Explanation

Words and figures inclosed in brackets [] are given for information, but do not appear on the title-pages of the publications catalogued. When size is not given, octavo is to be understood. Size of maps is measured from outer edge of border, excluding margin. The dates, including day, month, and year, given with Senate and House documents and reports, are the dates on which they were ordered to be printed. Usually the printing promptly follows the ordering, but various causes sometimes make delays. When Congress and session are not given with the numbers of Senate and House documents and reports, 62d Congress, 1st session, is to be understood.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Superintendent of Documents is authorized to sell at cost any public document in his charge, the distribution of which is not otherwise provided for.

Documents can not be supplied by this Office free to individuals, **nor can they be forwarded in advance of payment.**

Documents entered in this catalogue that are for sale by the **Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C.**, are indicated by a star (*) preceding the price named. A dagger (†) indicates that application should be made to the Department, Bureau, or Division issuing the document, a double dagger (‡) indicates that the document is not obtainable, and whenever additional information concerning the method of procuring a document seems necessary it will be found under the name of the Bureau. The Senate and House documents and reports are issued in limited editions and, unless otherwise indicated, may be obtained only through Members of Congress.

In ordering a publication from the Superintendent of Documents give the name of the issuing Department, Bureau, or Division, and title. If publication is numbered give number also. Do not order by Library of Congress card number.

Read carefully the instructions "How to remit," found at the bottom of the next page.

The accumulation of publications in this Office amounts to over a million, of which several hundred thousand are assorted, forming the sales stock. Many rare books are included, but under the law all must be sold "at cost," regardless of their age or scarcity.

In ordering, it should be borne in mind that many of the books have been in stock some time and are apt to be shop-worn. In filling orders, however, the best copy available is sent.

No general price-list of public documents is available, but lists on special subjects will be furnished on application.

MONTHLY CATALOGUE DISTRIBUTION

The Monthly catalogue is sent to each Senator, Representative, Delegate, and officer in Congress, to designated depositories and State and Territorial libraries, to substantially all Government authors, and to as many school, college, and public libraries as the limited edition will supply.

Subscription price to individuals, \$1.10 a year, including indices. Back numbers can not be supplied. Please notify the Superintendent of Documents of any change in address.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS CARDS

Numbers to be used in ordering the L. C. catalogue cards will be found at the end of the titles of the more important monographic documents. The figure following the card number (separated from it by a slanting line) indicates the number of cards required for entries suggested (title entry not included) on the cards. The price of the cards is 2c. for the first card and $\frac{1}{16}$ c. for each additional card for the same title ordered at the same time. **Remittances should be made to the Librarian of Congress.** Cards can not be furnished by the Superintendent of Documents.

CUMULATIVE INDEX

The Index to the Monthly catalogue will be issued separately each quarter and will cumulate for the twelve months ending June, 1912. That is, the September number of the Index is an index to the Monthly catalogue for July, August, and September, the December number will be an index to the Monthly catalogue for October to December, the March number will be an index to the Monthly catalogue for January to March, and the June number will be the Index for the fiscal year 1912. Persons desiring to bind the catalogue at the end of the year should be careful to retain the numbers received monthly, as duplicate numbers can not be supplied.

HOW TO REMIT

Remittances for the documents marked with a star (*) should be made to the **Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C.**, by postal money order, express order, or New York draft. Currency may be sent at sender's risk.

Postage stamps, foreign money, defaced or smooth coins will positively not be accepted.

To facilitate the payment of the cost of documents, the Superintendent of Documents will hereafter accept coupons issued by him instead of cash. Coupons of the value of 5 cents each are sold in sets of 20 for \$1.00. Address order to Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office.

No charge is made for postage on documents forwarded to points in United States, Guam, Hawaii, Philippine Islands, Porto Rico, or to Canada, Cuba, or Mexico. To other countries the regular rate of postage is charged, and remittances must cover such postage.

NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Forest Service Bulletin 86, Windbreaks; their influence and value, is a document primarily for the prairie States. It advocates the planting of evergreens for windbreaking uses. Paper, 30 cents.

