Explanation

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CUMULATIVE INDEX

Beginning with July, 1910, the Index to the Monthly catalogue will be issued separately each quarter and will cumulate for the twelve months ending June, 1911. That is, the September number of the Index is an index to the Monthly catalogue for July, August, and September, the December number will be an index to the Monthly catalogue for October to December, the March number will be an index to the Monthly catalogue for January to March, and the June number will be the Index for the fiscal year 1911. Persons desiring to bind the catalogue at the end of the year should be careful to retain the numbers received monthly, as duplicate numbers can not be supplied.

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NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

The Report on farmers' institutes in the United States, 1909, has been reprinted (in a 5-cent pamphlet) from the Annual report of the Office of Experiment Stations. It is an encouraging report. Returns have been received from 49 States and Territories, and in 47 of them institutes had been held. More marked progress was made than in any previous year. More money was appropriated, more sessions were held, and the attendance was greater than at any other time since this means of carrying scientific agriculture to the very door of the actual farmer was devised.

Progress report of investigations in human nutrition in the United States, 1905-09, is another very useful 5-cent separate from the Annual report of the Office of Experiment Stations. It briefly reviews the literature of the five years relating to human nutrition, and probably no previous five years turned out so much on this vital subject. One may not be able to learn from these brief reviews all that one should know of these matters, but the way to learn more is clearly pointed out by numerous references to the books and magazines in which extended treatises on various phases of the subject are to be found.

Statistics of land-grant colleges and agricultural experiment stations, fiscal year 1909, is another interesting 5-cent separate from the same prolific depository of agricultural lore. It gives the name of the president, the date of establishment, the location, the courses of study, the revenues, and numerous other details for the land-grant colleges, while for the State agricultural experiment stations it gives the location, date of establishment, principal lines of work, number and size of publications, and so forth and so on.

There is a new Superintendent at the Government Reservation, Hot Springs, Ark., and his first annual report indicates that he is the proverbial new broom. He says that for 40 years systems which he calls "hotel drumming" and "doctor drumming" had been pursued at the Springs till they had become established industries—and nuisances. Though Hot Springs is a town of only 16,000 permanent residents, it has 600 hotels and boarding-houses and the arrivals of visitors by rail for the first four months of the present year exceeded 53,000. As these were mostly invalids or fast livers seeking health or recuperation through the curative waters of the springs, the field for "hotel drumming" and "doctor drumming" was large and inviting. The report says, however, that the hotel

drumming was mostly a subterfuge in aid of the doctor drumming, the chief end being to get invalids into the hands of unregistered doctors. The new Superintendent seems to have tackled the drumming business energetically and successfully, sending agents aboard the trains to warn visitors against the drummers, shoals of whom had formerly invaded the trains as far away as St. Louis and Memphis. The drummers were thus driven off and the Government agents informed the arriving invalids that if they employed unregistered doctors they would not be permitted to bathe in the healing waters of the Government springs. So far from these stringent measures keeping intending visitors away, the number during the past year was greater than ever before. The Superintendent believes that remarkable cures have been effected by the use of the waters at Hot Springs.

Government annual reports are not all humdrum details and statistics. Here, for instance, is a very serious question raised by the Commissioner of Fisheries in his 1910 report:

"In some of the hatcheries of the Bureau [of Fisheries] and in similar establishments under State and private auspices certain fish diseases have become so prevalent as to make it a matter of grave consideration whether the propagation of certain species, especially the trouts, should not be abandoned. It frequently occurs that the fish and fry are decimated by epidemics for which there are no known remedies. The gravest phase of the matter is the possible relationship of some of these diseases to more or less kindred affections occurring in human beings. It has been determined that a type of cancerous affection is of widespread distribution among domesticated trout and their offspring planted in the streams. Whether this disease has a causal relation to cancer in human beings, or whether the two are to be even traced to the same source, is a matter of doubt, but the annually increasing mortality from cancer in man and certain remarkable coincidences in the geographical distribution of the disease in man and fish render it imperative that it should be made the subject of minute inquiry."

There is a new print of Rules of practice in the Patent Office dated Oct. 1, 1910.

