade directory, published by the Manufactures Bureau, now the Foreign and Domestic Commerce Bureau, and sold by the Superintendent of Documents has become a work of recognized authority and of general use by exporters and others. New editions are called for and will be supplied. But the form will be changed. Instead of covering the whole globe in one huge volume, future editions will be issued in sections. The first section will relate to the commercial and manufacturing interests of the South American countries, and should be available for distribution toward the end of the present year. As the Bureau is not equipped to handle more than one section at the same time, other sections are not expected until next year.

Typical specifications for the fabrication and erection of steel highway bridges, prepared by the Office of Public Roads, and published as Circular 100 of that Office, will be of much value to road officials throughout the country. From the Superintendent of Documents, 5 cents.

The library of the Education Bureau has compiled and published a number of brief and handy reference lists on live subjects. Some of the titles are: Secondary education in the United States; Higher education; Maria Montessori and her methods; Mothers' clubs and parent-teacher associations; Rural life and culture; Economic value of education; Home economics. These are all listed in the Monthly catalogue for July, 1913.

International conferences are becoming so numerous that it is lively work keeping track of them. The Second International Opium Conference was held at The Hague, July 1-9 of the present year, and a report made on behalf of the American delegates by Mr. Hamilton Wright is now printed as Senate document 157 of the 63d Congress, and entered in this catalogue under the State Department. As a result of the First Conference, all the world's nations but 10 have agreed to confine the trade in opium and allied narcotics strictly to medical uses, and President Wilson expresses the belief that by the end of the present year assent to this policy will be universal throughout the civilized world. Great is cooperation.

Senate document 118, 63d Congress, 1st session, is the final report of the International Waterways Commission on the proposed submerged dam or weir at the outlet of Lake Erie. This structure would cost about three millions and a half and would raise the water in all the Great Lakes except Ontario, and though the raise would be too slight to cause damage, still it would be of great benefit to navigation, and the Commission unanimously recommends that a treaty be entered into between Great Britain and the United States providing for its construction. Though the report is accompanied by maps and tables illustrating and demonstrating the Commission's findings, its price is only 5 cents. The Commission finds that the level of the Lakes has been appreciably lowered by the Chicago Drainage Canal and the Erie Canal. As the freight boats on the Lakes are built nowadays of the utmost capacity that the depth of water in the harbors will permit, and as every added inch of water means an increased capacity of 85 tons for each of the big freighters, it is evident that the question is of serious importance to the greatest system of inland navigation in the world. The total area drained by the Great Lakes is estimated as 287,688 square miles, said by the Commission to be considerably greater than the German Empire. The Commission's report adds: "Of this total, about one third is occupied by the Lakes themselves—that is, devoted to reservoir purposes. The result is a uniformity of level and a uniformity of

flow which are truly wonderful—a perfection of regulation which no work of man ever did or ever will approach.”

Public document Price list 51, Health and hygiene, is out of stock, but will be reissued as soon as practicable. An earlier issue, however, will be a new edition of Price list 11, Food and diet, to which will be transferred the dietary material which was listed in the 1st, 2d, and 3d editions of no. 51. Similar division will necessarily be made of other price lists as the increase of available material makes them too bulky for convenience or economy.

Miss Annie Bock of California, a woman from a woman-suffrage State, and herself formerly an active suffragist, is the author of Senate document 160, 63d Congress, 1st session, which is a lively address in opposition to woman suffrage. Price, 5 cents.

Circular 33, Standards Bureau, will probably be a quick and extensive seller. It is the United States Government specifications for Portland cement. 10 cents.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has published during the month two new documents which are marked “First issue,” indicating that future issues are expected. One is: “Regulations to govern the destruction of records of carriers by water,” the other, “Classification of income and profit and loss accounts for carriers by water.” Each 5 cents.

Number 6, volume 15, June, 1913, is the final number of the late unlamented Crop reporter.

Farmers' bulletin 551, The cultivation of American ginseng, has been issued and can be bought for 5 cents. It does not talk very encouragingly to would-be ginseng growers. While it is true that a mature crop is exceedingly profitable, yet it takes six years to get it, and the market for it is restricted. The average exportation of the roots for 10 years past has been only 164,000 pounds, a quantity which might readily be grown on 100 acres of land.