Experiment Stations Office Bulletin 240, Tidal marshes and their reclamation, discusses a large subject which must soon be of nation-wide interest. Drainage is the natural parallel of irrigation, it being quite as essential to reclaim the land which has too much water as that which has too little. The bulletin is sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 35 cents.

The Red man, a magazine written and printed by red men at the Government school for Indians at Carlisle, Pa., has been reviewing Ethnology Bureau Bulletin 30, Handbook of American Indians north of Mexico, and says of it: "It is the most complete record of matters pertaining to the Indians that has yet appeared. It is a splendid aid to those who are interested in the Indian and who need some authoritative source from which to gather information." The red man ought to know about this Indian book, and he does know. The two parts are now on sale by the Superintendent of Documents at \$1.50 for each part.

Plant Industry Bureau Circular 88, The picking and handling of peanuts, says: "The growth of the peanut industry in the United States during the last 15 or 20 years has been so great that few people recognize its importance." Another statement is that if the outer shell is not broken peanuts may be kept in storage indefinitely. Some of the machines now employed to pick peanuts break a good many shells, and because of this fact Circular 88 is issued, proposing improved plans.

Forest Service Bulletin 99 is the second number in the series called Uses of the commercial woods of the United States. This number gives the history of the pines, of which this country has 37 varieties. The white pine, which for 250 years was the leading American wood, leading in the variety of its uses and the quantity consumed, is no longer the leader, though still important. Its history, as given in Bulletin 99, is a most interesting chapter in our economic annals. (15 cents.) The first number in this series was Forest Service Bulletin 95, Cedars, cypresses, and sequoias. (10 cents.)

The Register of the Department of State, of which a new edition, dated Sept. 20, 1911, is just out of press, has an entertaining feature not found in any other Department register. It is a series of brief biographies of everybody connected with the Department, from the Secretary of State and the ambassadors to the laborers and messenger boys. Of course there is much more in the State Department Register, including full lists of the ambassadors, ministers, consuls-general, consuls, and consular agents

who represent this country in foreign lands and of like officials who represent foreign lands in this country.

Fisheries Bureau document 752 maintains it has been demonstrated that fishes can hear, yet for reasons stated comes to the conclusion that explosive sounds, like those produced by motor boats, do not startle fishes. The firing of guns does startle them but only slightly and temporarily.

Cavalry notes, by Major Henry T. Allen, is something more than a drill book. It gives reasons and comments.

The interesting and hopeful address on Conservation of the soil, made by President Taft, Sept. 25, 1911, before the National Conservation Congress at Kansas City, Mo., has been printed by the Agriculture Department as Circular 38, Secretary's Office.

Part 1 of the Report of the commissioner of corporations on the steel industry, which has been awaited with much interest, has now been issued. This part has for title Organization, investment, profits, and position of the United States Steel Corporation. There may be two other parts of this report, but some months will intervene before the appearance of the second part. Part 1 can be supplied at 50 cents.

By act of June 7, 1906 (34 Stat., pt. 1, p. 218), the director of the census was authorized to collect decennially and publish as "special reports" statistics as to the defective, dependent, and delinquent classes, crimes, social statistics of cities, public indebtedness, religious bodies, transportation (printed in the Statutes "transportation") by water, express business, mines and quarries, savings banks, and fisheries, the latter to be made in cooperation with the Fisheries Bureau. The law also provides for five-year reports on other designated subjects. Fisheries of the United States, the second special report under the ten-year provision, has been received. It is a quarto of 324 pages, in the familiar dark-blue cloth and silvery aluminum lettering of the Census Bureau. Though of course a statistical work, the statistics are not wholly given in figure-tables. There is much text of an informing kind, including several appendices, one of which is an alphabetical list of the best-known common names of American fishes, with their synonyms, and notes on qualities and habitat. The index is full and easy of use. The general conclusions are (1) a marked decline in the value of the whale and menhaden fisheries, (2) large gains in the general fisheries and the sponge fisheries, and (3) an increase in the oyster industry, though the results for 1908 were below the best record.