Experiment Stations Office Circular 99 is another one of those excellent publications looking to the diffusion of scientific education in agriculture of which so many have been issued by the same office. Its title is Farmers' institutes for young people.

A leaflet has been issued by the General Land Office dated Oct. 11, 1910, under the title Soldiers' and sailors' homestead rights.

A study of melting-point determinations, with special reference to the melting-point requirements of the United States Pharmacopœia, is the title of Hygienic Laboratory Bulletin 70. This title may not convey a very definite idea to the lay reader, but melting-points are among the most important tests in identifying drugs and determining their purity, and as by sec. 7, Food and drugs act, approved June 30, 1906, the Pharmacopœia is made the standard by which adulterations are to be determined, Bulletin 70 seems justified in its comment "that the food and drugs act confers upon the

Pharmacopœia, in its field of operation, the exalted dignity of a Federal statute—makes it the law of the land in the vitally important matter of official drug standards—and imposes upon that body of men which constitutes the United States Pharmacopœial Convention the very great responsibility of producing a Pharmacopœia which shall, in every sense, uphold the dignity of the law and be worthy to represent the final authority on the standardization of drugs." The ninth decennial revision of the Pharmacopœia is now pending, and the Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service, more especially through its Hygienic Laboratory, is contributing actively and earnestly to this important and highly technical work. To this end Bulletin 70 submits a series of recommendations as to methods of determining melting-points for incorporation in the new edition of the Pharmacopœia. The price of Bulletin 70 is 15 cents. This and other publications of the Public Health and Marine-Hospital Service are sold by the Superintendent of Documents.

Water-supply paper 255, Underground waters for farm use, is of so practical a character and appeals to so wide a public that it is likely to be in active demand. It sells at 15 cents.

The Census Bureau's special report on telephones is out of press. Cloth, 55 cents.

Another excellent separate from the 1909 Annual report of the Office of Experiment Stations, entitled Reclamation of the southern Louisiana wet prairie lands, has been issued and sells at 10 cents. The Report itself, from which so many useful separate pamphlets have been reprinted, is priced at 40 cents in paper covers and 55 cents in cloth binding.

Plant Industry Bureau Bulletin 193, Experiments in blueberry culture, brings the promise of a valuable addition to the stock of cultivated small fruits. The blueberry is not a huckleberry. There are several differences, perhaps the most noticeable being the fact that the seeds of the blueberry are so small that they are unnoticeable in eating the berries. It is found that the blueberry will not grow in fertilized or limed soils, but only in acid peaty soils in which other fruit plants will not grow at all. It therefore offers a means of profitably utilizing millions of acres of soil now unutilized. It bears transportation well, and at its best is a fine fruit, the choicest of the wild berries, which are the only ones now known, going almost exclusively to the Boston market and commanding there a high price. With the prospect of improvement of its size and quality by cultivation, it is a matter worth the while of fruit growers to look into. Bulletin 193 is a very complete exposition of the subject, reporting the researches of several years. It is profusely illustrated, and sold by the Superintendent of Documents at 25 cents.

The 16th index for binding Farmers' bulletins has been issued. It provides title page, table of contents, and index for binding the 25 numbers, 376 to 400. Similar "apparatus" for binding each

25 numbers has been issued, from the beginning of the series more than 20 years ago, and the farmer, stockgrower, fruitgrower, or poultryman who has the complete set bound and indexed in 16 vols. has a library which will come to his aid in almost any emergency.

Vol. 37, Proceedings of the National Museum, has been published.

Animal Industry Bureau Bulletin 126, The bacteriology of commercially pasteurized and raw market milk, is a timely contribution to the large and growing mass of literature on the milk question.

One of the most voluminous and important of the publications of the National Monetary Commission, Laws of the United States concerning money, banking, and loans, 1778-1909, was published as Senate document 580, 61st Congress, 2d session, with a very brief and inadequate table of contents, though with a full index. A full table of contents (22 pages) has now been published as Senate document 580, part 2.

Bulletin 81, Statistics Bureau, Agriculture Department, Grain movement in the Great Lakes region, is the result of special collection of data and its facts are not shown in any other Government publication (so avers the introductory page).