Senate report 166, 57th Congress, 1st session, Improvement of the park system of the District of Columbia, originally published Jan. 15, 1902, has been abridged and republished as Senate document 16, 63d Congress, 1st session, with numerous illustrations. The Superintendent of Documents has a few copies for sale at 10 cents. This is the Burnham report, which has been officially declared to be “the most comprehensive plan ever provided for the development of an American city.” The improvement of the national capital is a matter of interest to every American citizen.

Vol. 2 of the American Historical Association Report for 1911, now in press, will be made up of the correspondence of three famous Georgians, Robert Toombs, Alexander H. Stephens, and Howell Cobb.

The Biological Survey Bureau, Agriculture Department, has issued its 1913 directory of the game officials throughout the country, a list which interests numerous persons. Price, 5 cents.

Education Bureau Bulletin 29, series of 1913, Accredited secondary schools in the United States, is a list of such schools for the whole country. The term “accredited secondary school,” as used in this bulletin, means a school which requires for graduation at least 15 units of secondary work above a standard 8-grade grammar school course. A definition of the word “unit” has been agreed to by the chief educational associations as follows: “A unit represents a year's study in any subject in a secondary school, constituting approximately a quarter of a full year's work.” The present list is an extensive one because of the great increase in the number of such schools in recent years. In 1891 the number of secondary schools, public and private, was 4,885, and the students 309,600. In 1912 the schools numbered 13,268 and the students 1,246,827. Dr. Kendrick C. Babcock, the author of Bulletin 29, comments thus upon the

increase in this important branch of the American educational system: "The improvement during the past two decades in the number, scope, efficiency, and popular estimation of secondary schools of all kinds is unparalleled in the educational history of the United States." Price, 10 cents.

The Government Hospital for the Insane (Saint Elizabeth's) has issued Bulletin 5 in its series of scientific publications. Bulletin 5 is the only title carried on its cover or title-page, but it contains five elaborate papers by members of the medical staff of this great institution on themes connected with its specialty.

Vol. 26, Interstate Commerce Commission reports (decisions), is now ready at \$1.50. The index thereto has also been issued in a separate pamphlet.

Guide to the numismatic collection of the mint of the United States at Philadelphia, Pa., (10 cents), is a handy little pamphlet of 106 pages which every one of the thousands of citizens who have bought the Catalogue of coins, tokens, and medals in the numismatic collection of the Mint will find to be a convenient and useful supplement to that larger work.

New series are starting with frequency in these days. The Revenue-Cutter Service has just issued its Bulletin no. 1, and an interesting one it is, entitled Reports of vessels on ice patrol in the north Atlantic Ocean, April, May, June, 1913. Two revenue cutters, the Seneca and the Miami, were detailed to the service of finding icebergs and warning vessels of their whereabouts. Their work was aided by the radio service, as almost all kinds of sea navigation now are. Every day at 6 p. m. the vessel on patrol sent "broadcast" for the benefit of all vessels in those waters radiograms giving the information they had obtained. Each vessel was on patrol continuously for 15 days alternately while the other was going to Halifax for fuel and other supplies, returning to relieve its consort at the end of 15 days. They saw and gave warning of bergs of many sizes and shapes. Captain Johnston of the Seneca says that the only kind of berg he did not see "is the kind popularly pictured in school-books, with high, overhanging, craggy pinnacles."

The Journal of research, the new magazine of the Agriculture Department which was announced in last month's Catalogue, it has now been decided shall be called Journal of agricultural research. The first number is in press.

NEW ANNUAL OF GEOLOGICAL SURVEY

Beginning with Professional paper 85, an annual volume in the United States Geological Survey's series of Professional papers will be devoted to short papers and preliminary reports on subjects of general geologic interest and will be entitled "Contributions to general geology."

Part A of Professional paper 85 has been issued and will be followed from time to time by other parts, all to form a volume for which a title-page, a table of contents, and an index will be supplied in due season. The pagination and plate numbering of the separate parts will run continuously through the volume.

Librarians and others who receive the separate parts should preserve them, as the complete volume will not be supplied to those who have received the parts.