There is an International Commission on the Teaching of Mathematics. It has three American commissioners in its membership. Under their direction the American report has been made by Committee No. 10, on Undergraduate work in mathematics in colleges of liberal arts and universities. It is in three parts, made by as many subcommittees, No. 1 on Men's colleges; No. 2 on Women's colleges; No. 3 on Coeducational colleges. All are published by the Education Bureau as Bulletin 7, series of 1911, and copies can be supplied by the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents.

The United States Bureau of Engraving and Printing, which prints all of the paper money and postage stamps but none of the public documents,

has grown to be a very great manufacturing plant. The 1911 annual report of Director Ralph shows that the employees number 3,814 and that the average production of engraved and printed sheets was 68,905 for each employee. Each of these sheets is made up of a number of banknotes, silver certificates, postage stamps, or other Government issues. As one hundred postage stamps go to a sheet and 97,734,242 sheets of this kind were turned out, it is evident that the total issue of stamps of this variety for one year was 9,773,424,200—almost ten billions. These are overwhelming figures, and give a vivid idea of the corresponding habit of our people. The turnout of notes, certificates, and bonds was in round numbers 67,000,000 sheets, of national bank notes 12,000,000 sheets, of internal-revenue stamps 84,000,000 sheets, of customs stamps 153,000 sheets, of checks, drafts, and miscellaneous 2,266,581 sheets, a grand total of 262,806,113 sheets, aggregating an untold number of billions of separate notes and stamps. It is a moral certainty that even these magnificent figures will be greatly increased in the future. The correspondence habit, the circularizing habit, and the paper-money habit are all firmly fixed in the minds and the practice of the American people. The average life of paper money is said to be only between two and three years. The Director of the Mint reports that nearly the whole gold production of the country goes into the Treasury, which now holds more than \$1,200,000,000 in that metal, being the largest accumulation of the kind ever known. The people use the paper money issued against the metal, which remains inert in the vaults. This means that as the population increases more and more paper money must be printed. As for postage stamps, there seems to be no limit to the demand for them, and as they can be used but once, there must be a constant and constantly increasing supply. The Bureau of Engraving and Printing is sure to grow much greater. It is to be hoped it will not outgrow its new building before the structure has been completed.

Interesting discussions of sanitation and related topics may be found in Transactions of the ninth annual Conference of State and Territorial Health Officers with the United States Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service. 10 cents.

The movement of farming people toward the warm regions of the country will be aided by Soils Bureau Circular 43, The selection of land for general farming in the Gulf Coast region east of the Mississippi River.

Readers who do not see the catalogues of ships' and crews' libraries published by the Navigation Bureau, Navy Department, may perhaps accept our assurance that the selections are excellently made and that the ships' companies of the United States Navy need not lack for instruction and entertainment during such hours of leisure as their service leaves to them. The ships' libraries have a large proportion of textbooks, the remainder being histories and biographies, with little or no fiction. The crews' libraries have a large proportion of high-class fiction.

The second draft of former Senator Aldrich's Suggested plan for monetary legislation has been printed in a revised edition, dated Oct., 1911, and is on sale with the Superintendent of Documents at 5 cents.

A Geological Survey Bulletin of much local interest to an important American city is no. 483, Economic geology of Richmond, Va., and vicinity.

The annual report of the register of copyrights for 1911 shows that the copyright fees turned into the United States Treasury since the reorganization of the Copyright Office in 1897 have exceeded a million dollars, being \$162,905.23 more than the total of the sums paid for salaries in the Office during the same period. In that time 2,582,170 books, maps, and prints which have been filed for copyright have become the property of the Government without cost.

Biological Survey Bulletin 38, Birds of Arkansas, fills an important gap in our knowledge of the avifauna of the Mississippi Valley. Arkansas is remarkable for the variety and abundance of its bird life. This is the first detailed report on the subject that has been published. The bulletin is priced at 25 cents.