The Division of Militia Affairs, War Department, has issued for 1910 a report of 284 pages, with map. Since the militia became a national as well as a State ward, the interest in this important branch of the national defense has shown a decided increase.

Bulletin 45, Ethnology Bureau, has the title Chippewa music, Frances Densmore being the author. Director Holmes states that Miss Densmore has been for several years engaged in the study of Indian music, phonograph records being one of the means employed. The present work, of 216 pages, is illustrated by 12 plates, 8 text figures, and numerous scores and "song pictures."

Entomology Bureau Bulletin 80, Papers on deciduous fruit insects and insecticides, has been in course of publication in parts. Part 6, Life history of the codling moth in northwestern Pennsylvania; Part 7, The one-spray method in the control of the codling moth and the plum curculio; and Part 8, Tests of sprays against the European fruit lecanium and the European pear scale, have now been received. These complete Bulletin 80, which will soon be issued as one publication, with index.

The petition of the United States of America, filed in the Circuit Court of the United States for the Southern District of New York in the suit for the dissolution of the American Sugar Refining Company, popularly known as the Sugar Trust, is a volume of 221 pages, the most of them decidedly interesting reading.

Labor Bureau Bulletin 89, the one last issued, has for leading article a very comprehensive paper of 413 pages on child-labor legislation in Europe.

NOTE.—The documents briefly described in the two notes next following were entered under their appropriate headings in the Monthly catalogue for October, but without the prices, which at that time were not obtainable.

Chemistry Bureau Bulletin 134, Maple-sap sirup, its manufacture, composition, and the effect of environment thereon, should be a welcome document to all northernborn Americans, for to their palates the most delectable of all sweets is that derived from the spring-flowing sap of the hard-maple tree. This bulletin draws a broad line between sap-sirup and sugar-sirup, saying that sirup made by melting maple sugar is not the real thing. Only in sirup made from the sap, and made under the best conditions and with the utmost care and skill, are the exquisite qualities of the maple sweet preserved. How to do this and the reasons for doing it are shown in this bulletin, and it would be well worth the while of all maple-sirup farmers to study it, for there is hardly any limit to the price they may get for their product when it is really of the best possible quality. The price of Chemistry Bureau Bulletin 134 is 25 cents. It is profusely illustrated.

Contributions from the national herbarium, vol. 15, is out of press. Its title is *The North American species of Panicum*. It describes 197 species and 8 subspecies. Price 40 cents.

WOMAN AND CHILD WAGE-EARNERS

The Labor Bureau has in course of publication a very extensive report on this subject, resulting from an investigation ordered by Congress, Jan. 29, 1907, in an act providing for an investigation of "the industrial, social, moral, educational, and physical condition of woman and child workers in the United States, wherever employed, with special reference to their age, hours of labor, term of employment, health, illiteracy, sanitary and other conditions surrounding their occupation, and the means employed for the protection of their health, person, and morals." The bill as passed did not carry an appropriation, but each of the two succeeding sundry civil bills appropriated \$150,000, thus enabling the Bureau to send into the field a large force of special agents to gather the data necessary to fill the very large order given by Congress.

For nearly a year past almost the whole local force of the Bureau has been engaged in preparing the data thus gathered for publication.

The report will be published as Senate document 645, 61st Congress, 2d session, in 19 parts or volumes, under the general title *Condition of woman and child wage-earners in the United States*. No provision thus far has been made for a departmental or bureau edition without the Congressional document number. The manuscript for the first nine volumes has already been sent to the Public Printer. These volumes will bear the following subtitles: Volume 1, Cotton textile industry; 2, Clothing industry; 3, Glass industry;

4, Silk industry; 5, Wage-earning women in stores and factories; 6, Some phases of the beginnings of child labor legislation in certain States; 7, Conditions under which children leave school to go to work; 8, Juvenile delinquency and its relation to employment; 9, History of women in industry in the United States.

The remaining ten volumes will be sent to the Public Printer within the next few weeks. Their numerical order has not been finally determined, but they will consider these subjects: Hardships attending child-labor laws; Relation of occupation and criminality of women; Women as machine operators in the metal trades; Women in laundries; History of women in trade unions; Causes of death among woman and child cotton mill operatives; Employment of women and infant mortality; Hookworm disease among cotton mill operatives; Employment of women and children in selected industries; Employment of women and children in agriculture.