The completed volume will be supplied to the depository libraries.

DISCONTINUANCE OF CHARTS

The issue by the Weather Bureau of marine meteorological charts for the oceans and Great Lakes has been terminated. For the north Atlantic, north Pacific, and Indian Ocean the August issue, 1913, was the last. The quarterly

charts for the south Atlantic and south Pacific terminated with the issue for June-August. For the Great Lakes the chart for September is the last.

Pilot charts will hereafter be issued only by the Hydrographic Office.

Official announcement of these changes was made by the Weather Bureau under date of Aug. 20.

STATUTES AT LARGE, VOL. 37

The new volume of the Statutes at large, containing all the legislation of the 62d Congress, besides numerous treaties and conventions, Presidential proclamations, and other documents of state, is now on sale by the Superintendent of Documents.

Vol. 37 is in two parts, each part being a large leather-bound book. The two parts are sold at \$2.25 each.

Vol. 37, like its most recent predecessor, is printed on a 75 per cent. "rag paper." Such paper is much more durable than that made from the wood pulp on which nearly all printing is done nowadays. Surely, the laws of the land should be published in the most enduring form, as they now are.

A NEW SUBSCRIPTION LIST

The Superintendent of Documents, though already handling 30-odd subscription lists, welcomes all newcomers.

This month's addition is the Treasury Department's Appeals pending before United States courts in customs cases, 20 cents a year.

This is a pamphlet printed quarterly (Jan., Apr., July, Oct.) for the information of members of the customs service and supplied free only to such members. There has been always an outside demand for it, which has been supplied by the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents for single copies. For the convenience of regular buyers it has been decided to accept yearly subscriptions, so that only one remittance will be required yearly instead of four.

AMERICAN COMMISSION ON AGRICULTURAL COOPERATION

Senators Fletcher of Florida and Gore of Oklahoma, Representative Moss of Indiana, Col. Harvie Jordan of Georgia, Dr. John Lee Coulter of the Census Bureau, Dr. Kenyon L. Butterfield of Massachusetts, and Dr. Clarence J. Owens of the Southern Commercial Congress were, on Mar. 14, 1913, appointed by President Wilson as members of a commission to investigate and study rural credits and agricultural cooperative organizations in foreign countries.

The authority for the appointment of such a commission is found in the appropriation act for the Agriculture Department, approved Mar. 4, 1913 (37 Stats., pt. 1, p. 855). The members are required to serve without compensation, but \$25,000 is appropriated for their expenses.

The commission, as a body, sailed for Europe April 26, 1913, though not all the members went along. It returned July 26, having visited, as a body and by subcommittees, 20 different countries, and collected a great store of information and documents. A compilation committee of five members and an advisory committee of seven members have been appointed to digest this material and write a report, which it is hoped to have ready to transmit to the 63d Congress at the opening of its 2d session, Dec. 1, 1913.

On the return voyage by the steamship *Cedric* the commission adopted a preliminary statement which Senator Fletcher, its chairman, incorporated in his speech made in the Senate Aug. 9, 1913. In this preliminary statement the commission adopted for itself the name of "The American Commission on

Agricultural Cooperation," and this should be, and in all probability will be, its official designation instead of the much clumsier one of "Commission to Investigate and Study Rural Credits and Agricultural Organizations in European Countries," used in the Official Congressional directory, 1st edition, April, 1913, page 191.

BILLS OF EXCHANGE

An International Conference on Bills of Exchange was held at The Hague June 23-July 25, 1910, Mr. Charles A. Conant representing the United States. Mr. Conant's report was printed in 1911 as Senate document 768 of the 61st Congress, 3d session. The Conference of 1910 appointed a second conference, also to be held at The Hague, for the autumn of 1911.

For reasons which have not been made public, the second conference was postponed till the end of 1912. At this conference Mr. Conant again represented the United States. His second report was transmitted to Congress by the President August 13, and ordered to be printed as Senate document 162, 63d Congress, 1st session.

His first report filled a volume of over 500 pages (vol. 57, Senate documents, 61st Congress, 3d session). The purpose of the two conferences was to promote uniform legislation in relation to bills of exchange. The first conference was composed of about 60 delegates, representing 39 countries. Nothing has yet been officially published in this country concerning the composition or proceedings of the second conference.