An important chapter in the Annual report of the Experiment Stations Office for 1910 has been reprinted in a separate pamphlet. Its title is Irrigation under the Carey act. This act, which was a rider on an appropriation bill passed August 18, 1894, "has made possible the successful reclamation and settlement of millions of acres of desert land," says the article. The text of the original act, and also of the amendments by which it has been perfected, is in the pamphlet. Idaho leads in the development of land under the Carey act. That State is now developing its third allotment of 1,000,000 acres. Eight States—Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, and Wyoming—have received grants of land of 1,000,000 acres or more under the Carey act.

Bulletin 442J, Alaska coal and its utilization, is by Alfred H. Brooks, the man supposed to know most about the subject. He is also the man who declined promotion to Chief Geologist so that he might continue his work in Alaska.

It is the age of cement. The report of the Geological Survey on the cement industry for 1910 shows that the American production for that year was 76,549,951 barrels, valued at \$68,205,800. In 1880 the production was 82,000 barrels valued at \$126,000. The price in 1880 touched \$3.00 a barrel. In 1910 the average was 89 cents.

Series 1, vol. 24, Official records of the Union and Confederate navies in the War of the Rebellion, is now ready for delivery. Cloth bound, matching the previous volumes, 75 cents.

Fisheries Bureau Bulletin for 1909 (vol. 29 of the Bulletin series) is now on sale at \$1.35 in cloth binding. The large volume is made up of seven scientific papers, all of which have been previously issued in pamphlet form. As now brought together, they have been provided with a general index, while the combination of all the illustrations makes an unusually attractive volume. The frontispiece is a portrait of one of the handsomest of American fishes, the lake trout. There are several colored pictures of the American lobster.

The United States has at the Hot Springs Reservation a superintendent who is an enthusiast in his work. In his Annual report, speaking of the

medical efficacy of the springs, he says, "The cures effected here are so startling as to seem almost miraculous."

An important recent publication of the Library of Congress is Tentative headings and cross-references for a subject catalogue of American and English law. Sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 20 cents.

Insecticide decision 1 was issued in August by the Insecticide and Fungicide Board, a comparatively new organization created to pass upon the purity and efficacy of commercial insecticides and fungicides. Now the Board has issued Insecticide decision 2, in which it finds it necessary to warn the public that neither the decisions nor the correspondence of the Bureau must be taken to add anything to the Rules and regulations for carrying out the provisions of the insecticide act of 1910 nor to take anything away from them.

The Gaugers' weighing manual, 1911 edition, is now ready. In cloth, 75 cents.

Education Bureau Bulletin 18, series of 1911, has for title Teachers' certificates issued under general State laws and regulations. It is the outgrowth of a conference of State education officers concerning the recognition in each State of teachers' certificates granted in other States. 20 cents.

Fruit culturists should not overlook Plant Industry Bureau Bulletin 135, Orchard fruits in the Piedmont and Blue Ridge regions of Virginia and the South Atlantic States.

Annual report of the American Historical Association, 1909, is but a single volume, price in cloth, 75 cents.

PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS

Vol. 47, Congressional record, is the verbatim report of the proceedings of the 1st session of the 62d Congress, convened by Presidential mandate Apr. 4, and adjourned by its own authority Aug. 22, 1911. These proceedings have been published in the numbers of the Record issued daily while the session lasted. Now they are again published in the permanent bound books which will be preserved in the official and unofficial libraries of the country.

Vol. 47 is issued in five parts, each one of which is a very large book. Four of these books contain only proceedings, April 4-Aug. 18. The fifth part is an index volume, but contains also proceedings, Aug. 19-22, and an Appendix made up of delayed speeches.

The Superintendent of Documents offers the new volume of the Congressional record for sale at \$2.00 each for parts 1-4 and \$2.25 for the index volume.

SESSION LAWS

The session laws, otherwise known as the pamphlet laws, containing the enactments of the 1st session of the 62d Congress, are now on sale in one large pamphlet, price 40 cents.

The number of laws passed at the recent session was unusually small. The most important one was the act providing for reciprocity with Canada, and everybody knows what the Canadian voters did to that.

The act for publicity of campaign contributions and the resolution for the admission of the States of Arizona and New Mexico are the only other important measures of more than local interest. There are, however, an unusual number of Presidential proclamations relating to national forests and national monuments, and each of these is accompanied by a map.