With but few exceptions, these volumes are based on original data collected solely for this investigation and therefore not available in other form. It is by far the most extensive investigation ever made of this most interesting and important subject. The volumes are sure to furnish the occasion for much discussion and agitation, and quite probably for further legislation.

THE MOST VALUABLE MINERAL

"The man in the street" is likely to scoff when he first hears water spoken of as "the most abundant and most valuable mineral in nature," but this is the class and the rank assigned to it by the United States Geological Survey, and the Survey is consequently giving to it all the attention that can be given with appropriations which it considers quite inadequate to the tremendous magnitude of the work.

What has been accomplished, however, seems fairly wonderful when one who has not kept pace with the progress of the work comes to consider it in its present stage.

The first and greatest thing to know about water is what supply of it can be had at any particular place. To this end the Survey has hundreds of stations all over the country occupied in measuring rivers and smaller streams, gaging their flow and computing the averages, so that there are few streams of much importance on which the Survey can not give data. Whether a stream is wanted for public or for private use, the average volume of its supply and its extent at high and low water must be known before any kind of permanent construction for its use as a mechanical power can safely be entered upon. This information, and much more, the Survey has published and is publishing for the benefit of those interested. In its series of Water supply papers 260 numbers have been thus far published and many more have been announced as in press or in preparation.

It is the present purpose to call attention only to one of the sub-series of the Water supply papers, recently published under the general title Surface water supply of the United States, 1907-08. Under this title parts 1-12 have been published, the numbers, titles, and prices being shown in the following list.

All of these are substantial volumes, the smallest one containing 124 pages and the largest 418 pages. Each volume has illustrative plates. The 12 parts cover the work of 1907 and 1908 throughout the whole country, and are the latest issues of this branch of the work in water. All of these and other series published by the United States Geological Survey are sold by the Superintendent of Documents.

FIREWOOD

The Forest Service has made its first attempt at the task—obviously a difficult one—of estimating the quantity and value of the firewood annually consumed in the United States. It has had in this work the assistance of more than 48,000 crop correspondents of the Statistics Bureau, Agriculture Department, and of census special agents in cities of over 30,000 population, while for cities and towns of from 1,000 to 30,000 inquiries were sent to firms in the fuel trade. The results are published in Forest Service Circular 181 (5c.). The conclusions reached must prove rather surprising, especially to city dwellers, with whom the use of coal and gas has become so common that it is hard for them to think of firewood as more than a negligible quantity. It is, on the contrary, the second largest class of wood products annually consumed, being exceeded only by the double class known as lumber and shingles. The total annual consumption of wood is over 20 billion cubic feet, of which firewood takes over 7 billion. Stated in cords of 128 cubic feet each,

the firewood accounts for \$6,000,000 cords a year, valued at \$250,000,000. These are large figures, helping to make one realize more vividly the largeness of the country. When the first Congress to appropriate a billion dollars arrived—several years ago—the reply to the charge of extravagance was "This is a billion-dollar country." It was the correct answer, and its correctness daily becomes more evident. It is hardly possible nowadays to take up any kind of statistics relating to national production or consumption without speedily running into millions or hundreds of millions or even billions.

A SUPERB PATRIOTIC PUBLICATION

Glenn Brown's *History of the United States Capitol* (the building, not the city) carries on its title page this quotation from Rufus Choate, a famous orator and Senator of two generations ago: "We have built no temple but the Capitol; we consult no common oracle but the Constitution."

When Mr. Choate uttered these words he of course could have had no thought of supplying a fitting inscription for the most sumptuous and elaborate historical monograph ever issued from the Government press, but their fitness for such use is obvious and it was a happy thought of the author of the *History of the Capitol* to thus use them.

Mr. Brown's *History* is in two volumes, vol. 1 recording all known information concerning the Old Capitol, of which President Washington laid the corner-stone in 1792 and which remained still old and inadequate till 1851, when work began on the dome and wings which changed it to the present imposing structure. Vol. 2 records minutely the history of the New Capitol, 1851-1900.