REDUCED EXPRESS RATES

The Interstate Commerce Commission has published a very extensive document concerning its recent important reduction of express rates, being Opinion 2458, docket no. 4198, submitted to the Commission April 1, 1913, decided July 24, 1913, and published early in August.

It is a great quarto volume in which more than a thousand pages are filled with the tables of the new express rates. There is also a Directory of express stations for the whole country, the rules and classification—all these in addition to the Report of the Commission, written by Commissioner Marble, and the Order issued in accordance therewith.

This volume, which gives the complete official account of the express-rate cases, is sold by the Superintendent of Documents at \$1.50.

GROWTH OF RADIO SERVICE

The "wireless telegraph" service has disappeared, but the "radio service", which is the same thing under a more scientific name, is coming to the very front with a rush.

The monthly Pilot chart of the north Atlantic Ocean, issued by the Hydrographic Office of the United States Navy Department, has for many years had the useful habit of printing news and notes for seafarers in plain type in the blank spaces of the charts and often on their backs as well. These prints have usually given warning of derelicts and icebergs, summaries of weather records, and so on, but latterly a change has come. The August, 1913, chart has even more than the customary amount of printing, both on the face and on the back of the sheet. But it is not the kind of printing formerly customary. By far the larger part, and the more conspicuous part, relates entirely to the radio service, which has become in our times an important part of navigation.

Some of the headings of the text printed on this chart are: Radio calls of vessels and shore stations of the United States Navy; Time signals and hydrographic information by radio; Distribution of meteorological information by Radio Service; Opening of radio stations on ships of the Navy for commercial

business; Changes in radio rates applicable to United States naval radio stations opened to public business; South American radio stations; U. S. naval radio station discontinued (at Cape Henlopen, Del.); U. S. naval radio station established (at Balboa, Canal Zone); U. S. naval radio station, Mare Island, Cal., time signals.

Going below the headings, into the text, one finds many things that to many readers will seem new and curious.

Beginning July 15, 1913, the Weather Bureau is distributing "broadcast" from the most efficient radio station in the world, that at Radio, Va., in the suburbs of Washington, D. C., and also from the radio station at Key West, Fla., a daily weather bulletin. "Broadcast," as the term is used in the Radio Service, means that the message is fired out into the illimitable ether to be picked up and made use of by anybody who has the will and the apparatus to possess himself thereof. As the station at Radio, Va., has a distributing radius of 3,000 miles, the word "broadcast" gains a wider meaning than ever before. The bulletins will be sent a few minutes after 10 p. m. each day, and will give information and forecasts especially useful to navigators.

Time signals are sent by the United States Naval Radio Service daily between 11.55 and noon and between 9.55 and 10 p. m. for the determination of chronometer errors, and hence time and longitude at sea. Direct connection is made with the Naval Observatory for these time signals, which for the Atlantic Coast are the time of the 75th meridian west of Greenwich and for the Pacific Coast are of the 120th meridian. Full details of the wave lengths and symbols used are given on the chart, and mariners are advised that elaborate radio installations and skilled operators are not required in receiving these signals. Simple means for receiving are described. These time signals have been used successfully by vessels for rating their chronometers and by surveying vessels in the exact determination of longitudes. This is a remarkable development of methods in navigation. Formerly navigators had no recourse when cloudy weather prevented taking observations.

Information concerning wrecks, derelicts, icebergs, and other dangers of navigation, formerly printed monthly on the pilot charts, is now sent four times daily by radio, and shipmasters are warned that when within range of a naval radio station they should be prepared to receive these messages at 8 a. m., noon, 4 p. m., and 8 p. m., and should not themselves send radio messages at those hours, as their doing so might prevent other vessels from receiving information essential to their safety. The naval radio stations will also supply this class of information to passing vessels at other hours on request.

Naval radio stations, 23 in number, covering both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, are open to public business, at 6 cents a word "for plain ship-to-shore work."