PRICE OF SLIP LAWS REDUCED

The subscription price for the Federal laws, as published in separate pamphlets or slips during the sessions of Congress and immediately mailed to subscribers, has been reduced from \$2.00 a session to \$1.00 a session.

When the price was first fixed it was announced that it was an experimental rate, subject to change as experience might dictate. The session then current enacted a large number of laws—several hundred—but the number in the succeeding sessions has been much less, and it now seems evident that the reduced rate will be sufficient to meet the average cost, taking one session with another.

REPORTS OF COMMERCE COURT

The Superintendent of Documents, believing that there will be considerable demand for the reported decisions of the new Commerce Court, which decides appeals from the decisions of the Interstate Commerce Commission, has arranged to publish the decisions in a series of bound volumes.

It is too early to give any details. As the material accumulates, further announcements will be made.

TWENTY-SEVENTH ETHNOLOGY REPORT

The 27th annual report of the Bureau of American Ethnology, nominally for the year 1906, was not issued in time to be regularly catalogued in this number of the Monthly catalogue, but it has been printed, and copies will be on sale by the time this announcement reaches the reader.

A NEW FINANCIAL LIBRARY

The publications of the National Monetary Commission, which in the numbered Congressional document edition were printed in 44 separate paper-covered documents (one of them in two volumes), have been now collected in 24 cloth-bound volumes, having title-pages free of document numbers, with some changes in titles, and carrying on the backs of the title-pages information as to the document numbers and titles under which the first prints were made.

The contents of volumes 1-23 are definitely determined as above stated. Those of volume 24 are somewhat less certain. The Report of the Commission has not yet been printed, and there has not been any public announcement that it has been drafted or considered by the Commission as a body. It will, however, whether long or short, be the chief feature of the volume. Already two drafts of Mr. Aldrich's Suggested plan (Document 784), have been printed, and it is intimated there may be still others. All will be found in volume 24. Dr. Hollander's Bank loans and stock exchange speculation, listed as Document 589, but never printed because the manuscript had not reached the Commission, will be included in the volume, the manuscript having been lately received.

Document 592, The French banking system, which has been listed but not printed, will not be printed in either edition, and Document 663, Banks of issue and circulation notes, it is said will be consolidated with Document 575, Italian banks of issue, included in volume 18.

The 24-volume bound edition of the new financial library thus brought into existence by the Monetary Commission will be handsomely and substantially bound—probably in a dark green buckram—and will be sold in sets only at \$45. Orders for single articles or treatises will be filled from the paper-covered numbered document prints.