As the author is a practising architect and a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects, it was to be supposed that his history would be especially strong on the architectural side, and so it is. Nowhere else can so complete and accurate an account be found of the competitions, dissensions, dangers, and final happy outcome of the efforts, in the infant days of the republic, to secure a worthy design for a Capitol building. The same is true as to the history of the more ambitious plans for the extension on which construction began in 1851. The proposed plans for further extension also receive attention—for the Capitol is not considered to be yet complete.

Mr. Brown was engaged for many years in collecting material for his great history. The Capitol building during the various stages of its existence has been under the jurisdiction of many different Departments, commissions, committees, and superintendents, and its historical records were therefore to be looked for in many official places. Some of them were in unofficial places also, due to the fact that various architects and superintendents had made private property of public records and so left them to their

descendants. All of these sources were thoroughly explored by the author, and everywhere he found courtesy and assistance, being thus enabled to bring to unexampled completeness the history of the most famous and important public building in America.

In illustration the volumes are, if possible, even more complete than in text. The plates are not only very numerous (322 in all) but they are also interesting in subject and excellent in execution. They include external views of the Capitol in all periods of its growth—and there wasn't much of it when it was first occupied. They include also reproductions of many unsuccessful plans submitted in competition when Capitol plans were first invited. Some of those which happily failed of acceptance are really grotesque. Many of the statues and paintings and much of the mural decoration is also reproduced. The Capitol history thus makes its appeal to collectors on several grounds, of which patriotism is perhaps not the least compelling.

A number of sets of this superb work remain in the hands of the Superintendent of Documents for sale at a price which is probably hardly more than one fifth the sum a private publishing house would necessarily charge for so beautiful and costly a set. The Government price is \$20.00 for the two very large folio volumes, 15½ inches high by 11¾ inches wide, securely and beautifully bound in red and gold.

COUES'S BIBLIOGRAPHY

When a librarian is asked for Parts 1-4 of Dr. Elliott Coues's American ornithological bibliography he or she is likely to be at least momentarily puzzled. Part 2, or the "2d instalment," as Dr. Coues called it, is found in Hayden's Survey as Bulletin 2, article 17, in vol. 5 of the bound edition of the Bulletin. The 3d instalment is found in the same volume as Bulletin 4. The 1st instalment, or Part 1, does not appear on the surface, though its whereabouts is pointed out in the introductions to the 2d and 3d instalments. It was printed as Bibliographical appendix, pages 567-784, in Coues's *Birds of the Colorado Valley*, which is vol. 11 of the Miscellaneous publications of Hayden's Survey. Evidently when Dr. Coues compiled the Bibliographical appendix he had no thought of going further with the work. If such a thought had been then in his mind he would undoubtedly have supplied the missing link connecting the Bibliographical appendix with the 2d, 3d, and 4th instalments. The 4th instalment skipped out of the Hayden Survey altogether and landed in the National Museum. It is found in vol. 2 of the Proceedings, pages 359-499. In this instalment the word "American" is dropped from the title and the references are all to publications relating to British birds. In the introductory paragraph Dr. Coues says that the Bibliographical appendix in Miscellaneous publication 11 "is to be considered as the first

instalment of a Universal bibliography of ornithology." He says also that the first three instalments "represent a nearly complete bibliography of American ornithology"; and, finally, that "this instalment, like those which have preceded it, is to be considered only in the light of published proof-sheets, to be canceled on the final appearance of the whole work."

Dr. Coues died in 1899, leaving this work incomplete.

Hayden's Miscellaneous publications no. 11, which is Coues's *Birds of the Colorado Valley*, has on its title page the words Part first, Passeres to Laniidæ. This can hardly have been intended to apply to the Bibliographical appendix, although, as it turned out, three additional instalments of the Appendix were published, while no other part of the *Birds of the Colorado Valley* has been forthcoming.

The proper title of Hayden's Survey is Geological and Geographical Survey of the Territories, though from some of its title pages the words "and Geographical" are omitted. The period of its activities was 1867-1878, but the publication of its reports was not completed till 1890. It was an active publisher, its catalogue showing 12 Annual reports, 13 Final volumes or monographs, 27 Bulletins, 12 Miscellaneous volumes, and 17 Unclassified publications, besides numerous maps. The number of separate scientific papers included in the Annual reports, Bulletins, and Miscellaneous publications runs into the hundreds. Among the authors are many who were then or have since become eminent in their several branches of scientific research.