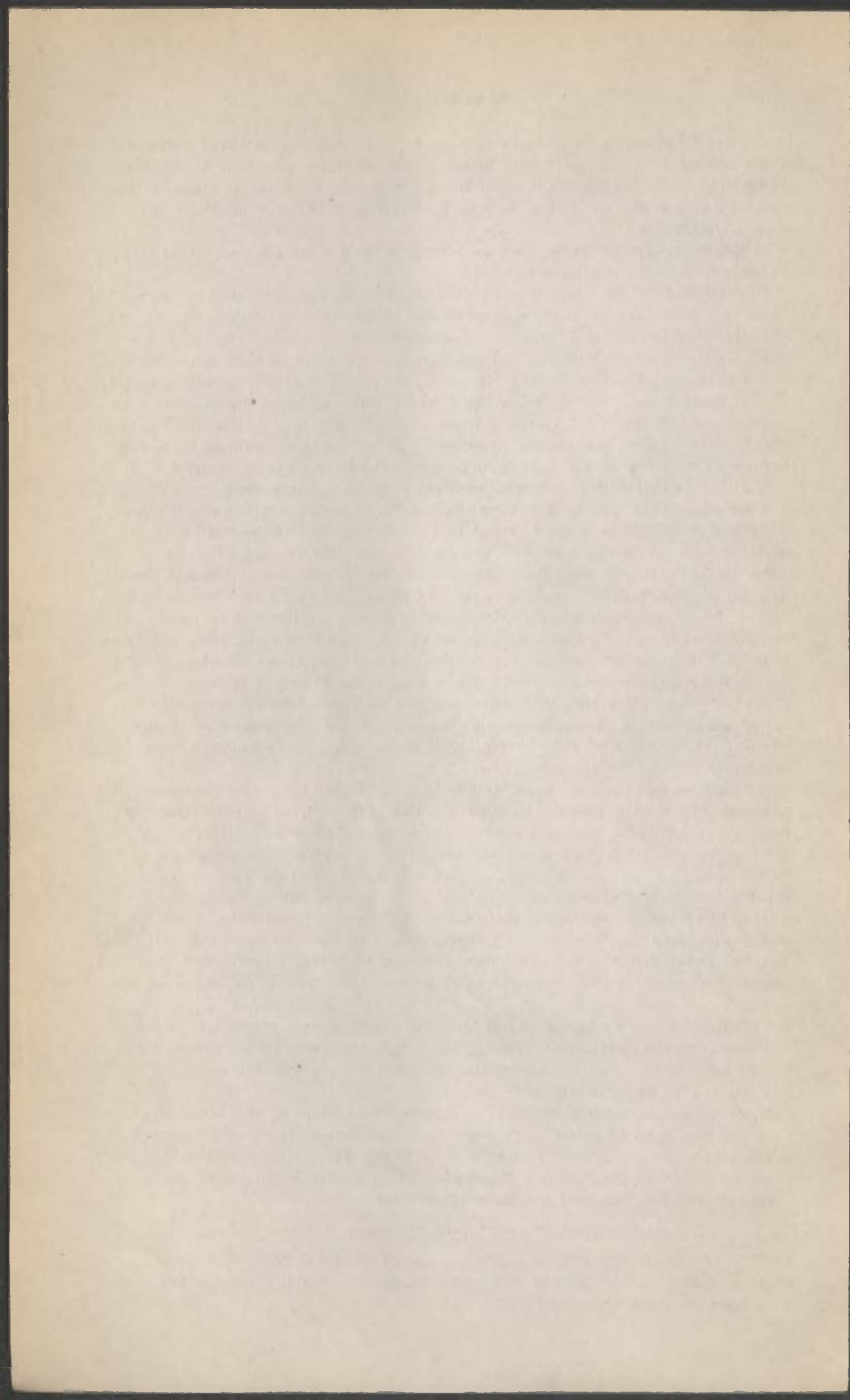
"Practically" every vessel of the Navy that goes to sea accepts public radio business, says the chart, thus adopting the common commercial misuse of the word "practically," really meaning that the statement is not true as to all vessels but is true as to nearly all.

Much more information as to the wonderful uses made of the radio service in navigation is to be found on the chart. Remembering that radio telegraphy is one of the newest applications of science to commercial uses, and noting its great accomplishments thus far, the subject of its future development offers an unlimited and inviting field for the boldest imagination.