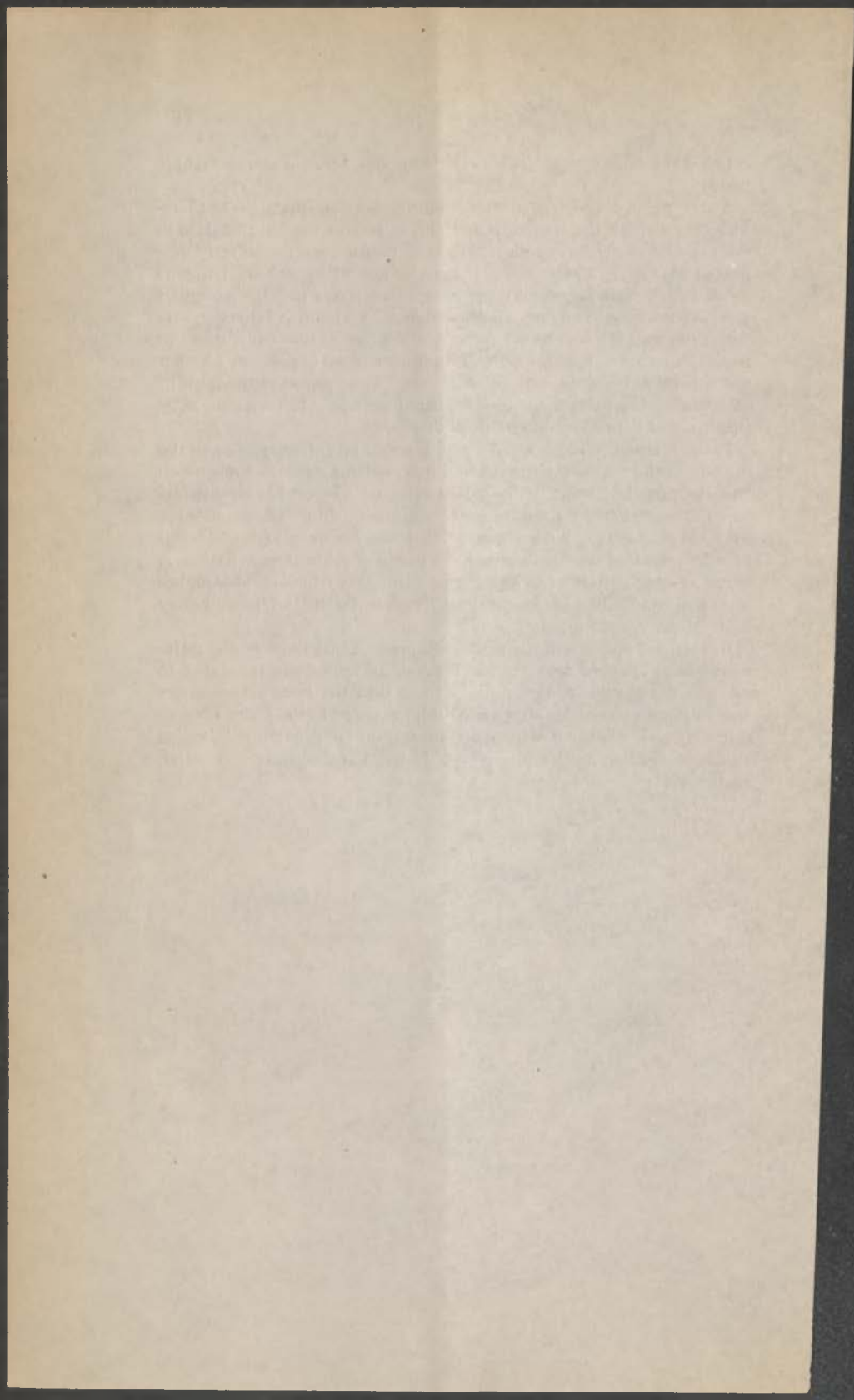

In two of these separates, however, the word "east" has been omitted from the general title, making it appear that the subject under treatment is The use of soils of the Great Plains region, which of course is quite contrary to the Bureau's intention. The librarian who

supplies the missing word at once puts up an insurance against trouble hereafter.

A new print of the United States mining laws and regulations thereunder, issued by the General Land Office, retains the imprint date of the old edition, 1909, and also carries on its title-page the legend "Approved March 29, 1909," but on pages 60 and 61 appear amendments dated July 29 and Aug. 8, 1911, proving conclusively that the pamphlet can not have been issued prior to those dates. An imprint date two years out of the way is a serious error, very misleading to librarians, who can not be expected to read through all their documents to discover whether the imprint dates agree with the contents. The purpose of the imprint date in a book is to show the time of its publication. If it does not show this it might better be omitted altogether.

In the Statutes at large, vol. 34, part 1, page 218, authority is given the director of the census (among other things) to issue decennial reports on "transportion" by water. Under this authority a report has been issued on "transportation" by water—quite a different thing, as one may see by looking closely. We are taught that the laws are to be followed literally, and that nobody is authorized to add or subtract even a comma, much less two letters as in this case. Still, no particular catastrophes seem to have resulted from publishing "transportation" on the authority for publishing "transportion."

In vols. 218 and 219, United States Supreme Court Reports, the statements are published that Mr. Justice Van Devanter was appointed to succeed Mr. Justice Moody, resigned, and that Mr. Justice Lamar was appointed to succeed Mr. Justice White, promoted to the Chief Justiceship. In vol. 220 these statements are said to be "in error," Justice Lamar succeeding Justice Moody and Justice Van Devanter succeeding Justice White.