A PUZZLE IN THE ANNALS

The *Annals of Congress* is the series in 42 volumes which records, so far as was possible at the date of publication, the proceedings of the first 17 Congresses and the 1st session of the 18th. A note in the October, 1908, Monthly catalogue concerning the *Annals* did not supply all the details needed to give librarians and others interested a full understanding of the set.

Two volumes were compiled by Joseph Gales, senior, and published by Gales and Seaton with the imprint date 1834. The title pages are: *The debates and proceedings in the Congress of the United States [etc.] comprising the period from March 3, 1789, to March 3, 1791, inclusive.* On the back the lettering is *Debates in Congress, old series. Vol. 1, 1789-90. Vol. 2, 1790-91.*

It seems most improbable that the words "old series" were used in the back title when the books were a new series first issued. These words must have been an afterthought, but when they were first supplied does not appear. Apparently all copies now extant have them. No indications have been found that any more volumes than the first two, covering the period of the 1st Congress, were published for several years after 1834. In 1849 the same publishers

proceeded with the issue of additional volumes, including the reprinting of volumes 1 and 2. In this reprint the former title pages were reproduced in full, including the imprint date 1834, but a half-title was prefixed, as follows: *Annals of the Congress of the United States; First Congress*. The back titles also were changed to read *Annals of Congress, 1st Congress, 1st and 2d sess., Vol. 1, 1789-90*.

Though specific data are wanting, it is a moral certainty that the *Annals of Congress* volumes 1 and 2, though bearing the imprint date 1834, were not then printed, though it is equally certain that the volumes 1 and 2 labeled on the back *Debates in Congress* were printed in that year.

March 4, 1849, Congress directed the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House to subscribe, in behalf of Congress, for 1,000 copies of the *Debates and Proceedings of Congress*, "from the termination of the first Congress, where the present publication stops, until the end of the fourth Congress, the same having been compiled and ready for the press." This was the beginning, which led to the publication of 40 additional volumes. Sept. 30, 1850, Congress directed the Secretary and the Clerk to make a new subscription for 2,000 sets (of which the 1,000 already subscribed for should be a part) and to begin at the first session of Congress, thus including the two volumes published in 1834 and making necessary the reprint of those two volumes which has proved a puzzle because of the fact that the two prints, though having the same volume numbers, title pages, and imprint dates, do not "match up," so that the library which has volume 1 of one print and vol. 2 of the other finds an accountable discrepancy between the two. [See *Statutes at large*, vol. 9, pages 419, 524, 543, 599.]

Really the contents of the two volumes taken together are identical, though the number of columns in the two prints differ.

The *Annals* is one of the old-fashioned sets which has each of its pages divided into two columns, each column instead of each page being numbered. Vol. 1 of the first print, back-titled *Debates in Congress*, old series, contains 1322 columns, while the same volume in the second or *Annals of Congress* print contains only 1170 columns. Vol. 2 of the first print begins at column 1323, connecting with Vol. 1 of the same print. Vol. 2 of the second print begins at column 1171, connecting with Vol. 1 of the same print. As both prints are still extant, they sometimes get mismated in libraries, as the Superintendent of Documents has reason to know because of inquiries received. If the librarian has Vol. 1 in the *Annals of Congress* print and Vol. 2 in the *Debates in Congress* print, he is very likely to think that he has lost 153 columns somewhere between the two volumes, while if his Vol. 1 is of the first or *Debates in Congress* print and his Vol. 2 of the second or *Annals of Congress* print there appears to be a duplication of 151 columns.

As librarians identify books by their title pages and not by the binders' titles on the backs, and as the title pages of the first and second prints are identical even to the imprint dates, these mix-ups are the more likely to occur.

It is difficult to account for the anomalous and misleading act of Gales and Seaton in retaining the imprint date 1834 on the reprint of Vols. 1 and 2 made in the 50's. The Gales of the firm was the son of Joseph Gales, senior, by whom Vols. 1 and 2 had been compiled, and the Seaton of the firm was his son-in-law. Mr. Gales, senior, died in 1841. It is conceivable that the firm so intimately related to him felt some scruples as to changing the title pages which he had affixed to his chief work.

No trace has been found in the Statutes of an appropriation, either directly or in the old-time fashion of an authorized subscription by the Secretary of the Senate or the Clerk of the House, in aid of the publication of Vols. 1 and 2, *Debates in Congress*, published in 1834.

LIGHT-HOUSE DISTRICTS

The new Bureau of Light-Houses, which recently superseded the Light-House Board, has announced a rearrangement of the light-house districts. The Third subdistrict becomes the Ninth district; the Ninth district becomes the Twelfth; the Fifteenth district becomes the Thirteenth; the Sixteenth becomes the Fifteenth; Alaska, formerly a part of the Thirteenth district, is made a district by itself and numbered the Sixteenth; the remainder of the Thirteenth district becomes the Seventeenth; the Twelfth district becomes the Eighteenth; the Hawaiian and other American Pacific Islands, formerly the Twelfth subdistrict, becomes the Nineteenth district. The First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Tenth, Eleventh, and Fourteenth districts remain unchanged in boundaries and numbers.

RAILROAD SECURITIES COMMISSION

Sec. 16 of the act to create a Commerce Court, etc., usually called the Commerce act (Statutes, 61st Congress, 2d session, Chap. 309), authorizes the President to appoint a Commission "to investigate questions pertaining to the issuance of stocks and bonds by railroad corporations," etc. The President has appointed as the members of this Commission President Arthur T. Hadley of Yale University, who is Chairman, Frederick N. Judson of St. Louis, Frederick Strauss of New York, Walter L. Fisher of Chicago, and Professor B. H. Meyer of Madison, Wis. The Commission has been assigned quarters in the Senate office building, has appointed Mr. W. E. S. Griswold as its secretary, has assumed the title Railroad Securities Commission, and has actively taken up its work. [See Session laws, 61st Congress, 2d session, part 1, page 556.]

TESTING OF STRUCTURAL MATERIALS

The testing of structural materials "both belonging to and for the use of the United States," formerly conducted by the Geological Survey, has been transferred to the Bureau of Standards, the equipment for the work being also transferred. The Standards Bureau has now, in addition to its main laboratories in Washington, a laboratory at Atlantic City for the study of the effects of sea water and sea air on structural materials; another at Northampton, Pa., for the testing of cement for the Isthmian Canal Commission, and a third at Pittsburg for testing a variety of materials. These facilities of the Bureau are available to all Departments of the Government.

There was a popular impression, derived, no doubt, from the terms of Public act 179, approved May 16, 1910, that the testing of structural materials was to be transferred from the Geological Survey to the new Bureau of Mines. The direction of the transfer was, however, changed by an amendment to the Sundry civil act, approved June 25, 1910.

AN UNPUBLISHED BULLETIN

Several months ago, when Leaflet 40, Structural materials, was published by the Superintendent of Documents, the Geological Survey had "in preparation" an unnumbered bulletin to be entitled Investigations of concrete and reinforced concrete at ten technological institutions, and an announcement to this effect was included in the leaflet.

The bulletin thus announced has not been published and a statement concerning it seems to be required because of inquiries from correspondents. It is learned that in the turnover of the structural materials work from the Geological Survey to the Standards Bureau this unnumbered and unpublished bulletin was included. The Standards Bureau has not yet made an announcement as to its publication.

AN ERROR CORRECTED

An error has been discovered in the index and one of the side notes of the Session laws, 61st Congress, 2d session, part 1. It refers to Chap. 373, An Act relating to liens on vessels for repairs, supplies, or other necessities. Section 5 of this act provides that the Act "shall supersede the provisions of all State statutes conferring liens on vessels," etc., but by an unaccountable slip the side note and the index entry both say "State laws *not* superseded." The plates have now been corrected, and in copies of the Session laws hereafter printed and in the Statutes at large, vol. 36, the word "not" will not appear in this connection. [Session laws, 61st Congress, 2d session, pages 605 and LXXVI.]
